Cooperative buying among fraternities at Ohio State University covers a wide range of products, according to Dean Fred Mulligan adviser to the cooperative group. Thirty-nine fraternities and seven sororities are members of the union.

to 40 percent on laundry when the

## Romany Theater of University Began Eight Years Ago; Was Directed by Sax

Eight years ago. a little Negrochurch on the vacant lot at the intersection of Euclid and Limestone streets was dissolved of its religious significance and invested with the spirit of drams when it became known to the public as the Romany theater under the personal direction and supervision of Carol Sax.

Mr. Sax was head of the art department of the university at the time, but his work at the Romany was performed outside of his regular routine. Under his management of the theater affairs the actors received emolument for their services.

The present building was occu pied in 1926, still under the nam of Romany, and successfully oper ated for two years

Mr. Sax was succeeded by Frank Fowler, who came here in the fall of 1928. His entrance was marked by a complete reorganization of the company, and the name of the

This name was derived from the Guignot This name was derived from the Guignot theater in Paris, France which was the first Little Theater in Europe. The true meaning of the word Guignot is marionette, but the popular conception is that of horror, probably caused by association of the type of plays produced

Originally, the object of the little French playhouse was to give production to plays without box-office value and to new, experimental, and classic works. Only non-professional and retired actors were in the company, and none received sal-

aries.

Thus in Mr. Fowler's reorganization of the Romany under its new name, no pay was given actors.

Now, it is one of the few Little Theaters that is paying its own way and accumulating a sizable bank

The first year, only one set was used and no costume plays were produced, but at the end of that season, that is to say, in the spring of 1929. "The Flight of The Duchess," a dramatization of the poem by Browning was presented with real success.


