Minutes of the Meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky, December 15, 1959.

The Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky, pursuant to adjournment of December 8, 1959, for want of a quorum, met in the President's Office on the campus of the University at 9:15 a.m., CST, 10:15 CDT, Tuesday, December 15, with the following members present: Governor Bert T. Combs, Chairman; Robert P. Hobson, Dr. Ralph J. Angelucci, Dr. Paul B. Hall, Floyd Wright, Dr. William C. Wilson, W. F. Foster, J. Stephen Watkins, Ben Butler, Robert H. Hillenmeyer, Harper Gatton, Wood Hannah, Sr., Ted Gilbert, and Clifford E. Smith. Absent: Mrs. Paul G. Blazer. President Frank G. Dickey and Secretary Frank D. Peterson met with the Board.

A. Introduction of Mr. Gilbert.

President Dickey welcomed Mr. Ted Gilbert as a member of the Board of Trustees. He explained that Dr. Robert R. Martin had resigned as Superintendent of Public Instruction, that Mr. Ted Gilbert had been appointed by Governor Combs to fill the remaining period of office of Dr. Martin, and that the new Superintendent of Public Instruction was ex-officion member of the Board of Trustees of the University.

B. The Vice Chairman Presided.

The time of the meeting having passed, and President Dickey having received a call from Governor Bert T. Combs advising that he would be a little late arriving and requesting that the meeting proceed, Mr. Robert P. Hobson opened the meeting and proceeded until Governor Bert T. Combs arrived and assumed the chair as chairman, at 10:15 a.m. CST.

C. Approval of the Minutes.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the minutes of the Board of Trustees on September 15, 1959; and the minutes of the Executive Committee on October 16 and November 20, 1959, were approved as published.

D. Treasurer's Report.

Mr. Peterson submitted financial report of the University for the four-months period ended November 30, 1959, reading the following letter of transmittal and submitting the following financial report:

Dear Doctor Dickey:

I am submitting herewith the Financial Report of the University of Kentucky for the four-months period ended November 30, 1959. This report contains a balance sheet and related financial statements which present a complete financial picture of the period for all funds of the University.

The Current General Fund budgetary operations for the period reflect income realized for educational and general purposes in the amount of \$7,837,680.72, or 54.8% of the budget estimate of \$14,299,431.10. The expenditures, including encumbrances outstanding, amount to \$5,845,064.83. This represents 41.1% of the total Current General Fund Appropriations of \$14,218,114.13.

The report having been explained and members of the Board having been advised, upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the report was authorized received and put to record.

E. Annual Financial Report Submitted.

Mr. Peterson distributed to members of the Board of Trustees the Annual Financial Report of the University for the year 1958-59. He called especial attention to the summary statement found on pages 5-10. He recommended that the Board members read pages 11-22 and called especial attention to Schedule 4, Statement of Investments, found on pages 23 and 24. He referred members of the Board to Schedule 6, Statement of Current (General) Expenditures, found on pages 26-30. He suggested that the members might be interested in Schedule 10, Statement of Bonds Payable, found on page 38. Schedule 12, Statement of Fixed Assets, pages 40-43, was recommended for information. Mr. Peterson expressed the desire that members of the Board read the Financial Report. He stated that it was presented in semi-laymen's terms and compared most favorably with the financial reports of any institution of higher education in America.

Members of the Board, having manifested considerable interest in the Annual Financial Report and being advised, upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, approved the Financial Report and ordered it filed.

F. Revenue Bonds Retired and Interest Coupons Paid Ordered Destroyed.

Mr. Peterson submitted a schedule of University of Kentucky Revenue Bonds retired and interest paid by bond issues of those returned by trustees and paying agents, July 1, 1958 to June 30, 1959. He requested permission to submit to the Board, as a matter of record, and to request the authorization to destroy these bonds retired and the coupons paid, and that reference be made in the minutes by numbers of issued bonds and by numbers of interest coupons paid.

