


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# Wildcat Tipoff

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
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#### JULIAN M. CARROLL

# Governor of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

JULIAN MORTON CARROLL became Kentucky's 58th governor on December 28, 1974, succeeding Wendell H. Ford, who was elected to the U. S. Senate. Carroll then won a full four-year term in the 1975 general election. Born in McCracken County in 1931, he attended Paducah Junior College after graduating from Heath High School. He was graduated from the University of Kentucky in 1954 and received his law degree from UK in 1956. Before becoming governor, Carroll served three years as lieutenant governor and ten years as a member of the Kentucky House of Representatives. He is an active member of the Optimist Club and a former Jaycee. He attained the highest office in Kentucky for laymen of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church in 1966-67 when he was named moderator of the Kentucky Synod. The Governor and his wife, Charlann, have four children.

Urban County Government


H. FOSTER PETTIT served two years as mayor of the City of Lexington and was a leader in the consolidation of the city and county governments. He was elected mayor of the Urban County Government in November 1973.

President of the Kentucky Municipal League for 1976, Mayor Pettit is also active with the U. S. Conference of Mayors and the National League of Cities. He was awarded the Optimist Cup in 1976 and the Chamber of Commerce Citizen-of-the-Year citation for 1975.

As chief executive of the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government, the mayor is authorized to supervise, administer and control all departments of government.

The mayor is elected on a non-partisan basis every four years. He is responsible for the proper administration of all services of the government. He is assisted principally by the Chief Administrative Officer and commissioners of the six departments.


A native of Lexington, he is an attorney who served three terms as a state representative. He resides on Richmond Road with his wife, Marion, and four sons.


HEAD COACH-Joe B. Hall

Now in his eighth year as president of the University of Kentucky, DR. OTIS A. SINGLETARY is a Mississippian whose route to the Bluegrass State curled through Louisiana, Texas, North Carolina and Washington, D. C.

He came to Lexington from a position as University of Texas vice-chancellor for academic affairs. Previously, in Washington, he had been director of the U. S. Job Corps in the early stages of its development before moving to the American Council on Education as vice-president. He had gone to the capital in 1964 after three years as chancellor of the University of North Carolina at Greensboro.

The UNC appointment terminated Dr. Singletary's first association with the University of Texas, this a seven-year stay that saw him, as a young historian, rise rapidly in rank from instructor to full professor and begin the shift to administrative work, first as associate dean and later as assistant to the president.

The Kentucky president, and his wife—the former Gloria Walton, met when both were students at Millsaps College. He later earned master's and doctoral degrees at Louisiana State. The Singletarys have two daughters, Bonnie and Kendall, and a son, Scott.

CLIFF HAGAN

Director of Athletics



"I've been preparing for this all my life," CLIFF HAGAN said before taking over as athletics director at the University of Kentucky in 1975. Hagan succeeded Harry Lancaster as director after serving as assistant director for three years.

Hagan's path to the athletics directorship began in Owensboro, Kentucky, where he established a then state high school tournament record of 41 points in leading Owensboro to victory over Lafayette in the championship game of the 1949 state high school tournament.

At UK, he played on teams that won 86 of 91 games and an NCAA championship (1951). The 1954 team, undefeated in 25 games, elected not to participate in the national tournament.

Hagan set a dozen Southeastern Conference records and an NCAA record of 528 rebounds as a junior. He averaged 24 points a game, led the nation in rebounding, and scored a UK record of 51 points against Temple in 1954. During ten years with the St. Louis Hawks, he was All-Pro five times in the NBA.

He is married to the former Martha Milton of Owensboro. They have four children: Lisa, Laurie, Amy, and Kip.

# Assistant Director of Athletics

FRANK HAM became Assistant Director of Athletics in July 1975 soon after Cliff Hagan succeeded Harry C. Lancaster as Director of Athletics.

A native of Scranton, Pa., Ham came to the University in 1969 as Administrative Assistant to football coach John Ray, and was reassigned to the Athletic Director's staff in 1972 when Ray resigned.

Ham graduated from high school at Niles, Michigan, and completed his undergraduate work at Olivet College. He did graduate work at Indiana University and coached high school football and track at John Adams High in South Bend in 1944-46 and then returned to Olivet as athletic director and head football and basketball coach.

In 1962, he became assistant to the president at Olivet, with responsibilities in public and alumni relations. He was in private business from 1954 until 1968.

He is married to the former Rosemary Woods of Niles, Michigan. They have two sons, Michael, of Raleigh, N. C., and Craig, a U. S. Army Captain, and two daughters, Mrs. Andy Hunsberger of Cassopolis, Michigan and Jennifer, a junior at UK. Ham is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Albert B. Ham of Edwardsburg, Michigan.

He is married to the former Barbara Foster of Huntsville. They have a daughter, Kim.

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






#### LARRY JOHNSON—12

Co-Captain

Back for his final year is 6'3" guard LARRY JOHNSON, whose dazzling speed and ball handling made the press very ineffective against the Cats. The willowy but strong Johnson was at his best under extreme pressure and won three games with final second heroics, including a last second shot to down Providence in the NIT semi-finals. Johnson averaged 11.2 ppg and led the team with 98 assists. He was named to the All-NIT second team.

Says head coach Joe Hall, "I hate to think about having to replace Larry. He does it all. He is the most effective deterrent to the press we have had in sometime, and he seems to come up with the big play when we need it. He is a dedicated worker, and a tremendous set of hands makes his ball handling almost flawless. By getting the ball into play quickly and initiating the break, he almost single handed keeps the Kentucky fast break alive."

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
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#### DWANE CASEY—20

Sophomore **DWANE CASEY** from Morganfield, Kentucky is one of two second year men on the Wildcat team. The 6'2" guard has a 1.3 point per game average.

Casey saw action in 20 games and showed steady improvement throughout the year. He played a vital role in the NIT when he hit three quick baskets in the championship game against UNCC.

