The Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky met in President McVey's office at the University, Thursday, April 28, at 10:30 a.m. The members of the Committee present were Judge R. C. Stoll, James Park and H. S. Cleveland. Mr. Cleveland accepted by letter appointment as a member of the Executive Committee made at the April 1938 meeting of the Board of Trustees. He met with the Executive Committee for the first time at this meeting.

#### 1. Approval of Minutes.

The minutes of the meeting of the Executive Committee of March 22, 1938, were adopted and approved at the meeting of the Board of Trustees April 5, 1938, and made a part of the minutes of that meeting.

#### 3. Requisition Committee Report.

The Requisition Committee filed written report of its action each week from March 24, 1938, to April 20, 1938. The report was examined, and on motion and second the orders named therein were ratified and approved and payments on said orders were authorized and approved.

The following additional budget appropriation noted on the report was approved and allowed: tree fertilization, \$150.00.

#### 4. Allotments for Fourth Quarter.

The Business Agent stated that he had received from the State Department of Finance, Budget Division, advice of allotments of appropriations for the fourth quarter of the year 1937-1938.

#### 5. Accounting Machines.

President McVey made a statement concerning the proposed purchase or rental of accounting machines. This statement showed favorable attitude to installation of International Business Machine of heads of departments of the University in which the machines may be used to advantage. The Business Agent reported as follows:

#### ACCOUNTING MACHINES

Mr. McCain and I have made a study of accounting machines for use in the Business Office to the best of our ability. It now appears that the International Business machines may be used to the best advantage so far as accounting is concerned. The expense of rental of these machines and operation is not taken into consideration.

We have also considered the National Cash Register and Burroughs machines. Each of these will be satisfactory for the work in the Business Office that is desired to be done by machine accounting. The cost of either of these will be approximately \$1600. These machines are supposed to last for a period of ten or more years.

In event the IBM machines are put in, it will be necessary to have someone to superintend the operation of the machines. It is now my opinion that Coleman Smith may be able to do this in addition to his duties as Secretary of Organizations Fund. The attention to these two things will probably take up his entire time so that he will not have time for any other work in the Business Office. It is probable also that his salary will have to be adjusted so far as amount is concerned.

A room for the machine will have to be provided. It is now my opinion that the room occupied by Mr. Wachs is the most suitable for that purpose. The Business Office is now very crowded and it is necessary to have additional room. It is my opinion that the room now occupied by Mr. Salyers should be turned over to the Business Office. In event these changes are made and in order to make the use of these rooms most convenient, it will be necessary to have either a stairway from the Business Office to the basement rooms or at least a mail chute. I think also that if the IBM machines are put in the room occupied by Mr. Wachs it will be necessary to have a door cut between the two basement rooms referred to above.

I can not now see that there can be any change made in the expense of the Business Office on account of accounting machines. The accounting machines will aid very much, however, in securing quicker reports and more statistical data and in the long run it is probable that expense in addition to what we now have may be avoided.

The matter was continued, the Committee asking for more complete report.

### 6. State Warrants Called.

The Business Agent reported:

The State Treasurer called for payment on April 15 certain State Warrants. Among the warrants called was the one to the Student Loan Fund for \$4600.00. This has been collected and the amount should probably be put on interest account in the bank.

I am informed that another call has been or will be made for May 15. Mr. McFarland thinks it probable that that call will include the warrants in which the Peabody Fund is invested.

Question of reinvestment of the funds thus released from investment was raised, but no action was taken thereon.

#### 7. Renewal of Note on Gymnasium.

The Business Agent reported: that at a meeting of the Alumni Association April 11, the Treasurer of the Association was authorized to sign the renewal of the Alumni note for funds formerly borrowed for payment on construction of Gymnasium due the First National Bank and Trust Company. Note was properly renewed after that date in the same form and with same endorsements as heretofore made, in the sum of \$7, 925.00. The interest due thereon was paid from funds set aside to Athletics from student fees.

### 8. <u>Insurance on Men's Dormitories</u>.

The question of the request for cancellation of policies written by Klair and Scott Agency, Lexington, Ky., on Kinkead and Breck-inridge Halls, Men's Dormitories, held by the Security Trust Company, and the rewriting of these policies by other agencies, that has been pending since the September 1937 meeting of the Executive Committee, was brought before the Committee by the following communications from Governor Chandler to President McVey:

Dear Governor:

I am enclosing herewith a bill and letter from Dawson & Kirkpatrick, insurance agents. The bill is for the premium on insurance policy in the sum of \$142,000.00 on Kinkead Hall and contents, at the University of Kentucky. The policy was written in the Hartford Insurance Company, being No. 60058. It is my understanding that at the time this policy was written by the insurance agency there was a certain contract with the Security Trust Company of Lexington in regard to the insurance on this property and perhaps the Board of Regents had no right or authority to insure the property. Nevertheless, this insurance agency issued their policy and paid the premium to the company, amounting to \$117.48. After this policy was issued, it was found that the Security Trust Company had procured a policy covering the same property in another company and, of course, under the contract with the Security Trust Company, the latter had the right to procure the insurance on the property. Therefore, it will be necessary to cancel the policy issued to the University by the Dawson & Kirkpatrick Agency and under the short rate cancellation provision

there will be due them \$90.46. Since this policy was issued by this agency upon the request of State officials, it seems to me that the agency should be reimbursed the amount of the earned premium on the policy, and that amount being \$90.46 they should be paid that sum and the policy cancelled.

Hoping that you can arrange to have the Board of Regents allow this agency the sum of \$90.46 short rate cancellation and that the policy will be cancelled. I am

The Business Agent reported that Judge Robert G. Gordon had called him by telephone, stating that he regretted his inability to attend this meeting of the Executive Committee. Judge Gordon made inquiry as to the progress of the question of insurance on the Men's Dormitories, and the Business Agent informed him of the communications sent to President McVey by Governor Chandler. Judge Gordon then said that he recommended following the advice of the Attorney General in settlement of the claim for premium on insurance policy written by Dawson and Kirkpatrick, New Haven, Ky., and as well a similar settlement with Coleman's Insurance Agency, Mount Sterling, Ky. He asked the Business Agent to report this recommendation to the Executive Committee at the meeting of this date.

Thereupon, upon motion duly carried, it was ordered that the Business Agent request the State Director of Insurance to have

cancelled at short rate as of April 1, 1938, Hartford Combined Policy #60058 covering \$142,500 on Kinkead Hall and contents, written by Dawson and Kirkpatrick Agency, New Haven, Ky. The Business Agent was further directed to submit to the Department of Finance a copy of this resolution, and a copy of the original bill covering the premium on this policy, and ask that payment be made to Dawson and Kirkpatrick Agency, New Haven, Ky., in the sum of \$90.46.

It was further ordered on motion, duly carried, that the Business Agent reduest the Commissioner of Insurance to have cancelled at short rate as of April 1, 1938, Fidelity-Phoenix Fire Insurance Company policy No. S947 for \$45,350.00 and to have cancelled at short rate as of April 1, 1938, Fireman's Fund Insurance Company policy No. WFW 238877 for \$45,350.00 written on Breckinridge Hall and contents by Coleman's Insurance Agency, Mt. Sterling, Ky.

The Business Agent was further directed to submit the bills for the premiums on these two policies to the State Commissioner of Insurance and ask him to have the bills corrected so that they will be rendered on co-insurance basis. When such bills are received the Business Agent shall submit them in the usual course to the State Department of Finance and ask that payment be made to Coleman's Insurance Agency, Mt. Sterling, Ky.

The Business Agent was further directed to have the State Commissioner of Insurance have fire insurance placed on the contents of Kinkead Hall in the sum of \$5000.00 and on the contents of Breckinridge Hall in the sum of \$5000.00.

The Business Agent is directed to send a copy of this resolution to Governor Chandler and a copy to the State Commissioner of Finance.

# 9. Carnegie Grant for Community Music Study.

President McVey presented the following communication:

I am glad to be able to tell you that, at a meeting of the Executive Committee of the Corporation held April 18, the following resolution was adopted:

RESOLVED, That, from the balance available for appropriation, the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) be, and it hereby is, appropriated to the UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY, toward support of the community music study, previously aided under Resolution X 1637.

Our Treasurer is being authorized to make pagement of this amount on or about July 15, 1938.

On motion duly carried, the appropriation was accepted. The President was asked to notify the Carnegie Corporation of acceptance by the Executive Committee and to express appreciation for the appropriation.

#### 10. Proposed Bond Issue.

Attention was called to the proposed bond issue for new construction and for refunding debt on Men's Dormitories by presentation of statement previously mailed to each member of the Board of Trustees by President McVey.

Consideration of the question was postponed, awaiting further information on the proposal.

#### 11. Constitution for Student Union.

The President presented copy of constitution for Student Union proposed by the Student Union Building Committee. After suggestions of changes were made by members of the Executive Committee, it was stated that on the whole the proposed constitution seemed to meet requirements. However, it was deemed advisable that further study be made by members of the Board of Trustees and the President was asked to have copy of the proposed constitution sent to each member of the Board.

