

S. Chamber 11th May 1832.

My dear Son

I rec'd your favor of the 2^d inst. If you can engage Mr. Shackleford to stucco the House at Ashland at a price not exceeding your estimate of \$350 (including materials), I am willing and authorize you to have it done, if you please. Or if you prefer it, I consent that it may be painted either a pearl color or a white tinged with a straw hue, as you may think best. There is one consideration in favor of not going to any great expense at present, and that arises out of the preceding context. Should that be decided in my favor (of which there exists a better prospect now than at any preceding period) I may not want the house for some time and it will be unoccupied, unless there should be a change in your condition that might lead you to wish to occupy it.

Will you be good enough to tell Mr. Grant that any money he may deposit with the Bank of the U.S. at his req't for to my credit shall be deemed a payment of so much on account of his note to me. I forget what it is I owe him Shackleford, and will want you to ask him of the holding note and for what amount. Any thing that I owe him I could send from this place. I have written to Mr. Martin about my wool. I transmitted to you a copy of my last report. My health is not very good and I am most anxious to be with you. But when I shall have that satisfaction is very uncertain.
