Minutes of the regular quarterly meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Montucky for Tuesday, April 5, 1927.

The Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky met in regular muarterly session in the President's office at the University at 11:30 a.m., Tuesday, April 5, 1927. The following members were present: Nr. McHenry Rhoads, Mr. E. B. Webb, Mr. Louis Hillenmeyer, Mr. Brank McKee, Mr. Robert G. Gordon, Judge R. C. Stoll, Senator Ernst and Senator H. M. Froman. Meeting with the Board were Dr. Frank L. McVey, President of the University, and Wellington Patrick, Secretary of the Board.

The minutes of the previous meeting of the Board and the minutes of the Executive Committee since that time were approved as published.

- 1. Report of the Business Agent. The report of the Business Agent was presented and upin motion duly seconded was ordered received and filed.
- 2. Purchase of Uniforms. A communication from Colonel Horace P. Hobbs was read, stating that the War Department appropriations were insufficient for the purpose of purchasing uniforms and asking if University funds could be allotted for the purchase of uniforms for advanced course students. The matter was presented, discussed and a motion was made, seconded and carried that it was the opinion of the Board that the use of University funds for such purposes would be of doubtful legality.
- 3. Quarterly Report of the President. The following statement from the President of the University making a quarterly report to the Board of Trustees was presented as follows:

## President's Quarterly Report

There are a number of notable matters to be presented to the Board of Trustees in my Quarterly Report to be made at the April meeting. These matters include some construction, plans for further comstruction, the purchase of lands, the completion of plans for the campus, landscape gardening, retiring allowances, courses in Art and Music, and the request for a grant from the General Education Board.

Five years ago Mr. Henry Wendt offered the University the complete equipment for a forge shop if the University would erect the building. It has been possible by careful financing to provide this building at a cost of about \$30,000 and the equipment is now being installed.

Meanwhile, plans are being prepared for the erection of a recitation building, made possible by the use of meeipts from the inheritance tax. This building is to be devoted to the housing of three departments, Mathematics, English and Journalism. It will cost approximately \$200,000. It will relieve the congestion in the Administration Building and the Science Building.

The wooden building which houses the Departments of Art and Music and the Romany Theatre has been completed at a cost of \$27,000.

The pavillion on the farm has been erected on the foundation where the old building steed at a cost of \$35,000.

In making this report, I am taking the opportunity of including in it a table showing the construction of buildings for the period 1917-1927.

The purchase of lands adjoining the University has been undertaken and the holdings increased considerably in the last three months. The Frantz property on Washington Avenue has been purchased, also two lots belonging to Messrs. Riley and Wallace on Graham Avenue.

In the meantime Mr. James M. White, of the University of Illinois, has completed plans for the campus and the purchases mentioned whove have been made in order to carry out these plans. The campus has been much cut up by readways and as building progresses, an attempt will be made to reduce the present number of readways. Considerable progress has been made in landscape gardening and the campus looks better now than it has at any time in its history.

For some time the matter of retiring allowances has been discussed at the meetings of the Board. A committee appointed by the Board has made some study of the matter and the purpose now is to report such progress as has been made and to bring this matter to the attention of the University Senate for its consideration.

The University is very much in need of an Experimental and Observation Practice School for the College of Education. The present high school is insufficient to meet their needs, and as there is no likelihood that such provision can be made in the near future, under the direction of the Board application has been made to the General Education Board for a grant to erect such a building.

New courses have been outlined for use in the fields of Art and Music leading to the bachelor's degree. These courses are to give the opportunity for wider training in the two fields.

It may be well for the Board of Trustees to create a committee to make an inspection of the buildings and grounds, so that a report can be made at the May meeting upon the conditions existing at the University.

