July 25, 1900. Miss Laura Clay, Lexington. Ky. My Dear Friend: --From the day I sent you my telegram I have purposed to write you my word of sympathy on the loss of your noble mother. I have thought of you and your sisters a great, great many times, but always with the feeling that the loss for all was more heavily felt by you, because of the fact that you had the personal care and responsibility for so many years, and that each of the others has her home and her children, and two of them their husbands, left to love and be loved by. I am wondering if you will continue to keep up that delightful home in Lexington, in which Mrs. Catt and myself were so hospitably entertained in January, 1895. I can remember your mother so beautiful and noble on that occasion. I am moved to write this morning because Mrs. Catt, Miss Shaw and myself while at Chautauqua ten days ago decided that it was very important to have a B. C. meeting called at the earliest possible date. I suggested that it should be here in the Anthony home at No. 17 Madison St., Rochester, N. Y., not because I am not perfectly willing and ready to go to the home of any one of the other seven members of the committee; but simply because I would like to have you all visit me here, and \*\*\* I think Rochester to be the most central place for the other members.

July 25, 1900, (L. C.) Mrs. Catt's letter, received this morning, says (what I wrote her last night) that it is simply impossible for our different members, living so far apart and having no chance for discussion of the various questions, to give an intelligent vote upon them. I wrote her that I had not felt competent heretofore and feel vastly less so now, since in her letters she says: "I ask you to make the returns as speedily as possible. More importance is attached to these answers of yours than perhaps you may realize." I feel none of us should be asked to vote on a question without knowing the importance of the results which are to follow its being carried or lost. She also writes now that Miss Blackwell wants the meeting to be by the middle of August if possible, during her transit from Chilmark to her other summer resort in Canada. I have written Miss Shaw this morning, asking her to give the very earliest dates in August that she can possibly

stop here.

Now, my dear Miss Clay, I very much hope you will be able to come on to the meeting, whatever date shall be fixed. I should love dearly to have you under my own roof, not only during the B. C. meeting, but for a good visit either before or after, as might best suit you. I have told Mrs. Catt that I did not think our meeting could be effective without your presence. I felt last winter that we needed you very, very much.

I have written Mrs. McCulloch inviting her to come, but I hardly expect she will feel like either leaving at home or taking with her her two children, and we can get along without her a great deal better than we can without you. Indeed, we can't get along at all without you. Were it not

My Dear Friend: --

Your B. C. letter of July 30, with your private note of July 31, is here by this morning's mail. Since August 13 can give us only one day of full committee it seems to me the only practical thing is to put the meeting off until August 26 or later when we can have the entire committee Miss Blackwell's engagement is a visiting one and she expressed herself entirely willing to change its date, and the last week of August is the one which Mrs. Foster Avery first indicated as her preference. " The time has come when she ought to be provided with a private clerk, even if we have to dispense with some other line of work in order to secure one. Miss Shaw agrees with me that this should be done at once, and says it is a better investment to save Mrs. Catt than to put the money that we have in a mortgage. While I have no authority to take a vote, I am going to do it; the result I am sure will be unanimous in favor of the Secretary, with the request to Mrs. Catt that she shall immediately act upon it. Every society to celebrate her birthday as it should be done ought to have the History of Woman Suffrage at hand. You will see by the Woman 's Journal that Mrs. Harriot Stanton Blatch in recommending speeches made by her mother throughout the whole of her life time, for she died just before the fourth volume went to press. The Journal of

r sek 30, 1903 Oct. 3 contains a reference to the magazine articles written at the time of her death. With these two authorities all the societies throughout the country can get data for a suitable celebration. I enclose here with a circular of the History and urge that every club which does not possess a copy will endeavor to do so at the earliest possible moment. If every local club cannot afford to purchase the History then let ever so many of you ask the city or town library to buy them and so place them where they can be seen by all. My dear Friend--

I was glad to get your letter of Feb. 20th. As I expected, I see you thought of Alice for Editing Secretary, but whom did you think of for Recording Secretary? That is an important thing to be worked for, and the two auditors, -- we ought always to think of their value upon the board. Because the numbers are so small, we want women of thought and good judgment in every place, not only for the particular work they do themselves but also for the general outlook. Could Mrs. Babcock serve as Recording Secretary? As you say, Mrs. Upton should be the one to think out who is the best one for Recording Secretary. If that could be some person who is footloose and could go and stay at Warren, it would be a good thing, but then we would want some one perfectly agreeable to Mrs. Upton. I note all you say about Mrs. Upton's time being so filled with the details of work that she has no time to give to thoughts about initiating work. She is a real good hand for that when she has time, so I think she should be relieved. If another clerk at headquarters could do it, we should get one. So long as we do not pay our officers a salary, we have no right to load them down with work beyond their strength, and I think Mrs. Upton has altogether too much to do. You will have seen, during the three months that you have been there, how she devotes every minute of her time to the work of the association and all of

that that it is possible to put into the hands of a clerk, should be so put. The principals of our public schools nowadays do not have a class in a single study. They superintend and initiate plans of work for all the different teachers that are under them. A principal was in the other day and she said she did not hear a single class but that she was busier now than under the old regime, when principals had classes, but you see we require so much more of the heads of departments now than we used to. We have no choice about the enlargement or scope of our work. It is going to grow and grow very rapidly too, and we want continually to expand to meet the demand, so I think the new secretary should be a woman who could be exceedingly useful there at headquarters, and that Mrs. Upton should be relieved from the drudgery and every-day work, so that she can go out in Ohio now and then, and even to adjoining states, to organize and to cheer and to comfort the societies, for she can do an immense work in that line.

