
ID Cards To Be Issued **Today And Tomorrow**



Female Graduate **Opened This Year**

A house for female graduate students has been opened up this year for the first time. This house at 625 Maxwellon Ct., formerly used for transfer students, has been made available for these students. Until five years ago no provisions at all were made for graduate women. If the students had been enrolled in the University before, they roomed with undergraduate students in the dorm, or if not formerly enrolled at UK, lived in town. For the past five years the barracks have been used to house the graduate students.

The school is growing rapidly, but it cannot continue this growth toward greatness unless there is more money forthcoming from the Legislature.

The chances are that the man or woman who is graduating this year would not be able to recognize the school if he should come back five years from now. This semester there are 7,000 students enrolled in the University. By 1960 the student population should jump to 10,000.

At present the University does not have the facilities to handle 10,000 students. There is neither enough dormitory nor classroom

The administration's expansion program includes a new science building, the moving of the Pharmacy College from Louisville to Lexington, and an increase in teachers' sal-

These are absolutely essential improvements. Without them the University will go backward instead of forward. But they cannot be realized unless the money is appropriated by the Legislature.

It will be the aim of the Kernel this year to help the University achieve these basic

The Kernel is not the voice of just one branch of the school. It is a mirror that re flects the opinion of the students, the administration, and the alumni.

Because of this the Kernel will not be radically against any part of the University. The Kernel will attempt to point out the good features of the school rather than hammer against the bad points.

However, this does not mean that the Ker-

nel will condone or overlook glaring faults. If it sees injustices or errors it will speak out against them in a constructive, interpretative manner.

The Kernel will never criticize for the sake of criticizing. It will always present an an-

one of the truly great institutions of our democracy. But it also realizes that this privilege entails a grave responsibility.

The newspaper publisher must see that his news stories are absolutely unbiased. To color the news to suit his own particular prejudices is a betrayal of the trust that has been given him.

It is toward these goals of impartiality and constructiveness that the Kernel will work this year.

But not every lowerclassman is average. Some of them make high standings and should be rewarded for their efforts. A freshman or sophomore having 3.0 standing or better should be allowed to have a car on campus providing that he maintains his standing. This should be a strong incentive for studying. The student who is on academic or social probation forfeits his right to operate a car. It is evident that he is not fulfilling his job at the University. This is a good regulation.

The regulation preventing driving on campus is rather senseless. It does much to antagonize the student and really doesn't accomplish anything important.

It does not save man hours because two campus policemen must

be stationed at the entrances to the University. It leaves a bad taste in the mouths of the stu-dents, and, if anything, encour-ages them to violate the rules out of spite.

It was designed to stop students from violating the parking regulations. The men who made the rule believe that a large majority of the students who drive on campus come there to park illegally.

But the ill deeling aroused by the regulation offsets any good it might do.

Finally, the penalties for violations are a little too stringent. Sending a student's car home because he received four or five parking tickets is a bit unjust.

Although it is not arbitrary that this be done, it can be. A student who is arrested for drunken or reckless driving should lose his car, but a student who gets a few parking tickets has not committed any serious offense. Again this is a regulation that antagonizes students.

The old fine of a dollar. When he took this chance, he used a parking space that was needed by a disabled student or a faculty member.

A five dollar fine would make a student think several times before he parked illegally. Perhaps the fine could be upped fo ten dollars for the fourth or fifth offense.

This would achieve the same end as the present regulation. Students wouldn't park illegally on campus, and it would have the advantage of not antagenizing the students.







U.S. Navy Announces **New Program**

from Officer Candidate (AOC) Frogram has been announced by the U.S. Navy. The program is degreed to permit college graduates to go through flight training as an officer in the U.S. Naval Reserve.

og othrough flight training as an officer in the U. S. Naval Reserve. The qualifications for this program are that the person must be a male citizen between the ages of 19 and 26, physically qualified or flight, married or single, a college graduate or within 90 days of graduating, and must not pre-lously completed or failed any military flight program. Eyesight must be uncorrected 20/20, height between 66° and 76°, and weight between 132 and 225 lbs.

