More Kentuckians Support LGB T rights

Recent surveys reveal, anearly 20-point gain in support since 2004!

Just over 50 years ago, Kentucky became the civil rights leader in the South when it passed the 1960 Human Rights Act.

Since then, cities like Lexington, Louisville, and Covington have all worked tirelessly to honor this legacy by enacting fairness ordinances — laws that ensure everyone in our commonwealth has equal protection.

A recent poll shows us Kentuckians continue to believe that everyone should be afforded the opportunity to earn a living, put a roof over their heads, and have dinner at their favorite restaurant without being turned away just because someone doesn't like who they are.

83% of registered Kentucky voters agree that gay and transgender people should be protected from discrimination in the workplace, in housing, and in restaurants or other forms of public accommodations.

The survey results confirm what we hear in talking to our neighbors throughout the state – Kentuckians want to be fair but many have no idea that employers can legally fire people for being gay or transgender or deny them housing or service in a restaurant.

Public opinion has come a long way since the last available data in 2004, when only 65% of voters supported these same non-discrimination protections. And

while providing the same legal protections for gay couples as straight couples lags in the polls

currently 70% support compared to 63% in 2004 – Kentuckians believe in fairness for hardworking gay and transgender employees who simply want to earn a living and provide for their families, just like everybody else.

Reflections on Martin Luther King

As I began researching this topic on March 28th, we had the Supreme Court arguing over the legality of prop 8 and DOMA. You couldn't turn on any news channel without it being discussed. So I started thinking about what the Bible had to say about equality in general. One of my favorité verses addresses it, Galatians 3:26-29 "for you are all sons of God through faith in Christ Jesus. For as many of you as have been baptized into Christ have put on Christ like a garment. There is no Jew or Greek, slave or free, male or female; for you are all one in Christ Jesus. And if you belong to Christ, then you are Abraham's seed, heirs' according to the promise."

In my research I found this sermon given by Martin Luther King Jr in 1956 and I wanted to share a part of it with you as I think it was very cleverly written.

Delivered at Dexter Avenue Baptist Church, Montgomery, Alabama, on 4 November 1956. MLKP.

"I would like to share with you an imaginary letter from the pen of the Apostle Paul. The postmark reveals that it comes from the city of Ephesus. After opening the letter I discovered that it was written in Greek rather than English. At the top of the first page was this request: "Please read to your congregation as soon as possible, and then pass on to the other churches."

For several weeks I have worked assiduously with the translation. At times it has been difficult, but now I think I have deciphered its true meaning. May I hasten to say

that if in presenting this letter the contents sound strangely Kingian instead of Paulinian, attribute it to my lack of complete objectivity rather than Paul's lack of clarity.

It is miraculous, indeed, that the Apostle Paul should be writing a letter to you and to me nearly 1900 years after his last letter appeared in the New Testament. How this is possible is something of an enigma wrapped in mystery. The important thing, however, is that I can imagine the Apostle Paul writing a letter to American Christians in 1956 A.D. And here is the letter as it stands before me.

I, an apostle of Jesus Christ by the will of God, to you who are in America, Grace be unto you, and peace from God our Father, through our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

For many years I have longed to be able to come to see you. I have heard so much of you and of what you are doing. I have heard of the fascinating and astounding advances that you have made in the scientific realm. I have heard of your dashing subways and flashing airplanes. Through your scientific genius you have been able to dwarf distance and place time in chains. You have been able to carve highways through the stratosphere. So in your world you have made it possible to eat breakfast in New York City and dinner in Paris, France. I have also heard of your skyscraping buildings with their prodigious towers steeping heavenward. I have heard of your great medical advances, which have resulted in the curing of many dread plagues and diseases, and thereby prolonged your lives and made for greater security and physical well-being. All of that is marvelous. You can do so many things in your day that I could not do in the Greco-Roman world of

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In your age you can travel distances in one day that took me three months to travel. That is wonderful. You have made tremendous strides in the area of scientific and technological development.

But America, as I look at you from afar, I wonder whether your moral and spiritual progress has been commensurate with your scientific progress. It seems to me that your moral progress lags behind your scientific progress. Your poet Thoreau used to talk about "improved means to an unimproved end." How often this is true. You have allowed the material means by which you live to outdistance the spiritual ends for which you live.

