ORIGIN OF "WILDCATS" NICKNAME

Kentucky's athletic teams are known to sports fans as the Wildcats. This first and only nickname borne by University varsities had its origin in 1909 in a speech made by Commandant Corbusier, then head of the military department of old State College. Speaking to a chapel audience of students on the showing of the Kentucky football team in defeating Illinois six to two, the Commandant declared "they fought like Wildcats." The tag was popularized by word of mouth and by the press with the result that it has since become synonymous with all major Kentucky athletic teams.

While the name is old in origin, no claim is made regarding precedence over similar nicknames boasted by Northwestern, Villanova and about 10 other major

athletic teams.

An alumnus in 1947 presented a live Kentucky Wildcat to SUKY, student pep organization. Named "The Colonel," the cat served as a live mascot for UK teams until his death in 1955. The current mascot is a stuffed wildcat obtained from a Brooklyn taxidermist just before the 1958 football season and named "Tucky."

WORKING TICKETS—Address requests to Sports Publicity Office as far in advance as possible. Tickets will not be mailed unless requested and will be held at the Reservation Window at the main entrance of Memorial Coliseum for pickup on game night.

PRESS DOOR—Entrance to the area set aside for press and radio should be via the Press Door located to the extreme left of the Coliseum entrance foyer.


COMPS-No individual game allotment.

WESTERN UNION—Wire facilities are available at court side. Please advise if you will be filing from the Coliseum and also notify manager of Western Union in Lexington.

RADIO BROADCASTS—Applications must be directed at least one week in advance to Radio Director, University of Kentucky, Lexington. Tickets will be supplied by the Sports Publicity Office only upon receipt of approved permit from the Radio Director. Spotters are available if requested in advance. Line orders should be made to General Telephone Company, Lexington. Broadcast accommodations are at the press tables located on side court at floor level.

TV AND MOTION PICTURES—News clip film highlights will be furnished to TV stations or newsreel agencies at actual cost upon arrangement at least one week in advance. Stations or agencies desiring to shoot own film must make application to the University Radio Director at least one week in advance. Forms may be signed to cover the entire season. Tickets will be issued by the Sports Publicity Office only upon receipt of approved permit. A maximum of 200 feet of filmed highlights may be shown on a delayed basis. Live TV coverage prohibited except under arrangements made with UK Athletic Director. Photographers are restricted to working areas at either end of the floor adjacent to team benches.

SERVICES—Working press and radio will be furnished game programs, brochures, running play-by-play, halftime quickie box and final statistics in the form of a complete, seven-column dittoed box score.

THE UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY

. . . The State Is Our Campus

Located in Lexington, an urban community of over 100,000 population in the heart of Kentucky's famed Blue Grass region, University of Kentucky is a state-supported, land-grant institution now approaching its centennial year to be celebrated in 1965.

The present school, which currently enrolls about 12,000 students and offers instruction in 10 academic colleges plus a Graduate School and a division of Extended Programs, had its beginnings in 1865 when it was established as a part of old Kentucky University. This action by the State Legislature united sectarian and public education under one organization for the first time. Federal funds authorized under the Morrill Act were used to develop agriculture and mechanical arts within KU and, in 1878, A&M College was separated from KU to become a separate state institution on the general site of what is now the 706-acre main campus. Name changes in 1908 and 1916 resulted in the title by which the school is now known.

A new chief administrative officer, Dr. John W. Oswald, took over reins of the University for the 1963-64 school year. The 46-year-old new president, who succeeds Dr. Frank Dickey, has an athletic background including collegiate football play at De-Pauw and letters in basketball and track. He was selected on the Sports Illustrated Silver Anniversary All-America Team in 1962. Dr. Oswald, whose special field is plant pathology, comes to Kentucky from a position as vice-president-administration, Statewide University, University of California.

The University is on the approved list of the Association of American Universities and is a member of the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. It is fully accredited in its respective colleges and departments by all of the major professional societies and educational organizations.

ATHLETICS AT KENTUCKY

Kentucky's athletic program, a well-balanced and ambitious activity featuring inter-collegiate competition in nine different sports, is organized under the Department of Athletics and a corporation known as the University of Kentucky Athletics Association.

The program is conducted without overemphasis or sacrifice of educational objectives and in strict compliance with the rules of the University, the Southeastern Conference and the National Collegiate Association.

A board of directors, headed by University President John W. Oswald in the capacity of chairman, maintains overall policy supervision of the athletic program. In addition to the UK President, board officers include Dr. A. D. Albright as vice-chairman and Dr. W. L. Matthews in the capacity of secretary. Twelve other men, drawn from the University faculty and the general public, also serve on the board as appointees of the president as does a student representative.

Supervising the steady growth and balanced development of one of the nation's top athletic programs is Bernie A. Shively, a former Illinois grid All-American and a veteran of 25 years in the post of Director of Athletics.

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS BERNIE A. SHIVELY

Supervising the steady growth and balanced development of one of the nation's top athletic programs is the Herculean task being carried out successfully by Bernie A. Shively.

Few who have observed the untiring efforts of the tall, silver-haired former All-America footballer in the service of the University of Kentucky since 1927 and as Director of Athletics since 1938 will argue his fitness as an athletic Hercules. Not only has Shively guided the development of Kentucky as a nationally-respected power in major sports, but he has also gained personal prestige through a fair-minded approach to many problems.

During his quarter-century tenure as Athletic Director, Shively has directly supervised major expansions in Kentucky's athletic plant resulting from the progression of the school's football and basketball teams to greater national prominence and increased patronage by the sports-minded public.

The seating capacity of Kentucky's football stadium, McLean Stadium on Stoll Field, has been doubled to bring the current number of seats to approximately 37,500 and on par with most other schools located in heavier-populated areas. Powerful lighting equipment also was installed during the 1948-49 construction and a new-type "iodized" light put up in 1961 to bring night football into new popularity. Partly to satisfy the overwhelming number of basketball devotees, who could not squeeze into the 2,800-seat Alumni Gymnasium, a long-planned Memorial Coliseum was completed in 1950. Sating 11,500 persons for cage contests, the four-million dollar Coliseum also houses the Athletic Department. More recently, Shively directed the acquisition of a pair of modern, ranch-style living units which have served as the home of the football team since 1954. "Wildcat Manor" and "Kitten Lodge" replace three frame houses which the gridders had occupied since 1949.

Plans Spacious New Sports Center

A large dressing room building and football practice field, used since 1955, was abandoned in 1959 to make way for a huge new men's dorm. Under Shively's supervision, a spacious new Sports Center was prepared a short distance away on the University farm to take even better care of the footballers and spring sports teams. The Sports Center is generally regarded as one of the finest sports facilities in the nation.

Stoll Field recently underwent, with Shively's supervision, a major "face-lifting" to improve its playing surface and the view of the fans sitting in the lower rows of the stands.

Born in Oliver, III., May 26, 1903, Shively attended Paris (III.) High school and there began his athletic career by participating in track and football. Although he was considered an outstanding backfield man in high school, Shively didn't attract the serious attention of collegiate scouts. He entered Illinois and tried out for the football team on his own. From that humble beginning, Shively went on to become a great guard under Coach Bob Zuppke on the same Illini team made famous by the immortal Red Grange.

Shive played two years with Grange, running interference for the "Galloping Ghost" and made All-America in 1926 as a senior despite a bad knee that handicapped his playing. He also won the heavyweight wrestling championship of the Big 10 and was a standout in track to rank as one of the finest all-around athletes in Illinois' history.

Shively came to Kentucky in 1927 as line coach of football under Harry Gammage and six years later was named head of the UK Physical Education Department. He succeeded Chet Wynne as Athletic Director in 1938. During this period and the years following, he also served as track and baseball coach for several seasons and

continued to assist the football staff as line coach until 1944. The next year, 1945, he assumed full charge of the grid squad for one season before turning the job over to mentor Paul (Bear) Bryant in 1946.

The Kentucky Athletic Director is currently chairman of the NCAA Basketball Tournament Committee and for the past 10 years has been president of the Southeastern Conference Coaches and Athletic Directors Association. He served as chairman of the SEC Basketball Committee for a number of years and is a past chairman of the NCAA summer baseball group.

Shively and his wife, Ruth, have two children. Doug was a star end on the UK grid team for three years ending in 1958 and is now coaching at VPI while daughter Suzanne was a Phi Beta Kappa graduate in 1957.

THE NCAA IN MEMORIAL COLISEUM

University of Kentucky's specious Memorial Coliseum, one of the largest and finest basketball arenas in the South, has been the site of portions of the NCAA Tournament six times since its completion in 1950. First round playoffs were staged in the UK Coliseum in 1955, 1959, 1960 and 1962 while regional tournaments were held in the building in both 1957 and 1958. The Wildcats played in the two regional eliminations, being eliminated by Michigan State in '57 and defeating Miami (Ohio) and Notre Dame in '58 enrouts to its fourth and last National Championship.

