# Imperial Court of Iky Celebrates 26th Year of Jundraising

The Imperial Court of Kentucky will celebrate 26 years of continuous fundraising with its 26th annual Coronation Ball and related activities the weekend of June 1 – 4. The Imperial Court was organized in 1982 and is a charter member of the International Court System, a group of over 70 such groups throughout the United States, Canada and Mexico.

Located in Lexington, the Court is a 501© 3 charity organization with a dedicated mission to fundraise for other 501© 3 organizations that serve the LGBT community. This year, the Court has designated Moveable Feast Lexington, AVOL, GLSO and Kentucky Fairness Alliance as their primary beneficiaries. Since 2000, the Imperial Court of Kentucky has donated over \$115,000 to local and

national charity organizations.

The Coronation Ball includes a celebration of the year's successful fundraising, the appointment of the next year's Board of Directors and the election of Emperor and Empress, the figurehead leaders of the organization. This year, His Most Imperial Majesty, Emperor 25 John Ridener, and Her Most Imperial Majesty, Empress 25 Sierra Reign, invite you to join them for "Through the Looking Glass—A Mad, Mad, Mad Tea Party!", an Alice in Wonderland-themed evening filled with celebration, grand entertainment and recognition.

Coronation weekend is the first official Pride Month activity in Lexington. The weekend starts with the In-Town Show on Friday at the Bar Complex. Doors open at 7:30 pm and the show begins at 8 pm. Admission is \$5 donation.

The show will feature many of Lexington's favorite court performers, and will be held in the upstairs dance floor area.

### Southern Comfort

On Sunday, June 3 GLSO will be showing Southern Comfort, the winner of the Grand Jury Prize, for Best Documentary at the 2003 Sundance Film Festival. Join us at 2 pm at the Pride Center, 389 Waller Ave.

Southern Comfort focuses primarily on Robert Eads, a 52-year-old ftm transsexual who lives in the back hills of Georgia. "A hillbilly and proud of it," he cuts a striking figure: sharp-tongued, bearded, tobacco pipe in hand. Robert has a number of trans friends who also tell parts of their life stories.

Robert was diagnosed with ovarian cancer, then turned away by more than two dozen doctors who feared that taking on a transgendered patient might harm their practice.

In the last year of his life, Robert falls in love with Lola, a mtf, and, with her ,fulfills a dream by attending a prom at the Southern Comfort Conference in Atlanta, the preeminent transgender gathering.

A rare blend of humor, romance, and tragedy, Southern Comfort is the first non-fiction film to intimately tell a trans-to-trans love story, set against a disturbing tale of gender bias as it unfolds.



### Local Chapter Resigns from KFA Forms Independent Group

All nine members of the steering committee of the Bluegrass Chapter of the Kentucky Fairness Alliance (KFA) have decided to step down to form an independent organization. This group, named Bluegrass Fairness, will work on local gay, lesbian, bisexual, and transgender issues by focusing on grassroots movements and educational and outreach opportunities.

Lexington Fairness was originally organized in 1992 as an advocacy group that worked to promote GLBT rights. Five years later, we developed a formal board and affiliated ourselves with the Ky Fairness Alliance, becoming the Bluegrass Chapter.

At this time, the newly formed Bluegrass Fairness has decided to return our focus to local community involvement and activism. We will work toward fairness under the law using a variety of educational and networking approaches. We will also continue our lobbying efforts.

Bluegrass Fairness will work closely with other LGBT groups and allies to promote fairness on several different levels. "We want to work with everyone out there who is interested in equality for gays and lesbians," says Aaron Hutson, treasurer of the group. We already have strong ties with local legislators and groups including the Imperial Court of Kentucky and the Gay and Lesbian Service Organization.

"Certainly, the options are limitless when it comes to the networking and initiatives we can create in our efforts to promote fairness through community involvement," states Beth Hartmann, secretary of Bluegrass Fairness. Members of Bluegrass Fairness are excited and looking forward to creating a fair and equal Kentucky for all GLBT persons.

