






JULIAN M. CARROLL Governor of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

JULIAN MORTON CARROLL became Kentucky's 58th governor on December 28, 1974, succeeding Wendell H. Ford, who was elected to the U. S. Senate. Carroll then won a full four-year term in the 1975 general election.

Born in McCracken County in 1931, he attended Paducah Junior College after graduating from Heath High School. He was graduated from the University of Kentucky in 1954 and received his law degree from UK in 1956. Before becoming governor, Carroll served three years as lieutenant governor and ten years as a member of the Kentucky House of Representatives.

He is currently chairman of the National Governors' Association, the first Kentucky Governor to hold that post. He is an active member of the Optimist Club and a former Jaycee. He attained the highest office in Kentucky for laymen of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church in 1966-77 when he was named moderator of the Kentucky Synod.

The Governor and his wife, Charlann, have four children.

JAMES G. AMATO Mayor Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government

JAMES C. AMATO took office as mayor on January 2, 1978. In doing so, he became the second mayor of the consolidated city and county governments.

A native of Lexington, Amato has been a practicing attorney since 1964. He is a member of the Fayette County Bar Association, the Kentucky Bar Association, and the Kentucky Law Enforcement. He formerly held positions as Alcoholic Beverage Control Commissioner for the Commonwealth of Kentucky, Director of Citizens for Judicial Improvement, Inc., Municipal Court Judge and City Prosecutor.

As chief executive of the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government, the mayor is authorized to supervise, administer and control all departments of government.

The mayor is elected on a non-partisan ballot every four years. He is assisted principally by the Chief Administrative Officer and commissioners of the six departments.

University of Kentucky

Dr. Otis A. Singletary University of Kentucky President

Now in his ninth year as president of the University of Kentucky, DR. OTIS A. SINGLETARY is a Mississippian whose route to the Bluegrass State curled through Louisiana, Texas, North Carolina

and Washington, D. C.

He came to Lexington from a position as University of Texas vice-chancellor for academic affairs. Previously, in Washington, he had been director of the U. S. Job Corps in the early stages of its development before moving to the American Council on Education as vice-president. He had gone to the capital in 1964 after three years as chancellor of the University of North Carolina at Greensboro.

The UNC appointment terminated Dr. Singletary's first association with the University of Texas, this a seven-year stay that saw him, as a young historian, rise rapidly in rank from instructor to full professor and begin the shift to admini-strative work, first as associate dean and

later as assistant to the president.

The Kentucky president, and his wife the former Gloria Walton, met when both were students at Millsaps College. He later earned master's and doctoral degrees at Louisiana State. The Singletarys have two daughters, Bonnie and

Kendall, and a son, Scott.

Cliff Hagan Director of Athletics

"I've been preparing for this all my life," CLIFF HAGAN said before taking over as athletics director at the University of Kentucky in 1975. Hagan succeeded Harry Lancaster as director after serving as assistant director for three years.

Hagan's path to the athletics directorship began in Owensboro, Kentucky, where he established a then state high school tournament record of 41 points in leading Owensboro to victory over Lafayette in the championship game of the 1949 high school tournament.

At UK, he played on teams that won 86 of 91 games and an NCAA championship (1951). The 1954 team, undefeated in 25 games, elected not to participate in the national tournament.

Under his leadership, the UK athletics department continues to develop success in all areas of endeavor including a strong dedication to the academic wellbeing of the athletes.





JOE B. HALL

LEONARD HAMILTON is beginning his fifth year at Kentucky after serving three years as assistant coach at Austin Peay. An outstanding recruiter with seemingly tireless energy, Hamilton has contributed heavily to maintaining a high level of young talent at UK. Specializing in coaching defense, Hamilton has had a positive impact on Wildcat defensive

JOE DEAN, JR., played against the Wildcats for three years at Mississippi State University, before serving as Bulldog assistant coach while earning a masters degree in physical education. An outstanding student, Dean was named to the 1976 Academic All-SEC second team. A native of Baton Rouge,

Joe B. Hall University of Kentucky Wildcats Head Basketball Coach

JOE B. HALL is beginning his seventh season as mentor of the Wildcats, coming off a year in which his senior dominated team captured the 1978 NCAA Championship. Since becoming head coach in 1972, succeeding the legendary Adolph F. Rupp, Hall has accumulated a record of 135 wins against 42 losses. His eleven year coaching record stands at 211-98. Broken down, it shows a 57-50 five year mark at Regis College, a 19-6 record at Central Missouri, and a 135-42 record at UK.

Hall became Rupp's top assistant in 1969 when Harry C. Lancaster was named athletics director. His record as freshmen coach was 60-15, including an undefeated (22-0) season (1971-72) which resulted in the Kittens being crowned National Freshmen Champions by Basketball News.

