That the value of the work may be enhanced to breeders, and its interest to all horsemen increased, pedigrees and performances are given in connection with the photograph.


Such a collection of accurate pictures of the celebrated horses of the past would be one of the choicest of treasures.



Hall, for \$30,000. After the death of James Fisk, his one-third interest was purchased by Budd Doble, who subsequently bought the one-third interest of Jay Gould, and also the interest of Geo. C. Hall, a short time previous to his death. Budd Doble now owns a two-thirds interest, while the remaining one-third is owned by a New York gentleman. Jay Gould is now at Fashlon Stud Farm, Trenton, N. J., standing at \$150 service money.






