


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

KENTUCKY vs. OREGON STATE

Kentucky and Oregon State meet for the first time on the gridiron tonight and the Wıldcats culdn't have picked a better Beaver team for the series inaugural.

Led by battering fullback Bill (Earthquake) Enyart, the Beavers bring to Lexington a squad which is big, experienced and rated in pre-season polls as one of the nation's better teams.

Coach Dee Andros' team, which was upset, 21-20, by an aroused Iowa team in the opener, bounced back to defeat Utah, 24-21, although star quarterback Stan Preece didn't

Enyart, a 235-pound fullback, put on a fantastic offensive show at Salt Lake City, carrying 50 times for 299 yards, scoring three touchdowns and virtually rewriting the OSU rushing record book.

Last year, Enyart carried 201 times for 851 yards (losing only three yards all season) for eight touchdowns and a 4.2 average. He's off to a much faster start this year and brought his touchdown total to six with scring plunges of one and two yards as the Beavers defeated Washington, 35-21, Sat-

While Oregon State lost its first game and bounced back with two straight victories, Kentucky has taken the opposite direction. The Wildcats pened with a 12-6 upset of Missouri on Stoll Field and then lost to Ole Miss, 30-14, at Jackson and Auburn, 26-7, last Saturday in Lexington.

While OSU has been getting premiere performances from its offense in general and fullback in particular, the Wildcats have been experiencing difficulties in moving the ball conDicky Lyons, "Mr. Everything" of the Wildcats, has gained 182 of the team's 264-yards rushing wh.le carrying the ball exactly half (64 of 128 rushes) the team total. He has scored 24 of the team's 33 points.

Fullbacks Roger Gann, Dick Beard and Jim Mitchell have gained 91 yards in 45 carries and accounted for only six points, a three-yard score by Beard against Mississippi

The Wildcats have been plagued by crippling mistakes,

especially in the last two games.


They have been penalized a total of 21 times for 227 yards this season and on 11 of those occasions, the opposition got a first down. The Wildcats have lost seven of eight fumbles at crucial moments and saw a blocked punt go for an Auburn touchdown last Saturday. That was the first Wildcat punt blocked since Charlie Bradshaw has been head coach.

There have been bright spots on the Wildcat ledger, especially the defensive play of noseguard David Roller, a sophomore from Dayton, Tenn. Roller was named SEC lineman of the week by the Associated Press for his performance against Missouri and has finished high in balloting each week. He received the team's "Wildman" award for the Ole Miss game.


Phil Thompson, leading pass receiver last season, has caught 12 passes for 194 yards while Vic King has caught six for 57 yards. The Wildcat passing attack has left a bit to be desired, with only 27 completions in 75 attempts for 365 yards and no touchdowns. Seven Wildcat passes have been intercepted.

Bradshaw said the Wildcats must correct silly mistakes if they expect to win against such competition as Oregon

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Governor Boosts Wildcat Gridders . . .

Louie B. Nunn, an architect of impressive changes and progress since his inauguration less than a year ago as the 56th Governor of Kentucky, believes strongly that self-reliance, pride and courage are the by-products of intercollegiate athletics.

Chairman of the Board of Trustees at the University of Kentucky, Governor Nunn leads Kentuckians in support of a football program to match the dramatic recent progress which has touched every part of the UK community.

An avid sportsman and spectator, the Governor's scarce moments of relaxation during the Fall are divided among hunting, fishing and football.

Governor Nunn's deep concern for education was reflected in his budget, which contained record appropriations for every level from grade school to vocational schools, colleges and universities.

Governor Nunn, 44, is a native of Barren County. He attended Bowling Green Business University, the University of Cincinnati and the University of Louisville, where he earned a law degree in 1950

A successful attorney, Governor Nunn has served in both executive and judicial positions. The third Republican this century to be elected Governor in Kentucky formerly served as a county judge and city attorney.





University's President Knows Value of An Athletic Program . .

Meet UK's interim president, Dr. A. D. "Ab" Kirwan, whose remarkable career has brought a distinguished teaching influence to both the classroom and the playing field. Also, he is no stranger to administrative problems in either sports or academics.

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In 1947, Dr. Kirwan was named dean of men at UK, and in 1959 was asked to serve as dean of the Graduate School. After several years in each of these posts he requested to be relieved of his administrative duties so that he could devote full time to his favored profession—teaching and studying history.

He received his A.B. degree from UK in 1926, a master's degree from the University of Louisville in 1944 and was awarded the doctorate by Duke University in 1947. He also holds an L.L.B. degree from the Jefferson School of Law.

