The Lexington Pride Festival will have a new home and theme in 2011. During the September Lexington Pride Festival Committee meeting, the group turned to another familiar downtown Lexington location to host the premier Central Kentucky LGBTQQIA event, Lexington's own Paddock Park at Red Mile.

"The Pride Fesitval Committee knows it is vital for the festival to remain in downtown Lexington but the growth and trending showed that it is time to find a location that will allow us to accommodate more participants from the LGBTQQIA community," stated 2011 Lexington Pride Festival Planning Committee Chair Orvis Kean. "After much research and consideration, Paddock Park at Red Mile proved to be the prime location for the 2011 event."

Equality Forum announced that starting in 2011, GLBT History Month will be renamed LGBT History Month. "For a community deprived of its history, GLBT History Month teaches heritage, provides role models, builds community, and recognizes extraordinary national and international contributions," said Ora Alger, LGBTA Employees at ED President, U.S. Department of Education. "We salute Equality Forum for spearheading this free educational resource."

"GLBT History Month is an educational project," stated Malcolm Lazin, Executive Director, Equality Forum. "We are delighted to have the U.S. Department of Education recognize and celebrate our community's history month. We salute GLSEN, GSA Network and Campus Pride

for promoting with Equality Forum GLBT History Month to over 6,000 high schools and colleges."

Each day in October, an Icon is featured with a video, biography, bibliography, downloadable images and other educational resources. The videos are offered without charge to educational institutions, nonprofit organizations, for profit companies and the public. 2010 marks the 5th anniversary of GLBT History Month, featuring 155 Icons from 2006 to 2010.

Equality Forum launched GLBT History Month with 20 organizations having a GLBT History Month link on their Web sites. In 2009, over 650 nonprofit organizations, educational institutions and for profit corporations had a GLBT History Month Link, making GLBT History Month the largest collaborative project worldwide for our community. Equality Forum is a national and international GLBT civil rights organization with an educational focus.

Equality Forum coordinates GLBT History Month, produces documentary films, undertakes high impact initiatives and presents annually the largest national and international GLBT civil rights summit.

Prayer

It's not uncommon to hear someone say, "I don't know how to pray", or maybe it's because we are a bit sheepish about praying because we think we don't know how. I believe that at least part of the reason for that is the lengthy, wordy, "Christianese", type prayers we so often hear in church. By "Christianese" I mean using words that someone from outside the church may not understand. What we need to understand is that prayer is simply talking to God, communicating your heart, thoughts, feelings, to Him and allowing Him to talk to you, and remember that communication is a two way street.

Jesus knew we needed a model so He gave us one in Matthew 6:9-13. "In this manner, therefore, pray, Our Father in heaven, Hallowed be Your name. Your kingdom come, Your will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread and forgive us our debts as we forgive our debtors. And do not lead us into temptation, but deliver us from the evil one. For Yours is the kingdom and the power and the glory forever. Amen.

Now let's break this down into compartments. First, we start with praise, "Hallowed be Your Name." The Nelson Bible Dictionary says that hallowed is akin to holiness. Holiness is godliness or moral and ethical wholeness or perfection. We should always start our prayer with praise, recognizing God as King of Kings, Lord of Lords, the most Holy One. Ps. 100:4 "Enter into His gates with thanksgiving, and into His courts with

praise. Be thankful to Him, and bless His name." No matter how difficult things may be, no matter how difficult of a time we are having, we must maintain an attitude of praise. Are we praising and thanking Him for the difficulties? No! However, we are restating the fact that no matter what, God is still God and is worthy of our praise. How was it that the walls of Jericho came tumbling down? Praise. What are your walls that need to come down? What enemy do you need to "face down"? The answer is in praise. Therefore, it's important to begin all prayers with praise.

Next, we pray for God's will to be done. We as humans always think we know what's best. Not true. God sees all that lies ahead, we can only see in part. If we have given our life to God, we need to trust that He has it, and that He knows what's best. It's ok to pray for specifics, just keep in mind that sometimes what we think we need is in fact not what we need, or the timing could be off. Papa may be ok with us having "it", but He knows now isn't the right time. Again, trust God; be confident that He has your best interest at heart. Jer. 29:11 "For I know the thoughts that I think toward you, says the Lord, thoughts of peace and not of evil, to give you a future and a hope." God, Your kingdom come, Your will be done.

Now, make your petitions known. What is it that you need today? "Give us this day..." Matt. 6:34 "Therefore do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will worry about its own things. Sufficient for the day is its own trouble." Take one day at a time. What do you need from God now to see you through the day? God promises us that He will take care of all our worries, just give them over.

Then we ask for forgiveness and we give forgiveness. As the prayer itself says, forgive us as we forgive. Take time here to really examine your heart before God. To forgive someone doesn't mean you have to be best friends with him or her. It simply means you recognize that we are all human and mess up; that I myself have done hurtful things to others therefore I should be willing to say I forgive. Ps. 139:23-24 "Search me, O God, and know my heart; try me, and know my anxieties; and see if there is any wicked way in me, and lead me in the way everlasting." Am I following hard after Christ? Is there anything I might be doing that's displeasing to Him? Examine your heart, and if you find anything, simply ask God for forgiveness and help to make things right. On occasion, I have had God bring someone or a situation to mind that requires me to forgive the person. It isn't easy when you have been hurt to forgive, but it is necessary. Think of it this way, I have done nothing to receive God's forgiveness of me. Yet He laid down His life for me. He forgave me even when I have a hard time forgiving myself.

Now we ask for protection. protection from the evil one, the one who is always looking for opportunities to trip us up. The devil is a liar and we need to stay as far away from him as possible. James 4:7-8a "Therefore submit to God, resist the devil and he will flee from you. Draw near to God and He will draw near to you." 1 Peter 5:8, 9 "Be sober (selfcontrolled), be vigilant, because your adversary the devil walks about like a roaring lion, seeking whom he may devour. Resist him, steadfast in the faith, knowing that the same sufferings are experienced by your brotherhood in the world." We can rest knowing God will always have our back.

Lastly, we end as we began, with praise and thanksgiving. What we see is a three step process of praise and thanksgiving; making our petitions known; and ending with praise and thanksgiving. We don't have to make it hard. Jesus used everyday words in His model of how to pray and so can we.

Father, I thank you for all that you are and all that you do. You are worthy of all my praise. I bless you and thank you for hearing my prayers. Father, I ask that you help us to understand how much we mean to you and how much you desire to simply talk with us, to spend time with us. I pray that you take these words and use them to encourage others. Again, I thank you and praise you for all that you do. In Jesus name, Amen.
