To review several specific instances, let us first investigate the case of the Men's Student Council. It was not so long ago that this Council. elected by student votes directly, not appointed by University officials, made a considerable contribution to the successful administration of suddent activities. This is not always true now! Why? Let the student body turn to an examination of its own record for the answer. Year after year, with selection of Student Council members left entirely in the hands of the students, the elections became more and more a cil members left emirely in the hands of the students the elections became more and more a campus political racket, with chosen members representing not the student body or its interests, but the interests of the particular clique which had used most campus political coercion-called strategy, to elect them. Year after year, with various members of the clique demanding representation (and accompanying spoils), the quality of the men selected deteriorated, until the entire Council became a mere figurehead, with its members sitting smugly, content with their "position" on the campus, but with no desire to perform service to the student body. In an attempt to obtain men who might have more interest in campus affairs, and who might have more knowledge of the existing problems, it became necessary for the administration to step in and appoint a Council. In addition, manipulation of student funds by former Councils made it necessary to place emphasis upon advisory activities of the Council. There is no doubt where the fault lies.

As a second example, a short discussion and investigation of campus publications brings interesting results. Here, too, is found the finger prints of the campus politician. One finds that changes in election technique occurred when serious violations had taken place. In one case students from other schools were imported to carry an election of the clior and business manager of The Kentuckian. Another case reveals a student publications committee proving their insincerity of purpose when they awarded contracts for printing and engraving, not to the lowest bidder, but to a company which, it was fairly certain, had done some "palm greasing," If students have suffered any loss here, then who is the sindess one who will cast the first stone?