"Nation's Winningest Basketball Coach"

33 Years — Won 684, Lost 134 — 83.6%

For over three decades, the sports world has watched an amazing record being forged with near perfection out of meager raw material by a colorful figure in the Blue Grass country of Kentucky known familiarly to hundreds of thousands as the "Man in the Brown Suit."

He is Adolph Rupp of Kentucky and when the sport of basketball is mentioned today, a direct chain of thought brings out the name of this maker of champions who holds undisputed rank as the "Nation's Winningest Basketball Coach." The name of Rupp, feared and respected in opponents' hearts and beloved by the millions who have witnessed the remarkable success of his Wildcat cage teams, has become synonymous with the game of basketball.

Such unprecedented recognition for the fabulous mentor is only natural since his sucess in the past 33 years as head man of the fabled Kentucky cage thoroughbreds has been nothing short of phenomenal. It would take a book longer than his onw technical best-seller, "Championship Basketball," to recite the record completely. Briefly, however, that record includes:

- —An amazing 684 victories out of 818 starts for an unparalleled winning percentage of better than 83 percent against major competition.
- —Certification by the NCAA Service Bureau as the nation's most successful collegiate basketball coach, both for the decade ending in 1961 and at the 20-year level.
- —One of only three still-active collegiate cage coaches with "membership" in the exclusive 600 club in which the dues are 600 victories. And he is looking for No. 700 this season.
- —Selection as the national "Coach of the Year" in 1959 for the second time in his career.
- —An unprecedented honor roll of four NCAA Tournament championships picked up by his Wildcats who hold the all-time record of 13 appearances in the national classic and can claim more victories in NCAA play (23) than any other team.
- —A nominal world's championship as co-coach of the successful USA entry in the 1948 Olympic Games which included members of Kentucky's NCAA champions.
- —Producer of more Olympic gold medallion winners (7) than any other cage coach.

 —An all-time record total of 20 Southeastern Conference titles since the league
- —An all-time record total of 20 Southeastern Conference titles since the league was organized in 1933.
- —Election to the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame in 1959 and previous selection (in 1946) by Helms Athletic Foundation as a member of their exclusive Hall of Fame.
- —Trustee and member of selection and honors committees of Basketball Hall of Fame. Also chairman NABC Hall of Fame Committee and headed the group last last winter picked players to appear in East-West All-Star Game benefitting the Hall of Fame.
- —Recipient of the Governor's Medallion in 1959 for meritorious service to the Commonwealth of Kentucky and plaques of appreciation from the U.S. Air Force (1959) and Sugar Bowl committee (1951).
- —Election to the Kentucky Hall of Fame (1945), outstanding citizen of Lexington (1949) and twice honorary citizen of the City of New Orleans.
- —Coach of the winning East team in the Shrine East-West game 1959.
- —Development of more All-Americans (20 players honored 29 times) and more material for the pro ranks (21) than any other coach.
- —Four Sugar Bowl Tournament championships, a National Invitation Tournament title and five trophies from the first nine UK Invitational Tournaments.
- —Membership on the NCAA Basketball Rules Committee.

Rupp's Teams Play In Most Tournaments

Tournament invitations in pre-Rupp years were almost unheard of—Kentucky played in only seven sectional eliminations. In contrast, the Rupp-led Wildcats have the distinction of playing in more tournaments of all types than any other team. All told, his Bluegrass fives have achieved the unequalled feat of 139 victories against only 38 defeats, covering action in 38 national classics plus 29 conference meets and the '48 Olympics.

Although the competition was nowhere near as rugged as the schedules played by today's nationally-recognized Wildcat brigades, Rupp's very first team compiled a highly-successful, 15-3 record and Kentucky basketball has been on a winning plane ever since. The most games lost in a single season since Rupp added his touch were nine in 1960-61 and again last season. The remarkably low average number of

losses per season in the Rupp Era is three.

Rupp's teams have finished as national champion in the press association polls four times in the last 14 years. They were unranked in the top 20 only in the 1952-53 campaign, when they were idle, and last season. Possibly his greatest achievement came in the 1953-54 season when the Wildcats rolled unchecked through a 25-game schedule of top-flight opposition to become the biggest-winning, perfect-

record unit in all basketball history up to that time.

Rivaling that achievement, in the opinion of the sportswriters and broadcasters, is the tremendous coaching jobs turned in by the basketball miracle man in more recent seasons. Seven years ago, Rupp guided a moderately talented club to an 18th SEC title, third place in the polls and a ninth NCAA Tournament appearance while achieving a 23-5 record. The surprised experts, who had predicted UK would not win its own conference, voted Coach Rupp the runner-up spot as 1957 "Coach of the Year."

Even that effort went by the boards in 1958, however, as Kentucky's talentless wonders copped the NCAA title for an unprecedented fourth time. The Wildcats were unsung and almost unknown except by reputation and heritage. Not a single man had been honored on the All-Conference fives selected before tournament time and they had lost more games (6) in regular season play than any UK team in 17 years.

Wins National 'Coach of Year' Honor

If the experts thought that was tops in miracles, they reckoned without the amazing drive of this man Rupp. With four-fifths of his starting lineup gone, he re-built shattered foundations in such an astonishing fashion that the Wildcats rolled through the 1959 season almost unchecked. Although they failed to win the title in their increasingly-tough Southeastern Conference for only the third time since 1943, UK was generally conceded to be the nation's top team. Most experts agreed that the Kentuckians, who finished with a 24-3 record and ranked second nationally, missed a golden opportunity to pick up a fifth NCAA crown as they were upset by Louisville in the tourney opener. This feeling was given meaning as Rupp was accorded "Coach of the Year" honor by United Press International.

The 1959-60 season admittedly was not a great one as the UKats chalked up only an 18-7 mark—second worst season of the Rupp Era. However, many experts considered the outcome to be a tribute to one of the greatest coaching efforts ever turned in. Plagued from the beginning of the season to the end by adversity (sickness, injuries, eligibility difficulties and personnel problems, complete disaster was always imminent and avoided only by masterful juggling (16 different starting combos) and

artful strategy moves.

It was a similar story of great coaching technique against the heavy odds of personnel and schedule in 1960-61. Although the final record read only 19-9 (worst ever for a Rupp team), a closer look reveals the touch of Rupp was there for the Wildcats were regrouped into a fearsome outfit after early troubles and rolled to 11 wins in their last 12 starts. Enroute they conquered eventual SEC champ Mississippi State on the road and demolished Vanderbilt in a SEC Playoff for an NCAA berth. They never ran out of gas until stopped by Ohio State in regional finals.

There was no way of anticipating the tremendous season that evolved in 1961-62 except to depend on the proven touch of master rebuilder Rupp. He had done it before, but losing four starters off the "worst" team of his career (19-9 in '61) presented a terrific challenge. Undaunted by odds, Coach Rupp guided his "Fearless Five" past challenge after challenge, copping the title in the UK Invitational and cornering a share of the SEC championship for the 20th time. Finally, critical lack of height and bench strength caught up with the 'Cats in the NCAA Regional finals and they put gear away until next year with an amazing, 23-3 record that even Rupp admitted was "one of the most surprising ever."

Not much could be said for 1962-63, which resulted in the posting of the poorest record ever (16-9) of the Rupp Era, except that it easily could have been worse without a dedicated coaching effort. And there was some solace to be found in the knowledge that a great majority of the nation's cage outfits would gladly

settle for such a "poor" (by Rupp standards) mark any year.

Rupp Credited For Increasing Interest

Rupp is recognized by sports authorities with doing more than any other modern tutor to make basketball a national spectator sport. From the very outset of his career at Kentucky, which began in 1930, he has introduced or popularized many new and revised trends in the game that have aided materially in making the country basketball-minded. One such innovation was the controlled fast break offensive pattern that has since become the crowd-pleasing trademark of Wildcat cage teams.

The outstanding success of this man as a basketball coach is matched only by

the personal fame he has attained off the court.

The masterful story-teller is equally renowned on the banquet and coaching clinic circuit and is in constant demand as a speaker in the off season. He annually appears in more than a dozen states to make speaking engagements and believes he has missed only Alaska in tours throughout the 50 states. Rupp undoubtedly has conducted more coaching clinics than any other tutor. Overseas assignments for the Army and Air Force have taken him in recent years to Europe three times (last, Germany 1961) and twice to Hawaii and the Far East (last, summer 1962). Several foreign olympic coaches have studied under Rupp at UK.