You have allowed your mentality to outrun your morality. You have allowed your civilization to outdistance your culture. Through your scientific genius you have made of the world a neighbor to dwarf distance and place time in chains. You have been able

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upon you to live as Christians in the midst of an unChristian world. That is what I had to do. That is what every Christian has to do. But I understand that there are many Christians in America who give their ultimate allegiance to man-made systems and customs. They are afraid to be different. Their great concern is to be accepted socially. They live by some such principle as this: "everybody is doing it, so it must be alright." For so many of you Morality is merely group consensus. In your modern sociological lingo, the mores are accepted as the right ways. You have unconsciously come to believe that right is discovered by taking a sort of Gallup poll of the majority opinion. How many are giving their ultimate allegiance to this way.

But American Christians, I must say to you as I said to the Roman Christians years ago, "Be not conformed to this world, but be ye transformed by the renewing of your mind." Or, as I said to the Phillipian Christians, "Ye are a colony of heaven." This means that although you live in the colony of time, your ultimate allegiance is to the empire of eternity. You have a dual citizenry. You live both in time and eternity; both in heaven and earth. Therefore, your ultimate allegiance is not to the government, not to the state, not to nation, not to any man-made institution. The Christian owes his ultimate allegiance to God, and if any earthly institution conflicts with God's will it is your Christian duty to take a stand against it. You must never allow the transitory evanescent demands of man-made institutions to take precedence over the eternal demands of the Almighty God.

I understand that you have an economic system in America known as Capitalism. Through this economic system you have been able to do wonders. You have become the richest nation in the world, and you have built up the greatest system of production that history has ever known. All of this is marvelous. But Americans, there is the danger that you will misuse your Capitalism. I still contend that money can be the root of all evil. It can cause one to live a life of gross materialism.

I am afraid that many among you are more concerned about making a living than making a life. You are prone to judge the success of your profession by the index of your salary and the size of the wheel base on your automobile, rather than the quality of your service to humanity.

The misuse of Capitalism can also lead to tragic exploitation. This has so often happened in your nation. They tell me that one tenth of one percent of the population controls more than forty percent of the wealth. Oh America, how often have you taken necessities from the masses to give luxuries to the classes. If you are to be a truly Christian nation you must solve this problem. You cannot solve the problem by turning to communism, for communism is based on an ethical relativism and a metaphysical materialism that no Christian can accept. You can work within the framework of democracy to bring about a better distribution of wealth. You can use your powerful economic resources to wipe poverty from the face of the earth. God never intended for one group of people to live in superfluous inordinate wealth, while others live in abject deadening poverty. God intends for all of his children to have the basic necessities of life, and he has left in this universe "enough and to spare" for that purpose. So I call upon you to bridge the gulf between abject poverty and superfluous wealth.

I would that I could be with you in person, so that I could say to you face to face what I am forced to say to you in writing. Oh, how I long to share your fellowship.

Let me rush on to say something about the church. Americans, I must remind you, as I have said to so many others, that the church is the Body of Christ. So when the church is true to its nature it knows neither division nor disunity. But I am disturbed about what you are doing to the Body of Christ. They tell me that in America you have within Protestantism more than two hundred and fifty six denominations. The tragedy is not so much that you have such a

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multiplicity of denominations, but that most of them are warring against each other with a claim to absolute truth. This narrow sectarianism is destroying the unity of the Body of Christ. You must come to see that God is neither a Baptist nor a Methodist; He is neither a Presbyterian nor a Episcopalian. God is bigger than all of our denominations. If you are to be true witnesses for Christ, you must come to see that America.

But I must not stop with a criticism of Protestantism. I am disturbed about Roman Catholicism. This stands before the world with its pomp and power, insisting that it possesses the only truth. It incorporates an arrogance that becomes a dangerous spiritual arrogance. It stands with its noble Pope who somehow rises to the miraculous heights of infallibility when he speaks ex cathedra. But I am disturbed about a person or an institution that claims infallibility in this world. I am disturbed about any church that refuses to cooperate with other churches under the pretense that it is the only true church. I must emphasize the fact that God is not a Roman Catholic, and that the boundless sweep of his revelation cannot be limited to the Vatican. Roman Catholicism must do a great deal to mend its ways.

There is another thing that disturbs me to no end about the American church. You have a white church and you have a Negro church. You have allowed segregation to creep into the doors of the church. How can such a division exist in the true Body of Christ? You must face the tragic fact that when you stand at 11:00 on Sunday morning to sing "All Hail the Power of Jesus Name" and "Dear Lord and Father of all Mankind," you stand in the most segregated hour of Christian America. They tell me that there is more integration in the entertaining world and other secular agencies than there is in the Christian church. How appalling that is.

