Parking space now available

The new UK parking structure has students and faculty hoping for a change in campus parking.

Three hundred students will no longer be able to use the excuse "I couldn't find a place to park" when they stumble into class 10 minutes late.

One thousand spaces are available in the new parking structure on Limestone; there are 600 employee spaces, 300 student spaces and 100 spaces allotted for visitors.

Although the original completion date was December 1996, the plan to improve campus parking began four years ago.

The parking and transportation committee, consisting of students, faculty and staff, proposed to hire a professional consulting firm to give advice on UK parking facilities.

"The parking structure will have a tremendous impact on campus life," said Director of Parking and Transportation for acmpus life," said Director of Parking and Transportation for hornton. "In not only accommodates 300 students right of the world the students who purchased C5 parking permits this year previously parked in the K and Virginia Avenue lots.

Half of the students had no prior permits. The parking and transportation office is pleased with the completion of the parking structure because of the problematic library construction. The structure is located close to Central Campus, which gives visitors convenient parking to take advantage of the facilities at UK. When leaving, the visitors must go to a station on the floor where they have parked and pay their fee at the ATM-style machine. The visitor's parking pass then will be validated, giving the driver about 15 minutes to reach the garage exit and swipe the pass through the meter box.

The cost for visitor parking will be SI per hour or S6 per day.

Student spaces are available at junior, senior or graduate level status and sold for S112 for a year.





The Wildeats won the game 9-2 in Tuscaloosa. The nine strikeouts tied his season high. The Louisville native also won the award for his March 7 performance at Ole Miss. In that game, also a Cat victory, Downs pitched a complete-game, two-hit shutout. He struck out four Rebel batters.

For the season, Downs is 3-4 with a 4.22 carned run average. He has a 3-to-1 strikeout to walk ratio this season. In his past two outlings — the win over the Crimson Tide and a no-decision against Birmingham-Southern — he is 1-0 with a 2.08 ERA. He as struck out 15 and walked one in 13 innings pitched.

BOSTON — Boston Celtics fan Jim Muldoon thinks enough of Rick Pitino to be one of the first in line at his book signing. Muldoon thinks the UK coach—along with a couple of high draft picks — could turn the Celtics around, too.

He's not going to hold his breath, though.

"You think he's going to say Yes' to the Celtics?" Muldoon saked Monday, noting that Pitino already turned down a New Jersey Nets offer reportedly worth \$30 million. "What are they going to do, give him the team?"

Pitino stopped by Boston on Monday to pitch his new motivational book, but he isn't interested in staying, much to the dismay of Celtics fans who hope he could return the team to its former glory.

"It's not that I don't have any

DETROIT — A booster accused of giving cash payments to Michigan basketball players had tuckets available only to people close to the school more recently than the university admitted in a report to the NCAA, the Detroit Free Press reported yester-day

The newspaper said Ed Martin bought tickets from the special athlete department pool of tickets as recently as a year ago — two years later than Michigan athletic officials said he had last obtained tickets in a length report last month to the NCAA. A Free Press review of ticket lists used by players and coaches indicated that Martin bought two tickets or a game against Indiana on Feb. 18, 1996.

In itself, such preferential treatment is not against NCAA rules.