# 12. Inspection of Gas Lines.

Explosion of gas in one of the manholes back of Student Union Building that occurred April 27, 1938, was reported. It appears that accumulation of gas from leak in gas line was ignited by a spark from motor. Two men, employed by contractors, were seriously injured. On suggestion of Judge Stoll, inspection for leaks in gas lines on the campus was ordered.

### 13. Annual June Commencement.

The annual June Commencement was announced by President McVey for June 3, 1938. It is proposed to be held at the Stadium at 7:00 o'clock p.m., under arrangements being made by the Commencement Committee. He said that the change of time is desired in order to avoid the unpleasantness of midday heat. The regular June meeting of the Board of Trustees was announced for 10:00 a.m., Commencement day, June 3, 1938.

# 14. List of Employees Prepared.

The President stated that at the request of the State Division of Personnel the Business Agent had caused to be made an alphabetical list of regular employees of the University of Kentucky. The list shows the name, residence, original residence and the amount of monthly or weekly salary, according as paid. Part time employees and county agents are not listed. Transmission of a copy of the list as prepared to the State Division of Personnel was approved.

### 15. Petition of Students.

During the meeting there was presented to the President which he, in turn, referred to the Executive Committee, a petition signed by students of the Engineering College asking for changes in the organization of the College. The petition was ordered filed.

#### 16. The Matter of Audit.

The President presented copy of letter written by him to the accounting firm of Peat, Marwick, Mitchell and Company, Chicago, Illinois, in answer to inquiry from that firm, as to action on bids previously made for making audit of accounts of year 1935-36. The letter sets forth the situation as to matter of audit.

At the date of this meeting of the Executive Committee, no opinion on the question of audit pending before the Attorney General had been received. For that reason the President had not asked for bids as ordered at the April meeting of the Board of Trustees.

# 17. Truck Accident - Liability.

Opinions of Attorney General, and correspondence,

a. Letter submitting

Honorable Hubert Meredith Attorney General Frankfort, Kentucky

Dear General Meredith:

I have been asked by the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky to request an opinion from your office on the liability of the University on account of automobile accidents.

I state a particular case as follows: A collision occurred between the farm truck of the Kentucky Agricultural Experiment Station and a truck of the Lexington Water Company on February 19, 1938. The Lexington Water Company claims damages from the Experiment Station for repairs of its truck in the approximate amount of \$120. The University truck was so badly damaged that it had to be traded in for a new truck.

In order that the case may be presented from the standpoint of the University and also from the standpoint of the Lexington Water Company, I submit herewith copy of a letter to Dean Cooper from Professor Ely, professor of dairy husbandry. Also I submit copy of a letter to Dean Cooper from the Lexington Water Company.

I will appreciate it very much if you will let me have your opinion at an early date.

Dear Sir:

Your letter of March 30, wherein you request our opinion as to the liability of the University by reason of an automobile accident, has been referred to me for reply.

The statement of Professor Ely, attached to your letter, indicates that the liability was on the part of the Lexington Water Company truck driver. The letter of Mr. Jacobson of the Lexington Water Company indicates that the University truck driver admitted responsibility. It seems to be altogether a question of fact.

If the board of trustees feels that the University driver was operating the truck in a proper manner then their course would be to sustain him and refuse to pay the damages claimed by the Lexington Water Company. It is a matter of judgment to be exercised by the board of trustees after hearing both sides of the case as far as possible. No one could foresee what a jury might do if suit were brought. If the University, however, can rely upon proof being given substantially the same as that indicated in Professor Ely's letter, then my personal opinion is that payment should not be made to the Lexington Water Company.

I have yours of April 5 in regard to truck accident on which I requested the opinion of the Attorney General as to liability of the University. Members of the Executive Committee are of the opinion that, on account of the University being an institution of the State of Kentucky, there is no liability in cases of this kind. It was intended that my request for opinion cover this point. Perhaps I did not make this clear but I will appreciate hearing from you in regard to that question.

The University does not wish to avoid such liability but the members of the Executive Committee questioned whether or not they would have the power to authorize settlement should there be no liability against the University as a State institution.

Dear Mr. Peak:

This is to acknowledge receipt of your letter of April 11, relative to the liability of the University for an automobile accident which occurred recently. I regret that I misunderstood exactly the point you had in mind in your previous letter.

The University of Kentucky is not a branch or arm of the State Government to such an extent as to grant it sovereignty and prevent it from being sued. The University is a special legislative creature, not a part of the common school system or an arm of the Government, but a corporation set up and organized by the Legislature and given certain powers to act through its board of trustees.

Under the provisions of Section 4527-18 of the Kentucky Statutes, which outlines and defines the duties of the board of trustees of the University of Kentucky, we find that: - "The board of trustees---shall be a body corporate---and as a corporation shall have the power to sue and be sued, implead and be impleaded----."

