WILL YOU REMEMBER THE UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY IN YOUR WILL?

Is there really any reason why you shouldn't? The fact that you are reading this demonstrates that the University means something to you as an alumnus.

Legacies to educational institutions are not just for the wealthy to make. Anyone of average means and conviction of the need of his college can make a bequest. You can literally perpetuate *your resources indefinitely.

NATURALLY, YOU MUST THINK OF YOUR LOVED ONES FIRST and provide for them, but it may be possible to include a bequest for the University, too. In any case, it is always possible to include a clause in your will where the remainder of the estate passes over to the University of Kentucky after the death of all heirs.

A man may see his children grow to be entirely self-sufficient. After providing in his will for his wife, he may find that a sum bequeathed to the University, which helped shape his career, brings him a great sense of satisfaction. Alumni who do this say that they feel an obligation has been met because they have always known that the tuition they paid while in school never really covered the full cost to their alma mater.

Making a will is a very personal thing. However, everyone should make one. If you have a will, how long has it been since you reviewed it? Does it cover your current status and reflect your present wishes?

IF YOU ARE MAKING OR REVISING YOUR WILL, the University of Kentucky offers you an unparalleled opportunity to associate yourself with enduring progress in education. You can leave a permanent memorial to yourself and family while helping others to have the opportunity you enjoyed.

TRANSFER OF PROPERTY TO THE MANAGEMENT OF A TRUSTEE in one of various ways can provide for the immediate or future benefit of the University of Kentucky. A donor can reserve income for himself for life, provide for dependents or survivors and simultaneously gain substantial tax benefit for himself and his estate.

Assuming that a donor wishes to provide for his wife and family by way of a trust created by will, he may provide that on fulfillment of these obligations the remainder shall be given to the University of Kentucky.

Depending on the nature of the estate, it is possible that by reason of this arrangement, his family will have more income. The charitable deduction allowable will reduce the estate tax, possibly to such a point that the principal of the trust remains substantially undisturbed, thus allowing it to earn more money for the wife and children.

A short term trust, under which the property reverts to the donor or his estate after the University of Kentucky has received the income for a specified period of years, is occasionally more advantageous to the donor than outright gifts from current income.

IMPORTANT: Information For Alumni, Parents

New students planning to enter the University of Kentucky for the fall semester must submit an application to the Registrar's Office not later than Aug. 15 or by Jan. 2 for the spring term. The deadline was approved by the University Faculty, and is in effect this year.

The ruling also applies to students who have dropped out and wish to re-enter UK. The deadline system is not a new development, according to Registrar Robert Mills. Certain private institutions have had "cut-off" dates for years, and most public-supported schools are beginning to adopt the policy.

The system will enable the University to prepare housing and other facilities for the increasing number of students. The deadline also will encourage students to look ahead-to decide in advance the field of study they want to pursue.

Assignment:

Assignment: Indonesia — it sounds like classwork, and it is—an assignment to teach in the classrooms of the University of Indonesia at its faculties in Bandung and Bogor on the beautiful, romantic island of Java in the archipeligo Republic of Indonesia, the former Dutch East Indies. Since July of 1956, 35 American professors have accepted assignment as members of the Kentucky Contract Teams in Indonesia.

Indonesia is a country of 80,000,000 people living on 3000 islands; it gained its independence shortly after the end of World War II with the termination of 350 years of Dutch rule. Not the least of the problems facing the leaders of the new nation was that of higher education, for with the departure of the Dutch professors from the schools, there were simply not enough trained teachers to staff the Indonesian universities. As a stop-gap measure, the gov-

ernment recruited staff members on a contract basis from all over the world, and for a time the University of Indonesia had one of the most cosmopolitan faculties in the world. In addition to the problem of staff, there was the equally serious problem of completely overhauling the European system followed in the schools; such a system turns out a few men of high quality, but Indonesia, on the threshold of technological progress needed greater numbers of trained teachers, engineers and administrative leaders. A new Indonesian system was needed.

The help of the International Cooperation Administration of the U.S. State Department was sought for the solution of the multiple problems facing the country in the field of education. As a result of this appeal contracts were negotiated between the International Cooperations Administration and the University of Kentucky for technical aid to the University of Indonesia. The first of these contracts, that for assistance in Engineering and Basic Sciences at the Technical and Science Faculties in Bandung, was signed on July 2, 1956; a year later an additional agreement was reached for assistance in Agricultural and supporting sciences to the Faculties of Agriculture and Veterinary Science at Bogor.

