Youth Rights Conference

The American Civil Liberties Union of Kentucky is preparing for our annual Youth Rights Conference September 20th from 9am-4 pm at the Lexington Main Public Library. The Conference is an opportunity for high school students from across the commonwealth to come together and learn more about civil liberties issues.

This year's conference will include a variety of topics including The First Amendment, Lesbian/Gay/Bisexual/Transgender Rights, Freedom of Religion, Immigrants' Rights, Reproductive Freedom and Students' Rights. We will be discussing these topics within a Human Rights framework that takes into consideration the roles of gender, race, class, sexuality, age, and geography in individuals' and communities' lives and experiences.

Our goal with this conference is to bring about a facilitated dialogue between civil liberties advocates and young Kentuckians. Our desire is to not only organize an engaging and diverse conference but to create a Youth Rights Committee for future advocacy work.

By developing a statewide network of engaged individuals we can make powerful changes throughout Kentucky. The ACLU can provide trainings and materials to help students educate their community about the issues that they care about the most.

Ladies, you're invited! Sister-Sound is starting to rehears Sept. 7th. I am looking forward to seeing my friends again after having the summer off, but it means more than that to me.

How can I explain what Sister-Sound means to me? It's more than just good friends, although that is a big part of it. It's more than the chance to sing, although that's important to me, too. It's not really a "gay chorus" as some of the straight Sisters remind us on occasion (by my count probably half of us are lesbians – now, do we have to be a majority to not be a minority?).

It's not just cracking up with the Director, although John (and his wife Beth) and I go back almost 20 years, to the time in my life I was married to a man. It's all of those things and more.

When I figured out that I was a lesbian at the tender age of 37, I felt disconnected from the community I had just "left." At the same time, I was embarrassed to admit to the gay community that I had been so dense. I felt very much the "newbie" and had no idea then how many women shared my path. Then I saw the ad in the GLSO newsletter – at that time, Sister-Sound was asking for 1st Sopranos- no audition, just show up. It felt like fate!

When I appeared at my first rehearsal, I felt so at home. Most importantly, I felt safe to be myself. I was welcomed by a warm, friendly bunch of women, both gay and straight...and I have been a part of SisterSound off and on since that day.

That was about 11 years ago. Still, it's difficult for me to explain just what SisterSound means to me. I do hope some





Admission is free with a donation to the "God's Pantry" food bank. There is a playground on the grounds as well as other activities of interest to children. For information see Lexpaganpride.org.


Historic Newsletters



Shooting at the Tennessee Valley Unitarian Universalist Church

On the morning of Saturday, July 27, Jim D. Adkisson entered the Tennessee Valley Unitarian Universalist Church (TVUUC) during a performance of a children's play and opened fire on the people gathered there. Two adults were killed, Greg McKendry, who stood up to the gunman blocking his ability to shoot others, and Linda Kraeger. Six other adults were injured but no children were harmed. The gunman was tackled by congregants and taken into police custody.

In his first media interview after the shooting, Rev. Chris Buice, said that Greg McKendry was someone who counseled and in other ways helped people in economic difficulty. If the circumstances were different, Greg would have been ready to help this man who's financial crisis may have been one of the factors contribut-

ing to his violence.

You may have heard that Adkisson made homophobic and anti-liberal remarks in the church and in a letter he had written to explain his actions. The police have the letter but have not released it's contents.

Many people including Rev. Chris Buice, the minister of the TVUUC, have called on authorities to make Adskisson's letter available to the public. Buice said that knowing the contents of the letter might help vulnerable groups including Knoxville's gay and lesbian community reclaim a sense of safety.

The Rev. Bob Galloway, pastor of the Metropolitan Community Church in West Knoxville, says he and his parishioners can't worship in peace until they know what's in the letter Adkis-

son wrote. (85% of his congregation is GLBT.) Knoxville Police Chief Sterling Owen said the letter detailed his hatred of gays and "the liberal movement." But the Police won't provide the letter or identify the shooter's targets. "If you needed to know, you would have been notified," the chief said.