"Dwane definitely fits into our plans this year," said Hall. "He worked hard this summer on his deficiencies and it's going to pay off for him with more playing time."


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#### JACK GIVENS-21

Heading the list of returning lettermen is All-American and All-SEC forward JACK GIVENS, a silky smooth 6'4" junior southpaw who led the Cats with a 20.1 ppg average while grabbing 7.2 rebounds. Givens scored in the 30's three times and was out of double figures only three times. He became UK's second leading sophomore scorer (602), and was named to the All-NIT team.

Coach Hall says, "The hardest thing to realize about Jack is that he is starting his junior year. We already have come to depend on his leadership and ability to come through in pressure situations. Jack's basketball maturity is his greatest asset."



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


#### TRUMAN CLAYTOR—22

JAY SHIDLER is a newcomer to the Wildcat camp from Lawrenceville, Illinois. He was the state's top scorer at 32.7 points per game average and nine rebounds.

An all-around athlete, Shidler earned 11 letters at Lawrenceville-four in basketball; one as a football quarterback;

three in baseball, and three in track, where he holds the school record in the high jump at 6'5".



"Jay is a true guard—an' exciting player who will need little seasoning. 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


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#### MERION HASKINS—30

Hall points to his value away from the ball—blocking out on the beards, getting author the heards.



"Stephens is a potential guard," says Coach Hall, "and one who can play the big guard. He is a proven quick forward and will have the opportunity to swing both positions. He and Shidler will give us the outside shooting potential we lacked last year. They should reopen our inside game by taking the pressure off our big men."

Stephens is a two-time All-State basketball player from McCreary County High School, Whitley City, Ky. "I've followed UK since I was 10 years old," Stephens said. "It has been my only thought to play at Kentucky. Now that I've reached that level, I'm as excited as can be."




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#### JAMES LEE—32

Filling in for Robey last year was JAMES LEE, a junior-to-be whose speed and quickness belies his solid 6'5", 230 lb. frame. Lee started 20 games and after a slow transition, blossomed into the powerful, explosive type player which was predicted of him from prep days. His best performance came when he scored 21 points and grabbed 11 rebounds as the Wildcats upset sixth-ranked Alabama 90-85 on national television. He finished with a 9.3 ppg and 7.3 rebounding mean, and was named to the All-NIT second team.

"Pressed into starting duty last year when Robey was injured, James became one of the most improved players on the team," says Coach Hall. "He is a fluid, strong forward who could easily become one of the outstanding players in the conference."



#### RICK ROBEY-53

RICK ROBEY is the 6'10" fiery junior competitor who averaged 15.6 points per game and 7.5 rebounds at forward before missing the last half of the season with a knee injury. However, the knee has fully mended without surgery and Robey has been declared 100 per cent recovered. Failing to escape the knife completely, Robey underwent summer operations for a tonsillectomy and removal of a cyst from his hand.

According to Coach Hall, "Robey probably is the key to the improvement of our club this year. His knee injury last year and subsequent loss of a half season's play have made him that much more determined to contribute to the team this year. Rick seems to have much more scoring potential and a better understanding of the game than at any point of his career. He has developed a good feel at forward, and his inside game is tremendous as well. He is extremely agile for a big man."

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
#### MIKE PHILLIPS-55


Holding down the center slot is mammoth 6'10" MIKE PHILLIPS, whose overall play showed vast improvement while scoring 15.6 points per game and leading the team in rebounding with 9.8. Phillips' single game highs were 35 points and 28 rebounds. He was selected to the All-NIT team, MVP in the Kentucky Invitational, and second team All-SEC.

"Mike," according to Coach Hall, "can be an awesome scoring machine—someday, he is going to cut loose and pop open a lot of eyes. He needs only to develop lower body strength and control to dramatically increase his efficiency. Mike has a good variety of shots, including an accurate outside jumper."



#### KYLE MACY—10

As a prepster at Peru (Ind.) High School, KYLE MACY gained All America status and was named Indiana's "Mr. Basketball" after averaging over 35 points his senior year. He was coached at Peru by his father, Robert G. Macy.

Macy, a transfer from Purdue University with a 3.16 academic average, earned a starting role at Purdue in the third game and scored 21 points. His season high came in his first Big Ten game when he popped in 38 points against Minnesota. He finished the year with a 13-plus average, while hitting 49.1 per cent from the field.

"We had recruited Kyle in high school so we know that he is an outstanding young man who will be a credit to our program at Kentucky," said Coach Hall. "He will insure us a quality person and player at his position for three years."

Macy will sit out a year of competition due to the transfer. However, he will be able to practice with the Wildcats and learn Hall's style of play.

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

#### JOE B. HALL

#### University of Kentucky Wildcats Head Basketball Coach



JOE B. HALL'S record as Wildcat head coach for the past four years stands at 79-36. During the 1976 season his team won the National Invitational Tournament and ended the year with a 20-10 record.

Hall's coaching career began at Shepherdsville (Ky.) High School in 1956 and continued, through Regis College and Central Missouri State College before he returned to UK on July 1, 1965, as an assistant to his former coach, Adolph Rupp.

During Hall's two years at Shepherdsville, the Cougars won a Mid-Kentucky Conference title and he was named "Coach of the Year" in 1958. He then served one year as freshman coach and five years as head basketball coach at Regis College in Denver, Colo., where he was also athletic director and earned special recognition as coach of the champion independent team in the area.

While in Denver, he also coached the Capital Federal host team in the 1964 AAU tournament and was selected as head coach of the AAU Stripes in the Olympic trials at Jamaica, N Y

His next move was to Central Missouri, where he coached the Mules (19-6) to their first MIAA Conference championship since 1951 and their first Christmas Tournament title in history. He was named MIAA "Coach of the Year" (1964-65).

A three-letter winner and team captain in two sports in high school at Cynthiana, Ky., he played freshman basketball and one year of varsity basketball in the "Fabulous Five" era at the University before transferring to the University of the South at Sewanee, Tenn., where he set a school single game scoring record and was team captain. Coach Lon Varnell, upon retirement, rated Hall as No. 1 of the three best players he ever coached.

