






# JULIAN M. CARROLL Governor of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

JULIAN MORTON CARROLL became Kentucky's 58th governor on December 28, 1974, succeeding Wendell H. Ford, who was elected to the U. S. Senate. Carroll then won a full four-year term in the 1975 general election.

Born in McCracken County in 1931, he attended Paducah Junior College after graduating from Heath High School. He was graduated from the University of Kentucky in 1954 and received his law degree from UK in 1956. Before becoming governor, Carroll served three years as lieutenant governor and ten years as a member of the Kentucky House of Representatives.

He is currently chairman of the National Governors' Association, the first Kentucky Governor to hold that post. He is an active member of the Optimist Club and a former Jaycee. He attained the highest office in Kentucky for laymen of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church in 1966-77 when he was named moderator of the Kentucky Synod.

The Governor and his wife, Charlann, have four children.

# JAMES G. AMATO Mayor Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government

JAMES C. AMATO took office as mayor on January 2, 1978. In doing so, he became the second mayor of the consolidated city and county governments.

A native of Lexington, Amato has been a practicing attorney since 1964. He is a member of the Fayette County Bar Association, the Kentucky Bar Association, and the Kentucky Law Enforcement. He formerly held positions as Alcoholic Beverage Control Commissioner for the Commonwealth of Kentucky, Director of Citizens for Judicial Improvement, Inc., Municipal Court Judge and City Prosecutor.

As chief executive of the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government, the mayor is authorized to supervise, administer and control all departments of government.

The mayor is elected on a non-partisan ballot every four years. He is assisted principally by the Chief Administrative Officer and commissioners of the six departments.

# University of Kentucky

Dr. Otis A. Singletary University of Kentucky President

Now in his ninth year as president of the University of Kentucky, DR. OTIS A. SINGLETARY is a Mississippian whose route to the Bluegrass State curled through Louisiana, Texas, North Carolina

and Washington, D. C.

He came to Lexington from a position as University of Texas vice-chancellor for academic affairs. Previously, in Washington, he had been director of the U.S. Job Corps in the early stages of its development before moving to the American Council on Education as vice-president. He had gone to the capital in 1964 after three years as chancellor of the University of North Carolina at Greensboro.

The UNC appointment terminated Dr. Singletary's first association with the University of Texas, this a seven-year stay that saw him, as a young historian, rise rapidly in rank from instructor to full professor and begin the shift to administrative work, first as associate dean and later as assistant to the president.

The Kentucky president, and his wife the former Gloria Walton, met when both were students at Millsaps College. He later earned master's and doctoral degrees at Louisiana State. The Singletarys have two daughters, Bonnie and

Kendall, and a son, Scott.

# Cliff Hagan Director of Athletics

"I've been preparing for this all my life," CLIFF HAGAN said before taking over as athletics director at the University of Kentucky in 1975. Hagan succeeded Harry Lancaster as director after serving as assistant director for three years.

Hagan's path to the athletics director-ship began in Owensboro, Kentucky, where he established a then state high school tournament record of 41 points in leading Owensboro to victory over Lafayette in the championship game of the 1949 high school tournament.

At UK, he played on teams that won 86 of 91 games and an NCAA champion-ship (1951). The 1954 team, undefeated in 25 games, elected not to participate in

the national tournament.

Under his leadership, the UK athletics department continues to develop success in all areas of endeavor including a strong dedication to the academic wellbeing of the athletes.





JOE B. HALL

LEONARD HAMILTON is beginning his fifth year at Kentucky after serving three years as assistant coach at Austin Peay. An outstanding recruiter with seemingly tireless energy, Hamilton has contributed heavily to maintaining a high level of young talent at UK. Specializing in coaching defense, Hamilton has had a positive impact on Wildcat defensive

# Joe B. Hall University of Kentucky Wildcats Head Basketball Coach

JOE B. HALL is beginning his seventh season as mentor of the Wildcats, coming off a year in which his senior dominated team captured the 1978 NCAA Championship. Since becoming head coach in 1972, succeeding the legendary Adolph F. Rupp, Hall has accumulated a record of 135 wins against 42 losses. His eleven year coaching record stands at 211-98. Broken down, it shows a 57-50 five year mark at Regis College, a 19-6 record at Central Missouri, and a 135-42 record at UK.

Hall became Rupp's top assistant in 1969 when Harry C. Lancaster was named athletics director. His record as freshmen coach was 60-15, including an undefeated (22-0) season (1971-72) which resulted in the Kittens being crowned National Freshmen Champions by Basketball News.