I am so glad that you have been at the headquarters this winter, and have learned of all the work that must fall upon the head of the manager and that it needs an assistant, but who it shall be you and Mrs. Upton there together must find out.

Dear Mas Anthony: I have not written to you earlier about Oklahoma because I wantd to wait until I had become familiar enough with the conditions here to be able to give you an impartial judgment of the situation. When I first came into the territory, I felt very much encouraged, as the old friends here in Guthrie received me so cordially, and there seemed to have been considerable growth in sentiment among the representative women, who were quite agitated over the Attorney General's having decided two years ago that women could not vote on school questions in cities of the first-class; and as the schools of Withrie were in a dreadfully demoralized condition, a good many of these women were clamoring for the right to wote in school elections, which they had before Guthrie became a city of the first-class. Wy first judgment was, therefore, that suffrage sentiment had considerably grown in the territory as it seemed to have grown in Guthrie. But the more I learn of the rest of the territory, the more I am impressed that this growth is more in Guthrie than any where else, and that it has been stimulated by local conditions. On the other hand, I have learned some thing about the territory which, it seems to me, make the situation a very grave one. In the

First place, you have probably read the Bhabling Act of the new Omnibus Bill which has just been reported from the committee, and which will undoubtedly pass the House and be hung up in the Senate until next winter that "male citizens over twenty-one years of age" will be the qualified voters for delegates to the constitutional convention. I think the act has been written that way on purpose, so as to shut out any possibility of our carrying the next legislature, and getting a right to vote on the delegates and on the constitution itself, for undoubtedly if we should carry the legislature, we would not be allowed to vote on the constitution, owing to this Enabling Act. It is my impression that those who were qualified to vote for members of the legislature in other territories, were qualified to vote on the constitution. Was this not true in Wyoming and Utah, and did not the women vote on those Constituions? Dennis Flynm, has just been to Washington helping them to fix up that Omnibus Bill, and I think he has seen to it that the Enabling Act was worded in that way.

Now, of course, this Omnibus Bill has not passed, and undoubtedly will not pass the Senate until next winter, but since it will in all probability pass the Mouse, I do not believe any change in it could be effected, and this takes away our strongest appeal to the women to organis for work in the legislature, in the hope that they might get suffrage and have the opportunity to vote on the constitution.

But a more discouraging feature still, is the situation in the territory itself. The territory changed since we were here five years ago. It has certainly made the most marvelous growth of any country in recent years, not only in population, but in wealth, and the people are simply dissy with their prosperity. In the mean time the saloen has flourished like a green bay tree, and is exceedingly impudent and high handed in its power. It has terrorised the people who have lifted a hand

against it by breaking them financially, and its wealthy emissaries join the church in order to terrorize the preachers and hold the balance of power in the church by their wealth, so that I find about the same conditions here now, that we found in South Dakota six years ago, which rendered it impossible for us to accomplish any thing. The people who oppose the saloons are such rabid, intense people that they are generally unpopular, and would not carry much influence for us, while the people of a more temperate judgment do not dare to ally themselves with us for fear of being affected financially by the malcons: consequently about the only people that I can get to take hold are the W. C. T. U. women and prohibition ministers whose position is well known on the liquor question. In sending out my letters for the route, I purposely steered clear of the W. C. T. U. women, addressing my letters to ministers, editors, and olub women, but invariably before I can get held of any + body who will do anything it comes around to the W. C. T. V. women. The club women write respectful letters and refer me to the officers of the W. C. T. U.; the editors do the same, and like wise the ministers, except a few who are undoubtedly prohibitionists.

The W. G. T. U. has very materially grown in this territory.

Indeed it is the most active W. C. T. U. that I have found in my travels, and these women are concentrating their efforts upon getting prohibition in the constitution, and the prohibition men are helping them, so that there has been enough prohibition activity in the territory to place the liquor men on their guard, and they have found a special organization separate from their regular Idquor Dealer's Association, and more respectable in appearances, for the purpose of fighting prohibition in the constitution, and they have headquarters at Enid, and organizers in the field. One of them who claims to be a liberal minister, and who opened his meeting with the Lord's Prayer, lectured here resterday.

Now, of course this association will fight woman suffrage just as strenuously as it will fight prohibition, and with its forces already organized, and with headquarters, and workers already in the field, they will undoubtedly have the delegates to the constitution pledged before ever they are elected.

