Coming Out In the Beginning, There Was a March

On Oct. 11, 1987, half a million people participated in the March on Washington for Lesbian and Gay Rights. It was the second such demonstration in our nation's capital and resulted in the founding of a number of LGBT organizations, including the National Latino/a Gay & Lesbian Organization (LLEGO) and AT&T's LGBT employee group, LEAGUE. The momentum continued four months after this extraordinary march as more than 100 lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender activists from around the country gathered in Manassas, Va., about 25 miles outside Washington, D.C. Recognizing that the LGBT community often reacted defensively to anti-gay actions, they came up with the idea of a national day to celebrate coming out and chose the anniversary of that second march on Washington to mark it. The originators of the idea were Rob Eichberg, a founder of the personal growth workshop, The Experience, and Jean O'Leary, then head of National Gay Rights Advocates. From this idea the National Coming Out Day was born.

To this day National Coming Out Day continues to promote a safe world for LGBT individuals to live truthfully and openly.

The success of NCOD, which from inception quickly expanded to include participation from all 50 states and foreign countries, is because of the hard work of celebrities, volunteers and activists.

•Candace Gingrich, half-sister of then-House Speaker Newt Gingrich, became a National Coming Out Project spokesperson and fulltime activist in 1995

 Dan Butler, who played the character Bulldog on NBC-TV's Frasier, was NCOD spokeperson in 1995

•Rock musician Melissa Etheridge did a radio public service announcement, reminding people that "Labels belong on records, not on people."

•Del. Eleanor Holmes Norton, D-D.C., spoke at the "Come Out Voting" rally in Washington, D.C., Oct. 11, 1996.

•Fashion photographer Don Flood in 1996 shot past spokespeople Bearse, Butler and Gingrich, along with Olympic diver Greg Louganis, actor Mitchell Anderson, newly minted gay activist Chastity Bono and Sean Sasser, who had appeared in MTV's The Real World.
•In 1996, actress Judith Light,

•In 1996, actress Judith Light, pro golfer Muffin Spencer-Devlin and, in her first appearance at a gay rights event, Cher spoke at a Come Out Voting rally in Washington, DC

•In September 1997 the project brought in its first straight spokesperson, Betty DeGeneres, mother of actress/comedian Ellen DeGeneres.

Health Department Features Free Flu Friday

An annual event will help the Lexington-Fayette County Health Department test its emergency preparedness while providing hundreds of free flu shots to the community.

The health department will host Free Flu Friday, a special one-day clinic designed to give up to 2,000 shots to Lexington residents who want to fight the flu this fall and winter. The event will be held 9 a.m.-5 p.m. Friday, Oct. 12, at Imani Family Life Center, 1555 Georgetown Road.

"A seasonal flu shot is the best way to fight the flu each fall and winter, so this is a great way for people to protect themselves and their family," said Kevin Hall, LFCHD spokesman. "Free Flu Friday is a cornerstone of what public health is all about. It covers three key components of what we do for the community: communicable disease control, preparedness and education."

The seasonal flu shot, which also provides protection against H1N1, is recommended to all people ages 6 months and older. Last year, Lexington had 143 confirmed cases of the flu. The health department provided more than 5,000 flu vaccinations throughout the season.

Last year, the health department provided almost 1,700 free shots at Free Flu Friday.

Those who are unable to attend Free Flu Friday can still get a flu shot 3-5 p.m. Tuesdays at the Public Health Clinic at 805A Newtown Circle. No appointment is necessary, and the cost for a flu shot is \$25. Medicaid/Medicare, cash, checks, credit cards and some insurances are accepted.



October Important Month for Bullying Prevenetion and Support

Bullying continues to be a tragic problem across the country. In Kentucky alone, over the past year there have been numerous reports of bullying and suicides as a potential result of bullying. Luckily, there are many who are devoted to reduce and prevent bullying in middle and high schools. Lexington Fairness has committed its funding and programming to Project Speak Out, a bullying prevention program.

As part of this program, in August, nearly 30 community volunteers were certified by the Gay, Lesbian, and Straight Education Network (GLSEN) to provide training to middle and high school staff regarding bullying prevention. In addition, Project Speak Out will be providing free GLSEN Safe Space Kits to schools in Central Kentucky, as well as working on the goal of making sure every middle and high school in Kentucky has a kit.

The month of October is important in the battle to prevent bullying among our youth. National Stop Bullying Week is October 7– 13, and National Bullying Bystanders Unite Week is October 14 – 20. Specifically, on Wednesday, October 10, wear orange to show your support of PACER's Unity Day. The organization runs the National Bullying Prevention Center, working to end bullying

in schools.

On Thursday, October 11, you can join Lexington Fairness at Soundbar for a fundraiser for Project Speak Out. Twenty-five percent of the proceeds from the night will be donated to the organization's bullying prevention program. It is also National Coming Out Day, so the fundraiser at Soundbar is bound to be a fun-filled night!

It is past time for all of us to make the change to help prevent bullying. If there truly is something we want to see happen, we must first act ourselves. Now is the time to step up, support our children, and help them feel safe in school, while providing LGBT students with a safe and supportive community where they feel comfortable living.

In celebration of the Lexington LGBTQ community, and as a way of saying thanks, independent counter/queer culture bookstore sQecial Media will sponsor four films to be shown throughout the month of October, three of which will comprise the first official GLSO Queer Film Series.

First, as the final installment in this year's Rosa Goddard International Film Festival, sQecial will feature Weekend (2011), a British art house release from director Andrew Haigh. This boymeets-boy indie ode to new love will be shown at the Kentucky Theater on Wednesday, October 3rd at 7:15pm. Tickets will cost \$5.

Only a few days later, the GLSO Queer Film Series will begin! In partnership with the GLSO, sQecial will present three films to be shown at the downtown branch of the Lexington Public Library in the Farish Theater on Sundays at 2pm. Free admission.

October 7th – North Sea, Texas (2011)

After nearly two decades of making acclaimed gay-themed short films, Belgian director Bavo Defurne adapts André Sollie's novel Nooit gaat dit over for his beautiful and highly stylised first feature length film, 2011's Noordzee, Texas.

It is the story of young dreamer Pim, a Walter Mitty of sorts, who grows up and falls for Gino, the somewhat older and über-cool boy next door with attitude and a motorcycle to boot. In writing about the film, Defurne says, "It explores many of the same themes as my short films – like the discovery that you are different. But my short films didn't explore what happened after that discovery. This film is about what's next, and I wanted that to be something happy."

October 21st – Pariah (2011)
Coming out is generally a well
trodden path in the land of
queer cinema; luckily Dee Rees'
brilliantly engaging Pariah gives
us new eyes with which to see
this often awkward and difficult
ritual.

Brimming with tenacity, optimism, and verve, Alike is a 17-year-old African-American woman navigating the complexities of family life and community while trying to figure out just where she fits in. Rees' ability to show the humanity of all the film's major players, and the overall sidestepping of one-note characterisations make Pariah a genre-defying tour de force.

October 28th – Heartbeats (2010)

Xavier Dolan's amorous and candy-coloured Heartbeats is a glossy and darkly comic look at the lengths gay man Francis and his gal pal Marie go to in the battle for the heart of the same fellow, the strikingly beautiful, albeit sexually ambiguous Nicolas.

This acerbically astute Cannes Film Festival award-winning feature plums the depths of friendship, love, obsession, and the fragile yet resilient intricacies of the human heart.


