Hate Free Lexington

Fred Phelps came to town for half a day Sunday morning, Nov. 24, protesting five churches because he believes they do not hate enough. He got some press coverage but when he left, the Lexington GLBT community had become more united, supported and celebrated by a good portion of the Lexington community. The hard work of many organizations within our community made this a huge success; they deserve our thanks, as do the straight supporters who turned out to stand with us.

Jamie McDanial, coordinator of Soul Force, offered training in non-violence and organized the counter protest at Christ The King Church in support of their decision to welcome Michael Meehan and Thomas Dysarz into their congregation and to baptize their quadruplets. About 45 people showed up in the chilly morning air to stand near the church doors to show our appreciation and to stand firmly against hate. Rally ignore them? confront them with angry words or fists? Or find a middle path, not silence, not combative, but radically non-violent in the tradition of Ghandi and King. Jamie led us in the third option, thanks for steping into a leadership role Jamie.

In the afternoon, hundreds of people showed up at the Hate Free Lexington Rally at the new Center for the Arts. Terry Mullins, GLSO President, Jim Dickinson, Co-Chair of Bluegrass Fairness Alliance, David Cupps, Member of Integrity's Board of Directors at St. Michaels Episcopal Church, and Allan Barger were four of the major organizes. Tara, Alix and crew did a wonderful job on the decorations. Forty One organizations signed on as

co-sponsors of this event.

There were so many high point in this afternoon that I have asked a variety of people for their personal vote for what gets mentioned in this limited space. SisterSound gave the Rally a rousing beginning with three wonderful songs. Debra Hensely was a great MC, who knew she could preach? Mayor elect Teresa Isaccs had one of the most quotable lines, "Fred, you're not in Kansas anymore." We appreciate her warmth and her undaunting support of our community.

Marta Miranda wove our struggle into the struggles of other oppressed peoples, and we would do well to become allies to others as we work for justice for ALL. Jamie McDanial made strong statements about the need for us to confront those ministers and churches that are much less hateful than Phelps but who nevertheless preach spiritually violent messages. He also commented on the ongoing need for LGBT people to root out our internalized homophobia and transphobia.


PIGS ARE FLYING

Gentle Adventure Retreats

Gentle Adventure Retreats for Women offers a combination of eco-adventure activities, unique experiences with local cultures, bodymind teachings, and opportunities for personal discovery. Meriah Kruise has developed retreats in Maui, Hawaii over the last four years and last year added a retreat in Pawley's Island South Carolina co-lead with Mary Crone.

Cost for the Maui trip starts at \$1850 for the 8 day option and for the Pawleys trip \$1,100 for 5 days and 6 nights. 

Boyd County GSA What You Can DO by Jeff Jones

A group of Boyd County (the county containing Ashland, KY) High School students sought to organize a GSA (gaystraight alliance) to offer support and educational opportunities for GLBT students at the school. Twice the Boyd County School Board turned down their application until advised by the ACLU that denying one group while allowing extra-curricular groups was against the law. The school system's insurance company also told the board that they would not cover legal liabilities associated with denying the group an equal opportunity to meet like other student groups because the group's right to meet was clearly legal. The School Board then voted 3-2 to approve the GSA.

Both during the process and afterwards, several area churches practicing a conser-

vative brand of Christianity have organized some adults and students to hold anti-gay protests opposing the GSA. This last weekend over 2,000 people gathered in an area parking lot to protest the GSA's existence. Several students have threatened to skip classes or move to another school rather than attend a school that allows a GSA to meet. Opponents of the GSA have even gone so far as to bring in radical right wing activists like Scott Lively who preaches that the Nazis were a gay sex cult, and the holocaust was an attempt to eliminate straight people.

I think we all can remember our own high school experiences as GLBT people or as strayt friends of GLBT teens. To have the bravery to fight for the GSA and to withstand almost daily, organized protests almost unseen in this country since racial integration in the 1960s takes a lot of guts. Many folks have written in asking how they can help. The GSA welcomes support but also wants to downplay any false idea that

the GSA results from some "gay agenda" pushed from outside the school. Having a lot of protesters come to Boyd County to support the GSA isn't probably the wisest option at this point. Here are ways you can help.

While teacher Kaye King has kindly offered to receive emails and letters to the GSA and pass them along, there is some concern she may get flooded. Kentucky Fairness Alliance has instead offered to gather letters/cards/emails of support and pass them along as a bundle. KFA will also count the number of letters of support that they receive to help educate legislators about why anti-bullying and anti-discrimination legislation is so important. If you have personal stories you are willing to share, please also send them to KFA: KFA at PO Box 3912 Louisville, KY 40201.

If you would like to write a letter supporting the School Board's approval of the GSA and relating how a GSA was/could have been a huge asset for you in your high school experience (or the experiences of friends), you can write to the Boyd County School Board at: Boyd County Public Schools 1104 Bob McCollough Drive Ashland, KY 41102

Urge them to additionally support an anti-bullying and anti-discrimination policy covering students and staff that covers sexual orientation and gender identity. Be polite, clear, and to-the-point. Board members: Shari Bryan, Chester Tackett, Teresa Jackson, Randall Stapleton, Teresa Cornette.

Write a letter to the editor of the Ashland Daily Independent supporting the GSA by emailing your letter to: mreliford@dailyindependent.com Letters must be under 300 words and include your name, address, and a phone number where you can be contacted. The Daily Independent does accept letters from outside Boyd County.

Contact your own school board and urge them to pass anti-bullying and anti-discrimination policies that include sexual orientation and gender identity. Here in Fayette County, the Fairness Ordinance does not likely apply to Fayette County Schools since they are a state agency. The school system needs to pass an internal policy to protect students and staff.

You can help support efforts to pass sexual orientation/gender identity inclusive anti-bullying laws for the entire state as well as other legislative efforts such as a statewide Fairness Law. Hope Along the Wind: The Life of Harry Hay a film by Eric Slade by Mary Crone

Harry Hay passed away on October 24, 2002 at the age of 90. You may not have heard of him, but he had an impact on your life. During his ninty years, Harry was a labor organizer, a Communist Party member, founder of one of the first gay rights organizations in the country, the Mattachine Society, and a Radical Fairy.

Hope Along The Wind is an award winner documentary by Eric Slade that takes us through the fascinating and extraordinary life of Harry Hay. His story provides a chronicle of the gay rights movement, as well as a history of California in the 20th Century.

Harry Hay joined the Communist Party in the early 1930s and participated in the San Francisco General Strike of 1934. In the mid-1950s he was called before the House UnAmerican Activities Committee.

It was also in the 50's that Harry started the Mattachine Society. This momentous film features poignant interviews with Harry and many of the surviving original members of this historic and brave group of gay men. In the last 40 years, Harry has immersed himself in various counterculture activities including the Radical Fairies, youth movements, and Native American culture.

Hope Along The Wind has won a number of awards including the Jury Prize for Best Documentary at both the Philadelphia and Seattle Gay and Lesbian Film Festivals, the Golen Gate Award at the San Francisco International Film Festival, and the Best of Fest Documentary Film Award at the Pittsburgh International Lesbian and Gay Film Festival.