The initial goal of these international affiliations was to fill the gaps in the ranks of teachers left by the departure of the Dutch and European professors. Shortly after the signing of the Bandung contract the University of Kentucky's "pioneer" group went out to teach Indonesian students in Indonesian classrooms - in English. They have since been joined by others at Bandung, and by the new team at Bogor. Classroom instruction is, of course, the short run program; the longer more difficult task is that of assisting the Indonesians in the task of creating a staff capable of taking over these teaching positions. The University of Kentucky professors are dedicated to the task of working themselves out of a job as soon as possible and present plans call for achieving the objective of "Indonesiation" by

For instance, it would be difficult for an American to visualize a university with no textbooks or accessible library books, yet this has been the situation in the University of Indonesia in the past. There are no bookstores where college texts are available in sufficient numbers to meet the student needs, and the campus libraries are so organized that checking out a book overnight is nearly impossible. Consequently, the students have had to rely almost entirely upon classroom instruction. Due to the under-development of the Indonesian language in the technical fields and to the cosmopolitan composition of the faculty, the English language has been adopted as the language of classroom instruction, and the student must cope with many "brands" of English. Because of this latter factor textbooks

At Bandung 14,000 textbooks have been purchased through the United States Operations Mission in Indonesia; others have been provided on direct purchase from contract funds. Tau Beta Pi, the Engineering Honorary Society at the University of Ken-

tucky donated over 1500 books through a book drive, and a recent gift from the Asia Foundation will provide many more volumes for the students and faculty at Bandung.

The situation was, of course, similar at Bogor. Textbooks for the elementary classes were ordered through contract funds; others were purchased for the libraries, and periodicals were ordered for the two faculties. The Agriculture and Home Economics Student Council of the College of Agriculture, University of Kentucky, held a book drive like that conducted by Tau Beta Pi and forty-two cases of books were sent to the Indonesian students.

There is a considerable amount of highly specialized technical and laboratory equipment available in Indonesia, but there are shortages in vital areas. Under the contracts, University of Kentucky professors working with their Indonesian counterparts have requisitioned a great deal of basic scientific and laboratory equipment for Indonesia. Under the "team" concept, there is little duplication of equipment, for the lists are checked with others of the team working with departments en-

gaged in similar experimental work, and every effort is made to achieve a balance in laboratory equipment. A workman is only as good as his tools and his knowledge, and excellence in both is the aim of the Kentucky teams.

A vital part of the program of Indonesiation is that of sending promising Indonesian students to the United States for a period of a year or more to follow study programs at the University of Kentucky and other American universities. Speaking of this program of training teachers for the Indonesian faculties, Dr. Ellwood Hammaker, Group Leader of the Bandung Team wrote: "The team is attempting to accomplish this aim chiefly through its participant program. 'Participants' are Indonesians who are sent to the United States by the team for advanced study. Each participant is expected to return and take his place on the faculty, preferably alongside a team staff member, who can train him further in the responsibilities of a position on the faculty." Thus, in time, outstanding Indonesians who have received their training in the United States will relieve the shortage of qualified professors and the need for foreigners to fill these positions. The team at Bandung has sent 23 participants to the United States since the beginning of the program, and the team at Bogor has sent five. The first of these, seven young men from Bandung, are just completing a year in this country. Their records indicate that they will be qualified, dedicated professors upon their return to Indonesia.

The Agricultural team at Bogor has one opportunity not given to the team at Bandung, that of assisting the Indonesians in the development of an entirely new program at its new experimental farm at Dramaga, some six kilometers from the Campus of the Agricultural Faculty. This site offers dramatic possibilities; as Dr. Olaf S. Aamodt, Group Leader of the Bogor Team, has stated: "It not only has possibilities as a possible future Experiment Station . . . it is also a most natural and beautiful site for an Agricultural College."

The staff members of the Kentucky Contract Teams are busy men-selecting books, making up equipment requirements, choosing participants for study in the United States, advising on new buildings, even on entire new campuses - but undoubtedly their greatest contribution has been in the classroom and in the general association with students. Members of both teams assumed normal teaching loads shortly after their arrival in Indonesia and have been introducing a new approach to education in their classes. The students have particularly appreciated the close, informal relationships established between themselves and the Kentucky professors. These professors have introduced unannounced quizzes, lab reports with deadlines, and lecture schedules which were designed to cover the work of a semester in a semester. This scheduling has spread to other parts of the University and is being practiced by other professors.