A popular personality on the clinic and convention circuits, Hall also has had much international exposure. In addition to the Globetrotters tour in 1951, and the "Down Under" tour in 1974, he has helped conduct basketball clinics for the U. S. Army in Anchorage and Fairbanks, Alaska (1968) and at Ramstein Air Base in Frankfurt, Germany and the RAF Base at Mildenhall, England in 1975. He also was Olympic Trials coach under Hank Iba at the Air Force Academy in July 1972 and was a member of the 1976 Olympic Basketball Committee. In 1978 he coached the U.S.A. team that hosted the first International Invitational Tournament.

philosophy. A native of Gastonia, N. C., he lettered three years in football and twice in basketball. An outstanding collegiate player, he starred at Gaston Community College in Dallas, N. C., and at University of Tennessee-Martin. He is married to the former Claudette Hale. They have a son, Lenny, 7.

La., he attended Baton Rouge High School where he earned letters in basketball and football. In addition to regular coaching duties with the Wildcats, Dean's primary responsibilities will be recruiting and scouting. He is married to the former Ellen Elizabeth Anger of Jackson, Miss.



DICK PARSONS

DICK PARSONS, in his seventh year as Joe B. Hall's No. 1 assistant, returned to the University as baseball coach in 1969. Before giving up his position to join the basketball staff on a full time basis, he molded a baseball team (1971) which established or tied 15 school records. He is a graduate of UK where he played guard under former Coach Adolph F. Rupp.

Parsons came to the University in 1958 after an outstanding career as a four-sports star at Harlan High School, where he had a three-year basketball scoring total of 1,276 points.

He was a two-time (1960-61) recipient of the coveted A. B. Chandler award, given annually for the player best exemplifying the qualities of leadership, scholarship, character and ability. Only four other Wildcats have twice been so honored since the award was originated in 1951.

He is married to the former Celia Cawood of Harlan. They have a daughter, Kathy, and a son, Ed.





FRANK HAM Assistant Director of Athletics

FRANK HAM became Assistant Director of Athletics in July 1975 soon after Cliff Hagan succeeded Harry C. Lancaster as Director of Athletics.

A native of Scranton, Pa., Ham came to the University in 1969 as Administrative Assistant to football coach John Ray, and was reassigned to the Athletic Director's staff in 1972 when Ray resigned.

SUSAN FEAMSTER Assistant Director of Athletics

SUE FEAMSTER joined the athletics association July 1 with the merger of the men's and women's programs. Feamster had been the director of women's athletics prior to her appointment as assistant director of athletics.

A native of Frankfort, she came to the

Ham graduated from high school at Niles, Michigan, and completed his undergraduate work at Olivet College. He did graduate work at Indiana University and coached high school football and track at John Adams High in South Bend in 1944-46 and then returned to Olivet as athletic director and head football and basketball coach.

In 1951, he became assistant to the president at Olivet, with responsibilities in public and alumni relations. He was in private business from 1954 until 1968.

University as a graduate student in 1970, was named assistant director of campus recreation in 1972 and director of women's athletics in 1974.

Feamster graduated from Franklin County High School where she was an outstanding tennis player and athlete. While in college she earned letters in tennis, field hockey, basketball and track from Indiana University and Kentucky State University, where she earned her B.S. degree and graduated with honors.







LARRY IVY Assistant Director of Athletics For Finance

Adding a new dimension to UK athletics was the appointment two years ago of LARRY IVY as Assistant Director of

Athletics for Finance.

Ivy, who came to the University as Director of Housing in 1969, is involved primarily with the administration and management of financial aspects, and develops and initiates policies for accounting procedures and related business management activities of the department.

Public Donations To Build Museum To House Memorabilia

Adjacent to the entrance to Rupp Arena in the Lexington Center will be located the Adolph F. Rupp-UK Basketball Museum.

The purpose of the museum is to relive some of the past Wildcat teams' exploits and those of its great players. Included in the museum will be photographs, trophies, tape recordings, films and other memorabilia reflecting on past Kentucky teams.

"We have a unique opportunity to perpetuate the legend of the late Adolph Rupp and the rich basketball tradition that has been established by the University of Kentucky," commented DeWitt Hisle, chairman of the museum. "The museum will give basketball fans every where a fascinating insight into what this game has meant to followers of the UK Wildcats."

Rupp coached teams compiled an 880-190 record. He guided the Wildcats to four NCAA titles, an NIT championship and 27 SEC crowns.

The museum will cover Kentucky basketball teams from the first season in 1903, when the team recorded a 1-2 record, through the most recently completed season.

