The University of Kentucky is greatly concerned about the Veteran Aid Bill now before Congress. The Faculty of the University earnestly requests you to support the Barden Bill, H.R. 3846, which provides for the use of existing educational agencies and institutions in carrying out the educational program for veterans. We are convinced that the educational provisions of the Clark and Rankin Bills would, if enacted into law, constitute a serious threat to the existing state and local control of education. We believe that the Barden Bill, which makes provision for state supervisory committees, for state selection of institutions, and for the administration of the veterans' program through the state educational agencies is fundamentally sound and should receive the support of the Congress of the United States.

Dean Taylor's original motion was amended to provide that the statement be sent to all Kentucky Congressmen, and the Secretary was instructed to carry out the wishes of the Faculty in this respect.

President Donovan introduced to the Faculty Mr. William R. Embry, the newly elected President of the Student Government Association, and by virtue of that office a member of the Faculty.

This list had been carefully checked by the Registrars Office and by the respective deans of the colleges, and had been approved by the latter. The list was approved by the Faculty and the candidates recommended to the Board of Trustees for the degrees indicated

Prof. R. G. Lunde submitted to the Faculty a recommendation from the Rules Committee, covering the classification and scholarship requirements of student organizations, and proposing a procedure for the better evaluation and direction of student organizations and their activities. As a result of the discussion of this report, certain amendments were made. The more important of these dealt with the addition of the Accounting Club and the Secretarial Club to the list of approved student organizations, and the reinstatement of Lamp and Cross, Lances, and Keys, as leadership societies. As finally amended and approved, the complete report of the Rules Committee follows:

Minutes of the University Faculty - May 31, 1944

The following is the report on the recommendations concerning University Organizations which were submitted by the College of Arts and Sciences to the University Faculty and referred to the Rules Committee.

The report is divided into four parts:

- I. A statement of the present rules X Student Campus Activities and XI Social Life (Sections of the rules which are not to be altered in any way by the recommended changes are listed only by their titles.)
- II. The new rules with the proposed changes and recommendations.
- III. Additional recommendations.
- IV. Suggestions concerning Student Organizations.

Part I. The Present Rules are as Follows:

X. Student Campus Activities

Participation in Intercollegiate Athletics (no changes)

A student who is on probation is not eligible to participate in activities such as the following: Membership on staffs of publications; offices, committees, and the legislature of the Student Government Association; fraternity, sorority, club, and society offices; military andband sponsorships; cheer leading; managership of intercollegiate athletics teams and intramural sports; U. K. Troupers; Women's Athletic Association offices; musical and radio grants in aid; folk dancing club; musical, dramatic and forensic organizations; and sotke judging teams. The list of activities affected by this rule is subject to revision by the University Faculty at any time.

In activities extending through the year, a student who has been eligible to participate during one quarter may be allowed to continue during the next quarter regardless of probation, if, in the view of the faculty adviser and the dean concerned, he is deemed essential to the successful functioning of the activity, and it seems probable that he will succeed in removing his probation.

At any time the dean of the college in which a student is enrolled may declare the student ineligible because of failure in current class work. At any time the Dean of Women or the Dean of Men may declare a student ineligible, whose participation in an activity is judged to be detrimental to the student, the organization, or the University.

A student with an I or X at the time of the opening of the fall quarter may have the privilege of removing that mark any time up to and including the close of the registration period, and have the quarter grade considered as completed during the previous quarter or term.

This applies to participation in all activities, including athletics.

The University Faculty will prepare a list of the faculty members who act as advisers for the various activities included in the above statement. A faculty adviser is required to present to the dean concerned the names of students proposing to engage in the activity before proceeding. The Registrar will examine these lists and issue certificates of eligibility for those who are allowed to participate.

Student organizations are required to have faculty advisers. By accepting appointment as faculty adviser for a student organization, the person appointed agrees to maintain contact with the student organization to such a degree as to be familiar with its programs and personnel, having in mind not only the objectives of the particular group but also the responsibility of the University as a whole to the people of Kentucky.

The faculty adviser, the president of the organization, and the student, himself, shall be held responsible for the student's participation while ineligible.

Eligibility for Initiation into a Social Fraternity or Sorority.

For initiation into a social fraternity or sorority, a student must be free from probation and must have gained a standing of 1.0 or more in the preceding quarter's work in the case of a man or non-freshman woman, and in the preceding two quarters' work in the case of a freshman woman.