The students have come to have a high regard for the University of Kentucky professors because of the changes noted above, and because their presence has assured graduation for students who live up to their obligations and responsibilities. Prior to the arrival of the Teams, graduation was uncertain; if an instructor could not be found to teach a required course, students could not complete the requirements for graduation. This delay was frequently of several years duration, and in some cases, the student never graduated. Now, with the assistance of the Kentucky Teams, a new four year program is being adopted by almost all departments, and more students are being graduated each year.

It may be years before the professors may hope to see the fruit of their labors, but they continue with the certain knowledge that their accomplishments will multiply as the years pass. Indonesia, unlike many of the newly-

Strong Represents U.S. Industry In Europe

Henry G. Strong, Executive Secretary of Refrigeration Industry Safety Advisory Committee and 1914 alumnus of UK, attended three international engineering meetings in Europe during September as a representative of the air-conditioning and refrigeration industry of the United States.

Strong represented RISAC, under sponsorship of the U.S. National Committee to the International Institute of Refrigeration, through their affiliation with the National Academy of Sciences and the National Research Council of the U.S., at meetings in Moscow and Prague, and served as a member of the American Standards Association delegation at a meeting in London of Technical Committee 86 (Refrigeration) of the International Organization for Standardization.

In Moscow, Commission 3 of the Technical Board of IIR discussed design, construction, and operation of refrigeration machinery and air-conditioning plants. Commission 7 of the Institute, meeting at Prague, considered refrigerated transport by land and air. Strong was named to both commissions. The scope of the London sessions was designated as "Coordination of standards in the field of refrigerating equipment as used in refrigeration and air-conditioning."

Elvis Stahr, '36, Is Appointed To Presidency Of West Virginia University

When Elvis J. Stahr, Jr., '36, assumes the presidency of West Virginia University on Feb. 1, the 42-year-old Kentuckian will become the University's youngest chief executive in more than 60 years.

Mr. Stahr, now vice chancellor at the University of Pittsburgh, accepted on Aug. 2 an offer by the University Board of Governors to succeed retiring President Irvin Stewart. As the University's 14th president, he will be the youngest man to hold the office since President Jerome Hall Raymond was inaugurated in 1897 at the age of 28.

At Pitt, where he has been a member of the staff since July 1, 1957, Mr. Stahr is in charge of the Schools of Business Administration, Education, Engineering, Mines, Law, Public and International Affairs, Retailing and Social Work, as well as the Administrative and Science Center and the Computation and Data Processing Center. As a member of Pitt's Administrative Committee, he also participates in the formulation of top-level policy for the entire institution.

He went to Pittsburgh after a year's duty in Washington as executive director of President Eisenhower's non-partisan Committee on Education Beyond the High School, and prior to that time had been law dean and provost at the University of Kentucky. He also holds degrees from Oxford and Yale Universities.

Born in Hickman, Ky., March 9, 1916, Mr. Stahr was graduated from the University of Kentucky with the highest grades in the history of the university. He won a Rhodes Scholarship and spent three years at Oxford University where he gained three additional degrees (B.A. in Jurisprudence, Bachelor of Civil Law, and M.A.) and later won a diploma in Chinese language at Yale.

He then practiced law for eight years with the New York firm of Mudge, Stern, Baldwin & Todd with time out for long service as a combat infantry officer in World War II. During the war he served overseas more than two years, was in combat in China for many months, and received seven medals and several battle stars and service ribbons,

meanwhile rising in rank from second lieutenant to lieutenant colonel.

In 1947, Mr. Stahr was appointed associate professor of law at the University of Kentucky, and in 1948, at the age of 32, was promoted to professor and made dean of the College of Law. In that same year he was named as one of the "Ten Outstanding Young Men of America" by a committee which included Dwight D. Eisenhower.

During the Korean War, he took leave from Kentucky to serve as special assistant to Secretary of the Army Frank Pace Jr. In 1954, Dean Stahn was made provost of the University of Kentucky, and for the next two years was heavily involved in the planning of the new medical school and medical center of the university, which will open its doors in 1959. During his years at Kentucky, he also served as counsel to the president of the university and as vice-chairman of the state's Constitution Review Commission.