Internationally recognized for his avocation as a registered Hereford breederenthusiast, Rupp is currently in his eleventh term as president of the Kentucky Hereford Assn. He owns and operates one of the largest farms in the Bluegrass area and serves as a director of the Central District Warehousing Corp., world's largest tobacco marketing organization. The coach in 1962 was named to a five-year term on the Board of Governors of the Agricultural Hall of Fame and National Agricul-

tural Center.

Coach Rupp is active in Shrine affairs, being chosen in 1950 as one of the 10 outstanding Shriners of the nation and holding honorary memberships in temples throughout the country. He is a Past Potentate of the Oleika (Lexington) Temple and serves as vice-chairman of the board for the Shrine Crippled Children's Hospital in Lexington. Four years ago, he was nominated as one of five candidates for the Imperial Outer Guard of the Shrine. Rupp serves also as state chairman of the Cerebral Palsy Association.

He has his own television and radio shows during the season, has produced two film shorts ("Basketball: Individual Offense" for Coca-Cola Co. and "Parade to National Championship") and written books on virtually every phase of the game. The Coach also is chairman of the board of the Leatherguard Corporation and a board

member of American Central Life Insurance Company.

Born in Halstead, Kansas, Sept. 2, 1901, Rupp attended University of Kansas where he played guard under Phog Allen. Following graduation in 1923, he coached high school ball one year at Marshalltown, Iowa, and then at Freeport, III., four seasons before coming to Kentucky in 1930. His fame as "The Man in the Brown Suit" stems from his superstitious preference of brown as the color of his game-night wardrobe.



HARRY LANCASTER

Assistant Coach

When Harry Lancaster finds a spare moment to reflect on his days an an all-around star athlete at Georgetown (Ky.) College back in the early thirties, he can recall with a degree of dismay how close he came to never pursuing the "round ball"





An All-Conference halfback for three straight years and captain during his last two seasons, Lancaster's football career almost overshadowed his play on the basketball court. In the cage sport, he was equally successful—with three All-Conference nominations and two team captaincies to his credit—but considered himself a better football player than cager. Experience, however, proved him a good student and teacher of the sport of basketball as he began his coaching career and he now has no regrets over the choice he made.

Born in Paris, Ky., in 1911, Lancaster attended Paris High School where he played four years in all sports. Following graduation in 1928, he continued his athletic career at Georgetown College and gained star recognition in football, basketball and baseball. After finishing at Georgetown in '32, Harry remained

on for the next school year as an assistant coach in both the grid and cage sports before moving into the high school field. He coached several sports, mostly basketball, for nine years and was a high school principal for six years before coming to the University of Kentucky in 1942 as an instructor in physical education. Soon thereafter, the war intervened and Lancaster saw 26 months' Navy duty, rising from apprentice seaman to Lieutenant (Senior Grade).

Returning to UK in March, 1946, he became a part-time assistant to the Wildcats' famous cage mentor, Adolph Rupp, in addition to carrying on his teaching duties and gaining his master's degree. Two years later, he became Coach Rupp's general right hand man in a full-time capacity. Lancaster also served as Kentucky's baseball coach in 1946-47 and picked up the assignment again starting with the 1951 campaign.

In addition to his coaching duties, Lancaster manages to sandwich in a large slice of traveling. Besides checking on the nation's best high school cagers as potential material for future Wildcat national champion crews, his travel stems from a plan to extensively scout upcoming opponents. Coach Rupp was one of the first in the country to inaugurate this wide-spread scouting system in basketball and believes it has contributed materially to Kentucky's past success in carrying off championships with almost reckless abandon.

Lancaster also traveled to Greece in the summer of 1951 on a special athletic assignment for the U. S. State Department. The mission called for the Kentucky aide to act as an advisor to Greek Basketball Federation officials on Olympic procedure and other matters. He also conducted numerous clinics, coaching schools and gave public lectures on the cage sport as played in the U.S.A.

During the summer of 1962, he helped Coach Rupp conduct clinics for Army personnel in the Far East Theatre.

Lancaster's coaching success with the freshman teams has been commendable. The yearlings have lost only 31 contests under his tutelage the past 13 seasons against formidable competition that included the more elite junior college clubs and topnotch service quintets. His record stands at 140 wins, 31 losses.

NEIL REED

Assistant Coach

Youthful Neil Reed, who joined the Wildcats in a graduate assistant capacity for the 1962-63 season to study the proven coaching methods of Baron Adolph Rupp,



becomes a full-time aide this season. In this capacity, he will assist Coach Rupp in both varsity and freshman coaching assignments, put in much time scouting the Wildcats' upcoming opponents and search out the top high school talent to fill out the stable of UK court thoroughbreds. Coach Reed came to Lexington following two seasons at Wauconda (III.) High School as head basketball coach. For his job in rebuilding a defeat-ridden ball club, which had lost 28 straight and won only seven games in seven years, he was accorded conference "Coach of the Year" designation. Previously, Reed had coached at a junior high school in Milwaukee, Wis. The personable, 31-year-old coach is a native of Lawrenceburg, Ind., and attended high school in that city. Although he did not participate as a player on his high school team, Reed did gain cage experience with an AAU club and later

played freshman basketball and baseball at University of Illinois. He holds academic degrees from both Illinois and Millikan and, at Kentucky, is working toward a degree in athletic administration. Reed is married and the father of three children.

KEN KUHN, Publicity Director—A veteran of 16 years in the position of publicizing Wildcat basketball teams and other athletic activities of the University of Kentucky, Kuhn came to Lexington from Michigan State in 1946. After spending the first two years of his UK association as News Editor of the school's Department of Public Relations, a job concerned with presenting the academic side of the university to the public, he moved over to the Department of Athletics just prior to the 1948 basketball season. In the capacity of Director of Sports Publicity, Kuhn diseminates news and information on Wildcat teams throughout the year through the media of the press, radio, television and national magazines. He also edits numerous UK sports publications, such as the national-prize-winning basketball brochure and game programs in both football and basketball. Kuhn is a past president of the SEC Sports Publicity Association and holds membership in COSIDA—national organization of sports publicity men.

JOE BROWN, Trainer—With a background as a trainer, teacher and coach, 30-year-old Joe Brown joined the University of Kentucky athletics staff last year in the capacity of trainer assigned to the basketball team. In the off season, he also serves the baseball squad and other spring teams in the same role. A member of the National Athletic Trainers Association and a service veteran, Brown is a valued authority on static exercises and rehabilitation of athletics-connected injuries. He has had numerous articles on various phases of his profession published by national magazines. For the current season, the former teacher has picked up the assignment of supervising the academic progress of Kentucky's cagers. His teaching background includes two years in public schools of his native state of Missouri and one year as a physical education instructor at Southern Illinois University. Brown has had training experience at Southern Illinois and Southeast Missouri State College and coached all sports while in service. He holds both a bachelor's degree and the MA in Education.

GEORGE HUKLE, Basketball Equip. Mgr. and Statistician—An invaluable member of the Kentucky basketball team for longer than most people can remember, George Hukle has served as official statistician for the Wildcats for a great many years and is in his second year as cage equipment manager . . . Regarded as the dean of Southeastern Conference statisticians and one of the nation's veterans, Hukle has been keeping charts for Coach Rupp since 1933 . . . He is credited with popularizing the statistic of field goal attempts in collegiate basketball.

KENTUCKY BASKETBALL OUTLOOK — 1963-64

Cagey Adolph Rupp didn't acquire his reputation as the nation's most successful basketball coach by "singing the blues," but the usually optimistic Baron of the Blue Grass is frankly fearful that his 34th edition of Kentucky Wildcats could go to the post with "possibly the poorest outlook for a winning season since I have been coaching."

Such uncharacteristic pessimism is truly bad news for the team that is acknowledged as the winningest collegiate cage outfit in history, but it also could be a good sign.

Just a year ago, the veteran Kentucky mentor freely predicted a banner season to compare favorably with the great years of the past that culminated with the Ruppmen capturing an unprecedented four NCAA championships. And then the "roof caved in" as a variety of troubles dogged the Wildcats all season long to a degree that resulted in the posting of the poorest record in the Rupp era—a 16-9 count.

While loyal Kentuckians are hopeful that seven returning lettermen—headed by two-time All-American Cotton Nash and 1963 Most Valuable Player Ted Deeken—can lead the way to a better campaign than Rupp anticipates, the questions revolving around a short-handed roster are many, varied and serious.

Perhaps the biggest key to the type of season Kentucky has is Nash. Although he notched points at a 20.6 clip last season and repeated on some All-America selections, he disappointgly fell off the sensational pace started during a terrific sophomore break-in year when he led the Southeastern Conference in scoring and toppled many school records. The question is posed: "Is he due for a performance equal to his soph season or will he be shackled by another showing similar to his problem-plagued junior year?" Indications, based on a new enthusiasm and determination at the start of pre-season practice, give much hope that Cotton is ready for another great year.