I understand that there are Christians among you who try to justify segregation on the basis of the Bible. They argue that the Negro is inferior by nature because of Noah's curse upon the children of Ham. Oh my friends, this is blasphemy. This is against everything that the Christian religion stands for. I must say to you as I have said to so many Christians before, that in Christ "there is neither Jew nor Gentile, there is neither bond nor free, there is neither male nor female, for we are all one in Christ Jesus' Moreover, I must reiterate the words that I uttered on Mars Hill: "God that made the world and all things therein . . hath made of one blood all nations of men for to dwell on all the face of the earth."

Berea Passes Fairness Ordinance

The Berea Citizen and Richmond Register newspapers report Berea Mayor Steve Connelly has signed an executive order which not only amended the city workforce's non-discrimination policy to include lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender workers, but also extended domestic partner benefits to its employees. mayor Connelly's move makes Berea, home of one of the region's most famous and beautiful college campuses, the third Kentucky city to extend domestic partner benefits alongside Covington and Louisville.

Though enacted by executive order, the benefits and non-discrimination policy could have been opposed by city council objections or a nullifying ordinance, none of which were raised. According to the executive order, couples eligible for the benefits must share the same residence for at least the previous 12 months and be financially interdependent.

Mayor Connelly's movements toward Fairness follows nearly two years of organizing and public education efforts by Bereans for Fairness, a grassroots movement of residents supported by the Fairness Coalition of Kentucky. Following his state of the city address in February, mayor Connelly stated that extending protections was the "right thing to do," adding gay, lesbian, bi and trans civil rights is "an his-

torical trend and I would rather Berea be a leader rather than a latecomer."

The city has yet to move on an anti-discrimination Fairness law, which would prohibit discrimination in employment, housing and public accommodations citywide, though the council recreated its Human Rights Commission in 2011 to investigate the issue and make recommendations to the city.

Consider Becoming Smoke-free?

The Lexington-Fayette County Health Department will be offering one of the first tobacco cessation programs in KY specifically for LGBT participants. The class will be held in Lexington beginning in July 2013, final date and location to be announced soon. If you are interested in becoming tobacco free, or want information for a LGBT friend or family member who smokes, please call (859) 288-2457. The pilot project is being funded by the KY Office of Health Equity and the KY HIV/AIDS program, and will be provided without charge, and includes nicotine replacement products.

Kentucky consistently has one of the nation's highest adult smoking rates. Recent statewide estimates range from 25-29%, and vary sharply between regions in KY. The adult smoking rate for the general U.S. population is around 19%. Data are very limited, but show that tobacco use is high in the LGBT community.

KY's LGBT smoking rate is not really known, but is likely higher than other states because the overall adult smoking rate is higher. LGBT adults may be up to 2.5 times more likely to smoke than heterosexual individuals of similar age and ethnicity.

This lack of information is created in part by the fact that surveys used to collect data on individual tobacco use do not typically ask about sexual orientation. There is also much concern over smoking rates for young LGBT and the lack of information about their tobacco use.

The few studies that have been done show that 18-year-old gay men may be as much as 80% more likely to smoke than heterosexual men of the same age. Information

gathered from bisexual individuals is even more scarce.

The tobacco industry has a history of targeting members of the LGBT community, whether through sponsoring LGBT events or depictions in media and entertainment. Stress in a major reason people say they continue to smoke or cannot stop. Smoking is the only effective way many smokers have to deal with stress. The chronic stress of coming out to friends and family, dealing daily with discrimination, and a lack of LGBT-friendly healthcare providers can make it very hard to stop smoking. Members of the LGBT community are less likely to have health insurance or access to quality care and providers who can help them quit. Use of tobacco creates grave health dangers, and sharply increases a person's risk for heart and lung disease and many types of cancer. Smoking can also make any kind of medicine, but especially HIV treatment options, not as effective.

The popularity of the bar and club scene in the LGBT community may contribute to higher smoking rates, especially in counties without tobacco-free ordinances. strong Being surrounded by tobacco and tobacco users can make it much more difficult to stop, and very easy to start. While certainly not everyone from the LGBT frequents bars and clubs, the limited data that public health researchers have collected show that LGBT, especially young gay men, do spend more time there than their heterosexual counterparts.

There are not many resources available to LGBT who want to stop smoking. Giving up tobacco is not something a person should do without help. Quitting "cold turkey" only has around a 5% success rate, while programs that provide social support, nicotine replacement products (patches, lozenges, or gum), and education can increase that number to 30-50%.