4. Soil Experiment Field at Bowling Green. The following resolution was offered, seconded and unanimously approved:

"HEREAS, The "estern Kentucky State Teachers College has requested the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky to establish a soil experiment field on certain of its lands at Bowling Green, and

HEREAS, The Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky has given careful consideration to this request, with the full realization of the value of cooperation between the two institutions, but seeking at the same time to determine a sound and logical practice in the establishment of experiment fields, and

THEREAS, The Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky is of the opinion that the soil experiment fields now developed, and the experimental soil work planned at the Western Kentucky Substation at Princeton, provide research service for the Bowling Green soil areas, as well as for the other principal soil areas of western Kentucky, and that in view of the necessity of economy and of conservation of the resources of the institution, it is not deemed advisable to establish a soil experiment field at Bowling Green, as it would result in duplicating work now in progress,

THEREFORE, Having in mind the best means of advancing the agricultural interests in Varren County, this Board of Trustees recommends the employment of a county agricultural agent who can lead the agricultural development in the county. To this end, the University of Kentucky will provide such proportion of the fund as is usual in cooperative agreements covering agricultural extension work. The Board of Trustees expresses the hope that a satisfactory cooperative endeavor can be developed between the Western Kentucky State Teachers' College and the University of Kentucky in the employment of a county agricultural agent.

5. Course in Music. A recommendation was received from the University Senate approving a course in Music leading to the degree of B.S., for the purpose of training supervisors and music teachers in the State. A motion was made, seconded, and carried that the recommendation of the Senate be concurred in. The Music course adopted was as follows:

- 6. University Budget for 1927-1938. The budget for the year 1927-1928 was considered by the Board and motion was made, seconded and carried that the budget re adopted, subject to minor changes.
- 7. Henorary Degrees. A recommendation from the University Senate on honorary degrees to be conferred at commencement in June was received and upon motion duly seconded, approved. The recommendation was as follows:

To the Board of Trustees University of Kentucky

The University Senate, Thursday, March 31, recommended the following for the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws:

Vincent Massey, Minister Plinipotentiary from Canada to the United States. He will be Canada's first minister to the United States. After graduating from Toronto University he took a degree at Oxford with second class honors in history. Returned to Toronto to lecture on modern history in his Alma Mater, of which he is now a member of the Board of Governors.

- 8. Plans for New Recitation Building. Plans for a new recitation building were presented and considered by the Board and a motion was made, seconded and carried that the design and plans for the building be approved and that the Executive Committee be authorized, upon receipt of specifications, to advertise for bids.
- 9. Appointments and Changes in Personnel. The following list of appointments and changes in personnel was presented and on motion, duly seconded and approved.

Continuation of employment of Mr. Ray C. Hopper as county agent for Meads County, effective March 16 to June 30, 1927, at a salary of \$125.00 a month.

Continuation of employment of Mr. R. H. King, county agent of Carter County, effective Mach 22, 1927, to March 21, 1928, at a salary of \$166-2/3 a month.

Continuation of employment of Mr. C. V. Bryan, county agent of Taylor County, effective Merch 1, 1927, to February 28, 1928, at a salary of \$200.00 a month.

Appointment of Mr. James Everett Wilson as assistant county agent of Grant County, effective March 21 to August 31, 1927, at a salary of \$150.00 a month.

Appointment of Mr. Albert Wilson, assistant county agent of Madison County, effective March 21 to June 30, 1927, at a salary of \$100.00 a month.

Appointment of Mr. Robert T. Harrison as county agent of Harlan County effective March 15 to April 30, 1927, at a salary of \$200.00 a month.

Appointment of Mr. Harold Martin Christian as county agent to Graves County, effective March 5, to June 30, 1927, at a salary of \$125.00 a month.

The appointment of Mr. E. Z. Palmer as assistant professor in the College of Commerce, at a salary of \$ , effective September, 1927.

The appointment of Mrs. May K. Duncan as extension instructor in Education to be employed in the Department of University Extension on a ten months basis, at a salary of \$2,400.00 a year, effective September, 1927.

10. Record of the University Rifle Team. The following letter from Colonel John F. Madden, as called to the attention of the Board of Trustees and a motion was made, seconded and carried that the letter be recorded.
