Bo List slides his resumé out of a neat leather briefcase like a man unsheathing a sword. Placing it on the table between us, he points to the top.

"It doesn't look so good," List says, referring to the layout, "but all the information's there."

The 25-year-old UK theater senior has a formidable arsenal of past directing experience cataloged on his resume. Besides the forthcoming "Much Ado About Nothing," List has eight directors' credits and three assistant directors' credits to his name.

Back in the air

The UK Hospital resumed medical helicopter service from Jackson for the first time since a UK helicopter crashed in Breathie county last month, hospital officials said. The new helicopter, a Sikorsky S-76 identical to the aircraft that crashed June 14, killing four crew members, began service at Monday, July 5 at 11 a.m. "We're pleased to again be able to offer this service to eastern and southeastern Kentucky," Colleen Swartz, director of trauma and emergency transport for the hospital said. "We are recommitting to our original mission of increased availability." The late-night crash occurred minutes after the helicopter took off from Jackson's Tulian Carroll Airport on its way back to Lexington for the night. Those killed were pilots Ernest L. Jones Ar., 49, of Oakwood Village, Ohio, and Don Greene, 46, of Somerset; flight nurse Sheila Zellers, 43, of Elizabethtown; and paramedic Brian Harden, 31, of Richmond.

No patient was aboard the flight. Investigators have not yet determined what caused the helicopter to slam into a rugged mountainside just southeast of the airport.

The new helicopter is from the fleet of Lafayette, La-based Petroleum Helicopters inc., which has leased helicopters to UK since the hospital began its air medical service in 1987.


The new craft, which has not yet been customized with the UK logo or colors, will be called "UK Three." "UK Two" was the designation of the helicopter that crashed and has been retired, along with the numbers of the crew members stilled in the accident.

Watching this year's Hamlet, it's easy to remember what a pleasure good Shakespeare can be. Even during a dress rehearsal, the production are both excellent, and the lighting is superb.

Of all the works in the Shakespearean canon, Hamlet stands among the most widely known and quoted plays. It's not the bloodiest or most romantic, and certainly but it represents one of Shakespeare's most thematically strong works.

A theme of murder, revenge, love, the loyalties of friendship, the loyalties of family and questioning the futility of existence, are evident. It's all interwoven into the two-plus hours running time the plot is squeezed into.



Rather, fans got to experience his imperfections — the shooting slump of early last season, the academic probation of a few years ago, the would-be clutch shots that failed to fall.

Scott Padgett's imperfections make him the perfect hero, insofar as he shows us what can be accomplished with hard work and determination.

Suspect in midwest shootings bought guns illegally CHICAGO — The white supremacist suspect in last weekend's deadly two state shooting spree got his guns last month from an lilegal gun dealer, a federal agent said today.

Benjamin Nathaniel Smith bought the guns from an unlicensed gun dealer in the Peoria area, said Jerry Singer, a special agent for the federal Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms.

The rampage, which included shootings of minorities in several Illinois cities and in Bloomington, ind., ended Stunday with Smith committing suicide as police tried to arrest him in the southern Illinois town of Salem. Singer said Smith bought a Bryco. 380-caliber semiautomatic handgun on June 28 —days after he was turned away from a licensed gun shop. Then June 28 is Smith bought a 22-caliber psito), Singer said the ATF had already been investigating the unlicensed dealer before Smith bought the guns. The person's name has been turned over to the U.S. Attorney's office in Springfield for possible charges, he said.

"I am completely and utterly innocent." he said after the sentencing, "if
we win the appeal, the sentence becomes irrelevant." An appeal must be
filed within 10 days.
Callan is to report to prison voluntarily in about four weeks. The location has not been determined. Meanwhile, he said he would be back in