G. Contract with Department of Health. Education and Welfare Approved.

Mr. Peterson explained that Contract pursuant to Public Law 85-864, University of Kentucky, provides that the University of Kentucky Counseling and Testing Service shall supply testing materials and scoring service to the private and parochial schools of Kentucky. The service is provided on a non-profit basis and the sole purpose for entering into the Contract is to make such test services available to the private schools in Kentucky.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Contract was approved and authorized executed.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the request was granted and the list authorized put to record.

I. Engineering Experiment Station Budget Amended

Mr. Peterson submitted a revised budget for the Engineering Experiment Station of the College of Engineering. He stated that the primary purpose of the revised budget was to make possible an increase of \$9,231.35, all of which will be secured from existing research contracts with the Aeronautical Research Laboratory which is a part of the Engineering Experiment Station. He stated that this did not involve any appropriated funds, and recommended that the request be granted.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the amended budget was approved, effective December 1, 1959

J. Authorization for Student Union Building Application Approved.

Mr. Peterson explained that, for the past eighteen months, the Committee has been programming an expansion to the Student Union Building. The Student Union Building was originally constructed through a Federal grant and the issuance of revenue bonds, all of which will mature in 1962, and funds are now available to retire outstanding bonds. He stated that these bonds had been liquidated from fees collected from the students for use of the Student Union Building. He stated further that the estimate was originally \$1,500,000 for the addition but that the Committee was now convinced that it would take \$1,800,000 to construct an addition to the building necessary to accommodate the expanded services required. eral Housing and Home Finance Agency requires that 25% of the total be made available by the owner. He recommended that authorization be granted to make application to the Federal Housing and Home Finance Agency in the amount of \$1,800,000, and to advise that Agency that the 25% will be made available by the owner. He further recommended that authority be granted to request of the State Commissioner of Finance necessary approval and that, when all approvals are obtained, the application be filed immediately with the Atlanta office, to be dated and held, pending action of Congress.

Members of the Board being advised, upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Vice President, Business Administration, was authorized to make application to the Federal Housing and Home Finance Agency, Atlanta, Georgia, in the amount of \$1,800,000, with the understanding that 25% of the total will be made available by the owner and that the owner will provide funds necessary to equip the addition.

K. Injuries.

Mr. Peterson submitted the following report on injuries, with his recommendation of approval:

1. James Bond, an employee of the Division of Maintenance and Operations. This accident occurred August 20, 1959, at the Litter Test Shed, Coldstream Farm. A scaffold shifted and Mr. Bond fell a distance of approximately 61, injuring his left ankle. He was treated at the University Health Center where an x-ray was taken.

For the x-ray, there was a charge of \$3.00.

2. Lankford M. Seward, an employee of the Division of Maintenance and Operations. This accident occurred August 4, 1959, while Mr. Seward was pulling a cap on a cord to the exhaust fan in the basement of the Experiment Station Building (the storage room).

Mr. Seward jumped as he began his fall, straining his left arm. He reported to the University Health Service where an x-ray was taken.

The charge for the x-ray was \$3.00.

3. Mr. Jim Bryant, an employee of the Agricultural Engineering Department. This accident occurred on August 22, 1959, while Mr. Bryant was grinding a piece of metal, a small flake flying into his eye. He reported to the University Health Service and was sent to Dr. C. W. Trapp, who removed the corneal foreign body.

Dr. Trapp has submitted a bill for services in the amount of \$6.00.

4. Mr. Ralph Smith, an employee of the Grounds Department.
This accident occurred on October 9, 1959, on the new baseball field. Mr. Smith was picking up rock and other debris from the field. Some fluid from a split baseball got into his eye. He was treated by Dr. C. W. Trapp for the eye injury, making two visits to the doctor? s office.

For this service Dr. Trapp has submitted a bill for \$12.00.

5. Mr. Harley Johnson, an employee of the Carpenter Shop.
This accident occurred September 1, 1959, on the roof of the Experiment Station Building. Mr. Johnson was working with fiber-glass when a small bit got into his left eye. In reporting to the University Health Service, he was referred to Dr. C. W. Trapp for treatment of the infection.

For this service, Dr. Trapp has submitted a bill for \$5.00.

