Firefighters relieve New York

'I couldn't say enough about the people there if I spoke for 3 days'

"I've seen death at fires, and I've seen the turmoil it ises the family. But there's nothing compared to New

"I've seen death at fires, and I've seen the turmoil it causes the family. But there's nothing compared to New York."

These words, uttered in the company of tears, are the words of a Lexington family man: a father of three sons, including a former UK student; a husband; a fire-flighter for 22 years.

Ray Salisman is a man who was determined to help New York City after the worst terrorist attack on American soil, and he and two retired Lexington fireflighters resolved to represent Lexington with assistance in the city that never sleeps.

Salisman and his friends packed up at midnight on Sept. 25.

They drove from their peaceful suburban neighborhoods, lined with baskethall hoops and picket fences, to the latest wonder of the world, a gigantic pile of dust, steel and ashes of the fathers, mothers and best friends who were killed on Sept. 11.
Tears swell up in Salsman's blue eyes whenever he discusses what he saw that week. He has walked on the edge of death, chased fire on a foot-wide ledge and run through a tunnel of flames, but the pain in the memories of this trip burn fresh in his mind unlike any pain he has battled before.
It was only by luck that the men were able to enter the version of hell called Ground Zero. A Prooklyn marcotics detective spotted Salsman, dressed in a Lexington Fire Department shirt, on the street and used his power to get them in.

After passing through security, they found themselves in a place Salsman said is incomparable to any-thine claes. Dense were scouring the area looking for bod-

As of Wednesday evening, test results to identify the powder con-

tained in the letter, that made three people ill, were not available.

While officials have not yet ruled out any connections, they said this was probably similar to a Nigerian hoax letter. Police say they have been seeing these for years.

Police have picked up each of these letters and are storing them as potentially hazardous material. Fire Chief William Hollerman said these letters are not being tested.

"We will keep the letters and contact the proper authorities," he said.

At this time, none of the officials had spoken with the FBI about these incidents.

Round of budget cuts could go deep

Round of budget cuts could go deep FRANKPORT — Forecasters slashed another \$171 million from the state's General Fund estimate this year, which will prompt another round of budget cuts that could hit education. And the preliminary forecasts for the coming two years will mean a spare cupboard for the General Assembly's budget-makers. The Consensus Forecasting Group's revision means total cuts from the spending plan first put together by the 2000 legislature will approach \$500 million, the largest shortfall in a decade. Budget director James Ramsey said actual spending cuts could be greater because some revenue receipts have to be shared with local governments.

U.S. planes have dropped about 100,000 packets of Tara peanut butter over Afghanistan since Sunday, when airstrikes began against military targets in that country. The military said the drops are designed to ensure people who have been cut off from aid normally provided by international organizations do not go hungry.

least 18 inches high to prohibit lap or table dancing. The ordinance won't go into effect until it is
signed by Mayor Dave Armstrong. A lawyer for

said. "But only as a precaution."

network, and will run at least four weeks, possibly longer. The first spot was timed to coincide
with Wednesday night's airing of "Hate in the

MTV's new weekly documentary series, "Criminal." right. 
Reagan, the longest living president

LOS ANGELES — Ronald Reagan on Thursday will have lived longer than any other U.S.
president — 33.120 days — eclipsing the record held by the nation's second chief executive John Adams. Reagan, 90, who occupied the White House from 1981 to 1989, was born Feb. 6, 1911. "Time passes so quickly," former first lady Nancy Reagan said Wednesday. "These days, especially, we should remember how preclous life is and how important it is to cherish every moment." The nation's 40th president is in the advanced stages of Alzheimer's disease and there has been no change in his condition, Reagan chief of staff Joanne Drake said.

Bombing to target mobile targets

Bombing to target mobile targets
WASHINGTON — As U.S. warplanes shift
from fixed targets in Afghanistan to bombing
more mobile targets such as troop convoys, helicopter-borne special forces teams are poised for
what is likely to be a prominent role in the next
phase of attacks. Special forces "will have a significant role in all the areas they are trained to
perform in," said Army Col. Bill Darley, a
spokesman for U.S. Special Operations Command. The next phase of the U.S. strikes could
include raids by small groups of Army Special
Forces soldiers ferried in by low-flying helicopters to rout out terrorist or Taliban leaders,
military analysts say.

where are all the people," Salsman said. "There was nobody. There was just dust." More than 5,000 casualties are
expected from the attack.

Salsman said the city was totally altered, from the
people and the inches of dust on buildings to the atmosphere in general.

"It just wasn't New York," he said.

During his stay at Ground Zero, where the men unloaded supply trucks and handed out respirators, helmets
and hand tools, Salsman met a man who had conquered
the unimaginable — he had survived the fall of the World
Trade Center as it collapsed right above him.

Tommy Spinard of Engine No. 7 in New York was the
driver of the truck that took his crew to the South Tower.
While the other men entered the tower, Spinard stayed
back to finish getting his equipment.

When the tower collapsed, he stood behind the column of a nearly building and dodged the debris as it fell
on top of him. His crew perished in the tower, and the
fire truck they traveled in is now two feet high, reaching
just above his knees.

