## INFORMATION FROM THE PRESERVATION COMMITTEE

High-volume binding for publishers is much different than that of just a decade ago. Publishers and book manufacturers alike are caught in a tight squeeze of high material and labor costs in an intensified competitive market.

Most publishers now use the least expensive colored Kraft papers for their hardcover bindings. A decade ago, most book papers used to be free of groundwood pulp. Today, the trend is away from high-quality paper to cheaper grades and lighter basic weights.