After touring Europe with the Globetrotters in 1951, Hall returned to U.K. in 1955 to complete requirements for his B.A. and later (1964) received his M.A. at Colorado State University.

Returning to U.K. again in 1965 as assistant coach and head recruiter, he was instrumental in adopting a running-conditioning program which obviously paid huge dividends as the Wildcats capitalized on speed and endurance to offset a lack of size and advance to the championship game of the NCAA Finals. Hall then successfully recruited six prep All-Americans, including all-time U.K. scoring leader Dan Issel, to form the nucleus of a varsity team that won three straight conference championships and was followed by a team that won three more consecutive SEC titles.

Hall became No. 1 varsity assistant and head freshman Coach to Rupp after Harry C. Lancaster was named permanent athletic director Feb. 1, 1969. His record with the freshmen was 60-15, including an undefeated (22-0) season (1971-72) which resulted in the Kittens being crowned National Freshman Champions by the Basketball News.

During his first season as head coach, the Wildcats won their last nine conference games to sew up the SEC title.

His ten-year coaching record is 155-92. Broken down, it shows a 57-50 five-year mark at Regis, a 19-6 record at Central Missouri, and a 79-36 four-year record at Kentucky.

A popular personality on the clinic and convention circuits, Hall also has had much international exposure. In addition to the Globetrotters tour in 1951, and the "Down Under" tour in 1974, he has helped conduct basketball clinics for the U.S. Army in Anchorage and Fairbanks, Alaska (1968) and at Ramstein Air Base in Frankfurt, Germany and the RAF Base at Mildenhall, England in 1975. He also was Olympic Trials coach under Hank Iba at the Air Force Academy in July 1972 and is a member of the 1976 Olympic Basketball Committee.

He is married to the former Katharine Dennis of Harrison County, Ky. They have three children, Mrs. Rick Derrickson, Kathy and Steve.

#### Coaching Assistants

DICK PARSONS



DICK PARSONS, who begins his fifth year as Joe B. Hall's No. 1 assistant, returned to the University as baseball coach in 1969. Before giving up his position to join basketball on a full time basis, he molded a team (1971) which established or tied 15 school records.

A mountaineer in his own right, Parsons came to the University in 1958 after an outstanding career as a four-sports star at Harlan High School, where he had a three-year basketball scoring total of 1,276 points.

A consistent player who made few mistakes at UK, Parsons was known as a fine outside shooter and for his aggressive defense during three years as a starting guard. His career high, 21 points, came against Mississippi as a sophomore.

He was a two-time (1960-61) recipient of the coveted A. B. Chandler award, given annually for the player best exemplifying the qualities of leadership, scholarship, character and ability. Only four other Wildcats have twice been so honored since the award was originated in 1951.

While working on his Master's Degree at the University in 1968-69, he scouted, recruited and helped with the Wildcat freshmen team, later accepting a part-time assistantship in basketball in addition to his baseball job.

basketball in addition to his baseball job.

He is married to the former Celia Cawood of Harlan. They have a daughter, Kathy, and a son, Ed.

Much of Kentucky's defensive prowess on the court can be credited to the talent of **LEONARD HAMILTON**, a third year assistant, who came to UK after three years as an assistant at Austin Peay State University.

In high school at Gastonia, N. C., he lettered three years in football and twice in basketball. He was basketball team captain two years at Gaston Community College in Dallas, N. C., where he scored 54 points in one game, set a record for most field goals in a season, and was All-Region and All-Tournament.

At University of Tennessee–Martin, he was team captain and led in assists and steals, was most valuable defensive player, All-Conference and All-Tournament. He was elected "Mr. Volunteer" by the student body and played in the Kentucky-Tennessee All-Star game.

At Austin Peay, he coached the freshman team, scouted and recruited. During his three years there, the Governors went from last place to first in the OVC, appeared in two NCAA tournaments and were nationally ranked in scoring.

He is married to the former Claudette Hale. They have a son, Lenny.

# LEONARD HAMILTON

A native of Detroit, Mich., JIM LONG joined the UK staff last year as junior varsity coach and scout.

He came to the University in the fall of 1974 as a graduate student in journalism, but his past association with basketball became too much of a temptation and he soon sought out a liasion with the UK staff as a scout, which the following year blossomed into his jayvee position.

A 1965 graduate of Notre Dame High School in Harper Woods, Mich., he twice lettered in basketball and three times in tennis.

He completed requirements for a B.S. degree in Foreign Language (German) and a teaching certificate from the University of Michigan in 1970.

After a three year teaching stint at Grand Haven, where he was head junior high and assistant varsity coach, he returned to Michigan to earn a Master's degree in Secondary Education in 1974. While working on his Masters degree, he was junior varsity coach at Saline High School.

A veteran organizer of summer basketball camps, Long worked three years at Michigan's camp and twice at Kentucky's, serving last summer as UK's camp director.

In addition to his coaching duties, Long will lend his talents to recruiting and scouting.





#### ROY DON WILSON Trainer

Entering his seventh year at UK is ROY DON WILSON, who came to the University after serving two years as trainer at The Citadel. A native of Texas, he is a graduate of Amon Carter Riverside High in Fort Worth. He received his B.S. degree from Texas A & M with a major in physical education and a minor in business. He is married to the former Patricia Jane Cotter of Houston. They have a son and a daughter.

#### WALT McCOMBS Trainer

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
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#### DR. EDWIN YOUNG

#### University of Wisconsin Chancellor

DR. EDWIN YOUNG was appointed chancellor of the University of Wisconsin's Madison campus Sept. 13, 1968.

The appointment was made two months after he returned to Wisconsin from nearly three years service as president of the University of Maine.

Before going to Maine in 1965, Dr. Young had served as a member of the UW-Madison faculty for 18 years and established a distinguished international reputation as a labor economist. His research and teaching areas include American labor history, foreign labor movements, and labor problems. He is co-editor of "Labor and the New Deal." He has also been both president and secretary-treasurer of the Industrial Relations Research Association.

