And now I fulfil your wish and tell you something about myself. I am ~~pass~~ 20 years now, and in October of this year I have successfully passed the examination at a High School. I want to become

I a chemist or a druggist. April 1st
1944 I shall begin to work in a
druggist's shop.

I am also tall (very tall) (190 centimeters)
light blonde and have blue eyes.

I have never heard about those Jitterbugs.
Perhaps you'll be so kind and tell
me something about them. Would
you? I had latin in school. Can't
you write some sentences in latin
to me, and then I'll answer in
latin, too? Here momentary we
cannot take pictures of ourselves.
When there is a possibility again, I'll
take some of myself, and I'll
send them to you. I am very interes-
ted in you! and I want you to
tell me all about yourself, too, in
your next letter. I have no girl-
friend till now.

Well, I think I must close now, because its already 10 o'clock p.m. and I have to go to bed now.

You write, I can ask you, as many questions as I like, and now I have one great question:

"Have you already a friend"???

I am intense on the answer!!!

You can also ask me every question, you like. But write as soon and as often as you can!

And now I have one great request, but don't worry about your impudent relatives in Germany. Would you ever be able to send a parcel to us here in Germany? We should be very, very (gracious) thankful to you. Perhaps we can send you some books or anything, you wish, for that, later. But do not be offended at our wish!

You thought, you had sent us some unnecessary things? - No! you haven't! it was a wonderful package and nothing was unnecessary. Still once more, many thousand thanks!!!! You all cannot imagine mother's delightness at your splendid coffee! She is talking about it, every day!

I think she will write a letter to you very soon!

The heartiest congratulations to your basket-ball-victory! We here in Germany don't often play basket ball. Do you often play it at school? I know it quite well!

Don't you believe me, that I have no girlfriend, except you? You can be sure!! Yes, you are right, the German girls are quite nice, but I don't think they are as nice as you are! You ask, what I do in my spare time? There's not much spare time in the moment. Only late in the evening, then I always read something.

Since when are you president of 12 girls?
And the best wishes for that dance on May 26.
May 23rd there is the silver-marriage-feast of my parents (May 23rd, twenty-five years ago, they have

married!)

I am still waiting for a letter from you! It's already three weeks I have not got one! and I also write to you!

Write as often as you can!

I hope your family is all in the best of health and the heartiest greetings to them all from my parents, especially from my mother, from my brothers and from me.

My dear Frau,

How are you? How are your parents
and your brothers? Now we have Sun-
day - afternoon, and so I have time
for a letter to you. Last Sunday William
and I, we have been at Cologne.

(Köln). There was the famous American
President of the YMCA (Young Men
Christian Association) Dr. John MOTT.

It was very interesting to hear him ^{speaking.}

He only spoke in the English language.
But he had a German interpreter.

It was much more interesting hearing
his English than hearing the German
translation. He told us, that he had
crossed the ocean for one hundred
and four times and that he had

been in Germany by sixty times.
He has been in 83 countries of
the world, and there are only two
countries in the world, he has not
visited. We were twenty^{to} thirty
boys of our town Bues. In Cologne
we were ten thousand! I have
added the program for you!

As you have already seen, I am
writing with that penholder, you
have sent to us. The whole family
likes to write with it. But now
I have one question. How do you
fill it? We do not know such
a thick ink and such a wonder-
ful penholder here in Germany.
If you can, would you be so gracious
and send me later a little bit of
such an ink? I can't get it here
in Germany. I would be very thank-

ful to you. What about your
girl-friend Pat? William is waiting
for a letter from her, since two months,
I think. Has she fallen ill? Or
has she no time?

Have you already finished
school for this year?

Father and mother have gone
out for a walk in the moment.
So William and I, we are alone.
Entzhermann is still studying at
the theological university of Bethel,
near Bielefeld. Now William is
working for school. Every Sunday-
morning I go to church at half-past
nine with our family. After the
service for the grown-up, there is
special service for small children

up to 14 years. And in this children-
service, which is at half-past eleven,
I have 30 young boys, 12 to 13 years
of age, to whom I tell one story
out of the bible.

After this service the children
get a paper, like the added one.
It is a very satisfying work,
and I like that very much.

Now I must ~~also~~ close, because
I am to care for a supper for
William and me.

Once more many thousand
thanks for your wonderful picture
and for that marvellous package!
Many greetings to you and to
your parents and brothers!

The prospects in the chemical faculty are so bad, that I don't like to stay in the chemist's any longer. I will cease there this week! William is writing a letter to Pat just now!

And now about my picture. In the moment you can't get made any picture, here. As soon as it is possible, I'll get made it, and I shall send it to you! Okay? But ~~you~~ I can't imagine, that I could get such a nice picture, as you have sent it.

Please send the best wishes to that wedding of Helen's daughter on Sept. 13. from their relatives in Germany! But don't be angry, that I am to close now. I am to be in the chemist's in twenty minutes. I promise you, I shall write once more very soon. I hope that you all are in the best health. Give all my love to your parents and your brothers.


