Cats lose another OT heartbreaker

Loss silences UK students in Louisiana

NEW ORLEANS - Before the game, UK students stood outside the Louisiana Superdome making all the noise. Michigan's students,

all the noise. Michigan's students, also picking up their tickets, could barely muster a round of "Hail to the Victors."

But by night's end, an 81-78 Wolverine overtime victory forced a role reversal that left UK students stunned.

"Everybody just sat there like they were hoping there was more time on the clock," psychology senior Kelly Sullivan said.

"Two years in a row in overtime—in hurts," she said.

Education senior Gema Hernandez sat on the back of her chair, holding her head in her hands.
"There should have been a foul, and Michigan did not deserve it," she said. "If they're gonna beat us, then they better win it all."

Some fans sat in their chairs looking out at the sea of maize and blue celebrating on the floor.
"I don't feel like doing anything but just sitting here," civil engineering senior Eric Mosolgo said.

A few minutes earlier the mood was much different. UK fam roared when Jalen Rose's last-second attempt to win it for Michigan in regulation fell short. With the Cats up four in overtime, some felt confident of a UK win. Then Jamal Mashburn fouled

"I guess Mashburn fouling out just killed us," Mosolgo said.
Pre-pharmacy student Chris Walker blamed the referees.
"The fourth foul on Mashburn was what bothered me," he said. "It was a little sissy foul. I think we didn't get a lot of calls."
Walker also gave credit to an uncanny night at the line for Michigan.
"I've never seen 'em shoot free throws like they did today," he said.

"Michigan just got lucky, that's all I can say," elementary education freshman April Fluty said. Though disappointed, Fluty said she was glad she came.
"I feel like the trip was worth it. I got my money's worth. It was agreat game."

Michigan's rebounding key to Wildcats' defeat

NEW ORLEANS — UK rolled into the Final Four like a world superpower. The Cats had more power than President Clinton, more force than Hurricane Andrew and more support than Jim Valvano.

It seemed they had reached has

It seemed they had reached basketball's equivalent of leaping tall buildings in a single bound.

But bounding wasn't a part of UK's arsenal Saturday evening at the Louisiana Superdome. It was, however, in Michigan's.

The Wolverines prevailed in overtime to win the battle of the superpowers 81-78.

"They rebound like Charles Barkley." UK coach Rick Pittino said. "They're a great rebounding abalt team."

"I think they had a great rebounding game," UK freshman Jared Prickett said. "That's probably where they won it."

Michigan gathered 40 rebounds and scored 20 second-chance points.

"They got a lot of second shots," junior Gimel Martinez said. "Rebounding was the differ-The Wolverines, college basket-

The Wolverines, college basket-ball's sleeping superpower, came out of hibernation early in the sec-ond half. Following a Jimmy Kin Jayup with 13:31 left, Michigan had its biggest lead of the game 52-41. A dunk by Michigan senior Eric Riley with 12:54 left in regulation made the score 54-44. Like any super hero. UK did not roll over and die. The Cats stormed back with a Jamal Mash-burn driving layup and back to back three-pointers by Travis Ford and Dale Brown pulling UK to within two.

With just 10 ticks left, Wildcat hopes once again rested firmly on Ford's shoulders. After being fouled by Michigan's King, Ford found himself staring at a rim 15 feet away — with an entire state staring back.

"He's gotta make these," UK cheerleader Mike Pare said just before referee Gerry Donaghy handed Ford the ball.

The junior calmly nailed both freebies, tying the score at 71.

A desperation shot at the buzzer by Michigan's Jalen Rose caught nothing but iron and the two powers took a breather before battling for an extra five minus.

Haggin Hall, Blanding Tower damaged in postgame rampage

After the Michigan Wolverines defeated the UK Wildcats Satur-day night in New Orleans, some UK fans took out their anger and frustration on campus residence

At least one floor in Haggin Hall was damaged, and a window on the 23rd floor of Blanding Tower was broken Saturday night.

Bob Clay, director of residence life, said that "surprise and disap-pointment" accurately described his feelings about the incidents in the two residence halls.

Clay said police reports were filed concerning the damage and staff members at the residence

halls were trying to find out who caused the damage.

He said the students could face a disciplinary bearing and that re-imbursement for the items damaged would be the minimum penalty if they were found to be guitty of causing the damage, "The cost will be assessed, and (the guilty) will pay the freight," Clay said. "We will assess the responsibility of the people involved."

