In order for the bill to become a law, however, it must be passed by the Senste, but the favor-able House vote is regarded as an assurance that the higher body will also act affirmatively.

The establishment of a council on tigher education which will have charge of governing all institutions of higher learning for white people in the state, is a step which should on much toward raising Kentucky from her present rank educationally among the states of the Union. This council will consist of the governor council will consist of the governor of the state, prevident of the Uni-versity of Kentucky, the dean of the Collece of Education of the Univer-sity, the presidents of the four teach-ers colleges, the superintendent of Public Instruction, and three mem-bers of the newly created State Board of Education.

Also, this new State Board of Edu-ation should go far in the achievecation should go far in the acnieve-ment of Kentucky's educational interests. Headed by the Superinten-dent of Public Instruction as ex-officio chairman, the board will have under its control all management of common schools, higher education for negroes, and vocational educacommon season, and vocational educa-tion and rehabilitation. In creating this new board, the bill also elimin-ates the former elaborate school district system, providing that each county in the state shall constitute one county school district. This, too, is a great improvement which is not to be overclooked.
