UK Interfraternity Council Fails To Function As Cooperative Unit

The Interfratemity Council appears to be defeating its purpose in having formal rish when it allows the fratemities on campus to ignore the rush rules and, instead, literally go all out after projective members.

During fratemity rush this fall numerous reports of rush rule infractions circulated about the campus. A large number of these "rumors" were well-ounded. It is becoming evident that practically very fratemity at the University has resorted at one time or another, to what is aptly termed "dirty ushing."

The fratemities have been guilty in varying degrees. It has reached the point where some frats are forced to violate rush rules in order to keep up with the fratemities which seem completely unaware of rush restrictions.

No one fratemity can be expected to shoulder the blame. The IFC is designed to prevent such infractions. But so far this year no constructive step has been taken in that direction.

Af the IFC meeting this week several suggestions for remedying the problem of "dirty-rush" were brought up for consideration. Formation of a "goon gang' which would inspect the fratemity houses during rush was suggested. In short, this would be a group of "strong-armed guys who would go bursting into each house."

Another idea mentioned was the use of "ringers" or out-of-town men posing as rushess in order to gain entry to the frat houses. Since these men would be entering inder false protenses, the actual legality of such a plan night be questioned.

During the meeting it was decided that fraternity men who had failed to turn in their rush reports on time were to be fined \$5 the first day and a dollar each day thereafter. students interested. At present an SGA advisory committee is studying the proposal before endorsing it.

In short, the program is designed to make the public aware of Kentucky's needs in the way of public school education. And there are inadequacies that deserve to be brought to light.

The classrooms in many of the state schools are overcrowded, thousands of the buildings are outmoded, transportation to and from the schools is sadly lacking. Thousands of emergency teachers are required to fill vacancies which have been left by teachers seeking larger-salaried jobs elsewhere. Eighty-eight thousands offlether are not enrolled in any school, and a large per cent drop out before completing school.

Largely at fault is the manner in which state school funds are being distributed. In accordance with the present law, at least 75 per cent of state funds for education must be distributed on the basis of the number of school-age children living in each school district, whether or not they are in public schools. Since the money is not alloted with regard to the number of children in school, it would appear to discourage attendance.

At present, children in Kentucky do not have equal educational opportunities. The committee attempting to amend the statute has found that some districts have 50 times the ability to support education as other districts. Also one district receives only \$40. Another finding was the fact that the range in teachers' salaries is from \$5,100 to \$75.00.

How do University students fit into all this? They have a chance to help amend the constitution on Nov. 3. They can approve an amendment removing this per capital requirement. Parents, too, can be influenced. It's to your advantage.

TV's 'Dragnet' Gains Distinction Without Help From Ray Anthony

Having nothing better to do the other night, we brushed the cob-webs from our TV machinery and snapped on that half-hour of nerveless gaugebusting. "Dragnet."

Now before the clever expansion of the program's theme by Brother Authony and the subsequent pueric "Drag.Net" parody, "Dragnet" was just another cops and robbers affair—but it had gained a sort of distinction of its own of which it was justly proud. Based on factual cases from the files of the Los' Angeles police depot, the show, by employing a novel, and realistic understatement, immediately caught on when it debuted on NBC-radio about four years ago.



Scherago Compares Hawaii And Mexico

By David G. Coapman

An island of scenic grandeur and spotlessness, contrasted to a country where deplorable health conditions exist, was the description given by Dr. Morris Scherago, head of the UK Bacteriological Department, of his trip to Hawaii and Mexico this summer.

Dr. Scherago's first trip took him to the Army Schofield Medical Laboratory, located a few miles from Honolulu. There he did research on tropical diseases, a study he had begun the year before in Siam. After completing this scientific

project, he flew to Mexico City where he engaged in the same typ of work. While there he addresse a conference of epidemiologists an other public health officials on th topic, "Problems in the Production of an Effective Typhoid Vaccine.

of an Effective Typnoid Vaccine.

His address to the conference wa
held in connection with a typhoi
vaccination program currently being
carried out in Mexico.

"The Mexican health officials,' he said, "will have a marvelous opportunity to evaluate the true effectiveness of vaccination, since no other measures are now being instituted to prevent typhoid fever."

"The prevailing health conditions in Mexico are just the opposite of those in Hawaii." Dr. Scherago commented. For instance, in Mexico the infant mortality rate from intestinal infections is from 55-75 per 1,000. Other leading diseases are TB, typhoid fever, brucellosis, and diphtheria.

with regard to Hawaii, tae health situation is extremely good, reports Dr. Scherago. However, food poisoning is the most important problem. "Honolulu has one of the most remarkable pieces of sanitary engineering that I have ever seen." he