After joining the UW faculty in 1947, Dr. Young performed a succession of administrative assignments in addition to his regular faculty responsibilities. His administrative involvement culminated in four years of leadership as dean of the Madison campus College of Letters and Science.

For nine years, Dr. Young was chairman of the University's department of economics. During his tenure as chairman, he was a founder and coordinator of the department's program to strengthen economics education at Gadjah Mada University of Jogjakarta, Indonesia. On the Madison campus he was also director of the School for Workers and the Industrial Relations Center.

#### University of Wisconsin Head Basketball Coach

WILLIAM L. COFIELD, a 36-year-old native of Carrier Mills, Ill., was named the head basketball coach at the University of Wisconsin last March 16.


Bill had been the assistant coach under Terry Holland at the University of Virginia for two years prior to accepting the position at Wisconsin. Last year Virginia was the Atlantic Coast Conference representative in the NCAA tournament.

Bill has coached at H. E. Davis Junior High School, Cleveland East Technical High School, Kentucky State College, Lincoln University and Prairie View A. & M.

In 1973 Cofield became the nation's first black athletic director and head coach at a predominantly white institution of higher learning when he accepted both positions at the College of Racine. His team that year posted a 14-15 mark.

On the same day he accepted the head coaching position at Wisconsin, Bill Cofield made the announcement that WILLIAM "BO" RYAN, of Chester, Pa., would be one of his assistants.

The 28-year-old Ryan, who at the time was the basketball coach at Sun Valley (Pa.) High School, had previously worked as an assistant to Cofield at the College of Racine in 1973-74.

Bo was a high-scoring guard for Wilkes College in Wilkes-Barre, Pa. for four years, graduating from that institution in 1969. He has also done postgraduate work at Villanova.

Last season Ryan was named Delaware County Coach of the Year as he guided Sun Valley High School to a 14-7 record and a second-place finish in the Philadelphia Suburban 2 League, despite having no starter over 6-1. That secondplace finish qualified Sun Valley for the state tournament for the first time ever.

Bo and his wife Kelly are the parents of an infant daughter.

LARRY REED, former star player at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, also joined the Badger staff in March, from the front office of the Milwaukee Bucks of the NBA.

Larry's collegiate career, which began in 1957, was interrupted by service in the U. S. Air Force, where he was three times named to the All-Air Force team. He returned to UW–Milwaukee in 1964, and by the time his career ended in 1967, he had established himself as the school's all-time leading scorer and rebounder.

He served as an assistant coach at UW-M for two years following graduation, and joined the Bucks organization in 1970. That year Reed coached the Milwaukee Muskies, a Bucks farm team, to the Continental League title.

From 1971 until he joined the Badger staff, Larry was a front office administrative assistant for the Bucks; first to former president Ray Patterson, and more recently to General Manager Wayne Embry.



Falk was named Wisconsin prep basketball Player of the Year in 1972 and won All-State honors in football and basketball that same year. He is enrolled in the School of Business.





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
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#### AL RUDD—55





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#### Wildcats Return Eight Lettermen And Three New Recruits To Face Tough SEC

NIT champion Kentucky returns eight lettermen including four starters, and with the addition of three blue chip recruits, should emerge as one of the nation's collegiate basketball powers. The Wildcats reeled off 10 straight wins last year to finish 20-10, and will have added impetus of playing in spanking new 23,000 seat Rupp Arena. All-America and All-SEC Jack Givens, a 6-4 junior forward who averaged 20.1 ppg leads the Cats along with 6-10 junior center Mike Phillips, 15.6 ppg and 9.8 rebounds, 6-3 senior guard Larry Johnson, 11.2 ppg and 6-5 junior forward James Lee, 9.3 ppg and 7.3 rebounds. Rick Robey, a 6-10 forward-center who missed 18 games with a knee injury, returns after averaging 15.6 ppg and 7.5 rebounds in 12 games. Two sophomore guards round out the lettermen—6-1 Truman

Claytor, a part time starter, 6.0 ppg, and 6-2 Dwane Casey 1.3 ppg. Newcomers are 6-3 forward-guard Tim Stephens, 35.6 ppg, 6-1 guard Jay Shidler, 32.7 ppg and LaVon Williams, 6-6 forward, 19.1 ppg and 19 rebounds.

Of the Southeastern Conference, Coach Hall says, "The SEC will be tougher than ever this year, maybe the toughest in the country. The conference has taken great strides the last three years with great recruiting seasons. The recruits this year should develop balance and great depth for the contending teams. Very few of the SEC's outstanding players graduated so we should have our share of star candidates. Young teams such as Auburn, Georgia and Mississippi State will be more mature, while LSU, Florida and Vanderbilt beefed up with some fine recruits."

#### WILDCATS CARVE INCREDIBLE POST-SEASON TOURNAMENT RECORD

Since Kentucky made its first appearance in a major post season basketball tournament in 1942, no graduating class has ever missed the opportunity to play in either the NCAA or National Invitation Tournaments. In fact, the Wildcats have an incredible record which has seen them miss only seven times (1943, '54, '60, '65 and '74) in the past 34 years. Two of those misses were in 1953, when they sat out a season, and '54, when the undefeated National Champions won an automatic NCAA berth but declined the bid.

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


## Rupp Arena Is Named For "The Baron Of Basketball" – Adolph Rupp



In the storied land of Kentucky Bluegrass there dwells but one Baron, a man of consumate pride and a molder of powerful teams which for more than four decades made the name of the University of Kentucky synonymous with the game of basketball.

Now the baron, ADOLPH FREDERICK RUPP, is a spectator in a castle named in his honor. Rupp Arena, seating 23,000 Wildcat fans, will carry the Rupp traditions into the future.

Before bowing to the mandatory retirement rule, Rupp coached the Wildcats through one of the greatest collegiate sports eras of all time.