Mr. Stahr is a member of the bars of New York, Kentucky, and the U.S. Supreme Court, and a member of many national organizations, among them Phi Beta Kappa, the Order of the Coif, the American Bar Association, the American Law Institute, the Association for Higher Education, Sons of the American Revolution, the Sigma Chi Fraternity, having won as an undergraduate at Kentucky the Balfour National Award of Sigma Chi for 1936.

West Virginia's president-elect is the delegate of the Association of American Law Schools to the American Council on Education. He belongs to the Disciples of Christ Church. At present he is vice president of the Health & Welfare Association of Allegheny County (Pa.).

Mr. Stahr married Dorothy Howland Berkfield of New York in 1946, and they have three children, Stephanie Ann, 5, Stuart, 1, and Bradford, born in October.

He was responsible also for the city's first weather station, personally acting as observer from 1914 to 1946, a service for which he was cited by the U.S. Weather Bureau.

Other citizenship honors bestowed on Brown include that of being St. Petersburg's first "Mr. Sun" in 1955 and Goodwill Industries' "Man of the Year" in 1956.

UK Advises Guatemalans

A University of Kentucky agricultural team is teaching and advising in Guatemala under a new contract with the International Cooperation Administration.

The team, operating under an agreement involving ICA, the University and the government of Guatemala, is teaching some courses at the University of San Carlos, Guatemala City, and assisting college and government officials in agricultural planning. Group leader for the project is Prof. L. J. Horlacher.

The program is similar to a project in Indonesia, where the University has two contract teams, financed by the Indonesian government and ICA—an agency of the U.S. government.

Both contracts are administered by the Kentucky Research Foundation at U. of K.

The most recent contract was developed after an exploratory visit to Guatemala two years ago by Dean Frank J. Welch of the College of Agriculture and Home Economics and Dr. J. E. Hernandez, associate professor of romance languages.

Also included in the contract is a provision for Guatemalan students to study agriculture in the United States.

UK Offers Air Science Degrees For First Time

The UK College of Arts and Sciences is offering two academic degrees in air science for the first time this fall, Col. R. W. Boughton, head of the air science department, has announced.

The degrees are Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Science, with a major in air science, Col. Boughton stated. The new offerings place the University among a very small number of colleges and universities which offer courses intended to prepare college men for military careers as officers.

The Bachelor of Arts degree is intended for those students who will probably enter non-technical officer career fields. The Bachelor of Science degree, on the other hand, will be suited for those students who intend to enter technical career fields.

Music Department Has Two New Members

He has had teaching experience at the University of North Carolina, University of Illinois, Ithaca College, and the University of New Mexico.

Nash came to U.K. from Boone, N. C., where he was head of the music department at Appalachian State Teachers College. He will co-ordinate the music program for state music festivals and assist in the development of an extensive program of music clinics and workshops for students and teachers both on campus and throughout the state.

A native Kentuckian, he has returned to his home state after 21 years. He has taught music from first grade through college and graduate school. His first teaching position was at Evarts, Ky., where he taught Public School Music and organized the Evarts High School Band.

In 1937, he went to the Laboratory Schools of Appalachian State Teachers College as a critic teacher and to organize their first band. Later, he was promoted to the Appalachian College department of music as band and orchestra director. After serving four years as an officer in the Navy, he returned to Appalachian where, in 1951, he became head of the music depart-

Nash received his bachelor's degree from Eastern Kentucky State College and his M.A. degree from the University of Kentucky.

He is a past-president of the North Carolina Bandmasters, the immediate past-president of the North Carolina Music Educators Association and a member of the Music Educators National Conference in which he is a member of Commission X. He has been active in conducting instrumental clinics, classroom teacher workshops, and judging festivals in Kentucky, Virginia, North Carolina, and Tennessee.

Three Added To Civil **Engineering Department**

Expanded programs in architectural, sanitary and structural engineering are being offered at UK this fall following the addition of three members to the faculty of the Civil Engineering department.

Prof. Charles Graves, 31, holds a master's degree in architecture from University of Pennsylvania and a bachelor's degree in architecture from Georgia Tech. He taught at Clemson University before coming to UK and has also taught at Pennsylvania and Georgia Tech. He will teach courses in architectural design and act as an advisor for students in civil engineering who are interested in architectural

Dr. Robert Lauderdale was an assistant professor of sanitary engineering at Massachusetts Institute of Technology before coming here. In addition to his teaching duties he will continue research on nuclear wastes, air pollution and sanitary problems created by increases in population and industrial development.