While these letters tend to
be reported from businesses, individuals may receive them as
well. Those who receive usupicious letters should not be
afraid to report them.

"We are not discounting
concern over any letters. To be
careful, we are picking up letters and storing them, if citizens call us," said Fire Major
Bart Powell.

Hollerman stressed that
people should practice practical
safety procedures.

While there is no immediate danger to Lexington citizens, Hollerman said. "Everyone should be more concerned
than before. We are a nation of



Jets, explosions hit Afghanistan capital

Retaliation: Raids continue on Kabul, Taliban says bin Laden still safe



Law loopholes costing lives

There is an old comic strip where Garfield is speaking to the reader and says the veterinarian told him to eat carrots. The next frame has Garfield standing next to a carrot cake with a big grin exclaiming. "Leopheld" claiming, "Loophole!

In a similar vein, hundreds of people charged with driving under the influence have been able to delay prosecution due to a backlog in requests for blood-alcohol tests. In some cases, judges are even dismissing the cases.

The problem is a combination of both the backlog of tests and a 1991 law urging judges to settle DUI cases within 90 days of

the arrest.

Because of these delays, people who should either have their licenses revoked or be put in jail are instead driving down Nicholasville Road right alongside the rest of us. Instead of changing their ways, they are changing lanes.

Technicalities are a part of the legal system, as well they should be. Restraints are placed on officers all the time to make police work eligibly.

slightly less arbitrary. This issue of test delays, however, has no bearing on the quality of police work or even the quality of our

bearing on the quality of police work or even the quality of our legal system.

It is a simply a loophole caused by understaffing at the toxicology lab, and for that there is no excuse.

Many judges have attempted to resolve the matter by threatening contempt of court charges against the lab technicians. So, the person who threatened the lives of Kentucky motorists goes home while lab technicians doing their jobs go to jail. That makes sense.

In reality, the 90-day rule is not apt for this situation. It was put in place with good intentions—to pred along counties with better

in place with good intentions—to prod along counties with historically long trial periods for DUIs—but, as good intentions often do, turned out to be bad law.

Unfortunately, bad laws are much easier to pass than to fix. The General Assembly has yet to resolve the issue, and Kentucky will see more and more cases dismissed as a result, even when the tests come back above the legal limit.





Affred Nobel, the Swedish industrialist and inventor of dynamite, offered only vague guidance about the prizes in his will. The awards always are handed out on Dec. 10, the anniversary of Nobel's death in 1896.

Drug similar to marijuana may protect brain

Could a drug similar to the active ingredient in marijuana protect your brain?

Research at the Hebrew University in Israel, reported in the journal Nature , shows that a cannabinoid, similar to the active ingredient found in marijuana and produced in the brains of many animals, protects mice from brain injury.

Mice that sustained brain injuries were discovered to have elevated levels of a compound known as 2-Arachodonoyl glycerol, or 2-AG. Theorizing that this cannabinoid was produced to prevent damage, the researchers administered more of the compound to injured mice and found it protected the brain.

Currently, there is no effective drug for the treatment of traumatic brain injury. In the U.S., there are nearly 52,000 deaths and roughly 80,000 cases of severe disability related to

traumatic brain injury even;

far greater than those for multiple sclerosis, Parkinson's disease and Alzheimer's disease.
"Brain injury is not a oneshot deal. The primary injury
occurs from the initial hit. Neurochemical injuries can cause
secondary damage, said br.
Ken Strauss of Temple University.

secondary damage, said Driver-sity. The secondary effects of brain injuries, such as swelling and the release of toxic chemi-cals, can be more damaging than the initial blow, said Dr. Esther Shohami, lead author of the study.

The cannabinoid, 2-AG, is believed to work in three ways. First, it reduces the levels of glutamate, a toxic molecule, re-leased after injury, Second, it decreases the amount of free radicals and TNF (a chemical

that induces inflammation) after injury. Third, it increases the blood supply to the brain. All three mechanisms are essential for limiting the damage done after the primary injury.

"The dose has to be very carefully controlled," Dr. Shohami said — noting that requirement is one of a number of reasons why marjuana, which can vary in potency, would likely be an unreliable treatment for head injuries.

She added that 2-AG must be administered within a four-to six-hour window after the injury to be effective.

Although 2-AG has only been tested on animals, Dr. Shohami said she didn't "see any problems with using a drug from this family to treat parients." Other cannabinoids have been approved for use in humans, such as synthetic forms of THC used to stimulate appetite.

In fact, one pharmaceutical company is trying to develop a

similar drug for humans. With the help of researchers at the Hebrew University, Pharmos is set to begin the final stage of clinical trials of Dexanabinol — a drug that is essentially the mirror image of THC, the active ingredient in marijuana. Because it is not exactly like THC, it does not bind to the same part of the brain, and therefore does not have the unwanted side effects.

However, the drug appears to exert effects similar to other cannabinoids on the brain after in toxic chemicals and swelling. The first two phases of clinical trials were completed in Israel to test for safety. The third and final phase of the trials is set to test for safety. The third and final phase of the trials is the Us.


"Helmets are for preventing primary injury, and hopefully this work can protect people from the secondary effects," Strauss said.