We have had hard enough fights with the liquor power when they did not consider us of sufficient importance to organize against us before we got into the legislature, and it seems to me with their organization effected this early, and with the mints of money which they have at command, and with their power to terrorize respectable citizens by their threats of financial wreckage, there is not any very good prospect for us ahead.

Miss Shaw and Mrs. Catt have both written that they felt that Oklahoma would be hopeless if the Indian Territory were annexed to it, and you know this has been done in the enabling act, and the Oklahomans have pretty generally accepted the situation. I tried not to feel that it would be hopeless with that territory annexed, because I thought that having had prohibition in the Indian Territory, there would not be a liquor organization there to fight us, and perhaps it would not be much harder to convert sober half-breed Indians, than drunken white people. but I have been told since that the people there, having no whiskey to drink, simply drink lemon extract and Peruna, and get about as drunk as they do elsewhere. I am also told that the white people there are the off-scouring of the world; criminals that have fled from justice and have changed their names; and a generally worthless outfit that have married Indians, and others who have tried to prove Indian blood in order to get land. Several different parties have given me this description of the inhabitants of the Indian Territory, and if this be true, I shall certainly agree with Miss Shaw and Mrs. Catt that the Indian Territory is hopeless.

I thought when I was in Montana that the high-handed-ness of the liquor and gambling elements was the worst that I had ever seen, and that Wontana was a pretty barren field, but even there we had considerable advantage over what we have in Oklahoma, for there we had very generally the support of the Labor Unions, and they were a tremendous power in our favor, that is, as any power in our favor goes; they made themselves felt in the legislature, and they pretty generally voted for us; but here the Labor Unions are poorly organized, and not very strongly affiliated with the Territorial Organization, and I am told that their power in politics is practically nothing; so while good Mr. Lynch sent a very cordial letter to our convention inviting us to come to the territory and help them secure suffrage for the women, yet I doubt if they will be able to control a single vote in the legislature or the constitutional convention. Also in Montana there had been no prohibition agitation, and consequently the saloen element did not have its back up against us so determinedly, as was evidenced by the fact that some of the bar tenders' unions passed resolutions along with other Labor Organizations, indorsing woman suffrage.

As to the newspapers, there is an editor of a weekly here in Guthrie, who is a suffragist, and who has asked me to write for his columns; he used to be a reporter on the Gapital when I was here before, and was very helpful to us then. But the dailies, both in Guthrie and Oklahoma City, are controlled by the powers that be.

The editor of the Capital (Republican) told me that he was not favorable, but that he would publish some suffrage matter. However, his paper has already opened fire upon us edutorially, and we shall get no support from that quarter.

The Times-Journal of Oklahoma City, also Republican, is adited by a man who used to be a good friend of mine in Kansas, but since he came to the Territory he has degenerated into a rng politician, and has P. 6. S.B.A.

killed a wan since I saw him five years ago. He would not help us then, and of course, will not now. The Leader and the Oklahoman, both Democratic, always were opposed.

So, as I have been making a careful study of the situation the past month, having weighed every influence against every other influence as best I could, the outlook does not seem very promising to me, and I feel it my duty to write the plain truth to the Business Committee before any more money is spent in the territory.

Now, as to the favorable conditions, I will say that I believe the Governor is a genuine suffragist, and all the women with whom I have talked, except one, are of the same opinion. One woman in Oklahoma City told me she did not believe he was anything more than a ring politician like the rest of the gang, Flynn, Grimes, etc.; but the women in Guthrie swear by him and declare that they know he is a true blue suffragist and temperance man, and he impresses me as being honest and sincere; but of course I have no means of estimating how much he would do for us other than sign a suffrage bill, which I feel very sure he would do.

the bright side of everything, and that I should not lose my hope and courage, and indeed I have not lost them; but there always hangs over me a very solemn obligation to make the best possible use of our limited means, and I must confess, that with these conditions confronting us, it d does look like a waste of money to spend it on Oklahoma; and since I have learned about the Liquor Dealers' special organization, and that the enabling act expressly excludes women, and that the Labor Organizations are so weak, and that the situation in the Indian Territory is so unpromising, my conscience troubles me & out spending any more money before I have laid the matter before the Business Committee; and I am therefore sending copies of this letter to each member of the Business Committee, so that if you feel that we should not spend any more money on Oklahoma,

P. 7. S.B.A. action can be taken before I have the route for the last two months made up. This trip is going to be an expensive one if I reach to the far western part of the territory, for I have failed to find any one to take full charge of my route; I have a young girl from the Business college who can work fairly well under my direction, but does not know how to force meetings in towns that are difficult, and I shall therefore have a good many of the meetings to work up on the spot myself, and I really feel it my duty to lay these things before the Business Committee before I plunge into this expense, so that if you feel that it is a waste of money to put it into Oklahoma, we can cut the work off and save the money for a more promising field. In the meantime, if you feel that with these conditions which I have outlined, it is still the best use to make of the money to go on, the work shall have my hardest and most devoted effort.