# Directions to Windy Knoll Farm 3263 Cleveland Road North

Your goal is marked by the red star on the map below. From Lexington, go out of town on Winchester Rd heading east. Midland Ave., by the Herald Leader, runs into Winchester Rd. You can also take New Circle Road (in orange) around to Winchester Rd. From the intersection of Winchester and New Circle (near where it says


Eastland), go east 5.5 miles toward Winchester.

Turn left (north) onto N Cleveland Rd (RT 1973). Down 1/2 mileon the left will be David's Fork Baptist Church. The Windy Knoll driveway is right next to the church property. A mailbox with the street number 3263 will be on your right, directly across from the driveway.

Turn left into driveway.

If you are arriving on I-75, north or south, take exit 110, onto Winchester Rd. Route 60. Go East towards Winchester, about 2 1/2 miles to Cleveland Rd.

From the east on I-64, you can take exit 94, which will put you on the bypass near Winchester. Go south on the by pass, turn right (west) on 60. Cleveland Rd will then be on your right. If you get lost, call 859-221-4396.

### Gallerie Soleil Presents Cast Days

Last Days is an exhibit based on the life of Saint Russell, a young, flamboyant, gay artist, rock musician, street personality and voice of our times. In October, 2006, Russell took his own life, leaving behind a stack of journals and a few props and trinkets. From the scant evidence of his short life, a group of artists has sought to make some sense of his walk among us, his soul searching rants, his words of wisdom, his struggle to survive and express himself and his search for truth and meaning.

The result is an overwhelming journey to the heart of loss, inspiration, despair, possible redemption and the celebration of a like to short. The artists have sought to make this exhibit a life altering experience to those unfamiliar with the devastation of gay teen suicide.

Last Days questions our community and the larger society on issues of alienation, homophobia, creative freedom, drug addiction and alcoholism, and the role of religion in adolescent despair and suicide.



### The Positive View By Dr. Sherry and Dr. Skippy Part 5: Being a Positive Role Model

Roles models are important to us as we grow and develop, even in adulthood. We find our role models at school, in our communities, at work, or among our family and friends. For gay men and lesbians, however, finding role models who share their sexual identity can be very challenging because of the lack of access to a range of visible GLBT persons.

The responses to our survey indicated that gay men and lesbians recognize the importance of being a positive role model and find great satisfaction in giving of themselves in this way. For example, one gay man wrote, "I find it positive to be a role model for the gay community in my workplace. I enjoy being openly gay in the workplace, particularly where I work with younger gay and lesbian students who look to me for support and guidance."

A lesbian participant wrote, "I think my partner and I, working as 'out' lesbians, try to set an example and be good role models for ALL our friends, including our lesbian friends and couples."

In serving as a positive social role model, a gay man submitted, "Younger people look up to me and see you can be gay, happy, and in a committed relationship."

For one of the lesbian participants, being a positive role model took the form of mentoring a young woman who was newly out and providing her with the role model she wished she had when coming out: "I became a mentor of sorts to her. It made me so happy to know that she felt she could come to me for support, and I always took time with her, because having gone through some of the same experiences, I would have loved to be able to talk to someone that I could trust."

In other research that we have conducted, we have found that same-sex couples express a desire to have visible, positive same-sex couple role models. While there are many similarities between opposite-sex and same-sex couple relationships, there are also differences. For same-sex couples, it is important to see positive, long-term, committed, loving relationships. One respondent wrote about her family and friends' view of her relationship, "They see that we are happy together, complement each other, are good forces in each others' lives, and they admire our relationship.

Who are the people that you look to for inspiration about how to live your best life? How might you be a positive role model to others in the GLBT community? Most of us vastly underestimate our impact on those around us. What types of positive messages do you want others to read in your life? What small actions can you take to be a positive role model of life well-lived as a GLBT person?