A popular personality on the clinic and convention circuits, Hall also has had much international exposure. In addition to the Globetrotters tour in 1951, and the "Down Under" tour in 1974, he has helped conduct basketball clinics for the U. S. Army in Anchorage and Fairbanks, Alaska (1968) and at Ramstein Air Base in Frankfurt, Germany and the RAF Base at Mildenhall, England in 1975. He also was Olympic Trials coach under Hank Iba at the Air Force Academy in July 1972 and was a member of the 1976 Olympic Basketball Committee. In 1978 he coached the U.S.A. team that hosted the first International Invitational Tournament.

DICK PARSONS, in his seventh year as Joe B. Hall's No. 1 assistant, returned to the University as baseball coach in 1969. Before giving up his position to join the basketball staff on a full time basis, he molded a baseball team (1971) which established or tied 15 school records. He is a graduate of UK where he played guard under former Coach Adolph F. Rupp.

Parsons came to the University in 1958 after an outstanding career as a four-sports star at Harlan High School, where he had a three-year basketball scoring total of 1,276 points.

He was a two-time (1960-61) recipient of the coveted A. B. Chandler award, given annually for the player best exemplifying the qualities of leadership, scholarship, character and ability. Only four other Wildcats have twice been so honored since the award was originated in 1951.

He is married to the former Celia Cawood of Harlan. They have a daughter, Kathy, and a son, Ed.





### FRANK HAM **Assistant Director** of Athletics

FRANK HAM became Assistant Director of Athletics in July 1975 soon after Cliff Hagan succeeded Harry C. Lancaster as Director of Athletics.

A native of Scranton, Pa., Ham came to the University in 1969 as Administrative Assistant to football coach John Ray, and was reassigned to the Athletic Director's staff in 1972 when Ray resigned.

### SUSAN FEAMSTER **Assistant Director** of Athletics

SUE FEAMSTER joined the athletics association July 1 with the merger of the men's and women's programs. Feamster had been the director of women's athletics prior to her appointment as assistant director of athletics.

A native of Frankfort, she came to the


In 1962, he became assistant to the president at Olivet, with responsibilities in public and alumni relations. He was in private business from 1954 until 1968.






Rick Robey describes how it feels to win an NCAA championship.

# LSU Tigers Chosen Tops In SEC

With Kentucky's overpowering veteran team of 1977-'78 graduated, the Southeastern Conference sportswriters and sportscasters recently turned to Baton Rouge, Louisiana, in search of a SEC champ for the coming season.

Meeting at the SEC Basketball Press Day festivities in Birmingham, Alabama, the sports iournalists voted for how they felt the SEC race would conclude and chose Dale Brown's talented and veteran Tigers to be the team to beat. They also listed their choices for all-conference honors

The newsmen picked four frontline players and a guard for the first team All-SEC. The guard chosen was Kentucky's 6-3 Kyle Macy. He was accompanied by Alabama's 6-6 Reginald King, LSU's 6-7 Durand Macklin, Tennessee's 6-9 Reggie Johnson and Mississippi State's 6-10 Rickey Brown. King and Macy were chosen unanimously.

The LSU Bengals totalled 445 points to finish in first place. The voting was done on a 10 points for first, 9 for second, etc. basis. Kentucky, which walloped La Salle in its opener to support the newmen's opinions, finished second with 382, followed by Alabama 370, Miss. State 354, Georgia 225, and Tennessee 217. Florida polled 168, Vanderbilt 145, Auburn 126 and Ole Miss 98.

Following in the order in which the teams were selected, evaluations of their capabilities are given below.

LSU—Dale Brown was appreciative of the number one spot accorded his team but feared a "fat cat" approach to the season by his team. However, their fatness can be seen in the fact that the Tigers have 10 combat-ready players who could be playing anywhere in the league. Brown felt that Durand Macklin was All-American caliber and that he was blessed with an outstanding point guard in Ethan Martin. Jordy Hultberg was termed a great shooter and team leader. Greg Cook is an accomplished center and DeWayne Scales was described by Brown as a "Dynamite Player."

KENTUCKY'S Joe B. Hall is in a rebuilding year but the newsmen showed their confidence in his ability to keep the winning tradition alive in Lexington by listing his Wildcats to finish second. "We have more experienced players for the outside than the inside," noted Hall. Kyle Macy and Truman Claytor will

Chancellor Dykes' professional activities include service as chairman of the advisory committee of the U. S. Army







Dykes and his wife, Nancy, have two sons, John 23, and Tom 21, both students at the University.





