Irregularities

Minutes of the Meeting of the Board of Trustees, University of Kentucky, January 19, 1945.

The Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky met in the office of the Director of the Student Union Building, at 10:00 a.m., Friday, January 19, 1945. The following members were present: Governor S. S. Willis, Grover Creech, Harper Gatton, Mrs. Paul G. Blazer, H. D. Palmore, Elliott Robertson, Thomas Cutler, J. C. Everett, and Horace Cleveland. President H. L. Donovan and Comptroler Frank D. Peterson, Secretary of the Board, were present.

A. Approval of Minutes.

The minutes of the Board of Trustees of September 19 and 23, 1944; and the minutes of the Executive Committee of October 21, November 22, 1944; and January 5; 1945, were approved as published.

B. Report of the Comptroller.

The Comptroller made the following report to the Board:

President H. L. Donovan University of Kentucky

My dear President Donovan:

I submit, hereto attached, the financial report of the University of Kentucky for the first six months of the fiscal year 1944-1945.

Income

Appropriations made by the state for the operations of the Colleges, Experiment Station activities and Agricultural Extension division of the University aggregate \$1,402,902.75, of which the University has realized, through allotments, a total of \$743,317.48. This amount represents 52.9% of the state appropriations.

There has been allocated by the Federal government to the University the sum of \$958,317.61 for Colleges, Experiment Station and Agricultural Extension work. Of this amount, \$510,511.74, or 52.2% has been realized during the first six months of the fiscal year.

The estimated income from sales and services for the Colleges and the Experiment Station was \$261,419.00, of which we have realized, during the period, \$154,728.78. This represents 59.1% of the estimated receipts from these sources.

Income from student fees was estimated at \$163,340.00. There has been realized, to the date of this report, from these sources \$101,019.82, which is 62% of budget estimates for student fees.

The total budget income for the University from all sources aggregates \$3,068,609.36, against which \$1,595,752.83 has been realized. This represents 52% of total income budgeted for current operations.

Disbursements

The following tabulation summarizes the appropriations and expenditures of various divisions of the University at the end of the first half of the current fiscal year.

The above information means we have expended, during the first half of the year, 3.2%, or \$96,976.22, less than one half of the budgeted appropriations. It should be noted, however, that the second half of the year carries a heavier load for salaries and usually a lighter burden for materials and supplies.

A careful examination of the detail report hereto attached will reveal estimates of anticipated income to be conservative and the estimates will be realized; that expenditures and encumbrances of the various departments and divisions are being controlled, well within departmental appropriations made by the Board of Trustees.

Restricted Funds

The report for the restricted funds shows the status of each account as to the beginning balance, current balance, receipts, and expenditures for the year. These funds are used to supplement administrative and general expenses, instructional activities, extension and research work, physical plant, auxiliary enterprises, college athletics, student functions, scholarships, related educational activities, and the work of the Experiment Station and Agricultural Extension. These accounts carry a current balance, as of December 31, 1944, of \$1,100,354.75, of which \$699,021.87 are invested in interest-producing securities and are being held in reserve for post-war expenditures

of deferred maintenance, equipment, materials and supplies not available during current market conditions, construction and post-war salaries of staff members now on leave, in the service of the government.

C. President's Report.

President Donovan presented "The Annual Report of the President to the Board of Trustees for the Year 1943-44." Due to a rather full agenda, time did not permit the report to be examined at length, but a copy of the printed report was made available to each member. A copy also was ordered filed with the Secretary of the Board.

D. General Dummit's Recommendation Regarding Declaratory Judgment Suit on Gifts, Bequests, etc.

President Donovan read the following letter received from Attorney General Eldon Dummit:

Commonwealth of Kentucky DEPARTMENT OF LAW Frankfort

December 1, 1944

Dr. H. L. Donovan President University of Kentucky Lexington, Kentucky

Dear Dr. Donovan:

For some time this office has been considering the matter of the proceeds from gifts, contributions, etc., being cleared through the State Treasurer. We have come to the conclusion that the Statutory provisions relating to this matter are conflicting and that in order to clarify same, a suit under the Declaratory Judgment Act should be filed.

