COMMUNITY MAILING LIST

At the November GLSO Board meeting, we initiated a mailing list project in order to provide our local community organizations with a list of addresses for social, political and fund raising purposes. There is a great need for such a list and various attempts have been made to assemble one in the past. Please read the articles by Linda West in this issue concerning the work done by Fairness in the last election and the need Fairness sees for such a mailing list.

After a long discussion, the GLSO board came up with a process to begin compiling a list and some suggestions for its maintenance. If you receive the GLSO New by mail and you do NOT want your name to be placed on the Community Mailing List, you need to call Mary Crone at 266-5904 or drop a note to the newsletter before March 1st. We will repeat this information in the next two issues of the GLSO News to insure that everyone knows well in advance. After March 1st, the names and addresses of all subscribes who did not call or write to us will be added to the community List. The Board anticipates that some individuals would have preferred for us to handle this in a different manner. We considered several alternatives, such as asking those wanting to be on such a list to call, or having volunteers call all our subscribers. We decided that having subscribers call us is the most efficient method. Of course, if you are not a subscriber and wish to be one, give us a call.

We will be contacting community groups to ask for their participation in this project. We anticipate that each group will canvas their membership and, if deciding to participate, will add names to the list. So far, we have had a favorable response. We are open to suggestions as to how the list will be organized, maintained, and distributed. If you or your group would like to discuss details, please attend the December and/or January Services Network Meeting. (See the article by Ann Olliges in this issue)

We considered a number of ideas about how to best maintain this list in our discussion. We agreed that the Community List should be on-going with names being added upon request. It could be maintained by GLSO or by the Services Network. Every group that participates could receive an initial list of mailing labels at cost and could receive additional sets of labels as needed. New groups that wish to participate would apply to the Services Network. We could have sub-categories such as voting districts. We still have to decide what agreement that should be made to insure discreet return addresses. We also need to clear about appropriate uses of the list and of course, we would stipulate that the list could not be sold.

We realize that some people have concern about putting their names on such a list As lesbian, gay and bisexual people, we have to continually decide how out to be. The members of the GLSO Board understand that some of us are not ready and others may not be interested in being on such a list. We would like to encourage participation however. It is often some degree of fear that keeps us quiet, unorganized and closeted. Sometimes we are concerned about loosing people close to us or sometimes we are concerned about the more extreme actions of right-wing fanatics and homophobes. The need we feel to protect ourselves can itself be harmful. We need to challenge ourselves to overcome our fears one step at a time. For some people, going to a concert or some other social event is the next step. For others, the time is right to attend a public political rally. The various groups who serve the various sectors of the lesbigay community need to know how to reach you to inform you of their events. We encourage you to leave your name on the list.



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ORGANIZING LEXINGTON'S GAY & LESBIAN VOTE

I have a map of the First District's Castlewood, Fairlawn, and Emerson precincts in my head. I have that map because I have walked more than half the streets in those precincts, knocking on every door as a Fairness volunteer campaigning for George Brown. What I also have, but never expected, is an image of those working class streets as surprisingly populous

with lesbians and gays.

One house I went to displayed a rainbow flag. A woman came to the door. I told her pointblank why she should vote for George Brown and asked her if she had any gay neighbors I should also speak to. She promptly directed me to two other houses on her street. On another street I found three gay households in a row. In every instance in which I suspected that the person answering my knock was a member of the community, I was right; and in each instance they directed me on to someone else a few doors down, or just around the corner, or on the next street up. If you ever feel discouraged by the infamous "1%" figure, just try going door to door. It will brighten your outlook immensely. What's more, it will show you quite clearly that gays and lesbians in Lexington have the potential

to become an organized voting bloc.

Fairness does not have a total for the number of gays and lesbians that its volunteers got to the polls for George Brown. It does know, however, that even in the three white working class precincts that George Brown lost, 29 voters—6% of everyone who voted were people contacted by Fairness. In the Hampton Court, Campsie, and North Broadway precincts—all won by Brown—the number of gays and lesbians whom Fairness urged to the polls probably ran at least twice what it did in the precincts Brown lost. Combine that with a scattering of gays and lesbians contacted in the District's remaining four precincts, and a minimal estimate of the number of voters which Fairness mobilized behind Brown is 100. One hundred votes doesn't sound like much until you consider the following: the 8th District council seat was won by 38 votes; Kathy Pratt won in the 3rd District by just 55 votes; the 7th District's council race was decided by 104 votes. One hundred votes can decide a local election. And remember, the estimate that 100 gay and lesbian voters were mobilized by Fairness is rockbottom minimal. The real figure may be closer to twice that.