6. Mr. Wilmore Kirkland, an employee of the Division of Maintenance and Operations.

This accident occurred on June 4, 1959, in the basement of the Biological Sciences Building. In backing a fork lift out of the basement, the front wheel caught on the sill of the door, jerking the wheel out of the operator's hand. The spinner knob on the wheel struck his left hand and arm. In reporting to the University Health Service, an x-ray was taken, for which the University Health Service has already received its payment, by Board of Trustees action August 14, 1959. At that time, there was a question about the \$10.00 charge of Dr. J. S. Sprague.

A further investigation reveals Dr. Sprague was consulted with reference to the reading of the x-ray and that Mr. Kirkland paid an office call for examination by Dr. Sprague.

Dr. Sprague has submitted a bill for \$10,00 for his services.

7. Mr. Frank Hamm, an employee of Donovan Hall Cafeteria.

This accident occurred on March 9, 1959, when Mr. Hamm slipped on the dishwashing room floor, fracturing his ankle. In reporting to the University Health Service, an x-ray revealed a broken ankle and the patient was referred to Dr. Kearns R. Thompson for treatment.

Dr. Thompson rendered a bill for \$95.40, the details of this charge being as follows:

Members of the Board, being advised, upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, authorized payment of x-ray charge of \$3.00 in connection with the accident to James Bond; x-ray cost of \$3.00 in connection with the accident to Lankford M. Seward; medical bill for services in the amount of \$6.00 in connection with the accident to Jim Bryant; doctor's bill in the amount of \$12.00 in connection with the accident to Ralph Smith; medical bill for \$5.00 for services in connection with the accident to Harley Johnson; medical bill for services in the amount of \$10.00 in connection with accident to Wilmore Kirkland; and bill for medical services, office calls, x-rays and consultation in the amount of \$95.40 in connection with the accident of Frank Hamm, with the expressed understanding that the University does not in any case admit negligence or liability and that it does not in any way establish a precedent by authorizing the payment of these claims.

L. A. D. Kirwan, Dean of Graduate School.

President Dickey read the following statement to members of the Board of Trustees:

Appointment of New Graduate Dean

When it became necessary to start a search for a new graduate dean for the University, I consulted the members of the Graduate Faculty, the group with whom the Dean of the Graduate School must work most closely and intimately. The members of this group gave many excellent suggestions, not only in terms of names of persons to be considered, but even more important, they gave the characteristics and qualities of the person that they felt would be desirable for this position. It became apparent that the person who would be recommended as Dean of the Graduate School should know good teaching and should himself be a superior teacher. More than this, however, he must be recognized as a scholar and researcher in his own right. He should have made contributions to his own major field of study. Equally as important as these academic criteria is the point that the man should be a leader and should understand the areas of human relations which would make it possible for him to work effectively with the wide variety of superior teachers and researchers representing a number of disciplines.

Lasked for the opinions of numerous persons both here at the University and in other institutions, and when all ideas had been secured, it was my feeling that Dr. Albert Dennis Kirwan would be the person most ideally suited for this important position on our administrative staff of the University. Dr. Kirwan received the A.B. degree from the University of Kentucky in 1926 and the Ph.D. degree from Duke University in 1947. He has been a high school teacher, a coach, the Dean of Men and Dean of Students of the University of Kentucky, and has served with real distinction as a professor in the Department of History. He is a superior teacher, an excellent research man, and an administrator of proven ability. Dr. Kirwan has consistently contributed articles and reviews to historical journals; he is the author of several outstanding books in his chosen field of American history; and he is currently engaged in the writing of another book.

It is with pride and confidence that I recommend to you Dr. A. D. Kirwan to become Dean of the Graduate School of the University of Kentucky, on or before February 15, 1960 depending upon the date that Dean Herman Spivey finds at necessary to leave the University for his new post at the University of Tennessee.

A few questions were asked, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the recommendation of President Dickey was concurred in and Dr. A. D. Kirwan was named Dean of the Graduate School of the University of Kentucky, effective on or before February 1, 1960, depending upon the date that Dean Herman E. Spavey finds it necessary to leave the University for his new post at the University of Tennessee.