We are, therefore, suggesting that you advise with your Board of Trustees at an early date as to the particulars of getting a court decision in these matters. We would appreciate hearing from you as to the decision of you and your Board of Trustees in this matter.

It is the desire of this office to cooperate fully with your institution in an early determination of this question.

President Donovan expressed the opinion that the issue involved represented the most serious question with which the University has been concerned since the suit filed sometime in the 80's in the last century to test the constitutionality of the law appropriating state funds for the support of the University.

Members of the Board discussed generally the question at issue and took the following action:

2. Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, President Donovan is authorized to proceed with the suit to determine the authority of the University to hold gifts, bequests, restricted funds, etc., and to secure the necessary attorneys to prosecute the matter to a final conclusion.

E. Food Service Unit for Women's Residence Halls.

President Donovan explained that, in connection with the erection of a new dormitory for women, it would be necessary to include in the new building a dining room and kitchen, because the present dining room and kitchen now serving Patterson, Boyd and Jewell Halls is inadequate for the present set-up and would be most inadequate if women housed in the new residence hall; were fed in the existing unit. He explained that there were two probabilities for taking care of the dining room requirements for the women students who would be housed in the residence halls: (1) dining room space to be

in the new dormitory, or (2) erection of a separate food service unit to care for all occupants of the four women's residences.

The members of the Board discussed the alternatives and took the following action:

* * * * * * * * * *

5. On motion duly made, seconded and carried, it is authorized that (1) a food service unit for women's residence halls be erected; (2) the President of the University secure estimates of costs for a food service unit adequate to serve the needs of women students living in the residence halls of the University.

F. Selection of Architects for Memorial Field House, Residence Halls for Men and for Women, and Food Service Unit.

President Donovan explained that the Board had previously authorized the construction of a women's residence hall and a residence hall for men, in addition to the food service unit for women. He also mentioned the necessity of starting plans for the Memorial Field House, and suggested that architects should be selected at an early date, in order that more time and thought might be given to the type of construction, plans and specifications.

The members discussed at length the desirability of proceeding immediately, and the various architects who might be available. After general discussion, the following action was taken:

- 4. On motion duly made, seconded and unanimous—
 ly carried, a committee composed of President
 H. L. Donovan, H. D. Palmore and Thomas Cutler
 fs appointed:
 - (1) To confer with the architectural firms of John T. Gillig, Frankel & Gurtis, and Wilson & Bell. This committee is to ascertain the adequacy of the said architectural firms and their organizations to perform architectural services in connection with construction of buildings to be erected on the campus of the University of Kentucky, and if, in the judgment of the committee, said firm or firms have the facilities and organization or organizations required, that the firm or firms hereinafter named be selected to perform such services as may be agreed upon;

- (2) That said committee is further directed to negotiate with each architectural firm or firms for preliminary drawings, to enter into a contract for preliminary drawings of the various buildings to be constructed, and to fix a fee to be paid for such preliminary drawings as may be recommended by the President of the University. If, after the preliminary drawings have been made and presented to the University authorities, and after they are accepted by the University, and the firm or firms so making the preliminary drawings are directed to proceed with plans and specifications, then said fee fixed for work in connection with preliminary drawings shall be considered a part of the total fee to be paid for architectural services, or plans, specifications and supervision, as hereinafter set forth:
- thorized, subject to the recommendations of the above committee, to enter into a contract with John T. Gillig to furnish architectural services in connection with the construction of a Memorial Field House building for the University, and/or to supervise the construction of said building, with Ernst Johnson and Hugh Meriwether, architects, as associates, and that the architect may be compensated for said architectural services in a sum not to exceed 3.6% of the total cost of such improvements, for furnishing plans and specifications, and/or that the architect may be compensated for such plans, specifications and supervision of such building in a sum not to exceed 5% of the total cost of said building. Equipment of building is not to be included.
- (4) That the President of the University be authorized, subject to the recommendation of the above committee, to enter into a contract with Frankel and Curtis to furnish architectural services for the construction of a women's residence hall and a food service unit for the women's residence halls for the University of Kentucky, and/or to supervise the construction of said buildings; and that the architect may be compensated for said architectural services in a sum not to exceed 3.6% of the total cost of such improvements, for furnishing plans and specifications, or that the architect may be compensated for such plans and specifications and supervision of said buildings in a sum not to exceed 5% of the total cost or such buildings. Equipment of said buildings is not to be included.