The 36-year-old Dr. Lauderdale received a master's degree in chemical engineering at the University of Tennessee and a Ph.D. degree from MIT. He was an associate health physicist at the Oak Ridge atomic project for four years and has written several technical articles on radioactive waste treatment for professional journals.

Dr. Hans Gesund received his master's and Ph.D. degrees from Yale University and taught structural engineering there for the past five years. He has done extensive research on the use of digital computers and will continue that work at the University Computing Center.

Dr. Gesund, 30, will also use computing methods in the instruction of advanced structural engineering courses. Both he and Lauderdale will teach courses for the department's approximately 25 graduate students. Both are members of Sigma Xi, national research honorary.

The three additions bring to 11 the number of full-time staff members, according to Prof. David K. Blythe, head of the department.

The department is the fourth largest civil engineering department in the country.

PROFESSOR BIGGE VISITS MIDDLE EASTERN COUNTRIES

Dr. Adolph E. Bigge, head of the department of modern foreign languages and foreign student advisor at the University, is currently making a two-month travel-study tour of the Middle East.

The tour is made possible by a grant, given by the American Friends of the Middle East working with the National Association of Foreign Student Advisors. Only one grant of this type is made each year.

Vandenbosch Heads Diplomacy School

Dr. Amry Vandenbosch, foreign relations specialist and head of the Political Science Department at UK, in August assumed his new duties as director of the University's new School of Diplomacy and International Com-

Tentative opening date for the school, provided for in the will of the late James Kennedy Patterson, former UK president, is the fall of 1959.

Dr. Vandenbosch is author of a number of books on foreign relations problems and an adviser to the government on a number of occasions.

The school will be named after William Andrew Patterson, son of the former U.K. president. The elder Patterson stipulated in his will that income from a portion of his estate was to be used for establishment of the institution.

Dr. Vandenbosch said the school will be opened with about 10 faculty members, and will offer courses primarily on the graduate level, designed to train students for careers in foreign relations, world affairs, foreign trade, and international finance.

Dawson Serves On Panel

Dr. Lyle R. Dawson, distinguished professor of chemistry and head of the Department of Chemistry at the University, spent several days last summer in Washington, D. C., where he served as a member of an advisory panel representing the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

The panel advised President Eisenhower's Committee on Scientists and Engineers on preparation of a booklet about science and scientific careers, the booklet to be distributed to high schools and colleges.

HICKS GETS NEW POST

Robert Hicks has been appointed to head pure-bred beef cattle work at UK.

Hicks, who has been coach of UK livestock judging teams, hold B.S. and M.S. degrees. He will be in charge of operations at Coldstream and UK Experiment Station farms.

Jansen Joins Teaching Team In Indonesia

William H. Jansen, professor of English at UK, left in September to join a team of UK professors teaching at the University of Indonesia.

He taught English to students of other nations when he was a professor at Indiana University before he came to UK, and later to airmen of the Turkish Air Force, from 1951-53, in that country.

Jansen will teach a "speed-up English course" to the Indonesian students there so they may have a better grasp of the lectures presented by other UK professors in scientific and technical subjects.

The UK team is teaching in Indonesia as a participant in a contract administered by the International Cooperation Agency, which sponsors programs of technical assistance to that nation. The purpose of the entire contract is to provide Indonesia with a nucleus of native teachers who may carry on the education programs that country is developing.

During World War II Jansen helped the U.S. Army prepare textbooks used in teaching foreign military men English in a fast, efficient course. During the seven years he was at Indiana University, he taught English to about 2,000 foreign students in this country under the auspices of the U.S. Department of State.

In Turkey from 1951 to 1953, Jansen prepared text material and tape recordings for use in teaching Turkish government officials the language.

During that period, he taught 70 members of the Turkish agriculture department a proficiency in English.

Jansen was accompanied on the twoyear stay in Indonesia by his wife and their eight-year-old son, William. Their daughter is attending the Brent School at Baguio in the Philippines.

Dr. Clayton Lay Thomas, 1944, began his duties in August as medical director of Tampax, Incorporated, Palmer, Mass. Dr. Thomas received the Master of Public Health degree from Harvard University in June.

GOES TO INDIA

Lawrence A. Bradford, professor of agricultural economics in the University College of Agriculture and Home Economics, in August and September attended the 10th annual meeting of the International Institute of Agricultural Economists in Mysore, India.