A small theatre area will be located

in the museum and used to show films on the changing style of basketball over the past 75 years.

The material found in the museum is coming from the official archives of UK, Memorial Coliseum, the family of the late Adolph Rupp and from the public.

"Obviously one of the major advantages we have in establishing this museum is the fact that we can build it around a central figure, the late Adolph Rupp, whose 41 seasons as UK head coach resulted in some of the greatest accomplishments in the history of collegiate basketball," said Charles Atcher, archivist of the University of Kentucky.

Atcher says one of the guiding principles in planning for the Rupp-UK Basketball Museum is that the museum will show the continuing history of basketball at UK, which means the museum will be capable of expanding to display accomplishments of future teams.

The UK tradition is being continued by Joe B. Hall who replaced Rupp as head coach beginning with the 1972-73 season. In six years, Hall has led the Cats to four SEC championships, an NIT championship, the 1978 NCAA title and an overall 135-42 record.

Costing an approximate \$200,000, the projects' funding will come from tax-deductible donations from the public. Operation of the museum will be funded by a small admission charge, "not to exceed \$1," according to Hisle.

Recruitment of Players Meticulous, On-Going Task

When Kentucky coach Joe B. Hall sends his recruiters, Leonard Hamilton and Joe Dean, Jr., to locate high school players to fill eight possible scholarships this year, they will be shopping for specific types of players and searching through organized channels. Coach Dickie Parsons takes time from his administrative and coaching duties and assists Dean and Hamilton when the recruiting duties become too numerous.

The process of locating likely Kentucky prospects, recruiting them, and finally signing them, however, does not occur in a short period of time. It is a process that is on-going. One that begins when a high school player is in his sophomore year and culminates when he is ready for college.

The best prospects are located through alumni, coaches, friends, and scouting services that publish lists of the nation's top players.

The best sophomore players are identified and watched as they develop their skills. As they become juniors, the recruiting effort becomes stronger and the UK coaches begin to research the player's background and past performance.

The coaches visit the player's hometown, get to know his coach and watch him play. When he completes his junior year they can begin to recruit him officially. The juniors are watched closely in Hall's basketball camp if they attend, and other All-Star camps. Some of the All-Star camps are run by the same people who publish the scouting services such as Howard Garfinkle in Pennsylvania and Bill Cronauer of Milledgeville, Georgia.

When the player becomes a junior, he is sent a questionaire that he is asked to complete that gives the coaches his basic information, size, weight, address, parents names, etc.

He is then sent a letter from Coach Hall and a packet of information on the University. The packet includes a basketball press guide for the current year, information on the academic offerings of the University and data on the UK basketball program.

The 200 players that UK considers the best in the nation are then placed



on a weekly mailing list beginning with their senior year. Each is given as much individual attention as is possible.

As the year progresses, the list de-

creases until the coaches single out the top 30 prospects. That list is divided between the coaches and the recruiting becomes more earnest.

They are looking for evidence that the player can do college level academic work, is a good citizen with sound character, has ability, size, speed and quickness, and has sound fundamental basketball skills.

The coaches are allowed three faceto-face contacts with the players under NCAA regulations. These are spaced out through his senior year. The first occurs at the beginning of the season, another comes at the conclusion of the season, and the third comes when the plaver signs. Many of the meetings are held in the presence of the player's head coach.

Coach Hall is given regular reports on each prospect and sees each of the top 20 play once and the top eight choices at least twice during his senior year.

Also under NCAA rules, a coach can "exchange pleasantries" with a prospect and can write or telephone him as often as he would like. Coaches can therefore watch the prospect practice and play as often as he would like but cannot have face-to-face contact, other than to say hello.

All colleges can offer a prospect the same things such as room and board, and tuition. What Kentucky offers in addition is that its staff is one of a few active coaching staffs that have won an NCAA title and know how to win one. It offers Kentucky's winning tradition.

At the end of the recruitment process, Kentucky hopes to sign players that will continue that winning tradition through their abilities, character, and basketball


Enrollment at the main campus increased from 12,000 in 1965 to 18,000 this fall, with several new buildings being constructed to serve the student body.





'New' Is the Word in Nursing

More than the building is new at the University of Kentucky College of Nursing.

One hundred thirty licensed and experienced nurses—including both men and women from their 20s into their 50s—are enrolled in UK's new Bachelor of Science in Nursing degree program.

Another 70 nurses are students working for their master's degree.

All attend classes in the new College of Nursing/Health Sciences Learning Center, and are taught by a nursing faculty of 46 persons described by nursing Dean Marion McKenna as "dedicated and committed."


UK's new nursing curriculum is up to the minute, reflecting recommendations of the state Council on Higher Education and the National League for Nursing, as well as the changing nursing needs of the Commonwealth.