M. Governing Regulations.

President Dickey submitted a proposed revision of the Governing Regulations. He stated that the Governing Regulations had been revised and printed in April, 1955. He stated that copies of the proposed revised Regulations had been mailed to members of the Board, and that they may or may not have had time to read and digest the Regulations. He called attention to comments on the revised Regulations included in the material sent to members of the Board of Trustees.

Member Mr. Clifford Smith stated that he had some questions specifically concerning Articles 11 and 13, found on pages 52 and 55. He reported having been in touch with experts on setting up a retirement system. A general discussion ensued which was participated in by President Dickey and a number of members of the Board,

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, approval of the Regulations was postponed until the next meeting of the Board of Trustees, to give members additional time to study and consider the report, and that the Governor, Chairman of the Board, appoint a committee of Board members and President Dickey to study the regulations prior to the next meeting of the Board of Trustees, and give to the committee the authority to employ experts to study the Regulations and report to the Board, the cost not to exceed \$5,000.00.

N. Committee Appointed.

Governor Combs, Chairman of the Board, appointed the committee authorized and named Mr. Harper Gatton, Mr. W. F. Foster and President Dickey.

O. Foreign Agricultural Contract Funds Budgeted.

President Dickey submitted budget for the Foreign Agricultural Contract Funds scholarships for fiscal year 1959-60 in the amount of \$5,150.00. He also submitted recommendation to appropriate \$250.00 for entertainment of foreign dignitaries and foreign students in 1959-60.

Upon recommendation of the President and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the budgets were approved and authorized put into effect.

P. Budget, Bureau of Community Services, Approved.

President Dickey submitted recommendation that \$2,400.00 be taken from Foreign Agricultural Contract Funds and made available to the Bureau of Community Services, Account 3133. He stated that this would enable the Bureau to employ a secretary and graduate assistant to help carry on the work of the Bureau.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the recommendation was approved.

Q. Departments of Dairy, Poultry and Animal Husbandry Established.

President Dickey explained that the Division of Animal Industry included all work of the Agricultural Experiment Station connected with animal industry. He stated that he felt that separate departments would give greater emphasis to the work of dairying and poultry, and recommended that Departments of Animal Husbandry, Dairy and Poultry be established.

Members of the Board being advised, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, a Department of Dairy was established with Dr. Dwight M. Seath as head, a Department of Poultry was established with Dr. W.M. Insko, Jr., as head, and Dr. W. P. Garrigus will head the Department of Animal Husbandry.

R. Agricultural Engineering Building Named.

President Dickey stated that he was in receipt of a communication from Dr. Frank J. Welch, Dean and Director of the College of Agriculture and Home Economics, Agricultural Experiment Station and Agricultural Extension Service, stating that the Agricultural Engineering staff had raised the question of designating the Agricultural Engineering building 'Kelley Hall' in honor

of Professor J. B. Kelley who has served some forty years in this institution. He stated that Professor Kelley was recently honored by receiving the status of Life Fellow in the American Society of Agricultural Engineering, which is an indication that he has gained national recognition for his work at the University. He stated that, in view of Professor Kelley's long, faithful and effective services, and on the basis of recommendation of the Agricultural Engineering staff, he recommended that the Agricultural Engineering building be officially designated 'Kelley Hally'.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the recommendation of the President was concurred in and the Agricultural Engineering building was officially named 'Kelley Hall'.

S. Dr. Charles S. Bacon Employed.

President Dickey recommended that Dr. Charles S. Bacon be employed as professor of geology with the Kentucky Contract Team in Bandung, Indonesia, for a period of two years, beginning November 1, 1959, or during the period of the contract, whichever is shorter, not to exceed two years. He stated that Doctor Bacon has accepted the offer and has obtained a leave from Case Institute of Technology for the assignment, and that his employment is contingent upon approval by ICA. He recommended the appointment.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, Dr. Charles S. Bacon was employed to work with the team in Indonesia for a period of two years if the contract continues for such a period.