# Owens Keeps Jayhawk Tradition Alive

One of the nation's most admired and respected major college basketball coaches, Ted Owens marks his 15th season as head coach at the University of Kansas.

Only the fifth coach in Kansas' proud and tradition-filled basketball history, his tenure ranks second only to that of Dr. F. C. Allen, today recognized as the "Father of Basketball Coaching" who for 39 years served in that capacity.

Owens, 49, came to Kansas in 1960 as an assistant under Dick Harp. Following the 1963-64 season, Owens was given the head coaching job.

In his first year, Owens led the Jayhawks to a 17-9 record and a second place finish in the Big Eight Conference behind Oklahoma State. He followed that with four consecutive 20 victory seasons and post-season appearances along with two Big Eight titles.

In his first 14 years as head coach, Owens has captured six conference titles, has had seven 20-victory seasons

and advanced to post-season play eight times.


Entering the 1978-79 season, Owens has a career record of 265-119 for a .690 winning percentage. This ranks 19th among active college coaches, who have coached for at least five years.

In Big Eight play alone, the Jayhawk coach has led his team to a .702 winning percentage, winning 170 games and losing just 72.

In 1970-71, he took Kansas to a 27-3 overall record and a fourth place finish in the NCAA Tournament. Owens also coached the Jayhawks to a fourth place NCAA finish in 1973-74.

Owens has won his own Jayhawk Classic Tournament five of the possible seven years. Five times—1966, '67, '71, '74 and '77—he has been voted Coach of the Year by the Big Eight Conference and in addition was awarded the Dr. Forrest C. Allen plaque for his contribution to the game.

Many of the great names of Kansas basketball have come under the tutelage of Owens, including All-Americans Jo Jo White (1968 and 1969), Walt Wesley (1966), Dave Robisch (1971) and Bud Stallworth (1973). Eighteen players have received Big Eight honors under Owens.



# Three Veterans Anchor Jayhawk Attack

Despite the loss of six lettermen including three starters from last year's Big Eight Championship team, Kansas again figures to be a title contender in the 1978-79 season.

In addition, several publications have tabled the Jayhawks' recruiting to be among the nation's best.

Kansas will be one of the country's youngest teams with only two seniors and a pair of juniors. Molding this youthful team together in a bid to win its fourth league title in six years will be Ted Owens, starting his 15th season as the Jayhawks' head coach.


"No one in the league had the kind of personnel loss that we did in terms of both quantity and quality," Owens quickly points out. "From that standpoint, I believe it's apparent that we have an uphill battle on our hands. I do believe we have very good quality in our returning personnel and I'm not just talking about the three individuals everyone first thinks of."

Those three are, Paul Mokeski, a 7-1 and 250-pound senior center and guards Darnell Valentine and Wilmore Fowler.



Jayhawks' 7-1, 250 pound senior center Paul Mokeski provides experience for Kansas' frontline.






In addition, Owens has bench strength in 6-6 senior guard Brad Sanders, who can also play forward and 6-6 junior Mac Stallcup.

Owens is quick to smile when he speaks of a relative unknown in 6-5 sophomore guard Booty Neal, who lettered as a freshman playing in 16 games for the Jayhawks.

Two other newcomers to the Jayhawk lineup are Johnny Crawford and Chester Giles. Giles, a 6-9 forward, sat out last season because of a knee injury suffered during practice. Two years ago he was the most outstanding performer of the national junior college tournament.

Recruited this season were three of the most highly sought after high school standouts in the nation last year. They are Tony Guy, a 6-6 guard who averaged 22.9 ppg. as a high school senior, Mark Snow, a 6-10 center and David Magley, a 6-7 forward from South Bend, Ind., who led his high school team in scoring with a 25.1 average.

"There has been considerable attention given to Tony, David and Mark," Owens said. "And I think it's well deserved. All three are outstanding young men and gifted athletes. I believe that all three have a chance to make immediate contributions although it is impossible to predict to what extent. I think everyone should remember, how-

ever, that they are freshmen and have much to learn before they can realize their maximum effectiveness."

With the quickness of the newcomers in Owens' lineup, the Jayhawks are expected to play a pressure defense and have a fast breaking offense.

That is also where Mokeski and Valentine are most effective. Mokeski led the team in rebounding a year ago with an 8.5 average. Valentine paced the Jayhawks in scoring with a 13.5 average. He also led the league in assists with

130 and in steals with 80. Mokeski led the Big Eight with 54 blocked shots.