University may allot money to kill campus pigeons

UK is considering allotting mon-ey to kill pigeons on campus be-cause they are a "nuisance," one administrator said. "The pigeons build nests on buildings, blocking vents and gut-ters," Vice Chancellor for Adminis-tration Jack Blanton said. "We don't know how much the proce-dure will cost, but we have contact-ed the U.S. Department of Agricul-ture to assess the problem and

"We have been considering kill-ing the pigeons, but we haven't made any definite plans yet."

Animal Damage Control, a division of the Department of Agriculture, has been called in by the administration to assess the pigeon problem.

this year on the crows and starlings found dead all over campus," Rob-erts said.

"When the pigeon population is reduced, the birds fill in the gap over the next year, so the problem develops into an endless cycle," she said.

Kim Roberts, a member of People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals, said Animal Damage Control kills the birds using poison, which does not solve the problem.

"They are planning on using poison, the same means used earlier on pigeons and corroborated Rob-

rheath risks are used as an ex-cuse so people will accept what is going to happen," Roberts said. "The Urban County Government spent \$15,535 to poison the birds. UK won't spend that much, but it will cost them a considerable amount."

PETA proposes that instead of killing the birds, the University should allot money to modify buildings or install a service to take care of the problem.

"If the University is so concerned with budget cuts, then why are they allotting money to kill pigeons?" Zentall asked.

"I think the University wants to get rid of a problem that doesn't even exist," he said. "I don't know where they perceive the problem is coming from."

Zentall said he had heard there are between 25 and 400 pigeons on campus. "I've seen about four or five pigeons since last September."

He said UK should be cone with bad publicity it may re from killing the pigeons.

College of Dentistry receives \$40,000 grant

The UK College of Deutistry received a grant for \$40,000 from the U.S. Public Health Service through the Pacific Island Health Officers Association.

The funds were given to address the oral health needs for the U.S.-affiliated Pacific Islands — American Samoa, Northern Mariana Islands, Micronesia, Guam, Marshall Islands and Palan.

UK is the only dental school in the United States to receive this grant.

The dental school's proposal is to design an undergraduate career ladder that will produce individuals with general practice dental degrees.

The project's goal is to develop a comprehensive plan for the training of multiple levels of dental professionals. Emphasis will be placed on helping students develop the knowledge, skills and attitudes necessary to be active in lifelong learning and community health issues.

Dean elected next president of national group

Peggy S. Meszaros, dean of the College of Human Environmental Sciences, has been elected president-lect of the American Home Economics Association.

Meszaros will serve as president-elect of the 23,000-meinber organization during the 1993-94 year and as resident during the 1994-95 year.

She will be only the second Kentuckian to serve as president of the AHEA and is the first since the early

1920s. "I look forward to providing leadership during a time of societal peril in our country, for an organization that deals so directly with quality of life," Meszaros said.

Institute obtains \$1 million in federal funding

A program to train UK students to serve children with disabilities and the children's families has received more than \$1 million in federal funding.

The program, which is aimed at improving the levels of service to children, from newborns to 21-year-olds, with disabilities and other special needs, takes an interdisciplinary approach that combines the expertise of faculty members from 14 different areas.

The program is being conducted by UK's Interdisciplinary Human Development Institute, with core funding provided by the federal Burean of Maternal and Child Health. The initial funding will cover the first 32 months of the program.

"The purpose of the program is to prepare professionals in health care and related disciplines to address the special health-care needs of children with mental retardation and other developmental disabilities through a comprehensive and coordinated approach," said Karen Middendorf, IHDI associate director.

Project has successful first year

The UK Family Connections Project is working to create opportunities with disabled people's families that any feel isolated from, or abandoned by, their communities.

Officials said they are happy with the project's progress in its first year.

"During our first year we worked with 14 families," said Carol O'Reilly, project coordinator in UK's Intersicularly Human Development Institute. "We' were shocked at the level of isolation some families have apprienced."

The project's intent is to provide ways for families to activate their own support systems — to tur other and their communities for support, officials said.

"As a family tells its story outside the immediate family, this starts a chain of reactions and inter O'Reilly said.

O'Reilly and her staff are developing a model that families may use and teach to other families. Reilly and her staff are developing a model that families may use and teach to other families network with friends, other family members, other members of the community and profession

nel.

After working a year on the Family Connections Project, the staff is convinced that every family has resources—they simply need opportunities to share their resources with others.

"The critical piece to the puzzle is to find the opportunities for families to share," O'Reilly said. "Once this happens, the isolation ends and there is increased awareness of other networks and support groups."

NEW ORLEANS — It's two different philosophies, that's all. Dean Smith operates according to a different set of beliefs than does Steve Fisher, but Smith has never

Michigan and North Carolina square off tonight at the Louisiana Superdome at 9:22 p.m. Smith said he wouldn't have done it the other way. Maybe he doesn't have the guts. he said, but freshmen just don't play at North Carolina. They certainly don't start. That's what Smith believes, but it doesn't mean he's right.