(5) That the President of the University be authorized, subject to recommendation of the above committee, to enter into a contract with Wilson & Bell, to furnish architectural services for the construction of a men's dormitory building for the University of Kentucky, and/or to supervise the construction of said building; and that the architects may be compensated for said architectural services in a sum not to exceed 3.6% of the total cost of such improvements for furnishing plans and specifications, and/or that the architect may be compensated for such plans and specifications and supervision of said building in a sum not to exceed 5% of the total cost of said building, Equipment of said building is not included.

My dear President Donovan:

I have the honor to inform you that at the meeting of the Trustees of the General Education Board on December 7, 1944, the sum of \$14,000, or as much thereof as may be necessary, was appropriated to the University of Kentucky toward the salary of a research associate for the Director and for other expenses of the Department of Commerce and Public Finance and its related Bureau of Business Research in order to strengthen teaching and research in public administration during a five-year period beginning about July 1, 1945.

The appropriation was voted pursuant to your letter of request of July 29th and is for use substantially in accord with the memorandum submitted therewith. The Board's appropriation will be available approximately as follows: for 1945-46, \$4,000; for 1946-48, \$3,000 each year; for 1948-50, \$2,000 each year, it being understood that the University from its own resources will maintain the added support at \$4,000 during the life and following the expiration of the Board's appropriation.

Payments will be made semi-annually upon receipt at the beginning of each year of a budget. Shortly after the close of each year please send us a statement of income and expenditures: Any part of the Board's appropriation remaining unused at the close of the five-year period reverts to the Board.

AGREEMENT BETWEEN

FOR

ADVISORY ASSISTANCE TO WESTERN KENTUCKY COOPERATIVE ORGANIZATION

This agreement is made and entered into as of the 20th day of November, 1944, between the TENNESSEE VALLEY AUTHORITY, (called the "Authority") and the UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY, (called the "Institution").

Background and Purpose

The TVA and the Institution over a period of years have carried on a joint fertilizer test-demonstration program in the Commonwealth of Kentucky, particularly in the Tennessee Valley counties, designed to obtain information as to the value, effect, and best methods of use of fertilizers in the interest of watershed protection and agricultural development. The parties have relied heavily upon soil conservation associations of farmers organized on a cooperative basis in carrying on the administration of the test-demonstration program. The Institution through its Agricultural Extension Service advises and furnishes information to these and other cooperative associations in the State. The Authority through the Cooperative Management Staff of its Agricultural Relations Department, with the collaboration of the land-grant colleges of the Valley, furnishes advice and assistance to associations of farmers on cooperative problems in furtherance of the objectives of the test-demonstration program.

Certain cooperative associations of farmers in the Tennessee Valley counties of Western Kentucky which participate in the test-demonstration program have requested advice and assistance from the Institution on organizational problems relating to new enterprises which are consistent with the objectives of the test-demonstration program. Because of a shortage of personnel the Institution is unable to render the requested advice and assistance, and has asked the Authority to provide this service through Authority personnel under the Institution's supervision. The Authority is authorized and willing to provide this service.

