The Kentucky sports chief also is a member of the NCAA Basketball Tournament Committee and for the past six years has been president of the SEC Coaches and Athletic Directors Association.

Seventh Annual

UK INVITATIONAL TOURNAMENT

Four national basketball powers, all of whom ranked among the top dozen teams in the country last season with a combined won-lost record of 93-19, will be participants in the seventh annual University of Kentucky Invitational Tournament December 18-19. In addition to the host Wildcats,

the defending UKIT champion who finished with a 24-3 mark and second place national ranking, the 1959 tourney will include NCAA runnerup West Virginia (29-5), North Carolina (20-5) and St. Louis (20-6).

Pairings made by UK Athletic Director and Tournament Manager Bernie Shively have slotted Kentucky and the team they whipped for the title last December, West Virginia, in opposite brackets. A classic rematch of the two powers may be in the offing, but the high calibre of the tournament is reflected by the fact that all four participants are being touted for high national honors again this season and any one appears capable of winning. As Shively proudly puts it: "I believe this 1959 UKIT field to be the strongest ever assembled for a tournament in advance of the NCAA finals."

Outstanding fields are nothing new to the UK Invitational, however. In the short space of six years, University of Kentucky—a school already internationally respected in basketball circles—has captured the imagination of the cage world with its holiday cage festival that returns big-time basketball to the campus.

Increasingly-important national prestige has become attached to the UKIT as reflected by the fact that in the past two years the winner has valuted to the top position in the wire service polls.

Furthermore, the UK Invitational ranks far ahead of all other tournaments as the most lucrative in the history of the game. According to UKIT policy, all participating teams share equally in the net proceeds and the payoff each year has been of national-record size. Last year, each of the four teams picked up checks for \$13,817.35—exceed-

ing by better than \$2,000 the previous high dividend paid in 1957.

Kentucky's amazing "Fledgling Five" walked off with a fourth UKIT title for Coach Adolph Rupp last December by rolling to a surprise conquest (97-91) of highly-favored West Virginia, who later was to lose the NCAA championship by a single point. Oklahoma State outlasted Ohio State to capture third place. The feat of the Ruppmen was made all the more amazing by virtue of the fact that they measured Ohio State on the first night without the services of two starters—forward Bill Lickert and center Don Mills—and beat the Mountaineers with Lickert still in the hospital.

Previous participants in the UKIT have included La Salle, Utah, Dayton (two appearances each),

Minnesota, Illinois, UCLA, Southern California, Duke and Southern Methodist.

The outlook for the 1959 renewal promises no letdown in the calibre of basketball seen since the tournament was organized. All four clubs should rank high in the national cage picture.

Pre-season selections have pinpointed the host Wildcats and the North Carolina Tar Heels, who meet in the nightcap of the opening tournament session, plus the sharpshooting Mountaineers of West Virginia as teams to watch particularly this season. All three rank in the top five nationally in advance estimates. St. Louis, always a good basketball team, is rated as a darkhorse outfit.



Youthful Fred Schaus, 34-year-old sensation of the cage coaching ranks, guided the Mountaineers to another banner season in 1959 despite an upset registered by Kentucky's Wildcats in the UKIT. West Virginia, sparked by the tremendous Jerry West and the coaching genius of Schaus, copped a fifth straight Southern Conference crown for their mentor and lost the national championship to California by only a single point (71-70) in the NCAA finals at Louisville. Schaus later tutored the winning College All-Stars in the Pan American Games Trials. The Mountaineer mentor enters his sixth campaign determined to parlay the fabulous West and a scrapping combination into a revenge victory over the Wildcats. But the road to another UKIT title and possible Kentucky re-match is blocked by a first-round go with the dangerous St. Louis Billikens.

One of the nation's finest basketball coaches and gentlemen, Frank McGuire currently is in his eighth season as head man of the round ball sport at North Carolina. The transplanted Yankee, who previously gained wide fame during five years as the coach of his alma mater—St. John's of Brooklyn, shows a commendable overall collegiate coaching record of 230 wins offsetting 83 losses. One of his greatest clubs ever was the Tar Heel outfit of 1956-57 which went undefeated for 32 games enroute to the national championship. In an opposite vein, one of Coach McGuire's biggest disappointments came less than a year later in their first UKIT appearance as West Virginia snapped UNC's winning streak—which had grown to 37—to cop the tournament title. The personable Irishman was accorded 1957 national "Coach of the Year" honors for his feat of guiding North Carolina to their greatest season.


















Known affectionately to dyed-in-the-wool Billiken fans as "Papa John," Coach John Benington currently is in a second successful year of continuing St. Louis basketball on a high plane. In his first season as successor to peppery Eddie Hickey last year, he managed the Bills to an outstanding, 20-6. Benington's Billikens were invited to the NIT, but suffered an upset in the opening round at the hands of Providence. Numbered among the season's victories were convincing wins over eventual NCAA champion California (55-43) and NIT champ St. John's (72-63). Although a head coach only since 1956 and now in his second location, Coach Benington is no stranger to tournament play. The 6-3, 185-pound "Thin Man" of St. Louis U., as an undergraduate, captained the 1948-49 National Invitation Tournament champions.