"We don't plan to change our style," said Owens. "There were several reasons why we were so successful last year (24-5 overall and 13-1 in the Big Eight). Certainly a big reason was our ability to rebound and then get the ball out and up the court. I'm hopeful this year's team can match or even improve on the quickness and speed of last year. I'm also hopeful that we'll be as good a shooting team."

Kentucky's journey to Lawrence, Kansas to meet the Jayhawks was their first venture away from Rupp Arena and their first supreme test of the young 1977-78 basketball year.

Kansas Coach Ted Owens had commented that the game was to be "a tremendous challenge for our team, but one that we welcome." The Jayhawks showed early their Top 10 ranking was deserved by jumping to an early 14-8 lead. Kentucky fought back to take a

three-point halftime lead, 36-33, behind Mike Phillips' 10 points and James Lee, who came off the bench, to score eight.

Despite 22 turnovers and 17 less shots from the field, the Cats held on to a 73-66 win, and ran their season record to 3-0.

Kyle Macy led the UK scoring with 15 points and Phillips added 14.

Planning is underway for the Adolph F. Rupp-UK Basketball Museum that will show the long and colorful history of University of Kentucky basketball, with special emphasis on the Adolph Rupp era.

The museum will be located in Lexington Center adjacent to the entrance to Rupp Arena. It will contain photographs, trophies, other memorabilia, tape recordings and films showing some of the great UK teams in action.

Funding for the approximately \$200,-000 project will come from tax-deductible donations from the public. Operation of the museum will be funded by a small admission charge "not to exceed \$1," according to Hisle.

# JACK PERRY Assistant Sports Information Director







# UK Network Largest in Nation

Captivating play-by-play announcing by Cawood Ledford and expert color commentary by Ralph Hacker highlight the University of Kentucky basketball broadcasting network, the largest network of its kind in the nation.

This season's network lineup features 94 stations in Kentucky, Ohio, West Virginia and Tennessee, an increase of 12 stations over 1977. There are two 50,000-watt stations on the network, WCKY in Cincinnati and WHAS in Louisville. The signal coverage of these two stations alone carries the UK broadcasts over vast areas of the eastern and midwestern United States.

Cawood Ledford, sports director for WHAS radio and television, is now in his 26th season of calling the play-by-play for Wildcat basketball games. He is known throughout the Commonwealth as "The Voice of the Wildcats" and has become something of an institution with UK football and basketball.

Ledford has been honored eight times as "Kentucky Sportscaster of the Year," and is the only on-the-air broadcaster to have received the Kentucky Broadcasting Association award.

Ralph Hacker, station manager of WVLK radio in Lexington, is in the midst of his seventh season as color commentator for the UK sports network. His knowledgable and articulate observations on the game have won for him the respect of UK fans and his peers in

the broadcasting profession.

The popularity of the network is seen in the fact that it was chosen 17 times during the course of last year's football and basketball seasons to be featured on the American Services Network, beaming the UK games to a world-wide audience.

The basketball network is administered for the University of Kentucky under the terms of a contract with Jim Host and Associates, Inc., a Lexington public relations firm. The Host firm also administers the UK football network and

the NCAA basketball championships network.

In addition to WHAS and WCKY, other primary stations on the UK network are WAMX-FM, Ashland; WLBJ-AM, Bowling Green; WCTT-AM and FM, Corbin; WKIC-AM and WKDQ-FM, Hazard; WSON-AM and WKDQ-FM, Henderson; WHOP-AM and FM, Hopkinsville; WVLK-AM and FM, Lexington; WFTM-AM and FM, Maysville; WOMI-AM and WBKR-FM, Owensboro; WPAD-AM and FM, Paintsville; and WSFC-AM and WSEK-FM, Somerset.

# Wildcat TV Network Cooking With Microwave

VHF and UHF . . . probably everyone knows that depending on the area in which they are located, the television stations transmit on one or the other frequency. But when you talk "network," whether it be national, like CBS, or regional, like the Wildcat Football Network recently put together by WKYT-TV in Lexington, you're talking microwaves . . . and we don't mean ovens!

Network transmissions must be done on a frequency other than VHF or UHF so that only those stations set up to receive the network programs will, indeed, receive them. Consumer television sets are designed to only receive VHF and UHF transmissions.