President Dickey stated that The Mead Corporation Foundation had given to the Kentucky Research Foundation their check for \$500.00, to be used toward scholarships in the Department of Chemical Engineering. He recommended that the check be accepted, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the members concurred in the recommendation of the President.

From: Professor J. O. Barkman, College of Agriculture and Home Economics -- \$100.00.

President Dickey stated that Professor J. O. Barkman had given to the University his check for \$100.00 to be used for a scholarship in the field of dairy manufacturing. He explained that this is one of many indications of Professor Barkman's sincere interest in the dairy industry of Kentucky and the total program of the University, and recommended that the gift be accepted.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Board authorized acceptance of the gift and requested the President to convey to Professor Barkman their appreciation.

From: Yoder Brothers, Inc., Barberton, Ohion-Chrysanthemum cuttings (value approximately \$175.00).

President Dickey stated that a communication from Dean Frank J. Welch informed him that Yoder Brothers of Barberton Ohio, had recently donated to the Department of Horticulture chrysanthemum cuttings valued at \$175.00, for use in research work now going forward. He recommended that this gift be accepted, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Board concurred in the recommendation of the President and requested him to write a letter of appreciation to Yoder Brothers.

From: Margaret Kern Crooker, Hattie Harris Kern, Rufus M. Kern, Lula Kern Humble, Charles A. Kern, Little Doctor's Office and all relics therein.

President Dickey reported that the University had received from Margaret Kern Crooker, Hattie Harris Kern Rufus M. Kern, Lula Kern Humber and Charles A. Kern, a doctor's office and relics therein, as a gift to the Kentucky Life Museum, in honor of the mother of the donors. He stated that this gift would provide a valuable addition to the Kentucky Life Museum and recommended that it be accepted. Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the members authorized acceptance of the gift and requested the President to convey their thanks to the donors.

From: Mr. and Mrs. Paul G. Blazer--125 Shares of Common Stock.

President Dickey reported that Mr. and Mrs. Paul G. Blazer had given to the Kentucky Research Foundation 125 shares of common stock of the Ashland Oil and Refining Company (present value \$2,875.00), to be added to the Paul G. and Georgia Blazer Lecture Fund. He expressed his appreciation for the continued generosity of Mr. and Mrs. Blazer and recommended that this latest gift be accepted. Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Board concurred in the recommendation of the President and requested him to write a letter of appreciation to Mr. and Mrs. Blazer.

W. Request of Member Mr. Floyd Wright.

Mr. Floyd Wright raised the question of the difficulty of being able to get in and out of McLean Stadium. He suggested that steps be made available at each end of the north and south sides of the Stadium to enable the holders of chair seats more easily to get in and out of these sections of the Stadium. President Dickey advised Mr. Wright that it was planned to review the problems and to make the ingress and exits to and from chair seats more available to the holders.

X. Request of Member Mr. Clifford E. Smith.

Mr. Clifford E. Smith requested that each member of the Board of Trustees be furnished a copy of the annual report of the affiliated corporations. He was advised that copies were available and would be sent to members of the Board.

Y. Statement of Governor Bert T. Combs.

Governor Combs expressed regret that he was unable to arrive at the meeting on time and said that he especially wanted to attend this meeting to express his interest in the University of Kentucky and his reaction to the manner in which the Board members handled matters brought to their attention. He stated that he had no desire to force his will or use his power in any way at the University and that he would depend upon the Board of Trustees, the President and his staff to run the University. Governor Combs, Chairman of the Board, raised the question and asked members of the Board to be thinking as to whether or not the meetings of the Board of Trustees should be opened to the press. He asked the Board further to be thinking as to whether or not more representation of the faculty should be made available to the Board.

Governor Combs stated that he expects to attend as many of the Board meetings as possible, that he is a graduate of this institution, and

that he is interested in furthering the work of the University.

President Dickey advised the Governor that the Board of Trustees and the University were nonored to have him present and that they deeply appreciated his experience and understanding of the problems and program of the University, and his desire to make the University the finest and best in the country.

Frank D. Peterson, Secretary Board of Trustees and Executive Committee
