Ridiculous Double Standard Also Plagues Other Schools

The double standard used here at UK for restricting co-eds while giving free rein to the men has long been a source of irritation with us. Another college paper recently printed a letter to the editor that does a good job of setting forth the situation in all its ridiculousness.

"Co-eds are supposed to have enough sense and maturity of judgment so that at 18, in many states, they are old enough to get married, join the service, or upon graduation from high school, decide whether they want to work, go to college, or get married.



Survey Queries Students, Faculty On Subsidized Marriage

Lautors Note — Some sociologists have suggested that parents subsidis: "enry" marriages, so couples —otherwise faced with an economic impasse—can go ahead and complete their education. The fol-lowing article summarizes a survey of UK opinion an the problem.

"If the parents are able to afford it, I see nothing wrong with accepting help from the families," said a junior in the Law College. "As for myself, though," he added, "if I were to get married, I would keep account of every cent I received and make sure that, when I was able to afford it, every penny of it was paid back."

Jean Rosenstone, Arts and Sciences junior, said she favored parental support by paying tuition. "They would do that much any way if they planned to send their children to college for four years," she asserted.

Bill Burleson, a junior, favored the parents' chipping in "about a fourth" of the expenses and added that he thought the wife should work and not go

to school.

Lois Fritz, Arts and Sciences junior, echoed Bill's
sentiments by saying. "the wife should be willing
to work and help her husband along, because, after
all, marriage is a 50-50 proposition."

Norman Berry, a sophomore in engineering, said
he thought subsidized marriage is all right, but
added, "I don't think the girl should work."

The question of age for marriage was brought up by Jay Wallace, a senior in Commerce, who said he considered the minimum age to be 20 years for the girl and 22 or 23 for the boy.

Dr. James Cladden, professor of sociology, also considered age an important factor in determining maturity. He said a junior or senior who is between the ages of 20 and 22 is usually mature and ready for marriage. He added that these individuals should be encouraged by parents and helped financially in setting up a home.

In answer to the theory that for each individual there is a psychological time for marriage, Dr. Cladden blasted it as a romantic fallacy and asserted it would be better if couples married when they were more rational.

Several students recommended that financial help from parents be worked out as a business deal. One married student believed the subsidy should be planned with both the couple and the parents knowing exactly what is to be expected of them.

Marilyn Steele, senior, said, "plans and definite arrangements should be worked out before marriage and there will be less likelihood of disagreements and unhappiness afterwards."

Dean of Women Sarah B. Holmes pointed out that married students do as well, if not better, scholastically than unmarried students, A married student agreed with Dean Holmes, saying, The married person is more inclined to stay at home Dr. James Gladden, professor of sociology, also

field that requires longer to graduate," reported a housemother, "it is better for the parents to help out, if they can afford it, than to have him drop out of school."

Those who were against subsidized marriages resented the feelings of dependence on their parents and the possibilities of parental control.

"I would be ashamed to ask Dad for any extra money just so I could get married," an Engineering student said. "The has helped me through two years of college so far and I just don't feel he should do any more."

Leo Griffin, a sophomore in Engineering said, "If you put too much dependence on your parents for money now, you will tend to lose self-reliance and you will have a much harder time when you have to depend only upon yourself."

A married student agreed with this opinion by saying that those who have parental support are not growing up. Because there are no financial worries, they have not taken on the full responsibilities of a marriage.

Joline Scoffeld, an Education sophomore, sum-med up the ideas of several students by saying, "If people are enough in love to get_married, they can wait until they are out of college and not have to rely on their parents to support them."

A recent bride who is working full time in a campus office, said, "We didn't ask for any help and aren't getting any." She added, however, that married students who pay their own way don't have time to take part in any extra-cirrucular activities.

Her lnusband, a senior in Commerce, works in a downtown store from 1 p.m. to 9 p.m. and has to study after he gets home. She says that after she has gotten the groceries and done the housekeeping, both of them 'are too tired to go anywhere. She admitted that they did feel independent, but thought that if both sets of parents would contribute equal amounts as sort of a "business loan," she would be able to finish her last year of college.

"We were married when we were both juniors," another student said. "Jean and I both held part time jobs and were able to just about make ends meet. Our parents played it smart, too, in giving us a welding present. They got their heads to-gether, and, knowing that we intended to stay in school, just gave us a sum of money in place of a present.






