Reasons for Protest

- 1. A new naval program of any sort is entirely inadvisable. The whole system of militarism is on trial in Europe. The conflict will, beyond question, establish a new order in Europe; and there seems no reasonable doubt that in its solution provisions will be made by which the burden of armaments will be in some degree removed from the nations of Europe, and therefore of the world. If Europe's solution of the problem results only in lowering the level of relative defense, the proportionate needs of the United States will be lessened.
- 2. Every new experience prescribes fundamental changes in construction. The dreadnaught is rendered obsolescent by the submarine and the aeroplane. Attempts to forecast the experience which will soon be in the hands of the naval constructors are useless. It is proper to conclude that any plans thus forecasted would, if realized in steel, simply involve a waste of the public money.
- 3. To-day serious men the world over see clearly that these monstrous armaments are vastly more a menace than a defense and that they are largely responsible for the ruin which has been wrought. That the war shall result in the drastic and universal reduction of armaments is therefore the imperative demand of the best European statesmanship. For the United States to consider at such a time the increase of her own armaments would indicate a most untimely readiness to intensify the very evil whose consequences now appall us and tend to check the great movement which all governments and all earnest men should unite to promote.

We the undersigned Citizens of the United States, Men and Women, unite in earnest protest against the exportation from this country of "the things that kill" for the use of nations engaged in the present conflict,—for humanitarian reasons—respectfully petition you in the cause of humanity and justice to call an extra session of Congress at once to invest you with the power to place an embargo on all arms and ammunition—basing our petition on International Law and precedent as follows:

Woolsey International Law: "If the neutral instead of wheat, should send powder or balls, cannon or rifles, this would be a direct encouragement of the war, and so a departure from the neutral position."

"On January 23rd, 1871, long after the Franco-Prussian War had begun, President Grant signed an embargo on arms. The result of this was that the war was settled within a few months and the shedding of much blood was prevented."

"President Taft in 1912 issued a proclamation forbidding the export of arms and munitions to Mexico."

"The British Government, has a law on its statute books, conferring discretionary power on the King of England to forbid the export of arms and ammunition. On April 23rd, 1898, at the time of the Spanish-American War that Government warned British subjects against unneutral acts, among which were enumerated the supplying of arms, ammunition, military stores or materials."

"During the Spanish-American War the German Government stopped the sale of arms and munitions of war to Spain."

"At this time every neutral country, except the United States, has placed an embargo on munitions of war."

For RATIFICATION OF REPEAL of the Eighteenth Amendment

PETITION

To the Secretary of State of the Commonwealth of Kentucky:

Pursuant to Section 4 of House Bill No. 1, entitled "An Act to provide for a convention to act upon the amendment to the Constitution of the United States providing for the repeal of the Eighteenth Amendment and to appropriate funds for certain expenses," passed at the special session of 1933 and signed by the Governor on September 7, 1933, we the undersigned and each of us, being citizens and residents of the State of Kentucky, state that we and each of us desire and are legally qualified to vote for the candidates hereinafter mentioned, and respectfully petition you to nominate and cause to be placed upon the official ballot under the heading: "For ratification of the Amendment to repeal the Eighteenth Amendment", each and all of the following group of nineteen delegates to a convention to be held at Frankfort, Kentucky, in the room of the House of the General Assembly in the State Capitol Building on Monday, November 27, 1933, at ten o'clock A. M., to consider and act upon the ratification of the following amendment to the Constitution of the United States proposed by the Congress of the United States to the several states;

"Section 1. The eighteenth article of amendment to the Constitution of the United States is hereby repealed.

"Section 2. The transportation or importation into any state, territory or possession of the United States for delivery or use therein of intoxicating liquors in violation of the laws thereof is hereby prohibited.

"Section 3. This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the Constitution by conventions in the several states, as provided in the Constitution, within seven years from the date of the submission hereof to the states by the Congress."