Bradford has specialized in farm management and farm credit. While in India he also studied Indian agriculture. His trip was made possible by a grant from the Ford Foundation and the Council on Economic and Cultural Affairs.

Dr. Eckstrom, who comes from the research laboratory of the Pan American Petroleum Corporation, received his bachelor's degree in chemical engineering at North Dakota Agricultural College. His graduate work was done at the State University of Iowa, where he received the Ph.D. degree in physical chemistry in 1937. After a few months as research physical chemist with the Aluminum Company of America, he joined the faculty of Brown University. He was associated with Brown for a period of ten years. During World War II he was connected with the Office of Scientific Research and Development and was a Captain in the Chemical Warfare Service at Massachusetts Institute of Technology. Since 1947 he has been Section Supervisor of the Fundamental Research Section of the Stanolind Oil and Gas Company now known as the Pan American Petroleum Corporation. His research publications are in the areas of solution chemistry and catalysis.

Dr. Ehmann is a native of Wisconsin. His bachelor and master's degrees were received at the University of Wisconsin. In 1957 he was awarded the Ph.D. degree in nuclear chemistry at the Carnegie Institute of Technology. For the past year he has been a post-doctoral research associate at the tts, develope Argonne National Laboratory associated with the University of Chicago.

Four long-time members of the Kentucky Agricultural Extension Service on Sept. 27 were honored by their associates, some 325 county agents and home demonstration agents holding their annual extension conference at the University.

Portraits of the four were unveiled at the Kentucky Agricultural Extension Service's recognition dinner. The pictures will be hung in the Extension Service office building.

Honored were T. R. Bryant, head of the Kentucky Agricultural Extension Service from its earliest days, 1910; Charles A. Mahan, one of Kentucky's first county agents and for years head of the state's county agents; Miss Myrtle Weldon, for 31 years leader of Kentucky's home demonstration agents, and J. W. Whitehouse, former county agent and for 32 years head of the state 4-H Club organization.

Bryant was graduated in 1908 from the University, and got his master's degree in 1932. He started in 1910 as superintendent of extension work under the Experiment Station; in 1914, the Extension Service itself was founded and he took over in Kentucky as full-time director. In his service he promoted the 4-H Club organization, initiated a program for young farm adults, sponsored community planning and county extension plans of work.

Mahan was graduated from the University in 1907, served three years in the Philippines, became the first fulltime county agent in Kentucky in 1913 in Henderson County, served several years as agent in Ohio and Indiana counties and took over as Kentucky county agent head in 1920. He held his post until he retired in 1957. Whitehouse is a native of Anderson County, was graduated in 1914 at the University, served as county agent until 1922 and in 1924 took over the state 4-H Club organization. He retired in 1956. He sponsored the annual 4-H Week on the University campus, one of the oldest such activities in national 4-H history; helped establish two permanent 4-H camps and has interested industrial, civic and agricultural leaders in giving scholarships to worthy farm boys and girls. About 60 per cent of the College of Agriculture's student body have been 4-H youths and about 25 per cent of the University's student body has a 4-H background.

AWARDED \$6,000 GRANT

Dr. Herbert P. Riley, head of the University's botany department, has been awarded a \$6,000 National Science Foundation grant for a study of South African plant life.

During the approximately two-year period of the research, he will grow several hundred plants from seeds being collected for him in South Africa. He will study the number and structure of chromosomes in the plants and the bearing of the chromosome differences on their evolution. The plants will be grown under synthetic conditions in the botany greenhouse.

TEACHES AT NORTH CAROLINA

Dr. W. L. Matthews, dean of the College of Law at the University, taught a course in personal property during the University of North Carolina's second summer term.

Dean Matthews, who has been recognized for his research and teaching in the field of property law, also attended a Southeastern Regional Conference of Law Teachers in August in Miami. He is a member of the conference's executive committee.

Functions Of Two New UK Centers Explained

A three-fold function is being planned for University of Kentucky centers in Cumberland and Henderson, according to Dr. A. D. Albright, executive dean of extended programs at the University.

Dr. Albright said the parent institution envisions a program which will

(1) Lower division instruction in core or basic areas as a part of the University's first two years of college

(2) Special periodic courses for occupational and technical objectives.

(3) General education courses for adults based upon needs of the people

in the area.