The record speaks for itself: 880 victories and 190 losses for 82.2%, making him the winningest collegiate basketball coach in the history of the game.

Rupp took over the title of winningest coach in December 1967, when the Wildcats defeated Notre Dame, 81-73, for his 772 victory, surpassing the record held by his old coach, "Phog" Allen of Kansas.

During the Rupp era, Wildcat teams gained a worldwide reputation. They were NCAA champions in 1948, 1949, 1951, and 1958, had five players on the 1948 Olympic championship team, and were International Universities champions in 1966.

"The Baron" was denied a fifth NCAA championship when his ailing "Rupp's Runts" lost to Texas Western in the finals of the 1966 tournament.


In addition to the NCAA titles, the Ruppmen won an NIT championship in 1946, five Sugar Bowls, 13 UKIT's and a record 27 SEC championships. They were national champions by polls six times since 1949.

During Rupp's tenure, 25 Wildcats were honored 37 times as All-Americans and 52 players were honored 91 times as All-SEC performers. Thirty-one players entered pro ranks.

## Honors And Awards Have Been Many For Well-Known Coach

While Wildcat players received their share of the glory, Rupp also gathered more honors and accolades than perhaps ever were bestowed on a basketball coach. Down the glory road, his many honors, accomplishments and awards included:

- —Certification by the NCAA Service Bureau as the nation's most successful collegiate basketball coach, both for the decade ending in 1961 and at the 20-year level.
- —Selection as the unanimous national "Coach of the Year" in 1966 for the fourth time in his career and runner-up for the 1957 and 1964 seasons.
- —Honored in 1967 by Columbus (Ohio) Touchdown Club as "Coach of the Century".
- —Coach of the International Universities Tournament champions in 1966.
- —A nominal world championship as co-coach of the successful USA entry in the 1948 Olympic Games which included five members of Kentucky's NCAA champions.
- —Producer of more Olympic gold medallion winners (7) than any other cage coach.
- —An all-time record total of 27 Southeastern Conference titles since the league was organized in 1933.
- —Election to the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame in 1959 and previous selection (in 1944) by Helms Athletic Foundation as a member of their exclusive Hall of Fame.
- —Trustee and member of selection and honors committees of Basketball Hall of Fame. Also chairman NABC Hall of Fame Committee and heads the group that selects players to appear in East-West All-Star Game benefiting the Hall of Fame.
- —Recipient of the Governor's Medallion in 1959 for meritorious service to the Commonwealth of Kentucky and plaques of appreciation from the U. S. Air Force (1959) and Sugar Bowl committee (1951).
- —Election to the Kentucky Hall of Fame (1946), outstanding citizen of Lexington (1949) and twice honorary citizen of the City of New Orleans. Enrolled in the Kentucky Athletic Hall of Fame in 1965.
- —SEC coach-of-the-year in 1964, '66, '68, '69, '70, '71, and '72.
- —Chosen "Delta Sig of the Year" for 1966 by the International Fraternity of Delta Sigma Phi, professionally fraternity in commerce and business administration.
- —Development of more All-Americans (21 players honored 32 times) and more material for the pro ranks (31) than any other coach.
- —Five Sugar Bowl Tournament championships, a National Invitational Tournament title and 13 trophies from the 19 previous UK Invitational Tournaments.
- —Membership on the NCAA Basketball Rules Committee.
- —More overseas clinic trips (seven to Europe, three to the Far East, and one to the Near East) for U. S. Government than any other coach. Also visited Alaska in 1968.
- —Selected as an official goodwill ambassador to the 1968 Olympics in Mexico City representing the National Association of Basketball Coaches.
- -Election to Kansas Hall of Fame.
- —President, National Association of Basketball Coaches, 1971. Coach Rupp is married to the former Esther Smith. They have one son, Herky and two grandchildren, Chip and Farren.



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## Wildcat Fans Should Be Able To Find Seats And Facilities Easily

UK basketball fans coming to Rupp Arena for the first time should have little trouble finding their seating areas, according to Thomas Minter, executive director and general manager of the Lexington Center Corporation.

Minter pointed out that all fans enter the arena on the concourse level and either go down to seats in the lower seating area, or up to the upper level seats.

The concourse level is also known as the High Street level. Spectators entering the Lexington Center complex from the High Street side will come into the arena lobby and enter into the arena concourse. Those entering from the Main Street side will come into the adjacent Mall at Lexington Center, take the escalators up to the High Street level, and enter the arena.

Large numbers on the concourse walls are section numbers that direct fans to their seating area.

Minter pointed out that all public facilities, such as restrooms, concession stands, and the first aid station are located on the concourse level. There are no public facilities on the arena floor level.

A service elevator in the Purple concourse is for use only by handicapped persons whose seating is adjacent to the arena floor.

Minter also pointed out a few facts about the loudspeaker system, known as "Big Bertha," that sends sound to all corners of Rupp Arena.

The speaker cluster that hangs high above the arena floor is one-of-a-kind and was customed designed for Rupp Arena by Merrill Richardson, superintendent of building and grounds for Lexington Center, working with acoustical engineers.

It has 33 high frequency horns, 16 bass speakers, and 11,-200 watts of output power. It weighs about 10,000 pounds. The horns and bass speakers can be turned on and off according to the location of the crowd.

Minter noted that the artists who have used the arena sound system for concerts thus far have been pleased with the setup.

### Portable Floor Can Be Assembled In Three-To-Four Hours

The portable northern maple basketball floor in Rupp Arena that is now the home court for the UK Wildcats can be put up in three-to-four hours and taken down in about two hours.

Number of persons required to accomplish those tasks: eight.

Merrill Richardson, superintendent of building and grounds for Lexington Center, can rattle off those kinds of facts by the carload.

The overall size of the basketball floor is  $60' \times 120'$ . It can easily be converted from the 94' length required for college and professional basketball to the 84' length needed for high school teams by the simple replacement of two panels. The floor was handmade especially for Rupp Arena, says Richardson.