During his student days at UK, Dr. Kirwan was an outstanding athlete doubling as a half-back and end, and captained the Wildcat football squad in his senior year. In the late 'twenties

and early 'thirties he returned to his home town to serve as teacher and coach successively at both Louisville Male and Manual High Schools. In 1931 he was married to Miss Elizabeth Lewis Heil.


Then in 1938, "Ab" Kirwan came back to his alma mater as head football coach, and in his six seasons as the second Kentucky graduate ever to hold the coaching job the Wildcats compiled a record of 24 wins, 28 losses and four ties.

He quit the gridiron voluntarily early in 1945 to teach in the University's Department of History.

Dr. Kirwan is widely recognized for his work in Civil War history.

Dr. Kirwan has held numerous positions in both the Southeastern Conference and the NCAA, serving as chairman of the Infractions Committee of the NCAA, and as a member of the Executive Committee of the Southeastern Conference.



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The appointment of Harry C. Lancaster as acting director of athletics of the University of Kentucky effective Sept. 1, was hailed in athletic, academic, alumni and lay circles as a most appropriate move, as well as a just and fitting recognition and reward for a person who has given more than a quarter century of dedicated service to the University.

Furthermore, there was no doubt that Lancaster was fully capable of filling the vacancy left by the death Dec. 10, 1967 of Bernie A. Shively.

Lancaster picked up the reins of administrative leadership with ease, thanks to the respect of colleagues, players, associates and persons with whom he has come in contact during a varied and productive career of coaching and teaching. In fact, the appointment gave him an opportunity to expand beyond his nationally known role of assistant to basketball's winningest coach Adolph Rupp.

The Rupp-Lancaster association, begun after the latter was discharged from the U.S. Navy as a lieutenant (s.g.) in 1946, has been one of mutual respect and harmony. Rupp made Lancaster a full assistant in 1948. During the two previous years, the youthful Navy veteran had busied himself by serving as part-time assistant

while carrying on teaching duties and studying for a master's degree.

The dual duties, plus extra studies, were second nature to Lancaster, who had served as assistant football and basketball coach at Georgetown College (1932-33) and Paris High School (1933-34), head basketball coach at Bagdad High School (1934-36) and principal and coach at Gleneyrie High school (1936-42) and physical education instructor at UK in 1942. He was to carry on that trend of carrying extra loads, serving as UK's baseball coach for 17 seasons prior to relinquishing the post following the 1965 campaign and teaching a physical education class during the past 18 years.

Basketball was his forte, however, and he became recognized as one of the game's master strategists and designer of offenses and defenses to fit certain situations. In addition to coaching Rupp's freshman teams, he has always been at the side of the "baron" during the heat of battle. In his own right, Lancaster has traveled extensively and received a signal honor when he was invited to prepare the Greek National Basketball Team for the 1968 Olympics. A six-week tour in Athens was cancelled when Lancaster was asked to stay home and serve as acting athletics chief of staff.





Wildcat Coaching Staff

One new face is included in Coach **Charlie Bradshaw's** coaching staff as the 78th season of football gets under way at the University of Kentucky.

Replacing veteran George Sengel, who left UK prior to fall practice to become an area scout for the National Football League, is Wilburn Tucker, former head coach at Tennessee Tech.

Coach Tucker brings to the Wildcat staff 22 years coaching experience, including the last 14 years as head coach.

His record includes a 55-34 Ohio Valley Conference slate which included five championships (1955-58-59-60-61).

Tucker is part of an offense staff coordinated by **Jim Poynter**, a former Wildcat (1959-60) who had a great schoolboy coaching career (40-10-1) at Glasgow, Clark County and Henry Clay before joining Bradshaw's staff two years ago as offensive backfield coach.

The offensive staff is rounded out by William (Moon) Conde another former Wildcat who returned to Alma Mater a year ago, and Phil (Duke) Owen, who are responsible for the offensive line. The 41-year-old Conde is a former Wildcat player of the glorious early fifties "Bowl Era." During his undergraduate days at Kentucky, he saw action as an offensive guard and linebacker on defense.

Senior coach in length of service to the profession is **Clarence** (**Buckshot**) **Underwood**, whose primary responsibility is the defensive end corps. Underwood, line coach for the Wildcats from 1948-55, returned to UK ranks in 1966. A native of West Virginia, he had a sparkling coaching career (77-26-6) record at Thomas Jefferson High School in Port Arthur, Texas.