The new degree program, says Dean McKenna, is not chiefly preparation for acute care. UK nursing students already know about that, and much more, since

they're already licensed as registered nurses and experienced in their profession.

Trained for Many Specialties

At UK nurses are being trained to fit into the health care delivery system, to run clinics, to teach prevention, to plan health campaigns, to apply crisis theory and grief theory, to operate intensive care units, to offer primary care and care in industry.

At the UK College of Nursing, the baccalaureate graduate in nursing is seen as a professional practitioner who functions in collaboration with the physician.

Classes are taught in the evenings as well as the daytime and each class is offered every semester to accommodate students.

In addition to its teaching function, the College of Nursing is doing research funded by the U. S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare, by the National Institute of Mental Health and by the United States Public Health Service.

And the College is continually seeking ways for its department of continuing education to take more teaching to nurse practitioners in the field. Currently, it is devising programs to be aired via educational satellite.

Dr. Juanita Fleming, a former American Council on Education fellow and

now assistant dean for graduate studies, believes graduates of UK's master's program in nursing will be prepared to assume leadership roles and "contribute to the changing health care system."

Four Graduate Specialties

Graduate students specialize in one of these areas: nurse-midwifery, adult nursing (medical-surgical), parent-child nursing or community mental health.

Susan Bobek is in the community mental health sequence. She's from the Chicago area, chose UK for its curriculum and the opportunity for rural clinical experience (she spends two days a week in Frenchburg and Mt. Sterling) as well as for the compactness of the master's program (one calendar year).

The work is demanding, Ms. Bobek says, and the faculty helpful while "treating you as a mature adult."

She's pleased about the "ladders and lattices" within nursing education which allow a nurse to "branch out" into pharmacology, for example, or into phychiatric nursing.

Ms. Bobek, who already has a master's degree in education, hopes to teach.




The dust has hardly settled in Auburn, Alabama where last Thursday Kentucky captured its first win on the road for this year 86-83 in overtime.

The Wildcats tied the first game at 72-72 with 14 seconds remaining to put the game into an extra stanza. Auburn gained an early four point edge in the overtime before a rally sparked by Kyle Macy cut the lead. Jay Shidler converted a heroic steal at midcourt into a layup that gave the Cats a one point advantage with 13 seconds left and LaVon Williams hit both ends of a one and one at the free throw line to give Kentucky its win.





Arena Information

FIRST AID

The University of Kentucky and the Lexington Center provide for your convenience and welfare, a First Aid Station on the Purple Concourse. Persons with any type of chronic medical problem are requested to leave their name and seat location with the nurse on duty at the First Aid Station. A person in need of assistance with a health emergency should report the situation immediately to an usher. For University of Kentucky events, all physicians are requested to leave their name, seat location and any other information required to locate them if they receive an emergency telephone call, at the UK Public Assistance station located on the purple concourse between sections 30 and 31. For all other events in Rupp Arena all physicians are requested to leave their name, seat location and any other information required to locate them if they receive an emergency telephone call at the First Aid Room located on the purple concourse between sections 33 and 34. In the event of an emergency, you will be notified at your seat. In order that the activities and program in Rupp Arena not be disrupted, paging over the public address system is not possible.

CARDIAC CARE

In cooperation with the University Medical Service, the University of Kentucky provides a cardiac resuscitation program at all UK basketball games.

LOST AND FOUND

Lost and found articles should be reported or turned in to an usher or a security officer. You may wish to write to the director of arena security and describe lost articles which will be returned if found.

NO HORNS

Horns are not permitted in Rupp Arena and will be picked up at the entrances. Be considerate and allow your neighbor to enjoy the game. Keep portable radios at a low volume.

GATE INFORMATION

Rupp Arena will normally open one hour prior to any scheduled event. Please do not leave the arena until the conclusion of an event or game or at half-time if you plan to re-enter. No "Passout" tickets will be issued and you will not be permitted to re-enter.

COURT REGULATIONS

Spectators must keep off the court at all times. Spectators must use the arena stairs and vomities. There are no public facilities located on the arena floor level. Public facilities in Rupp Arena are located on the entry concourse level. You will find all refreshment stands, drinking fountains, public telephones, restrooms, vending machines and first aid on the concourse level.

LIQUORS

Alcoholic beverages are strictly prohibited within the arena as are all food and drink containers including hard surfaced materials of any type, bottles, cans, thermos bottles, ice bags, ice chest, and any object related to above. Arena personnel are instructed to enforce this rule in the interest of safety.

PUBLIC ADDRESS

Messages for the public address announcer are acceptable only in emergencies and must be approved by the Sports Information Director at University of Kentucky basketball events.


SIGNS