"Each center is an integral part of the University extended to provide an educational service to people in an era of rapid change," he said. He added, however, that each center will also function separately to the extent that it provides for the special educational needs of the people of the area.

BOARD MEMBER DIES

Carl A. Dempewolf, a member of the University of Kentucky Board of Trustees and Henderson County landowner, died on August 6 at Evansville,

Dempewolf collapsed on an Evansville street and was dead of a heart attack on arrival at a hospital.

Dempewolf, 77, was noted as a scientific farmer. He was a member of a committee which is working to bring to Henderson an extension college of the University of Kentucky and a charter member of the Kentucky Farm

Dempewolf was appointed to the UK board in September, 1949, and his term would have expired Dec. 31 of this year.

REVISE CRIMINAL CODE

Roy Moreland, professor of law at UK, is helping to revise and improve the Kentucky Code of Criminal Procedure under a research grant from the Legislative Research Commission.

The Kentucky Research Foundation will administer the project, which is being conducted to reform and revise legal procedure concerning the administration of justice in Kentucky courts.

Kentucky will defend its NCAA championship in 1959 with a club minus four-fifths of its starting lineup and basing hopes for staving off revenge-minded opponents on a tall and talented, but inexperienced group of sophomores plus a couple of junior

college products.

The lone returning regular in Baron Adolph Rupp's traditionally well-stocked bluegrass basketball stable is lean and lanky Johnny Cox, a 6-4 Kentucky mountaineer sharpshooter who stands out as the South's leading All-America hope. His clutch scoring with a deadly-accurate jump shot and hook together with sensational rebounding helped immeasurably in the Wildcats drive last winter to an unprecedented fourth national collegiate championship and record 19th Southeastern Conference title.

All-America guard Vernon Hatton, leading scorer on the '58 club with a 17.1 average, departed along with fellow starters John Crigler, Adrian Smith and Ed Beck plus six key reserves who saw considerable game ac-

Joining Cox as returnees are a quartet of reserves from whose ranks Coach Rupp may pluck one starter to fill part of the graduation riddled front. They are 6-6 Don Mills, a lad who came into his own at tournament time and is rated the best chance to break into the starting lineup; 6-5 Phil Johnson; and six-foot Lowell Hughes, star quarterback from the UK football squad. Between them they accounted for 95

points last season.

While the ranks of the bluegrass thoroughbreds are pretty well depleted and the outlook is far from sunny in the old Kentucky home, there is a not-so-surprising confidence among followers in the masterful Rupp's ability to re-build shattered foundations into another banner season. While there is every reason to be pessimistic, the almost exact opposite is true with hopes rallied around the slogan, "what was done once can be done again." Fervent rooters and even impartial sportswriters recall that Rupp, admittedly the nation's winningest cage mentor, followed up the loss of the "Fabulous Five" Olympic titlists and two-time national champions with a sophomore-studded outfit in 1949-50 that posted a remarkable 25-5 record. For unexpected achievement in the face of tremendous odds, the Baron of Basketball was cited as "Coach of the Year.'

Facing his 29th season with an amazingly similar situation, Coach Rupp reverts to unusual (for him) hedging when talking about prospects. "I was lucky once before in replacing a national championship crew with a bunch of sophomores, but times have changed," he points out. "Next year we will have even less experience than the other time, the schedule is tougher-particularly in our own conference, and we will be on the spot more than ever before."

It's probably more faith in the abil-"The Man in the Brown Suit," who has never experienced a losing campaign, than in the potential of the sophomore material he has to work with that prompts the unfounded expectation of another winner. But some claim that Rupp has corraled plenty of potentially dangerous talent, inexperienced as it may be.

Most of the new blood comes up from a yearling team that posted a 16-1 mark last season in competition with other frosh units and junior college teams. One of the best bets for starting duty and eventual stardom is 6-3 guard Bill Lickert, a schoolboy All-America from the University city of Lexington who had a 20.1 average as a freshman campaigner. Rupp classes him "a natural for our style of offense." And there's height, too, in the form of 6-8 Ned Jennings (tallest Wildcat since seven foot Bill Spivey), 6-4 Carroll Burchett, 6-3 Roger Newman, 6-4 Howard Dardeen and 6-4 Bobby Slusher.

The junior college material brought in to plug the all-important gaps at both guard posts includes 6-1 Sid Cohen from Kilgore's national junior college championship outfit and six foot Benny Coffman, a product of Kentucky's Lindsey-Wilson.