A fraternity or sorority must obtain a certificate of approval before initiating any student. Certificates are issued by the Dean of Men for men and the Dean of Women for women.

Undergraduates who are special students or matriculate in a short course of study are not eligible to membership in a fraternity or sorority.

Deposit of Student Organizations Funds (no changes)

New Student Organizations

All petitions for new student organizations shall be submitted to the University Faculty.

Each petition to form a new organization must be accompanied by a copy of the constitution, charter, by-laws, or, in the absence of these, by a statement of the purpose of the organization, qualifications for membership, and the financial obligations of members.

Petitions for permission to form new organizations must not include the name of any student on probation.

Other Regulations

Permission for all camping parties held during the academic year must be obtained from the Dean of Men for men's parties and from the Dean of Women for women's parties and from both deans for mixed parties. In all parties where there are women, chaperons acceptable to the Dean of Women must be provided.

Women students residing in the residence halls, sorority houses, cooperative houses, and boarding houses are not permitted to go on camping parties that remain overnight or to swim in the river or any pool outside of Lexington except upon the request in writing of their parents or guardian and the pproval of the Dean of Women.

No society or association may be organized among the students of the University without permission of the Faculty of the University.

Student organizations are required to have faculty advisers. By accepting appointment as a faculty adviser for a student organization, the faculty member, having in mind not only the objectives of the particular group but also the welfare of the University, agrees (1) to be familiar with its program and personnel, (2) to see that the organization advertises itself in The Kentucky Kernel only in the classification approved by the University Faculty, (3) and to see that the announced rules of the organization and all faculty rules respecting student organizations are observed.

There shall be a standing committee of the University Faculty on Student Organizations to be composed of five members. It shall be the duty of this committee to maintain a check on the observance of the Faculty's regulations with respect to student organizations, to make reports of violations of these regulations to the University Faculty, and to recommend from time to time appropriate Faculty action.

Each fall the Secretary of the Faculty shall prepare for that body and for the use of its Committee on Student Organizations a classified list of all student organizations and their respective advisers.

Classification of Student Organizations.

- A. Student organizations shall be classified and these classifications defined, together with the minimum standing of eligibility for each, as follows:
 - 1. Honor Society: an association which bases eligibility and election to membership primarily upon the attainment of a high standard of scholarship. The minimum total University standing for eligibility at the time of election is 2.0.
 - 2. Leadership Society: an association which bases eligibility and election to membership primarily upon leadership attainment in student activities. The minimum total University standing for eligibility at the time of election is 1.4.
 - 3. Recognition Society: an association which bases membership on the recognition of achievement in a given department or special field of interest. The minimum total University standing at the time of election is 1.7.
 - 4. Professional Society: an association which limits its membership to a specific field of professional or vocational education and which organizes its group life specifically to promote professional competency within its field. The minimum total University standing for eligibility is 1.0.
 - 5. Social Fraternity and Sorority: a group which usually maintains a house and places dominant emphasis on the social life of its members. (Standing requirement is covered by the rule Eligibility for Initiation into a Social Fraternity or Sorority.)
 - 6. A Club or Society: an association which is open to all who express an interest in the objectives of the organization.
 - 7. Administrative and Service Organizations: (No definition is necessary. Covered by rule Participation in Campus Activities (p. 14).

Standing is based on the total University standing of all hours of work attempted at the time of initiation.

The enforcement of the scholarship requirements outlined above shall be governed by the same regulations as those applying to Participation in Campus Activities. (pp. 14-15)

Eligibility for Initiation into a Social Fraternity or Sorority

University fraternities and sororities are subject to regulations adopted by the University Faculty and all students who contemplate connecting themselves with such organizations as well as those who are members should inform themselves in regard to these regulations which may be obtained from the Dean of Men or the Dean of Women.

For initiation into a social fraternity or sorerity, a student must be free from probation and must have gained a standing of 1.0 or more in the preceding quarter's work in the case of a man or non-freshman woman, and in the preceding two quarters' work in the case of a freshman woman.

A fraternity or sorority must obtain a certificate of approval before initiating any student. Certificates are issued by the Dean of Men for men and the Dean of Women for women.

Undergraduates who are special students or matriculate in a short course of study are not eligible to membership in a fratemity or sorority.

All funds collected by student organizations are to be deposited with the Comptroller of the University as soon as possible after they are collected, and these funds shall be disbursed by the Comptroller on order of the officers of the organizations and the faculty advisers.

A list of organizations to which this rule applies will be made by the Faculty of the University.

