Our Voices Win Freedom LMC Celebrates Pride

On Saturday night, June 17th, the Lexington Men's Chorus' 10th Anniversary Season will culminate with their Pride show, " Our Voices Win Freedom." Since 1992 LMC has been proud to be a part of the Pride Month celebration for Central Kentucky.

Tickets are \$12 adults, \$10 student and senior and \$6 child under 10 and are available from chorus members or from the Singletary Center Ticket Office at 257-4929. Please be aware that the Sat. night June 17th is the ONLY performance. Some previous promotional materials referenced a second performance on Sun June 18th.

At the first Pride show, 19 men performed in tux shirts and rented cummerbunds the color of the pride flag The evening was billed as a "talent" night and LMC shared the stage of Arts Place with local singers, dancers and comedy acts. Over the next 7 years, LMC brought together the best regional gay and lesbian choruses for their Pride shows, performing with Indivisible, SisterSound and Voices of Kentuckiana.

The 2000 edition of LMC Pride under direction of interim Musical Director Richard Giles with accompaniment by ...continued page 2


Fairness Pride Event

Fenton Johnson grew up near Gethsemane, Kentucky, a Trappist monastery in rural Kentucky. He is the ninth of nine children. He is the author of two novels. Crossing the River and Scissors, Paper, Rock, as well as Geography of the Heart: A Memoir. Scissors was nominated for the San Francisco Bay Area Book Reviewers Award and the Boston Review Fisk Award for best fiction of 1994. Portions of Geography of the Heart appeared in the New York Times Magazine, and have been anthologized in college literature textbooks. It received the American Library Association Award and the Lambda Literary Award for best gay/lesbian nonfiction of 1996. Johnson is working on a third novel, Finding Faith: A Skeptic's Journey.

Finney, poet, lecturer, and English professor at the University of Kentucky, will read from her current works as well as emcee the evening. While Nikky hails from South Carolina, she has made Kentucky her home since 1989.





For Pride Month, Diversity Films will show Changing Our Minds: The Story of Dr. Evelyn Hooker and a number of short experimental films by Barbara Hammer. Join us in the Central Library Theater on Saturday afternoon, June 3 at 2 pm. No charge

In the 1950's Dr. Evelyn Hooker undertook ground breaking research to prove that homosexuals were not "sick" and did not belong in the DSM as a mental illness. The director, Richard Schmiechen, also directed The Life and Times of Harvey Milk for which he won the Academy Award. Schmiechen vividly portrays the life and work of this woman described by the Los Angeles Times as "The Rosa Parks of Gay Rights."

Startling archival footage of medical procedures used to "cure" homosexuality, images from the underground gay world of the McCarthy era, and "home movies" from that time period bring to life a part of our history. Dr. Hooker's work to educate her fellow psychiatrists included the concepts of "gay marriage" and "gay community" (a term she coined.) Her pioneering work and vision culminated in the American Psychiatric Association removing homosexuality from its manual of mental disorder in 1974. This film won the Best Documentary in the 1992 San Francisco International Lesbian and Gay Film Festival and was nominated for an Academy Award.

We will also be showing several short experimental films by Barbara Hammer. The History of the World According to a Lesbian traces the invisible and visible reference to women who ...continued page 7

love women from prehisory to contemporary times with the sarcastic sounds of the '50's lesbian quartet, "The Sluts from Hell."

In Hot Flash a menopausal woman and her lover join Hot Flash. the society for older women. Grey-Hairs are favored in this funny take on growing older. No No Nooky T.V. explores the impact of technology on sexuality, emotion, and self image. Computer language is juxtaposed with the everyday colloquial language of sexuality in a witty and playful way. The final short, Two Bad Girls, is rumored to be about some of those strange characters Reinette writes about, but we don't promise. One of these shorts will also be shown at the U.U. Church on Thursday, June 1.

Thursday Night Videos

On every Thursday evening in June, Interweave will be showing videos at the Unitarian Church. We will be in the main building in the middle school classroom, unless we get enough people to move out into the larger Fellowship Hall.

On Thursday, June 1 When Night Is Falling (1995). Patricia Rozema directed this sensual romantic sleeper set in Canada in which Camille, a theology professor, finds herself attracted to Petra, a circus performer. Camille struggles with her growing feelings for Petra while confronting her religious values. (Rated R) We also plan to

show one of the best of the short experimental film by Barbara Hammer.