Fairness and our community prevented a Radical Right candidate from winning this time, and we should

congratulate ourselves for that. There is, however, a down side. The down side is that we won only by an ad hoc "call all your friends" effort. We worked the grapevine right along with the pavement. But we could have won far more efficiently, with a lot less wear and tear, if our community just had a comprehensive mailing list of gay and lesbian voters. Unfortunately, we don't. Nor does Fairness have a ready means of compiling such a list. Fairness' only tap into the community is the sign-up sheet offered to people who drop in at the monthly Fairness meeting. And unlike an Iris Events concert or Tri State Gay Rodeo picnic, Fairness meetings do not draw throngs of people. Neither does Fairness produce a newsletter of broad general interest as GLSO does, thereby generating a subscriber list. Instead, if it's lucky, Fairness attracts two or three newcomers to its meeting every month and its mailing list grows accordingly, which is to say that that list will not become an effective means of reaching gay and lesbian voters anytime within the next decade. Unfortunately, our community will need such a list long before that. We will need such a list because there will be future Radical Right candidates in Lexington, possibly as early as next year, and because we need to muster concrete support, in large numbers, for candidates who go out on a political limb by supporting our rights. Moreover, having other organizations do mailings to their members on behalf of Fairness is not a solution, because what is needed is a mailing list organized by Urban-County and state legislative districts so that gay and lesbian voters in critical races can be reached.

Working the First District's precincts, I met gays and lesbians on every street. Virtually every community member I spoke to welcomed the information I gave them, especially since the candidates' stands on gay and lesbian issues was not information available through the Herald-Leader or other "straight" media. Many said that they hadn't known who to vote for, or that they might not have taken the time to vote if Fairness had not contacted them. Again and again people said, "It's great that Fairness is doing this!" In effect, they told me that gay and lesbian voters in this town are ready to be organized. But Fairness can't do the organizing alone. Organizing to prevent the election of Right wing legislators and judges, and to elect men and women who support our rights, will require the help of groups What is needed is this: those besides Fairness. organizations in our community that do have the ability to build large mailing lists need to find ways to serve as taps into the community for the purpose of creating a Community Voter's List. Then, maybe next time, the

grapevine can take a rest.

P-FLAG: We Heal Families

Are you concerned, in you gay, lesbian or bisexual lifestyle about how to develop or maintain a fulfilling relationship with your parents and families, especially at this holiday season? If you are, there are people in Lexington who understand, they have experienced the problems that sometimes occur as families of different lifestyles gather intergenerationally around the Thanksgiving table or the Christmas or Chanucka lights. You find people like this in PFLAG.

As you probably already know, PFLAG is a new and alive presence in Lexington. A chapter of this international organization began here in October. But it's not really new. You saw P-Flag people marching with pride in the Washington DC parade last summer on TV. You saw them lifting up a banner during the visit here in Lexington at Triangle Park on December 1. Why is this? Because they love and support their bisexual, lesbian and gay children and want to demonstrate these feelings to all, particularly to those who do not understand.

PFLAG has several purposes. First is the unwavering support of the rights of our lesbigay children. We seek to educate society and fight against the terrible evils of discrimination and homophobia.

Often talking to another parent who has dealt with similar issues can be a source of relief.

LEXINGTON FAIRNESS HELPS ELECT URBAN-COUNTY COUNCIL CANDIDATE

According to First District Council Member Elect George Brown and representatives of Lexington Fairness, Fairness was instrumental in Brown's November 2 win over opponent Pat McGill.

"A large part of what we were able to achieve in my campaign was due to Fairness and its membership," said Brown. "My appreciation is extended to all the members of Fairness. I definitely see us working together for the benefit of our communities in the future"

Fairness became involved in the Brown campaign after learning that McGill serves on the board of the conservative Kentucky Coalition of Christians. Consistent with the Right wing Christian Coalition's strategy of running covert "stealth" candidates, McGill did not disclose his right wing affiliation to the Herald-Leader. As a result, McGill's Coalition of Christians membership was not included in the Herald-Leader profile of him. Fairness instead discovered McGill's membership through its own independent sources.

According to Fairness Steering Committee Co-chair Julie Burns, upon learning of McGill's Right wing connection, Fairness approached Brown to see where

he stood on the question of civil rights protections for lesbians and gays. In Julie's words: "We were delighted to find that George was fully supportive of our community." Brown met twice with Fairness members, including one meeting at the home of a local community member.

