Dear Brother Paoli Inda Oct 18th 1831

With no other canopy than my tent, and no better seat than mother Earth, and a chair for a table I have taken up my pen to give you a brief sketch of our journey thus far, and to say something in relation to the business that you promised to manage for me with Capt McCalla the Marshall of Ky. — We have therefore, with scarcely any accident, but a good deal of attention got on thus far, all, including men, women, children, horses, and dogs in good health and unfagged spirits, and should the weather continue good I have scarcely a doubt that we shall all get out safe, and sound, and in tolerable good time. — As I came through Frankfort I called at the office of Mr. Hamma court, and a young man that wrote in Hamma's office told me he believed that Luke the aupt in execution in the case your memorandum speaks of, had paid to Mr. the mornng, and he supposed he had paid to Combs — Hamma was out of town, and could not see him, but I sat down, and wrote to him if he had not paid over the money, not to do it to Combs, as he had nothing to do in business, but to McCalla or if he had rather to John Cittenden who was employed, and attended to the business, and immediately by letter to inform you thereof. — Should he not have written to you before the receipt of this, you will please see Combs, and know of him, whether or not he has received the money, and if he has demand it of it, either by exhibiting this letter or the order I gave you to McCalla — This is the relation precise — by that Combs bears to the case, after first employing Blasor, I became somewhat peafull
