The Faculty met at the usual hour, 3:30 P.M., in the President's room in the Gymnasium Building, those present being President Patterson, Professors White, W.K. Patterson, Pryor, Anderson, Mathews, Miller, Pence, Norwood, Zembrod, Frankel, Lafferty, Hooper, Stout, Noe and Jones.

The minutes for March 5th. were read and approved. The standing committees of the University were then called upon in order for any reports which they might have to make.

Professor Pence for the Committee upon Courses of Study reported that the schedulenof a special course in Chemistry, now termed the course in Industrial Chemistry, was presented at the last meeting by Dr. Tuttle and was adopted. In a supplementary report of this committee it was stated that previous to the adoption of this course in Industrial Chemistry, the general Scientific course with Chemistry as a Major had been presented to the committee and adopted. President Patterson called attention to the fact that the committee meeting at which this course was adopted was not a full meeting, and that the schedule of Industrial Chemistry was adopted by a majority vote of those present, which, however, included only a minority of the entire committee. He thought therefore that it was open to doubt whether this report of the committee should be accepted and approved by the general faculty. After some further informal discussion it was moved by C.W.Mathews, seconded by Professor Anderson, that the Faculty adopt the report of the Committee upon Courses of Study with the intent that this course in Industrial Chemistry should be considered a course of the College of Arts and Science. An extended discussion followed, participated in by Professors Miller, Pryor, Anderson, Norwood, White, W.K. Patterson, and President Patterson, when the motion was lost by an aye and no vote, the ayes six, nose nine.

no vote, the ayes six, noes nine.

The discussion of the motion showed that the members of the Faculty were cordially in sympathy with Dr. Tuttle's purpose to develop strong courses in Chemistry and that they desired to aid him in this attempt, the main objection to the motion apparently being to the form in which it was presented and to the fact that it represented only a minority of the entire

committee.

It was then moved by C.W.Mathews, seconded by Professor Frankel that the Committee upon Courses of Study should give re-consideration to this course in Industrial Chemistry and report to the general faculty at the earliest possible date. After some further discussion this motion was carried.

Professor White for the Committee upon Calendar and Bulletins reported that work upon the catalog was progressing satisfactorily and that it would probably be issued about May 10th. He requested that whenever departments of the University were contemplating the issuance of any bulletins that they should confer with his committee in order that there might be uniformity in the method of publishing such bulletins.

For the Committee upon Diploma and Degrees, Professor Anderson reported that no final action had been taken upon the subjects referred to his committee.

Committees 5, 7 and 8 had no reports to offer.

For the Committee upon Student Publications Professor Norwood reported that his committee held a meeting at which was considered the petition of the publishers of the "Idea" to be recognized as the official publication of the University.
