Dr. Pryor chairman of the Board of Disciplinary reported that his committee had been
 unable to secure any definite ^{additional} information
 from the Grand Jury or Commonwealth's
 attorney regarding the guilty parties in the
 disturbances of Halloween night and had
 therefore referred the whole matter back to
 the faculty for action.

*Witnesses
Mr. Neal.*

Mr. Neal, called before the faculty, related
 the facts of his arrest and appearance in police
 court; admitted that he participated in the
 disturbances of Halloween night, but
 without any malicious intent or any other
 purpose than simple fun; helped to smash
 a car tracks with a rock, also aided in the
 attempt to force the car off the track.
 took no part in throwing rocks at the police.

Shelby Jett.

Mr. Shelby Jett testified that on that night
 he had come toward the college from the
 direction of the city. Heard a crowd making
 disturbances in street in front of the college.
 went to the dormitory and got his a
 pistol from his room and joined the crowd.
 fired his pistol into the air during the
 disturbance and the conflict with police.

Pistol was not his, but belonged to a
 former student, who had left it in his
 room. Did not have pistol concealed under person.

He further recited the detail of his arrest and appearance in the police court.

Witness

T.R. Bryant Mr. T. R. Bryant testified that he had been asked by Mr. W. S. Webb the acting commandant to join him in the effort to quiet the disturbance on Hallowe'en night, first at Patterson Hall and afterward on and near the college grounds. Their efforts were for the most part unavailing.

Was arrested in the middle of the front campus by an officer who had been chasing other students across the grounds. Was taken to police station with others and had been before the police court.

Offensive reference in transit.

Stanley Barr.

At this point the investigation of the Hallowe'en cases was interrupted, and Mr. Barr editor of the Transit was called in to make a statement regarding the offensive allusion in this paper in reference to Governor Breckinridge. Mr. Barr stated that he did not write the article but that it expressed his opinion and he admitted responsibility for its insertion. He thought any student had the right to express his opinion as he chose.

Mr. Barr retired and the Hallowe'en cases were again taken up.

*Hallowe'en
Witness
Mr. Check.*

Mr. Check was the next witness; he admitted being in the crowds on Hallowe'en night; he was arrested when seeking to secure the release by the police of Bryant and others who, as he knew, were innocent. He was in the crowd that escorted police officer Myers from Patterson Hall to the college campus, and lifted his helmet when it was desired to get his picture; was also in the crowd that tried to run street car off the track. He had no intention of injuring persons or property.

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*Witnesses**Mr. Orem.*

Mr. Orem, the next witness testified that he had no part in the disturbances of Halloween night; he went to the police station between 11 and 12 o'clock that night and asked to see Mr. Bryant, while there he was arrested, and in the police court found charges against him of breach of the peace, confederating, etc.

Mr. Bogart

Mr. Bogart testified that he was in the so-called riot of Halloween night. Did not throw stones or help in the effort to get the car off the track; did not discharge firearms or throw stones. Later in the evening he went with Mr. Webb to the police station to see the boys who had been arrested. He then went out in an effort to procure bail for them. Later he returned to the police station and while there was arrested.

Mr. Swigert

Mr. Swigert testified that he heard the disturbances at Patterson Hall on Halloween night and thereupon joined the crowd there, and saw boys take the officers picture. Had no part in interfering with the street car; did not throw stones or discharge firearms. Did not have his hands on officer Augus at any time.

This closed the testimony for the day relative to the Halloween cases and the case of Mr. Baer was taken up.

All present condemned the article in the Transit, the general opinion seemed to focus upon the idea that some punishment should be inflicted for the act, and that a retraction and apology should be made by Mr. Barr.

Upon motion the faculty adjourned to meet the next day Nov. 21 at 3 P.M.