New Student Organizations

All petitions for new student organizations shall be submitted to the University Faculty. No student organizations may be formed in the University without the permission of the University Faculty, and no change in the character of the regulations of such organizations may be made without the approval of the University Faculty.

Each petition to form a new organization must be accompanied by a copy of the constitution, charter, by-laws, or, in the absence of these, by a statement of the purpose of the organization, qualifications for membership, the financial obligations of members, and its classification.

Petitions for permission to form new organizations must not include the name of any student on probation.

XI. Social Life

Adoption of general policies and regulations covering the supervision and control of student social life is the function of the University Faculty. Subject to the regulations of the Board of Trustees and the rules of the University Faculty, the social and activities program of the University shall be arranged and supervised by the University Social Committee.

The University Social Committee shall be an administrative committee of faculty members and students appointed by the President of the University. The committee shall include on its membership the Dean of Men and the Dean of Women, one of whom shall be designated as chairman by the President of the University, and at least one representative of each such major student groups as the Student Government Association, the Student Union Board, the House Presidents Council of Women Students, and the Men's Residence Halls.

It shall be the function of this committee to organize and publicize the social program for the entire University community, with a view to proper limitations on all organizations and groups, to the avoidance of conflicts, and in general to serving the best interests of the institution. It shall be the further duty of the committee to prepare a complete activities calendar for the University and to give this such advance publicity as may be necessary to avoid conflicts. This calendar shall include all social events, meeting of faculty and student groups, convocations, and all other meetings of events held on the University campus or under University auspices.

Minutes of the University Faculty - May 31, 1944

The responsibility for administering the rules of the Board of Trustees and the policies and regulations of the University Faculty respecting social life, except as delegated to the University Social Committee, shall be assigned to the Dean of Men and the Dean of Women.

Subject to the regulations of the Board of Trustees and the rules of the University Faculty, the Student Government Association, the Kentucky Student Union, and the House President's Council of Women Students are authorized to function under their respective constitutions as approved by the University Faculty. All amendments to the constitution of these three organizations must be approved by the University Faculty before becoming effective.

General Rules

- the students shall be simple, free from ostentatious display, and inexpensive, and so far as possible, that they shall be held on the University campus.
- 2. Except as special permission may be given by the Social Committee, night functions shall close on Monday through Thursday at 10:30 p.m., and on Friday at 11:00 p.m. Saturday night functions shall close at midnight. These regulations apply to all student functions whether on or off the campus.
- 3. Dances shall be on Friday or Saturday afternoons or evenings, or on the evenings of the day before a legal holiday, or on a legal holiday, or at such other times as may be approved by the Social Committee. In every case, permission to hold a dance shall be obtained from the Social Committee.
- 4. At the beginning of each college year, all organizations which hold regular meetings shall register their meeting dates with the Social Committee. The committee is to be notified of any changes of program. Meetings of these organizations shall not rank as social functions. However, the closing hours for social functions shall be observed.
- 5. All social affairs in which both men and women participate shall be properly chaperoned. Not later than five days prior to the event, the names of the chaperons who have accepted the invitation and of the committee in charge, shall be listed with the Dean of Women. A signed form of approval shall then be issued to the organization by the Dean of Women. If this is not submitted by the time specified, the event may be cancelled.
- 6. Permission to give off-campus dances must be obtained from the Social Committee and acceptable chaperons provided.
- 7. Permission for formal social functions will be granted only to organizations which meet their financial obligations promptly and which make their financial reports according to University ruling.
- 8. When men and women are both included at any social function at any organized residence, the housemother must be present. A house

dance shall be classified as a social function and chaperonage, approved by the Dean of Women, shall be provided as in Section 5.

All social regulations are in force from the first day of registration in September to Commencement Day in June, inclusive. In so far as compatible, these regulations shall apply during the summer quarter.

University Approval of Houses and Residences

All contracts for renting or purchasing club houses and proposed locations for such houses, must be submitted to the Comptroller who shall obtain the approval of the Dean of Men or Dean of Women before any contract is closed.

The selection of housemothers for all fraternity and sorority houses must be approved by the Dean of Men for fraternities and the Dean of Women for sororities. The fraternities and sororities may, however, submit names for the Dean's approval.

Women of the freshman class, excepting those living at home and those given special permission by the Dean of Women, must reside in the University residence halls.

Each woman student who desires to reside outside of the residence units supervised by the University must receive the consent of the Dean of Women. This does not apply to those living at home.

