These young people are standing at the edge of a great precipice, not because they are seeking excitement or want to pull some publicity stunt. They are the honest victims of a poor economic system—the victims of circumstances over which they had no control.

Shall we help them to climb to a higher and safer landing, or stand and see them crumple and fall into the mighty abyss that awaits the poor and ignorant? We might do as many other schools have had to do, drop them from the roll. This would be the easy and common course, but it would not be the Christian and best course to take with such precious lives at stake.

We propose to establish a Student Loan Fund, from which these young folks can borrow the necessary amount needed after they have worked faithfully to meet their expenses. The amount borrowed is to be paid back with interest after graduation.

Will you help us to answer this Macedonian Call? Be the sum ever so small it will be greatly appreciated and the Lord will bless it to His glory. It will be a great blessing in the years to come to be able to point to some great national character and be able to say, "I helped to save that individual."