Four portable goals are on hand. The two extra goals are used in practice sessions and as backup should a goal be damaged during a game.

The four scoreboards used in the arena were custom made for the facility. Each scoreboard is 35' x 4'. Spectators can see at least three of the boards from any seat in the arena.

The solid state, electronic scoreboards can be used for basketball, rodeos, wrestling, boxing, and track and field. For track and field events, they can record times to 1/100th of a second. Lighted information on the boards is colored balanced for television.

In addition to basketball, other sporting events that can be accommodated in the arena include rodeos, tennis, horse shows, track and field, wrestling, boxing, and roller derbies.

## Concession Stands Offer Usual Ballgame Fare Plus Bratwurst And Toasted Sandwiches

Hot dogs and popcorn are standard items at just about every basketball arena in the nation. So are soft ice cream and soft drinks. But what about bratwurst and toasted ham and cheese sandwiches, and salted-in-the-shell peanuts?

You won't find those items everywhere, but you will find them at UK basketball games in Rupp Arena, according to Mary McCreary, director of group sales and concessions for Lexington Center.

Twelve full-service concession stands, two speciality sandwich stands, and two soft ice cream stands are all located on the entry concourse level of the arena. In addition, there are eight temporary concession stands located on the upper balconies of the upper seating areas.

For eating and drinking from your seat, vendors will service all seating areas from three vending commissaries. Diet soft drinks will be available upon request at the concession stands.

Concession workers have at their disposal 20 popcorn warmers that can keep 10,000 boxes of popcorn hot and ready at any given time. Hot dog grills can turn out 17,000 hot dogs per hour.

Ice will come from seven ice-making machines capable of making 17,000 pounds of cube ice in 24 hours. Ice bins can store 31,000 pounds of ice at one time.

For cigarettes and candy, vending machines will be located adjacent to selected restroom areas.

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Memorable Years

The curtain is down on "The House That Rupp Built" as the Wildcats move from Memorial Coliseum to the 23,000 seat Rupp Arena at Lexington Center.

The move marks UK's fourth home playing site and third in 52 years. Oddly enough, each of the former two lasted 26 years each.

Only a little more than five decades ago (1924), the University of Kentucky provided its basketball team with its second home—a magnificent new Alumni Gymnasium seating 2,800 spectators.

A great many persons freely suggested that the arena would prove to be a "white elephant" which would never be crowded to anywhere near capacity by the sport that then was considered little more than an innocuous winter-months' pastime.

But the hardwood game blitzed the nation and Kentucky's teams forged to the national forefront in such a crowdpleasing manner that the "huge" hall soon could not begin to accommodate the large number of fans seeking to whet their new-found interest. In fact, the situation soon developed to the point where only the student body and faculty were admitted and for several years about all that Kentuckians at large knew of their state university's famed cage teams consisted of information gleaned from the radio and newspapers.

In 1941, when Dr. H. L. Donovan became president of the University, one of his first recommendations was for a building "that will properly take care of our athletics, our health service, physical education, and recreation." From this beginning came the plan that culminated in the construction of 11,500-seat Memorial Coliseum, an unparalleled edifice costing \$3,925,000 by the time it was completed in 1950.

The huge building, which serves as a memorial to the nearly 10,000 Kentuckians who lost their lives in World War II and the Korean conflict, covers an entire city block and contains as much space as a seven-story office building.


In sharp contrast to the early days in Alumni Gym, the Coliseum played host to over a 150,000 Kentuckians annually for appearance of the Wildcat cage teams alone and interest increased with such strides that even this splendid arena became too small.

In fact, sale of season tickets has been closed to the public since the early 1960's with priority holders taking all the allotment other than student seating. The only hope for fans wishing to see individual games was to wait outside the Coliseum ticket windows and grab unused seating in the student section minutes before tipoff time.

The arena itself evoked an atmosphere difficult to match—the character of great tradition permeated the air with near spiritual force.


A young coach new on Kentucky's schedule brought his team in for its initial practice session and stood silently surveying the grandeur of the Coliseum. After several moments of silence, he commented with a reverence.

"I have heard about this place but didn't believe it. I feel and sense something here I have never felt in any basketball arena. This has got to be THE place to play basketball": And like so many others, he and his team became another victim of the Wildcats the following night.



#### Russell Rice Is Wildcat Sports Information Director


RUSSELL RICE was named sports information director at UK in May, 1969, after serving two years as assistant to Ken Kuhn, who retired after more than two decades of service with the University. Rice came to the Wildcats from The Lexington Leader, where he was a general reporter eight years and sports editor five years. A native of Paintsville, Ky., he won letters in football, basketball and baseball at Van Lear High. After serving with the U.S. Marines in World War II, he attended Kentucky Wesleyan College and received his bachelor's at the University of Kentucky in 1951. He has served as manager of the NCAA Mid-East Basketball Tournament (1968), president of the Southeastern Conference Sports Information Directors Association and chairman of the Basketball Hall of Fame Committee of the College Sports Information Directors Association and was recipient of the 1971 Churchmen's "Sportswriters of the Year" award. As a newspaper man, his duties ranged from agricultural hearings in Washington to spending three months as the traveling companion to a Kentucky gubernatorial candidate. He attended a national sports editors seminar at Columbia University and reported the activities of such Wildcat teams as football coach Charlie Bradshaw's "Thin Thirty" and "The Runts" of basketball coach Adolph Rupp. He is a former Kentucky area correspondent for Time-Life-Fortune magazines and Kentucky editor of Tobacco Magazine and Religious News Service. For the past seven years, he has pursued a hobby of researching Kentucky basketball and football. He edits the K-Mens Newsletter and has been honored by that organization for outstanding service. He also was honored recently by WAVE-



TV for "Outstanding Contribution to Televised Sports." He is married to the former Miss Doris Thacker of Knott County. They have four children—Mrs. Rodney Morris of Indianapolis, Ind., Mrs. Mike Covington of Georgetown, and Russell James and Kim, of Lexington.