'Fireman' Deeken Represents Question Mark

Deeken, whose supreme "fireman" efforts in the closing stages of last season saved many a game and won him MVP honors, represents another major question: "Can he turn in a consistently good contribution as a season-long starter?" The lean Louisville senior also ran into academic difficulties after last season but now has cleared these up.

Charles (Chili) Ishmael, 6-4½ guard standout, loomed late last January as the key to his team's outside shooting problems as he suddenly came to life with 30 big points in an encounter with Florida. But the "honeymoon" was short-lived as Ishmael encountered scholastic troubles and was lost for the final six crucial games of the campaign. Having now worked himself back into the good graces of the professors, the question stands: "Will he be able to pick up where he left off last season to provide the Wildcats with a dependable long-range threat?"

Still another question revolves around the potential of a trio of highly-regarded sophomores—6-2 forward Mickey Gibson, 6-5 guard Tommy Kron, and 6-3 forward Larry Conley. They ranked one-two-three in scoring by yearlings last season with averages ranging between 16 and 23 points agame. It is uncertain if the soph hot shots (dubbed by Rupp the Katzenjammer Kids because they are so talkative) can take up the scoring slack and perform with the poise of veterans without the benefit of experience.

It's obvious that Coach Rupp bases his fear on the possibility that all of these questions will not be answered satisfactorily. And, to add to his worries, the Baron must cope again with the prospect of no real big man in the lineup to control the boards. The squad's two most sizeable performers are 6-6½ junior, John Adams and 6-8 soph, Larry Lentz, but both are untested. Adams seems likely to be tagged for the pivot job—freeing Nash to return to his more natural forward spot.

There's also no sure-fire "take charge guy" like graduated Roy Roberts still around, but indications are strong that ace soph Kron can fill this role as he gains know-how and confidence.

The schedule offers no solace, either, with a danger-plagued road littered with seven tough non-conference tests, play in two tournaments and league competition stacking up as possibly the strongest in history from the standpoint of number of clubs figured to have a good chance at the title that UK has captured a record of 20 times.

All problems considered, the prospects for success coming easy in 1964 to Kentucky's amazing basketeers are not rosy—at least not outwardly. But there is a sneaky suspicion afoot, well-founded by past experience, that "Uncle Adolph" will have his Blue Grass bouncers jumping before the campaign is too far along.

All the Baron, who has a reputation for surprises, will admit, however, is that he "would rather be a winner than a prophet."

GREATEST TEAM, PLAYER, THRILL?

Adolph Rupp's illustrious career as headmaster at Kentucky for more than three decades is certainly filled with a lot of memories for him and he's willing to share many of them with anyone who'll listen. But there are lines he will not cross, such as:

Greatest team?—Rupp points to four national champion outfits and an undefeated team that probably could have taken the national title if it had tried. Listeners get the impression that he would narrow the choice down to two—the "Fabulous Five" Olympic champions of '48 and the possibly even greater 1954 crew that went undefeated in 25 games to become the best perfect-record unit up to that time.

Greatest player?—Rupp steadfastly refuses to discuss personalities. "I'd just make one boy happy and hurt the feelings of a lot of other great ones that have played for me."

Greatest thrill?—''That's hard to say, but I guess three of my greatest were winning the '48 Olympics with my boys, going undefeated in '54 and getting that NCAA national championship trophy in 1958 with an unheralded bunch they called the 'Talentless Wonders'.''

WHO WERE THE 'FABULOUS FIVE'?

The most frequently asked question tossed at basketball historians and sports authorities is "Who were the 'Fabulous Five' of Kentucky?" The answer is Alex Groza (center), Ralph Beard and Kenny Rollins (guards), Wah Wah Jones and Cliff Barker (forwards). This famous 1948 team, captained by Rollins, won 36 and lost 3 while sweeping to Kentucky's first NCAA title and went on to participate as a unit in the Olympic Games—helping the USA team capture the world championship. Rollins graduated after the '48 season, but the remaining foursome continued to play havoc with collegiate basketball and copped another NCAA title for Kentucky in 1949 on a record of 36-2. Members of these two teams later gained fame in the pro ranks as they formed a unit known as the Indianapolis Olympians. And, along with contemporary Wildcats Adrian Smith and Billy Evans, they give UK and Coach Rupp a unique standing of seven Olympic gold medal winners.

REVIEWING A 'DISASTER'

The Story of Kentucky Basketball in 1962-63

By most standards, a final season record of 16-9 would be considered passing, but when that mark is compiled by the Kentucky Wildcats of Baron Adolph Rupp it's "a horse of a different color."

Winning "only" 16 of 25 starts in 1962-63 stamped the Blue Grass cage contingent as the worst, record-wise in the fabulously successful Rupp dynasty that extends back to 1930. The poorest previous accounting posted by a Rupp-coached UK five came in 1960-61 on a 19-9 mark,

While everyone was looking for explanations of Kentucky's "troubles," the answer (in part) was right under their noses, so to speak. The record revealed that Kentucky simply did not have enough punch in the clutch to win the close ones. Actually, as examination of the season results shows, the 'Cats were thoroughly beaten by only one team—St. Louis—which administered an 87-63 licking at a time when the Ruppmen seemed to be rolling after experiencing early-season troubles. Other losses came by a remarkably slim average margin of only four points.

Why Kentucky, long accustomed to winning the close ones and the clutch encounters as the key to becoming the greatest winning combination in basketball history, failed in the clutch in 1962-63 is another matter.

Several reasons were advanced, chief among them the lack of the threat of outside shooting, the absence of desirable height and the inconsistent performance of some players. Just about the time it appeared that 6-4½ guard Chili Ishmael would solve the outside shooting problem, he was declared ineligible and nobody appeared on the scene to fill his shoes. Cotton Nash, All-America as a promising sophomore in 1962, again paced the Kentuckians with a 20.6 scoring average but disappointingly fell off from the Conference-leading 23.4 pace of his sensational, record-busting sophomore campaign.

All was not dark during the strange season, however, as the Wildcats annexed the title in their own Invitational Tournament for the sixth time in 10 years, measuring West Virginia in a 79-75 upset. For contrast, one could try to figure out the reversal of form that saw Kentucky top Vanderbilt in Nashville, 106-82, and lose the return engagement in Lexington, 69-67.

UK RECORD 20-GAME WINNERS

Kentucky lives up completely to its billing as the all-time champion of major college basketball with its run of 14 straight 20-victory seasons beginning in 1945, according to Boston sports authority Bill Mokray. The Wildcats were not permitted to field a team in 1953, but made up for it with a perfect record (25-0) the following season and continued their streak through 1959. Baron Adolph Rupp's warriors also achieved the magic circle with a 20-3 record in 1933 and posted a 24-3 mark in 1962. Only other major teams to boast of as many as ten straight 20-victory campaigns are North Carolina State and Western Kentucky—each showing 10-year runs. West Virginia, 23-8 last year to stretch its record to eight, is the only power currently close to threatening the cage elite.

KENTUCKY IN THE SEC

Perhaps the greatest supremacy enjoyed by any team in any sport is reflected by Kentucky's basketball success in the Southeastern Conference since 1933. Against SEC teams, UK has annexed a record of 337 victories and lost only 49—a winning average of nearly 90 per cent. They have annexed 20 league championships and own over 60 team and individual records from regular season and tournament play. Only Tennessee and Georgia Tech can boast of beating the Wildcats two in a row in the same season and only Mississippi State is added to the exclusive club when the basis is widened to consecutive wins over two or more seasons. Three newcomers—Wake Forest, Princeton and Wisconsin—join with host and defending champion Kentucky to form the classy field for the eleventh annual University of Kentucky Invitational Tournament to be staged in the Wildcats' 11,500-seat Memorial Coliseum December 20 and 21.

Kentucky Athletic Director Bernie A. Shively, who has directed the nation's richest regular season cage classic since its inception in 1953, announced that pairings for the opening night of action in 1963 will pit Wake Forest against Ivy League champion Princeton and the Wisconsin Badgers of the Big Ten against the host Wildcats. All three of the visiting teams were selected on the basis of their potential for outstanding play this season and are expected to give the '63 UKIT one of the best balanced fields in history, Shively explained. The arrangement of games is intended to further emphasize the UKIT aim of presenting intersectionally flavored play that will provide the public a look at the style of basketball as it is played in different sections of the country.

Participants in the UK Invitational vie for an imposing trophy (shown on front cover), record-size shares of the net proceeds and important national prestige which has become associated with success in the pre-Christmas classic.

Teams Netted \$14,000 Dividend Last Year

The monetary dividend in past years has increased steadily in proportion, ranging from approximately \$8,200 paid to each of the four teams the first year to \$15,420 awarded each clube in 1959. The 1962 renewal, in which Kentucky topped West Virginia for the title, proved to be the second most successful in history as a two-night total audience of 22,138 netted participating teams equal shares of the net proceeds amounting to \$14,067.17—more money than most schools make on their basketball program in an entire season.