Co-ordinating the defense and concentrating on linebackers is **Doug Shively**, who played end for the Wildcats from 1956 through 1958 and was co-captain his final year. He returned to the Kentucky campus in 1966 after one year as an assistant to Underwood at Port Arthur and six years as an aide at Virginia Tech.

The defensive staff includes two other promising and proven young coaches.

Leon Fuller, former All-Conference defensive back and academic


All-America at Alabama, came to Kentucky in 1966 from Oklahoma State, where he was an assistant for three years. He was a four-sports standout at Nederland (Texas) High School before attaining junior college All-America honors at Tyler, Texas. He played his final two years under Bradshaw, then an assistant at Alabama. He is responsible for the defensive backfield.


Charley Pell, who joined the Wildcats in 1966 at a defensive interior line coach, completed a military obligation last year in time for fall practice and is responsible for the defensive interior line. He was a defensive standout in the Alabama line.

Phil (Duke) Owen, who joined the Wildcat staff in 1964 after a highly successful career at Mt. Sterling, coached the Wildcat freshmen two years before receiving his first varsity assignment, working with backs on both offense and defense, year before last. His responsibilities also include the kicking game.

Wally English, who worked directly with the quarterbacks and passing game last season, has moved to head coach of the freshmen. He joined UK as a graduate assistant in 1965 after serving as an assistant at DeSales High School in 1959 and head coach four years at Bishop David High School in Louisville and one year at Mt. Carmel High in Houston, Texas. He is also responsible for all film exchanges, perpetual inventory of football equipment and co-ordination of the visitation program for high school and college students.

Another new face in the staff lineup is **Chris Patrick**, who came to UK in March as haad trainer, succeeding Ralph Berlin, now with the Pittsburgh Steelers. Patrick is a graduate of Central High School in Fayetteville, Tenn., and the University of Tennessee, where he earned a B.S. in physical education. He also holds an M.A. degree in secondary education from Eastern Kentucky University (1963). He has served as head trainer of all sports at Eastern and as assistant football coach for one season at Erlanger-Lloyd High School. He joined the staff of Florida State in June 1964 as associate athletic trainer and then was head trainer the past three years at Mississippi State.





Wildcat Coach Sets Winning Tradition . . .

The fruits of six hard years of working for better athletics programs throughout the Commonwealth may be realized in the near future for Charlie Badshaw, head football coach at the Univesity of Kentucky. Bradshaw, a 43-year-old former UK end and assistant coach, returned to his alma mater in 1962 with a two-fold mission—rebuild the sputtering Wildcat football fortunes and develop good athletics and pride throughout the state.

Current recruiting gives Brashaw three good years in a row. Coupled with a "red-shirt" program, this lends hope that Wildcat numbers may finally be built to a level needed to compete in the SEC.

Bradshaw started his football at the age of 15 at Sidney Lanier High School in his hometown of Montgomery, Alabama. He attended one semester at the University of Kentucky in 1942 before entering the Marines.

After three years service, including 19 months in the Pacific Theater, he returned to UK to play on Paul Bryant's first three Wildcat teams.

Bradshaw earned the first of four letters as a center in 1946 and the three more as a 165-pound end.

He joined the coaching staff as a student assistant in 1949 and then, in 1950, returned to Sidney Lanier as coach and coordinator of a junior high program—a position he retained until chosen an aide on the first UK staff of Blanton Collier in 1954.

Bradshaw served five years as end coach and later backfield coach before moving in 1959 to Alabama as a line coach for Bryant.

In 1962—his first season as UK head coach—Bradshaw's "Thin Thirty" won just three games. Bradshaw built his forces to a national contender in 1965, when an injury-plagued squad finished 6-4 and 17th in the final UPI poll.

The preceding year, Bradshaw was named National Coach of the Week after his team defeated No. 1 ranked Ole Miss at Jackson. Bradshaw served as an assistant on the Gray's coaching staff for the 1962 Blue-Gray Game that year in Montgomery, Alabama.

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
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


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
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
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
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
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WHERE ARE THE LEADERS?

With few exceptions the leaders of tomorrow in all walks of life are on the college campus today. Some of them are here in this stadium, either on the gridiron or in the stands.

While preparation for positions of responsibility generally is accomplished in the college classroom, many of the qualities possessed by men who become our leaders are acquired by practical experience and training which are not a part of the normal college curriculum. Many of these qualities are developed on the athletic field or through extracurricular activities. They are acquired to a significant degree through participation in the ROTC program.

Army ROTC, which is offered at 259 of our leading colleges and universities, is specifically designed to develop officers for national defense. But it provides training which produces leaders for other pursuits.