#### JACK PERRY

Tonight ushers in the opening of a new era. I wasn't around for the beginning of basketball play in Memorial Coliseum. I came to Lexington to old WLEX from Harlan at the start of the 1953-54 season. That year, after having been on probation, Cliff Hagan, Frank Ramsey, Lou Tsioropoulos, Billy Evans, and Gayle Rose led the Wildcats to their first perfect season 25-0, to begin my career at the mike in the Coliseum.

There is no way to express my feeling of Rupp Arena other than to say, "It could only happen in Kentucky." Where else could you fill 23,000 seats and have such a demand for tickets that they were distributed by lottery? Where else are names of players like Johnson, Robey, and Givens practically household words?

We will know a lot about this Kentucky team in a few games. Two seniors, four juniors, two sophomores, and three freshmen—eleven players who, without a doubt have their work cut out for them. I don't believe any team has a more difficult schedule than Kentucky—Indiana, Kansas, Notre Dame—it's a good way to get a team ready. Ready for Ernie Grunfeld at Tennessee, Anthony Murray at Alabama, Auburn's Eddie Johnson. The SEC may be the toughest conference in the country this season.

I've called the Cats' games in Memorial Coliseum for twenty-three years and watched Kentuckians like Vernon Hatton, Johnny Cox, Cotton Nash, Pat Riley, Louie Dampier, Dan Issel and Kevin Grevy make us proud to see the blue and white uniform take the court and I hope I'm around to call the next twenty-three in Rupp Arena.

It's so much more difficult now to post a perfect season than it was twenty years ago, but I sure would like to see the Wildcats do it again!

# Ten Schools Comprise Southeastern Conference

The Southeastern Conference traces its origin to 1933 when 13 members of the old Southern Conference reorganized into a new conference made up of Southern schools located west and south of the Appalachian Mountains.

The 13 charter members of the SEC were (listed alphabetically): Alabama, Auburn, Florida, Georgia, Georgia Tech, Kentucky, Louisiana State, Mississippi, Mississippi State, Sewanee, Tennessee, Tulane, and Vanderbilt. Since that time, three members have left the conference: Sewanee in 1940; Georgia Tech in 1964; and Tulane in 1966.

The ten schools in the SEC compete each year for conference championships in football, basketball, baseball, track, tennis, golf, swimming, and wrestling. In addition, an all-

sports trophy is given to the member compiling the most points in all sports, with 10 points given for a first-place finish, nine for second, and so on.

The office of Commissioner of the SEC was created in 1940 because of the growing demands for administering the conference's business. The first Commissioner was Martin S. Conner of Jackson, Miss., who served until 1946. Bernie H. Moore, former coach at L.S.U., was Commissioner until 1966 and was responsible for guiding the SEC to national prominence.

A. M. (Tonto) Coleman succeeded Moore, serving until 1972 when the present Commissioner, Dr. H. Boyd Mc-Whorter, took office.



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# In Last Meeting—December 31, 1968, Kentucky Bowed To Wisconsin 69-65

The last time Kentucky played Wisconsin was December 31, 1968 before a crowd of 4,805 in Chicago Stadium. Before time ran out, Wisconsin had built and lost a 17 point lead and outlasted two Kentucky rallies to beat the Wildcats 69-65.

With a 42-26 lead in the first half, the Badgers hit 72 percent from the field for a new record against a Kentucky team

A lay-up by Dan Issel with 14 seconds remaining in the game pulled Kentucky to within two points 67-65, but their chance for victory was lost when Wisconsin's John Schell intercepted a pass, with five seconds left, was fouled and hit both free throws.

While the Kentucky zone seemed to bother Wisconsin in the first half, the Badgers tight man-to-man appeared to give the Cats trouble.

Wisconsin finished with 56.1 percent — Kentucky 37.8. The Wildcats hit 9 of 24 attempts at the free throw line.

Kentucky scorers were: Mike Pratt—15, Larry Steele—2, Dan Issel—22, Phil Argento—14, and Mike Casey—12 points. The 1968-69 Wildcats, captained by Phil Argento ended the season with a record of 23-5. The other losses came from

North Carolina, Florida, Vanderbilt and in the NCAA Mideast Regional — Marquette.


In cooperation with the University Medical Service, the University of Kentucky provides a cardiac resuscitation program at all UK basketball games.

#### LOST AND FOUND

Lost and found articles should be reported or turned in to an usher or a security officer. You may wish to write to the director of arena security and describe lost articles which will be returned if found.

#### NO HORNS

Horns are not permitted in Rupp Arena and will be picked up at the entrances. Be considerate and allow your neighbor to enjoy the game. Keep portable radios at a low volume.



#### GATE INFORMATION

Rupp Arena will normally open one hour prior to any scheduled event. Please do not leave the arena until the conclusion of an event or game or at half-time if you plan to re-enter. No "Pass-out" tickets will be issued and you will not be permitted to re-enter.

#### COURT REGULATIONS

Spectators must keep off the court at all times. Spectators must use the arena stairs and vomities. There are no public facilities located on the arena floor level. Public facilities in Rupp Arena are located on the entry concourse level. You will find all refreshment stands, drinking fountains, public telephones, restrooms, vending machines and first aid on the concourse level.

#### LIQUORS

Alcoholic beverages are strictly prohibited within the arena as are all food and drink containers including hard surfaced materials of any type, bottles, cans, thermos bottles, ice bags, ice chest, and any object related to above. Arena personnel are instructed to enforce this rule in the interest of safety. PUBLIC ADDRESS

Messages for the public address announcer are acceptable only in emergencies and must be approved by the Sports Information Director at University of Kentucky basketball events.

SIGNS

Signs and barriers are restricted in Rupp Arena in accordance with policies established by arena management and public safety officials.