Over the years, 20 of the top basketball powers of the country have taken part in the UK Invitational. West Virginia holds the records for most visits with four appearances and is the only visitor to cop more than one championship—winning in 1957 and again in 1959. Baron Adolph Rupp's host Wildcats, one of the toughest outfits in the country to beat at home, have taken top honors six times, Dayton and St. Louis once each. Oregon State and lowa rounded out last year's field with the Beavers latching on to third place.

The prestige angle associated with the UKIT stems from the high-calibre competition that annually makes up the field and is reflected by the fact that the winner generally makes a significant jump in the wire service polls. Twice in recent years, the UK Invitational champion has valuted to the top spot in the rankings and often has used its success as momentum to post a good season record plus often attaining a coveted spot in post-season tourney play.

All four clubs invoved in the 1963 tourney are anticipating good seasons that should rank them among the national leaders and each boasts crowd-pleasing individual stars. Among these are Kentucky's two-time All-America Cotton Nash, All-America sensation Bill Bradley of Princeton, Wake Forest's 6-4 senior forward Frank Christie and 6-8 Jack Brens of Wisconsin—who notched points at a 17.8 clip last season.

Princeton's Ivy League champions, who rebounded from a poor start a year ago to stage a surprising run that qualified them for the NCAA, make their first trip to

Lexington since 1926 with one of the nation's outstanding scorers in the person of Bill Bradley. Coach Bill van Breda Koff's ace, held to less than 20 points only once in his 1963 break-in season, ranked No. 5 among the scoring leaders of the country with a 27.3 average. He contributed 40 points in Princeton's losing NCAA effort against St. John's. The Tigers are a relatively short team which stresses defensive play, works for the good shot and runs well when the occasion demands.

Wisconsin, tutored by John Erickson, lost six lettermen off its 1962-63 outfit that wound up sixth in the Big 10, but the Badgers are counting on being much tougher to cope with this season. Rebuilding plans are centered around Brens, leading scorer and rebounder for the club last season. Six other veterans return, but much of Wisconsin's hopes for appreciable improvement depend on development of a promising bevy of sophomores along the front line. Chief among these hands are 6-4 Ken Gustafson, 6-3 Kenny Barnes and 6-6 Mark Zubor. Wisconsin will be the fifth Big 10 team to appear in the UKIT.

The tournament-wise Deacons of Wake Forest, who just two seasons back were a finalist in the NCAA championship round, apparently will lack the vital experienced big man when they make their second trip in history to Lexington. However, veteran Coach Horace (Bones) McKinney has an outstanding junior in $6-5\frac{1}{2}$ Ronnie Watts to help out three returning starters and a promising rookie—6-2 guard Bob Leonard—comes up from the frosh five with 19.9 ppg credentials. The big gun again should be Christie.

Kentucky's outlook is clouded with so much uncertainty that the usually optimistic Baron Rupp—basketball's winningest mentor—is frankly fearful that he may go to the post with the poorest "on paper" chances in his 34 years at the Wildcat helm. But, if the chief problem of the absence of a big man can be minimized, chances are that UK will be tough to deal with as it defends its sixth UKIT title in the tournament's ten-year history. Back in the fold are three starters headed by two-time All-America Cotton Nash and most valuable player Ted Deeken. A fearless trio of standouts, dubbed the "Katzenjammer Kids," reports from the freshman team along with a 6-8 operative who could develop into a dependable performer by late season.



JOHN ADAMS (No. 45)

6-61/2 Junior Center Rising Sun, Ind.

Rapidly rounding into the dependable form that he displayed as a star schoolboy at Rising Sun (Ind.) High and as a standout Kentucky freshman two seasons back, Long John Adams should be a big gun in the Wildcat picture this season . . . He is a much-improved ball player over the inadequate (2.9 scoring average) performer of a year ago and set a pace in pre-season practice that has tabbed him as the man to beat out for the pivot job . . . His height (second tallest varsityman at 6-61/2) and rebounding potential is being counted on to free Cotton Nash for exclusive forward duty

and make for a more effective combination . . . Adams is aggressive and a hard man to move out under the basket . . . His best shot is an easy hook from the circle area . . . The Hoosier hot shot, who hails from a small community in Indiana 25 miles down the Ohio River from his Cincinnati birthplace, started only five games last year (first in the UKIT championship battle when he contributed six points and 15 rebounds) but logged action in a total of 16 games . . . His high point production was 8 against lowa and his top rebounding came on 15 retrieves in the lowa game . . . Adams is one of two Indiana products on the varsity—guard Ron Kennett of Lawrenceburg is the other . . . Mysteriously overlooked in All-State balloting as a schoolboy standout, John averaged 21 points and 22 rebounds a game in his senior year . . . He had a 46 point effort to set a high school record for one game . . . Also lettered baseball and track UK scouts closely followed his career for two years before signing him in a successful bid against several other schools . . . He confirmed this faith with a brilliant UK freshman performance that saw him average 16.6 in the points department and hustle to a 13.4 rebound standing.

LARRY CONLEY (No. 40)


6-31/4 Sophomore Forward Ashland, Ky.

One of a trio of unpredictable, talkative, extremely active sophomore cutups who have been dubbed the "Katzenjammer Kids" by an admiring Coach Rupp, Conley figures importantly in the Kentucky cage picture as it shapes up at the start of the 1963-64 campaign . . . Only the lack of necessary experience in the calibre of competition faced by the Wildcat varsity is holding him back and he is tabbed as a fast comer who should see considerable relief action early and put in a bid for regular duty as he develops knowhow . . . Everyone who has seen the youngster as both a

freshman star and as an improving varsityman has confidence he will help the UK

cause in time in a fashion reminiscent of ex-Wildcat All-American Frank Ramsey . . . Larry's stamina and continual hustle belies a seemingly inadequate physical makeup—he checks in a 6-3½ and only 170 pounds . . . He possesses fine speed, a quick pair of hands, good reactions and passes very well to establish himself as a valuable floor man . . . In addition, his hustle, talkative nature, cage savvy and popularity make him a leader . . . Conley, who is taking pre-dental work with the idea of eventually becoming a dentist if a coaching opportunity fails to develop, was a doeverything guy at Ashland (Ky.) High school where he played a major role in leading the Tomcats to the championship in 1961 . . . Earned schoolboy All-America honors . . . The son of George Conley, an SEC cage official and former State Senator, is a coach's dream and proved it as a Kentucky freshman last season when he posted a 16.1 scoring average and was instrumental in the Kittens' 14-3 season record . . . His high point performance as a yearling came against the Georgetown College "B" team when he hit for 32 . . . As a high schooler, he posted a career total of 1,475 points in 109 games while playing all positions.

A member of the "Lost Battalion" of sparsely used reserves on last season's Kentucky cage outfit, George Critz heads into his final campaign of collegiate basketball with hope that he can stage a comeback that will materially aid the Wildcat cause . . . The precedent is established—graduated defensive star Roy Roberts made the unheralded jump from "Lost Battalion" status to regular varsity duty—but an even more spectacular rise in fortune must occur if George is to gain starting status this season . . . He has played in just three games during his varsity career—two

as a sophomore and one a year ago—for a total action time of approximately eight and one-half minutes . . . Critz's point production amounts to one basket each year, against Baylor as a soph and in the Dartmouth contest during the past season . . . Although the road to consistent varsity duty has been a rough one, George has been a willing worker who has always tried hard to improve himself and never complains about his role . . . Kentucky coaches are hopeful that this attitude plus expected improvement and the stimulus of a final year will allow Critz to see more playing time this season . . . He is not a bad shot and an average rebounder who could please everyone by pulling himself up by the bootstraps . . . The name, incidentally, is pronuonced as if it were spelled CRITES . . . He hails from the small Ohio community of Bellbrook near Dayton and set all kinds of scoring records for the high school there as he netted over 700 points in his senior year . . . Mentioned on the All-State team in his final schoolboy year of 1959-60 when he paced the Bellbrook Eagles to a 24-3 tally.


TED DEEKEN (No. 12)

6-31/2 Senior Forward Louisville, Ky.