The first step in putting together a network is to contact commercial television stations in the various market areas. Ideally, the network originator wants those stations which can deliver the largest number of viewers as "network" stations. After network stations have been selected, AT & T sets up microwave lines from the originator station


(during Wildcat football this was WKYT-TV in Lexington using their million dollar mobile unit) to each of the stations in the network. This step is further complicated by the fact that microwaves are "line-of-sight" waves;

they cannot be transmitted through mountains or any other solid object and must be routed around such obstacles.

### BROADCASTING

Preparation for the actual broadcast of any Wildcat sports event begins weeks





ahead of the game. Game announcers must research players on both teams, memorizing names, jersey numbers and basic facts and statistics. Basketball games give announcers even more of a challenge due to the swift action of the game and the close proximity of the players to the announcers booth. Most announcers chose to memorize faces and corresponding jersey numbers to be able to deliver a smoother, quicker play-by-play. Denny Trease, sports director of WKYT-TV, says "it's not too difficult memorizing Wildcat ball players, but trying to quick-study the members of each week's visiting team is sometimes pretty tough."

In addition to the research that the announcers do, statistics on all players must be gathered and programmed into an "electronic graphics generator". These stats can be called up during the game and are usually seen by television viewers superimposed over the action.

A couple of days prior to the game, engineers from the originator station, the station which will be transmitting the game to its network stations, arrive at the event location and begin the tedious task of wiring and placing cable for the equipment which will be used during the taping or televising of the game. In Rupp Arena, cable trays are suspended

from the ceiling and engineers string approximately 2 miles of cable along these trays within the arena.

The day of the game, production crews work closely with the engineers and the director to finalize plans. Types of shots and sideline shots are discussed and in some instances, practiced, to determine the very best camera coverage for every inch of the playing area. Everyone is at their place, with headsets to receive directions from the director,


at least an hour before game time.

During the game, the director will preview the pictures from each camera and call out the camera whose picture will be taped. If a shot is missed, there's no second chance; directors have to make snap judgements as to what the television viewer will see.

The taped, or live, show is then transmitted, via microwaves, to the network stations for live broadcast or possibly for taping and then airing at a later date.

# Arena Information

### FIRST AID

The University of Kentucky and the Lexington Center provide for your convenience and welfare, a First Aid Station on the Purple Concourse. Persons with any type of chronic medical problem are requested to leave their name and seat location with the nurse on duty at the First Aid Station. A person in need of assistance with a health emergency should report the situation immediately to an usher. For University of Kentucky events, all physicians are requested to leave their name, seat location and any other information required to locate them if they receive an emergency telephone call, at the UK Public Assistance station located on the purple concourse between sections 30 and 31. For all other events in Rupp Arena all physicians are requested to leave their name, seat location and any other information required to locate them if they receive an emergency telephone call at the First Aid Room located on the purple concourse between sections 33 and 34. In the event of an emergency, you will be notified at your seat. In order that the activities and program in Rupp Arena not be disrupted, paging over the public address system is not possible.

### CARDIAC CARE

In cooperation with the University Medical Service, the University of Kentucky provides a cardiac resuscitation program at all UK basketball games.

# LOST AND FOUND

Lost and found articles should be reported or turned in to an usher or a security officer. You may wish to write to the director of arena security and describe lost articles which will be returned if found.

### NO HORNS

Horns are not permitted in Rupp Arena and will be picked up at the entrances. Be considerate and allow your neighbor to enjoy the game. Keep portable radios at a low yolume.

### GATE INFORMATION

Rupp Arena will normally open one hour prior to any scheduled event. Please do not leave the arena until the conclusion of an event or game or at half-time if you plan to re-enter. No "Passout" tickets will be issued and you will not be permitted to re-enter.

### COURT REGULATIONS

Spectators must keep off the court at all times. Spectators must use the arena stairs and vomities. There are no public facilities located on the arena floor level. Public facilities in Rupp Arena are located on the entry concourse level. You will find all refreshment stands, drinking fountains, public telephones, restrooms, vending machines and first aid on the concourse level.

### LIQUORS

Alcoholic beverages are strictly prohibited within the arena as are all food and drink containers including hard surfaced materials of any type, bottles, cans, thermos bottles, ice bags, ice chest, and any object related to above. Arena personnel are instructed to enforce this rule in the interest of safety.

# PUBLIC ADDRESS

Messages for the public address announcer are acceptable only in emergencies and must be approved by the Sports Information Director at University of Kentucky basketball events.




Signs and barriers are restricted in Rupp Arena in accordance with policies established by arena management and public safety officials.

# U. K. STUDENT CODE OF SPORTSMANSHIP