On Thursday, June 8 - Torch Song Trilogy (1988). Harvey Fierstein, Anne Bancroft and Matthew Broderick star in this film adaptation of the Broadway comedy/drama hit. The film tells the story of a professional drag queen, played by Fierstein and his trouble with relationships. (Rated R)

On Thursday, June 15 Gia (1998) Angelina Jolie stars as the title character in this acclaimed, erotic HBO biopic based upon the life of Gia Carangi, whom many consider the first supermodel. Although the film focuses upon Gia's rise to fame and fall due to drug addiction, her turbulent lesbian relationship with a make-up artist is central to the story. Mercedes Reuhl and Faye Dunaway also star. (Unrated)

On Thursday, June 22 Get Real (1998) Fans of Beautiful Thing will enjoy this touching and well-acted coming-of-age story about a high school boy's relationship with a closeted track star. An English movie that has not been on the big screen in Lexington. (Rated R)

Thursday, June 29 - The Life and Times of Harvey Milk. This documentary chronicles an important piece of gay and lesbian history. Harvey Milk was the first openly gay politician to be elected to public office as a councilman in San Francisco. His political career ended abruptly when he was assassinated by fellow councilman Dan White. The director Richard Schmiechen also directed Changing Our Minds which will be shown downtown on Sat. June 3. Harvey Milk is an Academy Award winning film and is worth seeing more than once.

Discussions will follow each film. Join us for a family evening of good movies and good talk.



The Kentucky Theater will feature two movies of interest to our community during Pride Month. Beef Cake, at present scheduled for June 2 through 8, tells the story of Bob Mizner who published Physique Magazine from the 1950's to the 1990's. This quasi documentary is in part a retrospective tribute to Mizner's work. Interviews with individuals who were featured in his magazine, some of whom later became famous, are featured.

The <u>Physique</u> archives now contain the largest collection a male nudes in the world. Many of the photographs from the magazine are used in the movie. Some are even animated, providing a campy comedic flavor to the film.

Better Than Chocolate is scheduled to run from June 9 to 15. In this sexy romantic film Maggie meets Kim, her ideal lover, just hours before her neurotic mother and brother unexpectedly move in with her. Interesting characters and plot twists abound.

We need to support these films in order to make it financially possible to get more LBGT Films at the Kentucky. Fred may have to hold a movie in a theater if it is getting good audiences so the dates of these movies are only the best estimate. Check the newspaper for times and for confirmation of these dates.







Does anybody remember the time that the Army sent two guys to pick James up for dodging the draft? And James ducked out the back of her kitchen with one of the guys chasing her through the alley. When my partner and I first moved to Lexington four years ago we were both still learning how to crawl out of the closet and into a GLBT community. Admittedly that journey has not been without its pitfalls. We look back at ourselves then and at ourselves now, shaking our heads in amazement.

One of the most memorable of those pitfalls came the first summer we were here. Having yet to experience any of Lexington's "family" entertainment, we set out one warm summer evening in search of the only alternative club that we had heard of in town.

After a few unsuccessful trips down the same street looking for this club we were about to give up and head home, when we saw two guys who sent our gaydar into overload. Feeling adventurous we decided just to follow them. Sure enough just a few doors down from where we were they opened an unmarked door and the sounds of techno-pop filled the air - we knew we were in the right place.

When in Rome...we followed them in, paid the man at the door and pushed our way through the crowd to the bar. While I waited for my drink I started to feel a little like the proverbial bastard at the family reunion. People were starting to nudge and poke each other and actually point.

And when the music stopped and the dancer on stage up front gave us a sideways look I really felt out of place. It was obvious that a few of my gay brothers were not impressed with the two femmes who had come to share their party.

As my partner pressed my drink in my hand I said, "I think we are in the

wrong place." She said that was probably true but that we weren't leaving until we finished ours drinks. I agreed and ten seconds later handed her back my empty glass and headed for the door. Back at the door I asked the guy taking the money why he hadn't warned us that this was an all-male bar and he just shrugged, "Lots of straight girls come in to see the show."

He graciously gave us back the money we had paid for our cover and pointed us in the direction of a more mixed crowd. I made a mental note to get a haircut and that was our first and last trip to Crossings.

That night always reminds us of the scene from Police Academy when they go into the Blue Oyster bar and the music stops and everyone stares, but it always makes us laugh at ourselves. And lately it has taught me just how far she and I have come together and individually.

Then I was straight off the farm and from one of the straightest parts of Kentucky. She, being from Louisville, was adjusting to the joys of a smaller community and the lack of privacy that comes with it. Now with a better understanding of where the bars are as well as the churches, the pride center and a diverse and growing group of friends we no longer find it necessary to follow men we don't know into bars we've never been to before.

I feel blessed. Blessed to have met so many people in this community, maybe even a few familiar faces from Crossings that night. Blessed to have picked up my first copy of the GLSO, which led us to a church community and introduced us to organizations and individuals of which we had never heard.

Due to an illness in my family I will spend much of pride month in Western Kentucky with my family of birth but I will take along my copy of the GLSO Newsletter so that I can keep up with what my Lexington family is doing while I am gone.


