Many times has the theory been advanced that the University should serve the state. Through the extension department, and the agricultural experiment station, in particular, the theory has been actively applied. Only recently, the University radio studios were granted an application for operation of an ultra-high frequency radio station for educational purposes. If the experiment is successful in the test county, the plan probably will be instituted in other hemucky counties; and educational programs adapted to the particular needs of the various sections will be available to hundreds of rural Kentuckians.

A joint resolution indossing "farm folk schools" and asking the University to exablish such a training system if possible was signed last week by Governor Johnson. 1) "To help young farmers develop their own personalities so that they can judiful their responsibilities as rural citizens.

2) "To give these young men scientific knowledge and practical techniques which they can use on their own farms and in their own communities."

Farm youths, averaging in ages from 18 to 25, unable to stand the financial burden of four college years, were drinking in the atmosphere of open forums, learning the latest wrinkles in farm-

ing and dairying, studying economics, history, sociology, music, and were finding themselves as leaders and cooperators in an increasingly interdependent society.

As the Courier-Journal suggests, it is not prosed that an agricultural Kentucky ape blindly the Danish idea, or even the Wisconsin idea. "But the notion that we might – possibly for very little money—open up new vistas of learning, and of simple, earthy culture, for our farm population tantilizes the imagination."