Although I do not like the police Chief's attitude, I am not sure that knowing the contents of that letter would make me feel any safer. Don't we know what kind of things he said? I do think it would be interesting to see if his opinions seem to come from some of the radio and TV personalities that use what I consider to be hate speech. Maybe that will come out in the trial.

Rev. Bruice commented on the use of "hate speech" which he referred to as "dehumanizing language" and questioned the responsibility of individuals who are particularly strong in their condemnation of liberals including GLBT people. Rev. Bruice spoke about the power of language and said: "The words you choose may be the difference between war and peace".

The police seized as evidence books by Michael Savage, O'Reilly and Sean Hannity that were found in the shooter's apartment. Bloggers have been debating the affect of right wing rhetoric on this shooter and on the increase of "hate

speech" in America today.

Do you think that right wing "shock jocks" use language that encourages violence? Should they be censored or is it better to know what people are thinking? I would love to print a variety of opinions on this topic. Send an essay or just a paragraph to marycrone@insightbb.com.

The TVUUCR was more than casually supportive of GLBT people. They had a large welcoming sign in front of their church, they hosted social gathering for queer teens, and they worked to change opinions about GLBT rights. They will continue to do so.

Rev Sinkford, the President of the Unitarian Universalist Association of Churches, addressed those gathered for the rededication of the Tennessee UU Church. He said, in part, "We will not give in to fear. We will meet hatred with love. We will continue to work for justice. Unitarian Universalists stand on the side of love. We invite you to stand with us."

"Unitarian Universalism are not going to change living our religion that way. We simply are not. And you can say Amen to that! [We will] stand on the side of that larger love which can help us move through these difficult times, resulting from this tragedy, but [also] these difficult times for our world, right now. Fear will not prevent us from standing on the side of love, and we will continue to open our doors and our hearts to all people."

Our local UU Church will be hanging a large sign in support of GLBT marriage rights in October. Come join us in celebration.

Bernitt's Phi Alpha Gamma

UK Theatre alum Dan Bernitt (www.danbernitt.com) will be performing his recent one man show, "Phi Alpha Gamma", at Briggs Theater on Sept. 26 and 27 at 7:70. The theater is in the Fine Art Building on Rose St. Cost \$5 at the door.

Dan was nominated for a Lammy Award this year; quite an accomplishment for a 21 year olds. If you have never seen him perform, you owe it to yourself to attend this performance.

This play tells the story of four young men in a college fraternity struggling to deal with two brothers one an imprisoned gay-basher and the other a newly out gay man.

GLBT Publishing: Sappho by mary crone

Any discussion of GLBT Publishing should include a discussion of Sappho. Sappho was an Ancient Greek Lyric Poet, born on the Ile' of Lesbos sometime between 630 BCE and 612 BCE. She spent most of her adult life in the city of Mytilene on Lesbos. The word "lesbian" derives from Lesbos and was first acknowledged as meaning sexual orientation in the 1870 Oxford English Dictionary. Up until that time it was used to mean "the women of Lesbos."

The bulk of Sappho's poetry has been lost, but her reputation has endured through the surviving fragments of her verse and from references to her by writers in later centuries. A recent translation of a fragment:

> Love shook my heart Like the wind on the mountain Troubling the oak trees

Much of what is known about Sappho's life is based on interpretations of her work which has established a "biographical tradition" that may not be entirely accurate. Aspects of her life, such as her exile to Sicily during a period of political turbulence on Lesbos, are accepted because they can be cross referenced to other accounts from that time. Most sources state that she had a daughter, Cleis, but one source points out that the word for daughter could also be translated as slave or young woman.

One 10th Century source, The Suda, claims that Sappho was married to a "very wealthy man called Cercylas" and that he was Cleïs' father. This tradition may have been invented by the comic poets, as the name of the purported husband means "prick from the Isle of Man". So, keep in mind that

many of the "facts" of Sappho's life can be questioned, including the accuracy of the translations of the poetic fragments. Sappho wrote her poems to be performed with the accompaniment of a lyre, (thus "lyric poet") the common practice of the time. Very few people were literate in her time and singing, no doubt, made poetic verse easier to remember and pass on to others. Some of her poems were written on papyrus and rewritten by scribes over several hundred years after her death.