Nicknamed "Fireman Ted" after several sensational game-saving performances late last season, Deeken returns for a final campaign as a Wildcat with credentials as the "Most Valuable Player" of UK's 1962-63 season and offsetting status as one of the big question marks in Kentucky plans for the coming campaign . . . How well and how consistently Deeken can perform in a regular duty role only time will tell . . . His stellar clutch contributions of a year ago saw him come off the bench eight times to either lead the Wildcats to victory or narrow the margin . . . One of Ted's

brightest accomplishments of the season came against Mississippi State when he notched 25 big points while making only his second start of the season . . . In that big game, he played the full 40 minutes for one of the rare times in the campaign. . . . Deeken saw action for the complete route also against Vanderbilt in the following game and picked up 43:09 of experience earlier in an overtime encounter with Tennessee . . . Playing in 24 of the Wildcats' 25 games, Ted accumulated 235 points for a 9.8 average . . . The 25 against Mississippi State was his highest point effort of the season as he logged the third highest total playing time of any varsityman with 628:38 . . . Coach Rupp cites Deeken's improved showing as a regular but worries about his consistency . . . However, there is reason to believe Ted is ready for a great season . . . In the background is his experience as a high school star who led Louisville Flaget to the 1960 state championship and attainment of All-State honors as one of the top schoolboy prospects in the state . . . As a UK freshman, he rivaled Cotton Nash for scoring honors while operating as a starting forward, registering points at a 17.7 clip . . . During a disappointing soph year, he collected only 29 points.

RANDY EMBRY (No. 11)


5-11 Junior Guard Owensboro, Ky.

Although the smallest man on the varsity roster at 5-11 and 170 pounds, Randy Embry looms as one of the biggest men in the Kentucky picture this season . . . Unless someone suddenly develops to beat him out, he appears ready to step into the starter's job that he picked up late last season following the loss of guard Chili Ishmael on scholastic in, eligibility grounds . . . Embry appears destined to take over the vital "quarterback" role in setting up plays and generally "directing traffic" . . . He's typical of the good little men who have often been a vital cog in Kentucky machinery

that ground out some of the school's greatest basketball records—a speedy and elusive dribbler, good long-range bomber and smart floor general in the pattern of

such Wildcat greats as Bobby Watson, Ralph Beard and Adrian Smith . . . Appropriately, Embry was tutored for his role by Watson, captain of the 1952 defending national champions and now coach at Owensboro (Ky.) High school . . . Another hometown idol is ex-UK All-America Cliff Hagan . . . Embry twice was an All-State pick and mentioned on the prep All-America . . . Randy came along extremely fast last year in his development in view of the fact that he had been slowed in picking up game experience as a freshman by a broken ankle . . . He saw only limited service in relief roles until suddenly promoted to a starting assignment in the 20th game against Mississippi . . . Starting the rest of the season, Embry pushed his point production total to 95 for the campaign and logged 335:02 playing time . . . He's a good long-range shot with a two-hand set . . . High point effort as a soph came against Tennessee with 12 . . . Scored 21 in one game as yearling . . . Plays a good shortstop for the UK baseball team in the off season.


MICKEY GIBSON (No. 42)

Scoring ace of a highly-touted Kentucky freshman group last season, Gibson racked up points at a 23.1 clip until sidelined by academic troubles during the second semester and Coach Rupp has high hopes for the youngster whom he labels "a left handed Johnny Cox who is as good as anyone I've ever seen at this stage" . . . Cox, hailing from the same home town as Gibson and similar to Gibson in shooting style, attained All-America at UK in 1959 . . . Mickey's best shot is a medium range jumper and he used it extensively in netting 369 points in 16 frosh encounters . . .

Gibson, whose real first name is Lloyd, also paced the Kentucky yearlings in rebounding with 197 retrieves for a 12.7 average . . . His highs for the season were 40 points against the Bellarmine frosh, which included a new school freshman record of 19 field goals, and 18 rebounds versus the Winchester Eagles . . . Micked served notice of his potential by hitting 31 points in his first game in a Kentucky uniform . . . He was over the magic 20 mark not less than 11 times and 14 points was the lowest one-night effort he had as a freshman . . . His cage career high is a 46 he bucketed as a sophomore at Carr Creek High and as a junior at Hazard High after transferring . . . Although born in Exeter, Va., Mickey now calls Hazard, Ky., home after residing in five other cities during his youth . . . Picked up All-State cage honors two years while playing his final two schoolboy years for the Hazard Bulldogs . . . He has ambitions to play pro basketball or coach after graduation . . . Despite his terrific schoolboy and freshman showing, Gibson may find it tough to break into the starting lineup early as a forward due to inexperience but should be heard from by tournament time in late December.


SAM HARPER (No. 32)

Accorded only second team All-State honors in his final schoolboy campaign in 1961, Sam nevertheless was chosen by that astute judge of horseflesh—Adolph Rupp—for his stable of Kentucky thoroughbreds . . . Harper, who is no relation to teammate Tom Harper—also running at guard on the current UK team, confirmed Rupp's judgment with a good freshman season during which he collected points at a 14.1 rate and wound up as third leading scorer . . . But his break-

in varsity play of last year left something to be desired in the relm of consistency . . . He loomed as a prime candidate to succeed graduated Larry Pursiful at a starting guard post and got the nod to open the first two games of the season . . . He netted 12 in the opener, then fell off to seven in the second contest and during the remainder of the season notched no more than two points in any game . . . Inability to score cost him his starting job, which was taken over by Chili Ishmael . . . For the total campaign, Sam collected just 25 points while seeing 92:09 action in 10 games . . . His high was the 12 registered in the opener with Virginia Tech . . . He added 16 rebounds to the UK cause . . . With a wealth of guard material on hand this season, it's possible Sam may move to forward or at least see some action there . . . He ern Kentucky . . . He has good speed, ruggedness and is a good ball handler who fits ideally into a fast break offense . . . Posted a 20-point average in his final schoolboy year.

TOM HARPER (No. 31) 6-2 Senior Guard


Winchester, Ky.

One of the most outstanding floor shots ever produced in Kentucky schoolboy basketball, Tommy Harper knows where the bucket is and looks good in practice rounds as he fires his favorite shot—a left handed push . . . The trouble stems from inability to connect in similar fashion under game conditions and he has learned a sad lesson, too, that the game consists of more than just heading the ball toward the basket . . . To his and his coaches dismay, Tommy has had particular troubles defensively—letting his man score as much or more than he does himself . . . Harper has seen

very little action in his previous two varsity campaigns, compiling about eight and one-half minutes of game duty as a sophomore two years back and seeing just 2:36 of action last season (Dartmouth game) while relegated to the "Lost Battalion"—a group

of a half dozen sparsely used reserves . . . Coach Rupp is hopeful that Harper will find himself this year with the impetus of a final year and knowledge that "Lost Battalion" men before him have made significant jumps in status . . . The former Clark County High All-State star has the potential to provide considerable help as he has demonstrated improvement in some phases of his game . . . 
CHARLES (CHILI) ISHMAEL (No. 22)

Such a circumstance would provide the Wildcats with highly-desirable height and dependable outside shooting . . . Ish's chief competition looms as Terry Mobley . . . Both drive for the basket recklessly and hit well from medium range . . . The hustling Ishmael, who came to UK on a football scholarship but gave up the sport after playing a freshman season at end in 1960, was an all-around athlete at Mt. Sterling High—earning second team All-State selection in both basketball and football as well as MVP designations in each sport . . . He gave every indication of being a terrific cage prospect by his play as a Kitten in 1960-61, posting a 12.9 scoring average and recovering 74 rebounds in 11 games . . . A disappointing soph year saw him limited to a mere 2.0 average but he saw action in only eight games . . . Last season, he started 17 of 19 games and finished right behind Cotton Nash in scoring with 212 points and an 11.1 average.


RON KENNETT (No. 50)

Another of the Kentucky cage squad's little men, Kennett stands just six-foot and checks in at 172 pounds but makes up for what he lacks in size with tremendous hustle on the basketball court . . . Ron is blessed with good speed and footwork that lets him move as well as any of the Wildcats . . . Like teammate Randy Embry, he is the "Little Man" type on whom Coach Rupp has relied for much quarterbacking help during many of UK's finest seasons . . . The little guy who can scoot, bring the ball down court and hit from outside has often been the vital ingredient . . .

Kennett fills this bill to a degree but has yet to prove himself a consistently heavy scorer capable of winning a regular duty spot in the lineup . . . His exceptional ability as a feeder and ball handler should stand him in good stead for more extensive duty if he can pick up in scoring this season . . . The Hoosier hot shot joins with center John Adams of Rising Sun to provide the varsity with an Indiana flavor . . . During his initial season as a collegian two years back, Kennett stood fifth in freshman scoring with an 8.6 average on 155 points collected in 18 Kitten games . . . Although he started only seven contests, Ron saw a lot of action and posted a single game high of 25 in mid-season . . . His break-in year as a varsityman resulted in a drop off to just two points that he picked up in the first UKIT game against lowa . . . All told, he saw a total of 10 minutes and 48 seconds of action in four games . . . While still a schoolboy at Lawrenceburg, he was classed as one of the outstanding playmakers in Indiana and gained All-Conference selection after producing 400 points in his final season . . . He's a baseball standout in the off-season.

TOMMY KRON (No. 30)


6-53/4 Sophomore Guard Owensboro, Ky.

