Dear Colored,

Enclosed find petition signed by the County Judge and all the Justices who were present at court in relation to a bill introduced by you at the request of Judge Steele, for the payment of some of "the negro Tax money" to various negro schools taught last year. — The petition was very hastily and most inartistically drawn, but enough can be collected from it to see that the court are unanimously opposed to the passage of the bill.

From all the information we can gather on the subject, it appears that the schools in question were established by and were under the control of the "Freemans Bureau"

and that the teachers were women imported by him from Lexington and paid \$15<sup>00</sup> per month by the Government, — the negro parents made up an additional \$5<sup>00</sup> per month and boarded the women. — When the schools were established the negroes made no attempt to bring themselves within the provisions of the school laws but preferred proceeding under the Bureau.

The County Court have to-day made provisions for having free negro schools taught in various parts of the County and wish to and will reserve a sufficient fund out of the "negro money" for that purpose, but they are unwilling to be compelled to pay \$385<sup>00</sup> (which we hear is the amount embraced in the bill) to these "Bureau" negro women who have already been overpaid for their services. We don't know (nor could we learn to-day) the exact provisions of the bill, but the Court seems opposed to any legislation in regard to their duties under school laws — Court is in session, and please advise us when the ad valorem tax bill will be passed through

The senate - You must really excuse