Under the provisions of this and other sections of the statutes applying to the University of Kentucky, we believe that since the University functions as a corporation it may be dealt with as a corporation, and that if the board of trustees believes a liability exists in the matter referred to, it could effect a compromise settlement with the aggrieved party, or suit might be brought by the party against the University.

18. Request for Sewer Connection - Experiment Station.

Letter from Dean Cooper presented:

April 13, 1938

President Frank L. McVey University of Kentucky

Dear President McVey:

Mr. E. C. Stocker and Mr. Winfield Underwood, have requested the privilege of making an attachment to the main line sewer which extends from the agricultural engineering building and the dairy building to the city sewer on Washington Avenue. This sewer comes from an area in which there are four or five families, but Mr. Stocker and Mr. Underwood are the only ones interested.

I can see no objection, with certain limitations, to their making an attachment to the present sewer line which is ample to take care of our needs for many years in the future. I would propose the following limitations and requirements:

- 1. That the sewer be installed and connected, in so far as it runs upon Experiment Station property, in accordance with the requirements of the University engineer.
- 2. That the type of construction designated, manholes, if required, or other features, be installed at no expense to the University and in conformity with the requirements set up by the University engineer.
- 3. That the location of the line shall be that designated by the engineer.
- 4. That permission for additional use of the sewer shall be given only upon authorization of the Experiment Station.
- 5. That the work shall be carried on in such manner as

not to disturb the activities of the Experiment Station, and that upon completion the surface shall be restored to its original condition.

I recommend that easement be granted for the purpose of this sewer right.

On motion and second duly carried, Dean Cooper was authorized to enter into agreement with the parties named in the above copied letter, permitting use of the sewer with express stipulation in contract for discontinuance of the privilege on thirty days notice.

# 2. Report on Insurance

Dear Mr. Peak:

I have discussed the matter of the insurance for the Student Union Building with Colonel Graham and he instructed me that \$25,000.00 will be adequate on this building.

This policy should cover damage by fire and wind. I believe that the following description will be beneficial in establishing a rate on this insurance: As you know, this building has a kitchen in it for cafeteria operation. The building is a structural steel frame, fireproofed by encasing the beams in concrete and the columns in double brick. The floors are beam and girder type reinforced concrete. The roof is of Robertson Protective Metal. The ceilings next to the roof are constructed of plaster on metal lathes attached to metal runner channels and furring channels. All partitions are of fireproof construction, that is, they are either Ceramic Tile or Gypsum Tile. The exterior walls are of brick and of brick and tile. This building is set up for winter air conditions. All sash is of the fixed type.

Please take steps to have these covered immediately as we are accepting this building as of Tuesday, April 19, 1938.

#### 3. Insurance Ordered

The new Student Union Building has been received from the contractors and insurance carried by the contractors has been released, therefore we find it desirable to

have insurance placed on this building.

I have consulted Dean Graham in regard to the amount and he advises me that, inasmuch as this is a fireproof building, \$25,000 will, in his opinion, be sufficient amount of fire insurance. Like amount of tornado insurance should be carried and like amount on contents. I will appreciate it very much if you will have this taken care of.

The building may be described as a three story brick and tile metal roof building 142 1/2 feet by 157 2/3 feet situated on the University campus at Lexington, Ky.

On investigation I find that, if policies written by Dawson and Kirkpatrick and Coleman's on Kinkead and Breckinridge Halls are cancelled in their entirety, there will be no insurance on the contents of these two Halls. Either that part of these policies in regard to the contents should not be cancelled or else you should place \$5000 on the contents of each of the above mentioned Halls.

Miss Calla Van Syckle, to teach home management and housing the first term of the summer session; and consumer problems and home management, the second term; payment for services for the two terms to be \$550. Miss Van Syckle received the bachelor of science degree in home economics from Oregon State College, and her master's degree from Iowa State College. In addition, she has had a year of graduate work at the University of California. She is at present acting as head of the home economics department of the State Normal School at Plattsburgh, New York.

Edward B. Doll, whose employment was noted in Minutes of April 7, 1938, is also employed for the months June, July and August, 1938, at salary of \$400.00 for the period, to arrange and install electrical laboratory equipment in the new laboratories.

James F. Allen, Instructor in Chemistry, salary \$1500.00 a year, provided for in the budget.

Flavius W. Wyman, Eleanor A. Mitts and Ernest K. Bean, graduate assistants in Chemistry, at salary of \$500.00 each, provided for in the budget.

Dr. D. W. Bruner, Assistant Animal Pathologist, Experiment Station, salary changed to \$2700.00. Budget of contingent funds is to be adjusted to take care of the change.
