Video Display Terminal Precautions

Recent studies from the Library and Information Technology Association (LITA) and the American Optometric Association give the following recommendations for the use of VDTs.

Operators' arms should be at 90 degree angles at the elbows.

Chairs should be adjustable for height.

Screens should be covered with antiglare shields.

Lighting should be indirect.

Screen-hoods should be used to cut glare.

VDTs should be adequately ventilated to reduce build-up of negative ions, dust, smoke, and pollen.

Work surfaces should be light-colored and textured.

Work areas should be decorated with attractive posters, photos, etc. to encourage restful focusing of eyes away from the screen.

The height of the VDT should be set with the top of the screen 10 degrees above and the center of the screen 20 degrees below the operator's straight-ahead vision.

Reference materials should be placed at the same distance from the eyes as the screen.

Lighting should be set at only 30-50 candles; characters on the screen should be 3-4 times brighter than the room light and 10 times brighter than the screen background.

There should be no bright light behind the operator.

Terminals should be adjustable for height and tilt.

Keyboards should be less than 60 mm thick.

Keyboards should have matte finishes.

Key tops should be concave.

Color and brightness should be adjustable.

Also recommended are annual visual examinations, regular work breaks of 15 minutes every two hours, and permission for pregnant staff to refuse work on terminals during the term of the pregnancy.

Special glasses are being made for users of bifocal and trifocal lenses to make terminal use more comfortable and to reduce emissions reaching the eyes.

This coming January, ALA will introduce ALANET, an electronic mail service which will link members and provide access to library suppliers, information bulletins, various databases, and document delivery systems.

Access requires any standard terminal and a modem. Costs include a \$30 signup fee, \$7.50 a month billing fee, and a connect-hour charge for system use.

INFORMATION FROM THE PRESERVATION COMMITTEE

An intelligent assessment of potential problems can often prevent terrible results. In older buildings, plumbing and wiring are often hazardous and should be inspected. Repairmen and contractors must understand the need for care when they work with pipes, welding equipment, and flammable materials. Cigarette use by staff and public must be carefully controlled. The great fire at the University of Texas Library was caused by a welder's torch, or at least by the contracting work going on in the building.

Fire prevention for libraries is an extremely important consideration. Fire itself is not the only concern; heat, smoke, and water may destroy books fire does not even reach. As always, prevention is the best approach. (Jessie Adams)