JAMES W. CAMMACK of the Kentucky Court of Appeals died on July 30 in New York City following an operation
Cammack was born March 10, 1902, in Owenton. He attended schools there and later went to Castle Heights Military Academy, Lebanon, Tenn., the University of Chicago, Peabody College in Nashville, and the University of Kentucky, He held master's and doctor's degrees from the University of Kentucky, received in 1929 and 1937.

After receiving his bachelor of law degree from the University of Kentucky, he was admitted to the bar in 1924.

Cammack taught school in Hardinsburg in 1924-25 and in Shelbyville before returning to Owenton to practice law with his father, the late James W. Cammack Sr.

The father was Kentucky's attorney general from 1928 to 1932.

Cammack entered state service in 1930 as director of research in the Department of Education.

Gov. Chandler named him to the appel-late bench in 1938 to fill a vacancy caused by a death. He had been in the court

by a death. He had been in the court since that time.

He served as chief justice of the court in 1851-1952, and was due to become chief justice again next year, by the system under which the position of chief justice is rotated among the seven members. His term would have expired in January, 1961. He is survived by four brothers, Edward Jackson Cammack, New York City; Floyd and Lawrence Cammack, Lexington, and Allen B. Cammack, Burlington, N. C., and two sisters, Mrs. Paul H. J. Gavis, Frankfort, and Mrs. J. C. Lumins, Richmond, Va.

MILIAM B. CRUTCHFIELD, 78, was killed Aug. 21 when he accidentally stepped in front of a freight train near his home in

Perguson.
Crutchfield had lived in Pulaski County for about 50 years, but was born and reared in Lexington. Hhe was a 1903-graduate of the University of Kentucky, and was a University English instructor at one time.
Survivors include a brother, J. H. Crutchfield Sr. and two nephews.

CCIL D. (ZEKE) FRENCH, 54, vice president of the Cothrum Murray Co., real estate investors, and a former Dallas, Tex., city councilman, died on July 20 at his home of a heart attack.

Born in Sherman County, Ore., and reared in Kentucky, Mr. French was graduated from the University of Kenteucky in 1925.

He moved to Dallas in 1945 where he first stablished a roofing factory for the Cer-lainteed Products Corp. In 1947 he set up his own company for distribution of power lose

He was a city councilman from 1951 to 1853 and became vice president of the Cothrum Murray Co. in 1956. Survivors are his wife; two sons, John and Robert French, both of Dallas; and his mother, Mrs. A. L. French of Grant's Pass, Ore.

John Robert Gillig, 41, associate of his father in John T. Gillip and Associates architectural firm, Lexington, died on Aug. I after a brief illness.

Antitrust activity was Stanley's specialty during his 12 years as a representative in Congress. He was a principal draftsman of the Clayton Anti-Trust Act.

His public service began in 1900 when he served as a Democratic presidential elector for William Jennings Bryan.

In 1902 he was elected to Congress from Kentucky's Second District on the Democratic ticket and served six terms.

Stanley left the House of Representatives March 4, 1915 and that same year was elected governor of Kentucky. He was elected governor of Kentucky. He was elected U.S. Senator in 1918.

During Stanley's term as governor he reorganized the administration of the University of Kentucky.

Stanley was born May 21, 1867 in Shelby-ville, Ky. He graduated from Centre College in 1889 and became a teacher.

He was admitted to the bar in 1894 and practiced at Flemingsburg for several years before moving to Henderson.

In 1907 he received an A.M. degree from UK and in 1916 an honorary LL.D. degree.

He quit the law in 1930 when President Herbert Hoover named him to the International Joint Commission, a group which handles U.S.-Canadian water boundary matters. He was nammed head of the U.S. section two years later but resigned in 1953.

He is survived by his wife, the former Sue Soaper of Henderson, Ky., and two sons, Augustus Jr., Arlington, Va., and william of Bethesda, Md. A third son, Marion, was killed in a 1932 plane crash in Lexington, Ky.

RICHARD PINDELL STOLL, 37, former Lexington city prosecuting attorney, died on Aug. 3 at his residence. He had been in ill health for several years.

Mr. Stoll was a native of Lexington, a son of the late Judge Richard C. and Angeline Chestnut Stoll. He attended the University School and the Lawrenceville School for Boys, Lawrenceville, N. J., and received his law degree from the University of Kentucky College of Law in 1944.