#### GENERAL TICKET POLICY

- All persons must have a ticket
- No pass out checks permitted at any exit
- All sales final
- Tickets cannot be refunded or replaced if lost, stolen or destroyed.
- The University of Kentucky Athletic Association reserves the right to revoke tickets by refund of purchase price.
- Holder of tickets to University of Kentucky athletic events agrees to abide by Arena and University Policies.
- For Arena events other than University of Kentucky basketball all tickets are sold by the Lexington Center Corporation and its authorized outlets. Box Office hours are 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Saturday and commencing 90 minutes prior to the event on event days. No telephone reservations. Checks will not be accepted within seven days of an event.



## A Growing University

Founded in 1865 under the provisions of the Morrill Land Grant Act, the University of Kentucky began with a modest enrollment of about 200 and a staff of 11.

For the first 40 years enrollment remained small and the liberal arts studies attracted more students than the offerings in engineering and agriculture.

By the turn of the century, the University was becoming one of the most important institutions in the Commonwealth. The Kentucky Agricultural Experiment Station, focal point of the University's continuing commitment to agricultural research, began in the late 1880's. Between 1900 and 1920, several reorganizations laid down the basic outline of the schools and colleges which exist to this day.

UK took its present name in 1916 and at the same time assumed the responsibility of being the state's principal institution for teaching, research and service.

From its modest beginnings more than a century ago the University in modern times has grown at a rapid rate with enrollment more than doubling in the past 10 years.

#### ENROLLMENT

There are more than 20,000 students on the Lexington campus and 17,000 students in the 13 community colleges across the state operated by the University of Kentucky.

Kentucky residents represent 85 percent of the enrollment on the Lexington campus. There also are some 500 students from about 50 different foreign countries each year on campus.

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#### THE CAMPUS

The central campus comprises about 625 acres of land on which there are more than 200 buildings and other structures, walks, malls, gardens, playing fields, recreation space and parking.

The University also has 6,750 acres in agricultural research farms and 4-H Club centers in various parts of the state and 14,495 acres in its Robinson Forest in Eastern Kentucky.

The University operates on a current budget of \$186,809,300., about half from state appropriations and the remainder from student fees, federal and country appropriations, endowments, gifts, and grants and miscellaneous sources.

#### FACULTY AND STAFF

The University employs about 8,800 people, including faculty and staff, on the Lexington campus and in the community college system. There are about 1,600 faculty on the Lexington campus and

500 in the community colleges.

The gross monthly payroll on the Lexington campus alone is about \$8 million.



#### WHO WERE THE 'FABULOUS FIVE'?

The most frequently asked question tossed at basketball historians and sports authorities is "Who were the 'Fabulous Five' of Kentucky?" The answer is Alex Groza (center), Ralph Beard and Kenny Rollins (guards), Wah Wah Jones and Cliff Barker (forwards). This famous 1948 team, captained by Rollins, won 36 and lost 3 while sweeping to Kentucky's first NCAA title and went on to participate as a unit in the Olympic Games—helping the USA team capture the world championship. Rollins graduated after the '48 season, but the remaining foursome continued to play havoc with collegiate basketball and copped another NCAA title for Kentucky in 1949 on a record of 32-2.

#### UK At A Glance

#### COMMUNITY COLLEGES

The University of Kentucky has 13 community colleges scattered across the state at Ashland . . . Henderson . . . Cumberland (Southeast) . . . Elizabethtown . . . Prestonsburg . . . Hopkinsville . . . Somerset . . . Louisville (Jefferson) . . . Paducah . . Hazard . . . Maysville . . . Madisonville . . . and Lexington (Lexington Technical Institute).

The community colleges offer students the opportunity of taking the first two years of their undergraduate work at home or working toward an associate degree in a two-year technical-vocational program to qualify them for job opportunities. The colleges also sponsor numerous continuing education and adult education programs to meet the educational needs of their communities.

Current enrollment in the community colleges is about 17,000, and the colleges granted a total of 1,746 degrees in the 1975-76 school year. Enrollment in the community colleges has more than tripled in the past 10 years.

Tuition for residents of Kentucky at the community colleges is \$195 per semester.

#### MEDICAL CENTER

The Albert B. Chandler Medical Center, through its wide range of programs in education, patient care and research, is committed to meeting the health needs of Kentuckians.

There are five colleges in the Medical Center — Medicine, Dentistry, Nursing, Pharmacy and Allied Health — with more than 1,900 students enrolled.

The University Hospital serves some 16,000 patients annually and accommodates more than 35,000 emergency room visits. Outpatient visits total more than 231,000 annually.

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#### **EVENING CLASS PROGRAM**

This program includes credit and non-credit classes in the evening. Tuition is \$20 per credit hour.

#### INDEPENDENT STUDY PROGRAM

This program offers more than 150 University courses for credit by correspondence. The program also offers noncredit courses designed to meet specific vocational needs and 40 courses at the high school level.

#### OFF-CAMPUS PROGRAM

The University offers a number of courses each year at various locations throughout the state based on the educational needs of the local communities. Tuition for these extension programs is \$20 per undergraduate credit hour and \$30 per graduate credit hour. There is also a \$2 service fee for each course.

#### CONTINUING EDUCATION

One of the fastest growing services of the University, continuing education programs are designed to bring people up to date with the latest techniques and information in their fields of work. Numerous colleges of the University—including medicine, dentistry, nursing, law, business and economics and engineering—now sponsor a year-long series of programs.

#### DONOVAN PROGRAM

Named in honor of the fourth president of the University, the Herman L. Donovan Senior Citizens Fellowship provides an opportunity for any person 65 years of age or older, regardless of whether they are a resident of the state, to enroll in University courses tuition-free. The program graduated its first Ph.D in 1975, Dr. Alfred David Arthurs of Montreal, Canada. Some 275 senior citizens participate in this unique program annually.

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
# University of Kentucky School Songs

#### COLORS: BLUE AND WHITE



A group of Kentucky football stalwarts who met to choose their colors in the 1890's were responsible for the famed blue and white of the University. Someone suggested blue and white—"blue like Dick Stoll's necktie." Judge Richard C. Stoll later became a prominent alumnus and trustee of the University.