Faced with one of the clearest choices offered in a local race, Fairness gave vigorous support to the Brown campaign. Fairness drew on its own supporters as well as other community organizations, such as Lexington's MCC, to recruit over twenty volunteers to do door to door leafletting and phone banking. Fairness volunteers, often working side by side with Brown, walked literally hundreds of streets in the First District on an almost daily basis during the last three weeks of Fairness also contacted all First District October. residents on its mailing list, as well as every other person Fairness volunteers knew in the District. Those contacted were asked to pass the word along to their gay, lesbian, and progressive neighbors. The result was a word of mouth campaign that Julie Burns believes "delivered a substantial majority of the gay vote in the First District to George."

Brown ultimately won with 63% of the vote, including 67% in the heavily gay Hampton Court precinct. Fairness' influence, however, extended well beyond Hampton Court and into those precincts carried by McGill. McGill won the overwhelmingly straight Castlewood, Fairlawn, and Emerson precincts, beating Brown by 340 votes to 158. But even in these conservative precincts, voter rosters show that 6% of the total vote and 20% of those who voted for Brown were gays and lesbians contacted by Fairness.

Asked to evaluate the significance of Fairness' work with the Brown campaign, Paul Fuller, Julie Burns' Co-chair, said: "It would be hard to overstate the importance of this development in the political life of our community. It was the first time in Lexington's history that a gay and lesbian organization worked hand in hand with a candidate for public office, not only contributing to the candidate's election but achieving coalition building between our community and leaders of Lexington's African-American community."

Services Network

If we don't unite all of our resources- professional, emotional, and financial, could what happened in Cincinnati happen here? It takes time, effort, and a commitment from our diverse service organizations to create a unified lesbigay community. One way we are doing this is through the Services Network.

A representative from each of Lexington Organizations meets on the first Saturday of each month at 11:00am (in the event of holiday weekends, the meeting moves to the second Saturday).

How can meeting once a month strengthen our

community?

1) To have a representative from each of our diverse groups when decisions affecting our community are made (sometimes decisions need to be made on short notice)

2) A quick, effective way to disseminate information to

hundreds of people.

3) Develop a comprehensive mailing list of lesbigay supportive individuals (for use on election information of political candidates)

4) Coordinate and quickly inform lesbigays of community events (Pride week, rallies, vigils parades)

5) Obtain and maintain a lesbigay community center. 6) Share resources (advertising, money, equipment, professional expertise)

7) Avoid scheduling conflicts of events and fundraisers.

8) Support, attend, and co-produce events and fundraisers.

The Services Network is vital to strengthening our splintered lesbigay community. a representative is needed from each group to attend these monthly meetings. Next meeting date is December 4 at 11:00 am, call Ann at 266-6568 for further information.

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NEWS SHORTS

New York: Mayor Dinkins announced that on January 1 all New York City municipal employees will be eligible for health benefits for domestic partners including gay and lesbian couples.

Denver: The Colorado Supreme Court refused to let the state enforce the anti-gay Amendment 2 voted in by Coloradoans last year. The CO Supreme Court decision blocks enforcement until the constitutionality of the amendment is decided.

New York: Exit polls found that between 8-9% of voters in the NYC mayorial race identified themselves as lesbigay. This figure is double those self-identifying as such from previous elections. 70% of the gay vote went to the losing Democratic incumbent, David Dinkins.

Cincinnati: A judge has blocked Cincinnati's Issue 3 that was voted into law by Cincinnatians in November. Issue 3 is a city-wide version of Colorado's Amendment 2 that not only repeals the city's law protecting people from discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation but also prohibits Cincinnati from enacting any law protecting gay, lesbian or bisexual people from discrimination. The judge's decision is based on the questionable constitutionality of the new law.

The passage of Issue 3 has also led to a nationwide boycott of Cincinnati. Three conferences have already moved out of the city or are seeking alternative sites: United Church of Christ, American Library Assoc., and American Historical Assoc.

Chile: 19 people were killed when a mysterious fire broke out at the door of a crowded gay disco in Valparaiso. The government claims the fire was due to faulty electrical wiring but witnesses claim otherwise.

Washington: After IGLA (Int'l. Gay and Lesbian Association) granted consultive roster status to NAMBLA (North American Man/Boy Love Association), P-FLAG (Parents and Friends of Lesbians and Gays) issued a statement denouncing NAMBLA's participation as a pedophile organization fostering sex between adult men and young boys.

