





Higher education rally just beginning of fight for funding

Almost 3,000 students, faculty, administrators and concerned citizens attended a march and rally for higher education Tuesday in Frankfort. It was reportedly the most people to show up for a rally since the civil rights era.

There is no doubt that that this many people showing up for a march and rally can influence legislators when they decide whether to give more money to higher education.

After all, there is nothing more important or scary to a politician than the sight of 3,000 potential voters marching up the steps of the Capitol.

But Tuesday's march and rally was by no means and. It was a beginning — a promise, if you will — to support the state universities.

For the next 2½ months, legislators will be examining and picking at Gov. Wallace Wilkinson's proposed budget while trying to hammer out a final product.

Tuesday's rally was only one event on one day. The march's influence will not be much if students and faculty alike don't back it up with letters and calls to state legislators.

UK and the other seven state universities quite possibly are facing their biggest financial crisis ever. One way in which we can avert this impending financial situation is by showing the legislators in this city, and in our home regions, that we won't stand for anything less than increased funding for higher education.

We know you are busy. We know a letter takes some time to write and prepare. But there is not a simpler and more important way of showing your concern to the legislature than by writing them a letter.

To make things easier, the Student Government Association will take your letters from legislators and take them to Frankfort and put them in the mailboxes of the respective legislators.

It doesn't get much easier than that.

Tuesday's rally and march was a start to what could be increased funding for our universities.

We must keep in mind, however, that it was only a promise to support our institutions of higher learning.

Now it is time to keep that promise by writing your legislator a letter.



Wilkinson claims that conformity is a form of tax increase, and he is vehemently opposed to any tax increase. What he doesn't admit is that it is only a tax increase for the people who can afford it.

Does he really feel that curtailing additional funding will help them get there? As a successful businessman, he must realize he needs to invest heavily to keep a project competitive. And universities do compete—for faculty, for students, for prestige and for businesses. Other states around the nation have recognized this, and their universities have made great strides in improving educational quality. University of Kentucky President David Roselle, while testifying to the legislature, pointed to the example set by North Carolina was one of the poorestates in the nation, both in terms of wealth and of educational quality. 
