WASHINGTON — In charge and eager to begin, leaders of the new Republican majorities in the House and Senate sketched a conservative agenda yesterday including a balanced budget amendment and term limits for lawmakers.

A tax cut, welfare reform, crime legislation and health reform also are likely to be addressed in the 104th Congress — the first under GOP control since the Eisenhower era.

Senate Republican leader Bob Dole and Rep. Newt Gingrich, House speaker-in-waiting, pledged cooperation with President Clinton wherever possible. "Maybe we can do some business," Dole told the president in a phone conversation witnessed by reporters.

## STATE Helicopters drop water on fires

PIREVILLE, Ky. — Four military helicopters from Virginia joined in dropping water on eastern Kentucky's forest fires, but nature is still refusing to do its part to douse the flame.

"Of course, west and central (Kentucky) have got a sinfall," said Rich Green, spokesman for the state Division of Forestry. "We, of course, want to think — and we're on our knees hoping — that's moving east. But the forecast is not looking the best. We're not real encouraged."

Green said 32 fires burned 3,550 acres around the region yesterday. That was compared with 37 fires that had burned about 2,000 acres on Tuesday.

Pike County was worst hit, with two fires alone at McVeigh and Mouthcard that covered 1,000 acres each.





An evening with Spalding Gray is like a tour with Danté in Disneyland. With Mark Twain tagging along, observing the scene with grave
hilarity. And Woody Allen, worriedly bringing up the rear, the nagging

Instead, Gray was diagnosed with a tricky problem of the left vision. retina, which was causing blurred vision.

Delicate microsurgery, involving scraping and the chance of blindness in that eye, were neces-

Gray left for a second opinion.
Full of fear and foreboding, and with a natural distrust of modern medicine from his Christian Science upbringing, Gray traipsed the globe in the quest of alternative remedies, anything but microsurgical szaping.
He went to his therapist, who worried that the disorder was Oedipal in origin. Gray first noticed his blurred vision while working on his book, "Impossible Vacation," in which he writes about his mother's visuicide. He wondered if he wasn't "subconsciously scratching out my eyes."

He went to a nutritional ophthalmologist who prescribed raw vegetables, which nearly ruined his health.
He went to Minnesota and participated in a Native American sweat lodge ceremony to purge sickness from his body. He went to Southeast Asia to see a well-known psychic surgeon.
He even revisted the Christian Scientist of his youth.
Along the way, Gray discovers what he was really looking for:
an eternal medical plan he can believe in, a mind-body healing that will subdue his lifelong skepticism, a means to squeeze his gigantic doubts through the needle's eye of medical miracles.
And, of course, a way to avoid the knife.
Now 50, with middle-age passing swiftly by him, and old age suddenly hurling toward him (a time his girlfriend's mother calls "the Bermuda Triangle" of health), Gray finally faces the prospect of growing old. Another anxiety adds to the background of this girlfriend of 12 years.
The fact that Gray and his companion (writer and producer Renee Shafransky, who directs "Gray's Anatomy") are now married, provides a clue to the ending of this strange saga. Frail, fearful, possessed of an intelligence that both elucidates and clouds the subtle complexities of life, Gray the Everyman somehow triumphs over his experience, proving laughter is often the best medicine.

In what many critice consider his best, most personal and hilarious monologue, writer Spalding Gray manages to communicate with disammight simple humanness. Traveling the common ground of shared anxieties, Gray has the sne

# Riddick injures knee in exhibition

And unlike Dent, Riddick won't miss the remainder of his season. The 6-foot-9 short-block-ing senior suffered a deep bruise to his right knee and should be back in about two weeks, UK trainer JoAnn Hauser said.

Riddick's absence last night, coupled with an injury earlier in the week to second-string center Mark Pope, meant that UK had to settle for forwards Jared Pricket and Walter McCarty in the paint.

All they could scrape up between them was 46 points and 26 rebounds.

McCarty showed confidence that he had been missing in practice, Coach Rick Pitino said, in scoring a game-high 30 points and pulling down 11 rebounds.

Desp te McCarty's strong offensive showing, Pitino said, in scoring a fense dwell now, where McCarty blocked five shots and altered several others.

"At times when he went up to block a shot, I thought it was Andre, but it was Walter," Pitino said.

UK ripped off a 29-8 run that put them on top 54-31 with 3:48 remaining in the half. All but six of UK's points during that span came from four players — McCarty, Prickett, Tony Delk and Walker.

Defensively, the Cats' press, despite depleted numbers on the bench, harassed AIA into 25 turnovers, which led to 33 UK points.

"Kentucky really gets after

WASHINGTON — In one historic day, voters transformed the face of American politics, making Republicans the majority party in Congress for the first time in more than a generation and leaving the Democratic coalition in shambles.

The remarkable Republican rout was powered by middle-class anxiety over the size, cost and reach of government — and extended well beyond the headline-grabbing gains in the House, Senate and governorships and deep into state and local politics.

It was a blunt repudiation of President Clinton and Democratic leadership — and of the Democratic Party's midterm campaign strategy. And while more a rejection of Democratic stan an embrace of Republicans, there was compelling evidence of the GOP's prospects for realignment in the South and major inroads elsewhere.

"The American people's revolution," was how Georgia Rep. Newt Gingrich — the likely next House speaker — put it, and at least in the short term it was hard to argue with him.

"The American people just closed the book on the 1960s view of government," said Paul Goldman, the former Virginia Democratic chairman. "The economy is improving but

their incomes keep going down. Crime is out of control. Families are breaking. People are groping for change and want answers, and decided to look to someone else to give them to them."

In the months ahead, this change will place enormous burdens on Republicans, particularly in the House, where the GOP last held a majority in the Eisenhower administration.

"It is a massive Republican victory and provides an opportunity for the Republican Party to have parity with Democrats at all levels of government for the first time in 60 years," said conservative GOP strategist William Kristol. "That doesn't mean we will succeed, but the opportunity is now there."

Whether Republicans meet that test will determine whether voters will swing back to Democrats in 1996.

▼Republicans gained eight Senate seats and more than 50 in the House, benefiting from anti-Clinton sentiment but also favorable redistricting after the 1990 Census. And in making these choices, particularly in seats without incumbents running, voters overwhelmingly sided with conservatives who ran against Clinton and his agenda and for lower taxes, less government and GOP staples like the balanced budget amendment.

WEvery Republican governor on the ballot was re-elected, and the GOP captured a dozen new governorships — and with them an enormous opportunity to set policy and build a broader national base. "They are showing the way for Republicans to govern at the federal level and showing the American people that Republicans deserve the chance to govern at very level," said national GOP Chairman Haley Barbour.