There is more to attract attention to Tommy Kron than just his unusual 6-5% height as a guard . . . Although he ranks as the tallest man ever to perform at this position for the Wildcats and likely one of the biggest back court men in the nation, Kron commands respect for his ability as a complete and outstanding basketball player . . . He is a guy who does everything well and, once he picks up experience in the calibre of ball played by Kentucky's foes, is expected to rank as a strong All-America contender . . . Much of this confidence in Kron's future chances at stardom stems

from his great showing as a Kentucky yearling in 1962-63 when he posted a creditable 16.6 scoring average that was second only to Mickey Gibson and ranked second

in rebounding with 140 in 17 games from his guard position . . . Tommy started every game played by the freshmen, including the finale against the Tennessee frosh in Knoxville . . . In that game, he put on a one-man show out of necessity as the leader of a five-man total Kitten squad (ineligibility had sidelined three other scholarship men who had been starters) . . . When teammate Larry Lentz fouled out with nearly three minutes to go, Kron had to hold the fort with three "students" . . . He personally controlled the ball during much of the game and wound up with high point honors of 18 . . . Tommy, who is highly respected by teammates, has natural leadership qualities that are expected to enhance his play as a varsity performer and in possible future pro work . . . He took all 12 years of his schooling at Tell City, Ind., but now calls Owensboro home . . . Wrote Coach Rupp about his intentions to attend UK while an eighth grader . . . Picked up All-State first team honors in basketball and was a second team choice at quarterback in football.


LARRY LENTZ (No. 54)

One of four promising sophomores up after good showings as yearling performers, Larry Lentz is distinguished both by the fact that he is the team's tallest man at 6-8 and by the impression that he was one of the fastest improving players on the Kitten squad at season end . . . The young giant from the Buckeye State, who is joined in representing Ohio by George Critz of Bellbrook, displayed continual progress in development of his potential ability and cage savvy in the later stages of his freshman year and is counted on for important relief action this season . . . His height will be a

particular blessing to a squad which is handicapped by the lack of a really big man in the starting lineup . . . Looks a lot like Bill Spivey at this stage in his career but more rugged with 220 pounds spread over a sturdy frame . . . Regrettably, Lentz has never quite attained the form that Coach Rupp hoped for when he signed him as something of a "darkhorse" . . . Larry operated as an outstanding pivotman for Indian Lake High School in nearby Lewistown, Ohio, and averaged 22 points a game plus posting a 14-per-game rebound rate . . . But he never gained recognition above honorable mention on the All-State selections although he led his club into tournament play . . . Larry is blessed with a fine touch for a big man and is highly accurate on his shooting—averaging 61 percent from the field in high school and tied for the team lead as a freshman shooter at 47.7 percent . . . His freshman season netted him 111 points and a 6.5 average that was fifth best on the team . . . High game was 16 against the Tennessee frosh . . . Also collected total of 124 rebounds to rank third . . . Started 13 games.

Tutored by a former Kentucky All-America cager in his schoolboy days and now an experienced operative after two seasons in a UK uniform, Terry Mobley is a man to watch in the Wildcat basketball picture this season . . . The Harrodsburg ace is tabbed in pre-season thinking as a possible guard starter—taking up a role that he had on three occasions last season . . . Mobley saw the major portion of his varsity action in 1962-63 as a top guard reserve but got a starting job after teammate Chili Ishmael was lost due to academic difficulties for the second semester . . . All told,

"Mob" got into 18 games as a sophomore and saw a total of 255:59 action time . . . For the campaign, he contributed 87 points and 33 rebounds . . . His high point effort came with 13 against Dartmouth . . . The 4.8 scoring average Mobley posted as a sophomore failed to measure up to the 11.8 mean that went into the record book after a flashy freshman campaign in 1961-62 when he started 10 of the 13 Kitten encounters . . . Further, the off-pace scoring mark did not completely reflect the generally fine play turned in by Mobley last season and accounts for the fact that he is very much in the race for one of the starting assignments in back court along with Chili Ishmael and Randy Embry . . . Terry particularly impresses with his poise under pressure, his drive toward the basket and ability to get open to hit underneath . . . He's quick, alert and an accurate shot from in close or out on the court at medium range . . . Connected at a 46.5 percent clip from the field last winter and was 80.8 percent accurate at the charity line . . . Coached by Forest (Aggie) Sale in high school where he scored at a 23-point clip in his final year and twice was accorded All-State honor.

6-5 Senior Forward Leominster, Mass.

Back for a final collegiate fling with the impressive credentials of two-time All-America selection by the nation's basketball writers, Cotton Nash is the man to watch in this season's edition of Wildcats . . . Coach Rupp declares his super star, who had trouble to some degree last season living up to his truly sensational sophomore achievements, is looking like the Nash of old and seems to have an attitude that should spell much trouble for foes . . . If Nash regains his soph form or improves to any extent on his 20.6 performance of 1962-63, he might succeed to national "Player

of the Year" recognition and become the top all-time career scorer in Kentucky's illustrious cage history . . . He achieved the distinction last year of reaching the

coveted 1,000-point club earlier than any previous Wildcat as he moved past the magic number in the 19th game of his junior year . . . Nash now shows a career mark of 1,122 points after netting 608 as a soph and adding 514 last season . . . One of the nation's most widely sought prepsters when he graduated from Lake Charles (La.) High, Cotton was influenced to attend UK by ex-Fabulous Five Wildcat Cliff Barker—who coached him his first two years at Jeffersonville, Ind. . . . Following a true-to-form freshman campaign, Nash began an assault on school and conference marks with such reckless abandon that he became the first soph in 10 years to cop the league scoring crown, won unanimous All-SEC honors, was accorded SEC "Player of the Year" selection, became only the sixth soph in history to be chosen on USBWA first string All-America and was described by his proud coach as the nation's second best cager—second only to Jerry Lucas . . . The nation's writers, among others, again honored Cotton as an All-American last season . . . His nickname is a long-standing tag stemming from the fact his blonde hair once was almost white.

SCHOLARSHIP FRESHMEN

BRAD BOUNDS (No. 40)—6-5½ Center—Bluffton, Ind.—One of the most highly-sought prep stars in Indiana last season, Bounds joins Southport's Louie Dampier and Brookville's Gene Stewart on the Kentucky roster and gives Coach Rupp the top Hoosier point producers of 1963 . . . Bounds, classed as a tremendous out-shooter, led all Indiana prep scorers in point average with a prolific 28.4 . . . Dampier copped honors of another fashion, leading in total points with *93 and topping Bounds by just 11 . . . Stewart had over 1,000 points in his career . . . Bounds was signed as a forward prospect, but probably will go to the pivot in the absence of a big man . . . Although born in Detroit, Mich., Brad took all his schooling at Bluffton—a small community near Ft. Wayne . . . Gained All-State selection and was All-Conference three straight seasons while netting 1,666 points in 73 games for career average of 23.8 . . . High night was 43 against Angola High . . . An accurate shot, he hit at 47 percent from the field and 88 percent on free throws.

WAYNE CHAPMAN (No. 12)—6-5 Guard-Forward—Owensboro, Ky.—Paid a unique honor by becoming the first prospect for the 1963-64 Kitten cage aggregation to be signed, Chapman also is the lone Kentuckian among the five outstanding schoolboys awarded cage scholarships this season . . . He hails from the same western Kentucky city—Owensboro—that produced All-America center Cliff Hagan and two-time All-Southeastern guard Bobby Watson . . . At a solid 6-5 and 180 pounds, Chapman is bigger than either of his home town predecessors and represents a new trend toward the big- pro-type guard who can handle defensively a big man on the opponent side . . . Wayne played his high school ball at Daviess County High and paced the Panthers to a 25-4 record in his senior year . . . Accorded first team All-State honors after netting a total of 502 points last season . . . Also starred in baseball and track . . . May also see duty at forward at UK as he did in high school.


LOUIE DAMPIER (No. 10)—6-0 Guard—Southport, Ind.—Top rated as everybody's All-State during a sensational career at Southport (Ind.) High, Dampier is considered one of the outstanding schoolboy cage aces in the country . . . He joins fellow Hoosiers Brad Bounds and Gene Stewart to give the Kittens and future Wildcat aggre-

gations the top scoring punch of Indiana basketball last season . . . Dampier led the state in total points scored with 693 while Bounds, just 11 behind in points, captured honors in scoring average with a 28.4, and Stewart netted over 1,000 points during his career . . . Louie, a slender and agile six footer, had a career total of 1,011 points to establish a new record at Southport High in the suburbs of Indianapolis . . . He also led his team in rebounding and paced his conference in assists . . . In leading his team almost single-handedly to a sectional tournament title, Dampier collected 114 points in four games to better a record set by Oscar Robertson as an Indianapolis Attucks' star . . . He was president of his senior class and is a good student.