LLDEF Case of the Month

Lambda Legal Defense and Education Fund is a group of lawyers, legal workers and supporters defending the rights of lesbians, gay men, bisexuals and PWAs in the courts of the land for 20 years. Below is a case from their 1993 Lambda Update showing their continuing work and the issues facing our community:

Ad Hoc Committee of Proud Black Lesbians and Gays (PBLG) v. Defender Charities, Inc. (Illinois)

LLDEF filed a complaint for PBLG before the Chicago Commission on Human Relations after the group's application for a place in the Bud Billiken parade (advertised as the nation's largest African-American parade) was turned down. Defender Charities, the parade organizers, claimed that the PBLG application was denied due to a lack of "space, time and manpower." This reason was shown to be a lie when another application (with the mention of gay and lesbian removed) was approved although submitted a month later. LLDEF and PBLG settled out of court to allow PBLG to march in the parade under their own banner in support of visibility, youth education and anti-violence.

HUNDREDS GATHER IN MID-WEST TO BATTLE RIGHT WING INITIATIVES

Washington, D.C. - (September 9, 1993) - More than 300 activists gathered in Cincinnati Labor Day weekend to plan strategies to defeat anti-gay initiatives on the state and local levels in the Mid-West. The Fight the Right Mid-West Regional Summit, held September 4 and 5, was cosponsored by the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force (NGLTF) and Stonewall Cincinnati, a local gay and lesbian political organization.

Following the passage of Amendment 2 in Colorado last November, Far Right groups announced plans to pursue similar anti-gay initiatives across the country. Activists from Ohio, Indiana, Kentucky, Illinois, Michigan, Missouri, and Wisconsin met at the summit to learn skills and share information to battle those initiatives.

Following an opening address by Peri Jude Radecic, NGLTF Deputy Director of Public Policy, summit participants offered regional reports on Right Wing activity in their states and cities. The summit featured a dramatic plenary session entitled "Civil Rights vs. Special Rights," presented by speakers Suzanne Pharr CONTINUED TO NEXT PAGE

of the Arkansas Women's Project, Scot Nakagawa, NGLTF Fight the Right Field Organizer, and Suzanne Goldberg of Lambda Legal Defense and Education Fund. Nine workshops followed, focusing on media advocacy, coalition building, grassroots organizing, opposition research, legal issues, campaign organizing, and direct action techniques.

Summit participants screened a new Right Wing anti-gay video called, "Gay Rights, Special Rights," which includes interviews and footage from the March on Washington. Activists discussed ways to counter the misinformation of that video and others that circulate around the country during debates over gay

and lesbian rights.

The summit was held as activists in Cincinnati are gearing up to defeat in local anti-gay initiative on the November ballot. That measure, known as Issue 3, would repeal a section of the city's human rights ordinance, which bans discrimination based on sexual orientation. The initiative would also prohibit future inclusion of sexual orientation in the human rights ordinance. Issue 3 is similar to Colorado's Amendment 2.

"The summit was a critical step in developing a cohesive strategy against attacks by Right Wing hate groups," said Betsy Gressler, NGLTF board member in Cincinnati and summit host committee chair. "Cincinnati and the Mid-West have emerged as key battlegrounds


in the fight to oppose anti-gay initiatives."

"We can't have another Colorado," said NGLTF's Radecic. "Activists battling these initiatives need to work together and share information, strategies and skills. And the national gay and lesbian civil rights movement needs to support the activists on the front lines in these battles, because the results have

impact nationwide."

The Mid-West summit was the second regional summit sponsored by NGLTF. The first was held earlier this year in Colorado. NGLTF will organize future regional summits. NGLTF's Nakagawa and Robert Bray, NGLTF Fight the Right grassroots media trainer, are currently touring the country, organizing one-day training sessions for local groups battling the Right Wing. Upcoming trainings will be held in Tampa, Florida (Sept. 18), Ft. Lauderdale, Florida (Sept. 20 & 21), Boise, Idaho (Sept. 25). Phoenix, Arizona (Oct. 9). Oklahoma City, Oklahoma (Oct. 23), Laramie, Wyoming (Nov. 30) and Missoula, Montana (Dec. 4). The NGLTF Creating Change conference, to be held in Durham, North Carolina November 12-14, will also include full-day intensive sessions on battling the Far Right.