ROTC teaches college men to organize their activities, to motivate and lead others and to accept responsibility. It provides training and practical experience which develops self-discipline and self-confidence. These qualities and abilities are essential to success in an Army officer's career—they are

equally important for success in other career fields.

Men who possess them are in demand for positions of responsibility in government, business and industry, the professions and other fields of endeavor. Employers of college graduates state that they prefer men with ROTC training and experience as Army officers and many pay a premium, in the form of higher starting salaries, to get them.

Through Army ROTC, young men not only earn a commission and fulfill their military obligation as officers, but they also increase their opportunities for success in careers of their choice.

Students about to enter college and selected students already in college may take advantage of these opportunities by completing a four-year or a two-year program while they earn their degree.

The four-year program consists of a two-year basic course and a two-year advanced course. Students enrolling in the two-year program attend a six-week summer camp between their sophomore and junior years which takes the place of the basic course.

Outstanding students may win Army ROTC scholarships. Fouryear scholarships are awarded on a competitive basis to outstanding high school graduates and two-year scholarships are awarded to selected ROTC students who have completed the basic course. Each scholarship pays for tuition, text-books and lab fees and provides a tax-free subsistence allowance of \$50 per month for the duration of the award.

More than 4,100 of the approximately 167,000 college students now enrolled in Army ROTC are attending college on Army ROTC scholarships. Over 1,794 scholarships were awarded this year.

Army ROTC students on approximately 150 campuses may participate in the ROTC Flight Instruction Program through which they may qualify for a private pilot's license.

The young man who wants to be among the leaders of tomorrow will find that Army ROTC offers significant opportunities and advantages.

The Professor of Military Science at any of the colleges and universities offering Army ROTC and guidance counselors in high schools, junior colleges or colleges can provide detailed information on the program. I invite you to investigate both the opportunities and the advantages it offers.

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
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
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
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
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
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

UK Scientists, Economists, Lawyers Look into the Nation's Water Supply

When you wash your face tonight you might be using the same water Julius Caesar used centuries ago because the world's supply of water has been in use over and over again since the beginning of the world.

There is only one water resource and it follows the great "hydrological cycle"—from ocean, through evaporation, into the sky; then in the form of rain or snow it falls on the earth; after use by man, plants and industry, the water flows down again into the sea to restart the endless, timeless cycle.

Under the aegis of the UK Water Resources Institute directed by Dr. Robert A. Lauderdale, scientists from ten different university disciplines are studying various phases of the national problem. These several projects are jointly financed by the University and the U.S. Department of the Interior Office of Water Resources Research. The projects are coordinated by the WRI and linked

with other studies being made in universities and government agencies. New projects are under study at UK for future proposal to the coordinating office. Some are based on findings already established by UK researchers.

Man is an extravagant user of fresh water, especially in our modern technological societies in which industry has become a voracious user of water. To produce one ton of acetate industry requires 240,000 gallons of water, 660,000 for a ton of synthetic rubber.

Agriculture also uses a huge volume of water, from 75 to 100 billion gallons per day for irrigation alone. A single slice of bread requires 37 gallons to produce, a pound of beef almost 4,000 gallons. The United States uses more than 400 billion gallons of fresh water per day.

The total world water supply amounts to millions of cubic miles, but 97 percent of it is held in salty oceans and inland seas, unfit for human use.

The ever-growing demand for fresh water is a source of anxiety to scientists interested in conserving our water resources and assuring the maximum use of them during that part of the hydrological cycle which applies to man's well being.

Scientists and researchers at the University of Kentucky have undertaken a series of 16 different study phases of water resource purification, utilization, and conservation. Some of the projects were begun more than three years ago.

A number of projects deal with Kentucky's generous supply of underground water, how to locate these natural reservoirs and make the water available for use.

Agricultural scientists are studying the use of water by plants, seeking ways to obtain maximum value from the water before it is drained away into the oceans.

Botanists, geologists, chemists and microbiologists are examining pollution sources seeking methods of

eliminating them. These studies go afield into forests and streams, into city sewage and industrial waste disposal sytem, eeking way to correct polluting influences.


A professor of electrical engineering is researching a pollution-detection system using a laser light beam as the detective.

The economics of flood control and the use of stored-up waters is another field under study.

The legal aspects of water resource storage and usage is another facet being researched by a professor of law.

Dr. Lauderdale said these research projects "will contribute to national efforts to combat pollution, conserve water resources, and assure their maximum availability and economic usage."

He added that each of the university researchers is "qualified by previous studies in his particular field to bring to his project the best scientific knowledge available at the University." Join The
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