Sappho composed her own music and refined the prevailing lyric meter to a point that it is now known as sapphic meter; a four line stanza in which the first three lines are long, and the fourth is short. One of the few works considered to be complete, Hymn to Aphrodite, was written in this meter. It is addressed to the goddess asking her to aid in the poet's pursuit of a young woman.

Addressing gods and goddesses was a traditional part of lyric poetry, but Sappho was also one of a group of innovative Greek lyrists who ex-

perimented by writing from a personal point of view. She is acknowledged to be one of the first poets in history to write in the first person, describing love and loss as it affected her (or the narrator of the poem) personally. An example:

My life is bitter with thy love; thine eyes Blind me, thy tresses burn me, thy sharp sighs Divide my flesh and spirit with soft sound

Many of Sappho's poems speak of infatuations and love (sometimes requited, sometimes not) for various women, but descriptions of physical acts between women are few and their meaning debated. Many lesbians, including authors and scholars as well as readers, have seen themselves reflected in her words and are convinced that Sappho was sexually as well as emotionally involved with women. Other people believe that it was simply more acceptable for women to express strong passions towards one another at that time and place. (Personally, I don't see experts explaining away references to heterosexual love)

Sappho was honored by numerous writers and philosophers of ancient Greece. Plato elevated her from the status of great lyric poet to "the tenth muse". Aristotle (a student of Plato) said that "everybody honored the wise... and the Mytilineans honored Sappho..." Upon hearing his nephew sing one of Sappho's songs, Solon, an Athenian statesman and Lyric poet, asked that he be taught the song: "So that I may learn it and die."

Sappho's work endured well into the Roman period and were translated into Latin. Poets and philosophers of Rome continued to refer to her work and to compare other writers to her. Roman poet Horace, writing in the first century BCE used the "sapphic stanza" fre-

quently. Sappho wrote in an Aeolic Greek dialect no longer used or understood in Roman times and so it is reasonable that the remaining original works were not translated or preserved as the decades passed.

In the 3rd Century, philosopher Maximus of Tyre wrote that Sappho's relationships to the lesbians (women of Lesbos) were similar to those of Socrates: What else was the love of the lesbian woman except Socrates' art of love? For they seem to me to have practiced love each in their own way, she that of women, he that of men

Scholars at the great Alexandrian library (destroyed, probably between 50 BCE and 300AD) collected her poems in an edition of nine books, but this edition was lost during the Middle Ages.

It is now thought most likely that Sappho's poetry was largely lost through forces of cultural change that obliterated the work of many ancient poets, historians and philosophers. There remain stories of purposeful destruction of Sappho's work by various historical figures such as Gregory of Nazianzus and Pope Gregory VII. Most historians today do not believe in this theory.

During the Victorian era, Sappho was described as the headmistress of a girls' finishing school. This attempt at making Sappho more acceptable to the people of that time was not based on evidence. There are no references to teaching, students, academies, or tutors in any of Sappho's surviving works. Experts now suggest that Sappho's circle of women was somewhat similar to the Spartan agelai or the religious sacred band,


Nineteenth and early Twentieth Centuries were reading translations that are not considered accurate today. In the 1960s, Mary Barnard reintroduced Sappho with a new approach to translation that rejected the previous emphasis on rhyming stanzas and the use of "modern" forms such as the sonnet. Subsequent translators have tended to work in a similar manner, seeking to allow the essence of Sappho's spirit to be visible through the translated verses.

New material continues to be published as archeologists uncover more ancient papyrus and as technicians discover ways of reading ancient texts. Infrared light, for example, is being used to read blackened sections of ancient papyrus.

Sappho and her poetry have fascinated writers and artists for centuries and many of them have included her in their works: John Donne, Tennyson, Baudelaire, Willa Cather, Virginia Woolf, Richard Aldington, Hilda Doolitle, Renée Vivien, Marguerite Yourcenar, Ezra Pound, and Lawrence and Erica Jong are a few examples.

I conclude with another fragment from Sappho:

The Muses have filled my life With delight. And when I die I shall not be forgotten