"There are no words to explain how great a player Shery! Swoopes is," Texas Tech coach Marsha Sharp said. "We're pleaced she was able to show the hation as a whole the great things she was capable of doing."

Swoopes, voted the Final Four appearance. The Lady Raiders finished with 19 straight victories and a 31-3 record and broke a 14-game winning streak for Ohio State (28-4).

"Our players did what we wanted all year long and they wanted all year long and they

Sharp said. "These are great kids. They always seem to do whatever it takes. It is a great moment for Tech, for our fans, for our program and for our co-nference."

Tech became the second Southwest Conference school to win the women's title, following Texas in 1986.

win the women's title, following Texas in 1986. Swoopes obliterated the record of 28 points in a women's title game by Dena Head of Tennessee and Dawn Staley of Virginia in the 1991 finals. The record in the men's Tinals was 44 by UCLA's Bill Walton against Memphis State in 1973.

She fell short of the all-time women's NCAA tournament mark of 50 points by Drake's Lorri Bauman against Maryland in the 1982 West Regional final. The mark for points in an entire tournament was 134 by Tennessee's Bridgette Gordon in 1989, and Auburn's Carolyn Jones see's Bridgette Gordon in 1989, and Auburn's Carolyn Jones held the free-throw record of 41, set in 1990.

The overall single-game record is 60 points by Cindy Brown of Long Beach State against San Jose State on Feb. 16, 1987.

"At a point in the game, I felt I wanted to personally take control of the game," Swoopes said, "A couple of times down the floor, they did a good job getting the ball to me and I felt like I needed to score whenever I got it."






Michael McKinnell Kallmann, McKinnell, and Wood, Boston (Architects for the new Commonwealth Library)

Protection from sun necessary to avoid long-term effects

There are, however, some impor-tant health issues to consider before soaking up ultraviolet rays — natu-ral or manufactured by a tanning

Unprotected exposure to the sun has long-term, cumulative and permanent effects, such as premature aging of the skin, wrinkles, precancerous sores and skin cancer.

Even if you were a sunhather at one time but have decided not to sunhathe anymore, skin cancers can develop years after the sun has damaged your skin. If a child or teenager has had even one blister-ing sunburn, he or she may be at a

Malignant melanoma is the most

Malignant melanoma is the most dangerous type of skin cancer because it has a strong tendency to spread to other parts of the body if not treated early enough. Melanoma is on the rise, having increased from one case in 1.500 people to one case per 150 people since 1930. When diagnosed in the early stages melanoma can be cured easily.

More immediate risks associated More immediate risks associated with sun exposure include sunburn or sun poisoning. Sunburn may result in extreme tenderness, pain, swelling and blistering. In some cases, there may be fever, chills, nausea and delirium. It is recom-

mended to seek medical attention for severe burns.

Sunburn actually is the skin's response to injury. In the tanning process, the sun kills some skin cells on contact and injures others.

Ultraviolet rays penetrate the skin's inner layer, producing melanin, which works its way to the outer layers and becomes the "bronzed" look many people work so diligently to achieve. Frequently, though, the "price" for a good tan is tough, wrinkled skin later in life.

life.

Excessive sun exposure over the years will result in sagging and aging skin and increased frequency of skin cancer. UV rays bounce off sand, water, decks and even snow.

The rays also can penetrate white fabric and wet clothes, and can reach into three feet of water.

People who have particular sys-temic or medical conditions that cause the skin to be particularly sensitive to sun exposure should be aware they need special protection against potential sunburn. The same is true for anyone taking cer-tain medications, such as tetracy-

attacks the fiber that keeps the skin resilient. The result is sagging skin. UV-A rays also injure the eyes, increasing the risk of cataracts.

For a safer time in the sun, try the following:

Do your best to avoid direct contact with the sun from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. during the summer, or limit your exposure to short periods (10 to 20 minutes), as your tan develops, especially if you are fair-skinned.

It now is known that the UV-A rays generated in tanning salons will greatly accelerate the skin's aging process.

The radiation from these lights penetrates deep into the skin and

fair skin who burn easily and tan minimally should use a product with a SPF of 15 or greater;
- Skin types 3 and 4: For those who burn moderately and tan gradually or burn minimally and tan easily, a sunscreen designed for prolonged exposure, an SPF of 8 to 15, is recommended;
- Skin types 5 and 6: People with dark or black colored skin would not necessarily need a sunseren in some situations because the higher level of pigment in their skin provides more natural protection.