Other Regulations

Permission for all camping parties held during the academic year must be obtained from the Dean of Men for men's parties and from the Dean of Women for women's parties and from both deans for mixed parties. In all parties where there are women, chaperons acceptable to the Dean of Women must be provided.

Women students residing in the residence halls, sorority houses, cooperative houses, and boarding houses are not permitted to go on camping parties that remain overnight or to swim in the river or any pool outside of Lexington except upon the request in writing of their parents or guardian and the approval of the Dean of Women.

Part III. Recommendations

- 1. Repeal the rule <u>Fraternities and Sororities</u>. This part of the rule constitutes the old classification of student organizations which will be replaced by the new rule.
- 2. Repeal the last paragraph of the section Other Regulations of rule XI. It duplicates the first paragraph of the rule New Student Organizations.
- 3. Organizations discontinued.

The Committee recommends that Delta Sigma Chi (Journalism - men), Omega Beta Pi (Pre-medical) and Phi Epsilon Phi (Botany), be discontinued, with the understanding that any person or

persons interested may petition the University Faculty for the re-establishment of any of them. (The last three named have been inactive for years but havenever been officially discontinued by the University Faculty.)

Any funds or securities owned by any of the above associations shall be disposed of in accordance with the wishes of a committee composed of the last accredited officers, if available, the adviser, the dean concerned, and the comptroller of the University.

Decogora bas Part IV. Suggestions

- It is suggested to all colleges and departments within the University that they study their particular organizations carefully, having in mind such matters as the costs assessed the students and the services rendered to the students and to the University.
- 2. It is suggested that each organization should justify its existence by carrying out a program for the interests of the students and of the University, that program to be subject to periodic review.
 - 3. It is suggested that clubs, societies, and other purely local organizations refrain from using Greek letter words in the names of such organizations.

President Donovan presented Dr. William Clayton Bower, as temporary Professor of Sociology.

President Donovan called attention to the fact that it would be necessary to hold another election late in the summer, or early in the fall, to fill vacancies that would occur in the membership of the Faculty. Dean Wiest, as Chairman of the Faculty Committee on Election, indicated that the matter would be cared for.

Professor R. G. Lunde, in his capacity of Chairman of the Rules Committee, read the following communication to the Faculty:

"The Rules Committee is aware that the University Faculty has no precedure for the effective evaluation of new courses and changes in courses. It desires to call to the attention of the

University Faculty this lack and offers to consider the problem - if the Faculty so desires."

On motion made and duly seconded, the Faculty voted to refer the question of the evaluation of new courses and changes in courses to the Rules Committee.

Minutes of the University Faculty August 21, 1944

The University Faculty met in the Assembly Room of Lafferty Hall Monday, August 21, at 3:00 p.m. President Donovan presided. Members absent from the meeting were A. E. Bigge, E. F. Farquhar, W. F. Gallaway, H. H. Downing, O. T. Koppius, L. L. Quill, H. N. Sherwood, W. B. Hamilton, M. M. White, Bernie Shively, L. A. Bradford, W. P. Garrigus, H. B. Price, Statie Erikson, E. A. Bureau, Perry West, F. H. Randall, Maurice Seay, L. H. Carter, Thomas P. Cooper, James H. Graham, William S. Taylor, Sarah B. Holmes, Margaret King, and W. E. Embry.

The minutes of May 31 were read and approved.

The Registrar read to the Faculty the following statement concerning credit for the War Training Service of the Civil Aeronautics Authority, offered at the University of Kentucky:

In the fall of 1941 there was initiated at the University a program of studies known as the Civilian Pilot Training Course of the Civil Aeronautics Authority. Some time after the initiation of this work, the Faculty of the University approved six quarter hours of credit for approximately 72 clock hours of work. The course was continued in this form until July, 1942, when it beceme the War Training Service of the Civil Aeronautics Authority and was extended to cover a total of 240 hours of instruction. No decision was ever been made as to the amount of credit to be assigned for this extended program, which included hours of instruction as follows:

Mathematics 36 Physics 30 Civil Air Regulations 16 Aircraft Identification 12 Navigation 36 Meteorology 24

Radio 20 Military and Physical Training 56

We are now receiving requests for transcripts of credit covering this work, and it is necessary that some decision be made about it. After going over the syllabi and the curricula very carefully with Professor David M. Young, who was the coordinator of the program, and with Dean Boyd, the Registrar's Office is recommending to the Faculty the approval of ten quarter hours of credit for this course, to be recorded as CAR War Training Service. The Faculty voted approval of