PAT RILEY (No. 54)—6-31/2 Guard-Forward—Schenectady, N. Y.—A top-drawer schoolboy All-America standout that was high on the wanted list of just about every major school in the country, Riley chose Kentucky because "I always wanted to come to this school since I was a young kid" . . . He remembered seeing and hearing about the great Kentucky teams that played in New York in the early fifties, Riley confided to Coach Rupp who personally signed the star to settle a scramble for his services by about 85 schools . . . During an outstanding, three- year career at Schenectady's Linton High, the sturdily-built Riley alternated between guard, center and forward and scored an even 1,000 points . . . In his final schoolboy season last winter, he connected at a terrific, 29.5 clip and went over 40 in each of the final four games . . . Riley's coveted 1,000-point total was four shy of the record set at the same school by Barry Kramer, NYU All-American who was the nation's No. 2 point producer last season . . . But Riley achieved his mark in 10 less games than it took Kramer to amass 1,004 . . . An all-around sports star, Riley also attained All-America recognition as a football quarterback (he passed up numerous grid offers) and played baseball and track . . . He is the son of former minor league baseball manager Lee Riley, Sr., and a brother of New York Titans' defensive halfback Lee, Jr.

GENE STEWART (No. 30)—6-2 Forward—Brookville, Ind.—One of three Hoosier cage hot shots to cast their lots with University of Kentucky for 1963-64 and future aggregations, Stewart is considered a promising collegiate prospect . . . He joins All-Indiana products Louie Dampier of Southport and Brad Bounds of Bluffton in representing Hoosier-land in the Blue Grass . . . Playing four seasons of basketball at Brookville, Stewart became a regular on his team as a sophomore and was a leading scorer the last three seasons as he produced over 1,000 points against tough competition . . . He averaged over 20 points a game and paced the club in rebounding and assists during the '63 season . . . Stewart also was credited by his coach for overcoming double and triple teaming defensive efforts of opponents and cited for excellent leadership in bringing inexperienced teammates along . . . The Brookville youth was one of only three small town players to gain mention on the All-Indiana selections . . . He had the unusual distinction of serving as team captain in four sports during his senior year.



SUCCESSOR TO A 'WHITE ELEPHANT'

Only a little more than a quarter century ago, the University of Kentucky provided its basketball team with its second home—a magnificent new Alumni Gymnasium seating 2,800 spectators.

A great many persons freely suggested that the arena would prove to be a "white elephant" which would never be crowded to anywhere near capacity by the sport that then was considered little more than innocuous winter-months' pastime.

But the hardwood game blitzed the nation and Kentucky's teams forged to the national forefront in such a crowd-pleasing manner that the "huge" hall soon could not begin to accommodate the large number of fans seeking to whet their new-found interest. In fact, the situation soon developed to the point where only the student body and faculty were admitted and for several years about all that Kentuckians at large knew of their state university's famed cage teams consisted of information gleaned from the radio and newspapers.

In 1941, when Dr. H. L. Donovan became president of the University, one of his first recommendations was for a building "that will properly take care of our athletics, our health service, physical education, and recreation." From this beginning came the plan that culminated in the construction of 11,500-seat Memorial Coliseum, an unparalleled edifice costing \$3,925,000 by the time it was completed in 1950.

The huge building, which serves as a memorial to the nearly 10,000 Kentucky heroes who lost their lives in World War II and the Korean conflict, covers an entire city block and contains as much space as a seven-story office building. Situated along Avenue of Champions, the Coliseum is used primarily for basketball games but also serves as the site of a sellout community concert and lecture series as well as numerous physical education classes and conventions.

In sharp contrast to the early days in Alumni Gym, the present hall plays host to more than 150,000 Kentuckians annually for appearances of the famous Wildcat cage teams alone and interest is increasing with such strides that even this splendid arena may someday be outgrown.

T-VIEWING THE WILDCATS

Kentucky's Wildcats have winning ways that make them particularly tough when in focus of the television cameras. In seven appearances during the past dozen years before the national television audience, Coach Adolph Rupp's crew has come out victorious each time. Their first experience on television is believed to have been in th NCCA eastern finals at Madison Square Garden in 1951 when games with St. John's and Illinois were televised nationally. Portions of a game with Loyola in Chicago Stadium Feb. 15, 1957, were aired as part of a salute to Coach Rupp on the old "Tonight" show. NBC-TV's "Game of the Week" series in 1958-59 featured three UK wins at the expense of St. Louis, LSU and Tennessee and a similar series in 1960-61 carried by ABC-TV saw the Wildcats measure Georgia Tech in a Memorial Coliseum game. Several other Kentucky road games have been televised locally or regionally in recent years and this season Kentucky is scheduled to appear before the TV cameras three times on a Southeastern Conference "Game of the Week" series. The Wildcats are dated with Georgia Tech, Auburn and Tennessee.

RUPP AND UK WINNINGEST IN 20 YEARS

Kentucky and Coach Adolph Rupp are collegiate basketball's most unbeatable combination any way you look at it.

This long-claimed fact has been verified by an authoritative survey completed by the National Collegiate Athletic Bureau on the top team and coaching records of the last decade and also of the past 20 years ending in 1961.

The NCAA Service Bureau's figures show Kentucky's Wildcats, who have been under the tutelage of Baron Rupp exclusively since 1930, head the major colleges in winning percentage at both the 10-year and 20-year levels by outstanding margins.

Coach Rupp's personal record far exceeds those posted by his nearest rivals to firmly establish his right to the rank of college basketball's winningest tutor.

WILDCATS ARE POPULAR

At home or on the road, Baron Adolph Rupp and his colorful Kentucky Wildcats are one of college basketball's biggest drawing cards. The largest crowd ever to see the Kentuckians in action turned out on March 17, 1961, for the opening night of the NCAA Mideast Regional at Freedom Hall in Louisville. A tournament-record crowd of 18,833 witnessed Kentucky whip Morehead and Ohio State top Louisville. Another banner crowd of 17,494 the following night broke all existing NCAA records for two-night play. Other top crowds to see the Wildcats were 18,493 in Madison Square Garden for a St. John's game Dec. 21, 1946; 18,803 who witnessed the Kentucky-Seattle national championship match at Louisville March 22, 1958; and 18,274 attending a regular season clash between Kentucky and Illinois at Freedom Hall in Louisville Dec. 30, 1958. At their own Memorial Coliseum in Lexington, the Ruppmen play to virtual capacity crowds every time out. The record one-night crowd was the 12,375 who saw the Wildcats drop their season opener last year for the first time since 1926. The spectators watching this loss to underdog Virgina Tech surpassed a previous high of 12,268 set as UK was nosed out by Mississippi State on Feb. 12, 1962. For the home season, the high total is 165,495 in 16 games of the 1961-62 campaign. Testifying to the popularity of the cage sport in Lexington is the unsurpassed Coliseum record of 12,734 fans who squeezed in for a high school doubleheader on Jan. 8, 1952.

WILDCAT MASCOTS HAD COLORFUL NAMES

Over the years, Kentucky athletic teams have been spurred on in efforts toward victory by numerous colorfully-named wildcat mascots. Records indicate the first animal was given to the University in 1921. Named "Tom," this live Kentucky wildcat died quickly from being in captivity and was replaced with "TNT." Other live mascots followed—including "Whiskers," "Hot Tamale," and "Colonel"—only to pass from the scene due to death or being turned loose in the mountains after they did not thrive out of their native habitat. The current mascot, displayed at the football and basketball games by SUKY (student pep organization) is a stuffed Kentucky wildcat obtained in 1948 from a Brooklyn taxidermist.

'BANNER' AND NO. 6

According to tradition, Kentucky's basketballing Wildcats have a pet pattern that they execute the first time hey get the ball in a game. The nationally-famous saying attributed to UK Coach Adolph Rupp is "Star Spangled Banner and then No. 6." This stems from Rupp's strategy of running the strategic guard-around play of Kentucky's repertoire and the reason, Rupp explains, is simple: "It tells us immediately if the opposing team is playing a zone defense against us." The basic-guard-around pattern has been employed by Kentucky as it raced to four national champion-ships and has produced eight All-America guards during the Rupp Era.

KENTUCKY'S COLORS

The blue and white of the University of Kentucky are known to sports fans everywhere. Officially the colors are Yale blue and white, but in the beginning, when the Lexington institution was still known as the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Kentucky, the colors were "Stoll blue" and white. One day back in the 1890's a group of Kentucky football stalwarts met to choose their school colors. Someone suggested blue and white—"blue like Dick Stoll's necktie"—and those colors were immediately adopted. "Dick" Stoll was to become Judge Richard C. Stoll, distinguished public servant and, for more than fifty years before his death, a member of the U.K. board of trustees.
