Dear William

Ash Hill - Dec - 30th / 1831.

Your communication of the 9th ultimo, came to hand in
ordinary time, & I have no doubt ere this, you are expecting an answer
from me; which under circumstances you might have calculated on, you
would have received some time ago - But little indeed, did I anticipate
the vexatious delay I have experienced since I received your letter & have not
until some two or three days since, had it in my power, to send you any
kind of answer, touching the subject matter of your communication -

The day your letter came to hand, I called to see Mr. Balla, but
found he had gone to Frankfort - I again & again called but found he
had not returned, & was absent from Lexington & could not see him - I then
left with his partner Mr. Shannon, your letter to me, together with your order
on Hoanna, to be delivered to Mr. Balla on sight, with my necessary verbal
instruction, which I conceived necessary to have adjusted, your transaction as
Attorney for Phillipsby in the Federal Court - Shannon informed me, he
delivered the paper to Mr. Balla & assured me on his part your business would
be promptly attended to & expected the money would speedily be made - & in
expectation of forwarding you proportion of the money to you, I delayed writing until
I could see the Marshall (Genl. Mr. Balla) - Some few days ago, when attending
