My Dear Henry

I rec'd. your two favrs of the 15th and 22^d ulto.
and am highly gratified to find that you continue to take so
truly an interest in all that concerns Arkland. I hope your
attention to it will be unremitting until we return, and I doubt
not that we shall find it improved under your management.
