EXAMINATION RULES

According to an announcement from the registrar's office the fol-lowing rules will govern the examinations:

GRADUATE RULES

Graduate students are required to take examinations under the same rules as those governing the undergraduate students.

STUDENTS BARRED FROM EXAMINATIONS

A student who has been absent from more than one-fourth of the total number of class exercises in any courses is barred from the final examination in that course. (Students entering late are included). The instructors are responsible for the enforcement of this rule.

LENGTH OF EXAMINATION

No written examination shall continue longer than three hours. All forenon examinations shall close not later than 12 c/clock.

MARKING SYSTEM

Results of work will be recorded in the registrar's office as follows:

A—Exceptionally bish quality, valued at 3 points per credit.

C—Fair, valued at 1 points per credit.

X—Absent from examination.

PROHIBITION IN COLLEGE

Prohibition in colleges continues to be the subject of emphatic debates and remedial plans for enforcement. Temperance organizations continue to manifest alarm and to labor incessantly to have university officials do something about the matter. It is submitted that such reformers ought to give a bit of study to the relationship between cause and effect. Logically, cause follows effect. Accordingly, it would be well to eradicate the flagrant causal evils underlying existing conditions within student bodies.

The Kernel believes that prohibition violations are more prevalent elsewhere than in college and that these diaregards of the law have produced understable habits among students. Bootleggers could not live on the trade furnished by students, but extra dollars coming from that source are appreciated. Their illicit business sense does not permit of such laudable eithics as a refusal to sell to men (and to women) who are seeking education.

The causal relation, therefore, is an exterior one. It arises among the masses. The Kernel believes that more attention should be directed there. Eliminate the evil at its source and the dilemma will be solved.

The general public seems to have the idea that college men and women are super beings; that they should be above reproach in every sense of the word. That is not true. They are ordinary human beings subject to the temptations which come to everyone, and it seems a bit unjust to be ready to condemn them for the slightest overt act. Being a part of the public, their indiscretions should receive ordinary publicity instead of widespread notoriety. Then, perhaps, more attention would be paid to the cause and effect of the question. ABOUT HELL WEEK

The National Interfraternity Conference, meeting in New York last week, recommended the abolishing of "hell week" in fraternity initiations.

Two hundred and twenty-one delegates were the conference, representing 60 national frate its council was organized in 1921 and has been active part in questions of mutual interest rious organizations.

The recommendation to abolish hell week is a natural agrowth of the sentiment that has been growing durge the past year. The argument presented to the country was that "if there were any psychological values in titing the fraternity across by rough methods, it would wave been incorporated long ago. Rough-house initiation odduces no constructive benefits and seriously underines the basic spirit of fraternities."

It will take time, however, for this practice to be roken. There are still many who are firm believers the rough stuff as a "maker of men." However it ill be better for the individual groups to take the stion instead of waiting for college authorities to take a lattist ster.

ARBITRATION IN PAN AMERICA

AMERICA

In the midst of the Senate's ballyhoo about the Kellogr Pact outlawing war there is danger that America will overlook two other agreements likely to have a more practical effect upon the maintenance of peace than the Kellogr pact itself. We refer, of course, to the arbitration and conciliation agreements negotiated by the Pan-American Arbitration Conference in Mashington, There is nothing new in them in principle. Under them the American states promise to arbitrate all legal questions and to refer non legal disputes to conciliation commissions. They agree in advance to abide by results of arbitration, though they are free to reject the recommendations of conciliators. The ground gained by these treaties is not so much in the realm of general principle as in the important realm of procedure. We have not space to discuss this in detail. We should, however, like to emphasize one great gain in the wording of the arbitration treaty. It applies with only two exceptions: one, to domestic questions "not controlled by international law" and the other to questions affecting states, not parties, to the convention.

In which case it showed more trust than the majority of the train-American nations which repeated the properties of the properties of the properties of properties and opening and preservations covering the scept in case of "denial of justice"—whatever that may mean. By not making any reservations covering the Monree Doctrine the United States has gone far toward transforming that doctrine into a Pan-American instrument. That is to say, while we may enforce the Monree Doctrine against European nations we shall submit to arbitration even questions which our State Department claims involve the Monree Doctrine if the difficulty is with one of the Pan-American countries.

1. doc:n tot detract from the credit due Mr. Hughes and our State Department that this position on the part of the United States is obviously wise politics calculated to allay growing resentment of our overlordship. Nevertheless American overlordship is likely to continue so long as our bankers and investors own most of the wealth of Pan-American nations. Under these circumstances they usually manage to own the government, For instance, we should not have been asked to arbitrate any disputes with Nicaragua because the recognized government of Nicaragua rested upon the buyonets of our marines and would not dream of challenging American authority. Something more than a formal treaty of arbitration is necessary to reach this underlying problem of modern American imperialism.