Some of the details of the program are that a seaman's apprenticeship must be served for 16 weeks while going through pre-flight which is intensive academic and physical training. Then for approximately nine months there is a basic flight training.

After this the boy will proceed to Corpus Christi, Texas for five months advanced training in jets or the complex control of the composition of a naval aviator is then made which carries with it a maximum of two years in the Navy.

The minimum total time served under this AOC program is 3½ years, but at no time will it exceed a maximum of 48 months, unless the decision to make the Navy career is made.

Formal fall rush for the fraternities, which began Sept. 15, will end Wednesday (pledge day). Sept. 28.

The IFC violations committee (dubbed unofficially as "the goon squad") has been in operation again this year during the current rush period.

Fraternities who do not have more than a combined total of 25 actives or piedges eligible to be initiated will be allowed to rush informally for a period of 60 days.

Men rushed by the fraternities falling under this classification will be signed up in the Dean of Men's office and will be eligible to be pledged 14 days later.

Norwegian Amazed BOU.S. Colleges

UK Northern Center Offers 3 Years Work On College Degree

Dr. Thomas L. Hankins, director of the Northern Center of the Uni-versity of Kentucky, said three years of college work toward a de-gree may now be taken at the cen-ter.

eree may now be taken at the center.

A student may now earn 96 credit hours and have a senior standing upon the completion of the course, Dr. Hankins said. Until now only two years work or 64 credit hours could be obtained at the Covington center.

"I want to emphasize that all 96 credits will be acceptable for degree work, as all classes at the center are fully accredited," Dr. Hankins said.

The center-was-set up eight years ago to help returning veterans of the Northern Kentucky area. Initial enrollment was less than 200 students. Last year more than 700 students last year more than 700 students attended classes.







Building Course Offered

An evening course in building construction estimating, slanted to be of special interest to Central Kentucky contractors, subcontractors, and other persons in the light construction business, is offered by the University this fall.

Designed to offer a well-rounded coverage of the everyday work problems in the construction field, the course will be taught by Prof. James L. Leggett Jr. of the College of Engineering. Three-phases will be covered: contracting as a business, building codes, plans, specifications, and the general techniques of estimating; estimating of work that is customarily performed by the general contractor's own men; and estimating of work usually done by the sub-contractor's men.

The class will meet once a week.

The class will meet once a week for 12 weeks beginning Monday, Sept. 26, from 7 to 9 p.m. The reg-istration fee is \$15.

"Building Construction Estimating" carries no college credit and has no prerequisites in college work. Prospective members of the class should be high school graduates or the equivalent. A knowledge of high school algebra and plane geometry, blueprint reading, and slide-rule operation is desirable.



Virginia Gets

The manuscript of the 1860 edition of "Leaves of Grass" by Wait Whitman has been given to the University of Virginia by Clifton Waller Barrett, a retired New York businessman.

Dozens of poems, some never published, letters and postcards by Whitman and to him, scattered notes, photographs and other items are included in the gift. Among the printed items is a first edition of "Leaves of Grass," published July 4, 1855.

Cut Flowers Now Have Longer Life

The life of cut flowers can be more than doubled by use of a new chemical preservative discovered by

chemical preservative discovered by a chemist at the Denver Research Institute of the University of Denver.

Two years of research by the chemist. W. R. Thompson, went into development of the new compound. it keeps cut flowers blooming "significantly longer" than other available commercial formulas, according to an article being published by the American Chemical Society.

Tried Sugar

Tried Sugar

"For years housewives have practiced elementary rules for prolonging the life of cut flowers, such as frequent changes of water, stem recutting, and placing the flowers away from direct light and heat and drafts. Addition of such simple home chemicals as sugar and aspirin to the water has also been tried, but with discouraging results," the report says.

Several formulas are now on the market which do, in some cases, prolong the life of cut flowers considerably, it is reported.

Heart Disease Declines New Fireman

A slight drop last year in deaths from diseases of the heart and blood vessels was reported yesterday in The American Heart, quarterly publication of the American Heart Association.