Agreement

In order to carry out the above purposes, and in consideration of the mutual covenants contained in this agreement, the Institution and the Authority agree as follows:

- 1. The Authority will provide the services of an Assistant Cooperative Analyst, who shall be acceptable to the Institution and shall work under its supervision, for a period of two months from the effective date of this agreement for the purpose of supplying advice and assistance to the associations of farmers in the Tennessee Valley counties of Western Kentucky in the formation of a federated cooperative. If the work contemplated in this section shall be completed before the end of the period, the Institution may terminate the agreement upon one week's notice to the Authority.
- 2. The Institution will reimburse the Authority for the cost of providing the services of the

Assistant Cooperative Analyst provided in Section 1, including salary, a percentage of salary to cover cost of accrual for leave and Authority's contribution to its Retirement System, and travel expenses including transportation fares, mileage travelled in Authority's cars at the rate of \$.05 per mile, and a subsistence allowance of \$5.00 per day, in conformance with federal travel regulations.

The Authority will bill the Institution as soon 3. as reasonably possible after completion of the work specified in Section 1 for its services rendered in accordance with Section 2, and the Institution will reimburse the Authority within a reasonable time thereafter.

The parties have executed this agreement by their duly authorized representatives as of the date specified in the first paragraph.

I, personally, prefer the shorter term bonds.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, it is ordered that one lecture a year to be delivered by a professor elected by the entire faculty of the College of Arts and Sciences, regardless of his field, be approved, and that such professor so elected be given the title of "Distinguished Professor" for the current year; and that such professor so elected be relieved of one quarter's teaching duties to permit him to do further creative and scholarly work. Such a leave shall not be regarded as a part of the regular sabbatical leave.

K. Letter of Dr. Laurence L. Quill to the Board of Trustees.

President Donovan presented, at the request of Dr. Laurence L. Quill, the following letter addressed to the Board of Trustees:

December 19, 1944

Board of Trustees University of Kentucky

Gentlemen:

I wish to express a sincere appreciation to you for the kindnesses and the thoughts which you expressed with respect to my work at the University of Kentucky and in requesting President Donovan to expend every effort that he could in keeping me at the University of Kentucky.

I feel there is a very fine future even though there are very serious problems to be overcome. Dr. Donovan has been a very fine man with whom to work. In the time he has been at the University, I think he has grown. I leave Kentucky with the greatest of respect for him.

I have had splendid cooperation from all of the faculty members, the students and particularly from the maintenance men such as the plumbers, the painters and the carpenters. I leave Kentucky with some regret because I am leaving some fine friends behind. However, that is life.

I close by again expressing a sincere appreciation.

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N. Mr. E. B. Farris Authorized to Appraise State Property for the Division of Insurance.

President Donovan read the following letter from Sherman Good-paster, Director of Insurance:

COMMONWEALTH OF KENTUCKY DIVISION OF INSURANCE Frankfort

January 18, 1945

Dr. H. L. Donovan, President University of Kentucky Lexington, Kentucky

Dear Dr. Donovan:

Section 56.080, KRS, provides that each year "the Division of Insurance shall reconsider its appraisal and valuation of public buildings and personal property belonging to . . . any state agency."

Pursuant to this provision and in view of the fact that in December, 1940, Mr. E. B. Farris, Chief Engineer of the University of Kentucky, completed the last thorough appraisal, which was made of various state properties, the Division interviewed Mr. Farris with a view to employing him to make the necessary adjustments this year.

Mr. Farris stated to us at that time that it would be necessary to secure your approval of this plan, and the following day, as Director of the Division of Insurance, I discussed the matter with Governor Willis and received his approval as well as the approval of the Honorable Clarence Miller, Commissioner of Finance. Governor Willis advised that he would speak with you concerning the matter, as he had an appointment with you on the date of this conversation.

Accordingly, on January 12, Mr. Leroy J. Taft, Assistant Director of Insurance, wrote Mr. Farris advising him that arrangements had been approved by the Governor and the Commissioner of Finance. Therefore, I request that, if this plan meets with your approval, Mr. Farris be apprised of the fact in order that he may proceed with the necessary work as rapidly as possible.

I trust that you will advise me your wishes in the matter if there should be any question about Mr. Farris being permitted to do this work.
