



Dr. Otis A. Singletary has maintained an active role both in academics and athletics since he became the University of Kentucky's eighth president in August

Great strides toward academic excellence have characterized Dr.
Singletary's presidency at UK. The Schools of Dentistry and Pharmacy consistently rank among the best in the nation. Departments such as political science, history, and mathematics have also gained nationwide attention while the UK Library now rates among the best in the Southeast.

Under Singletary's leadership, the University of Kentucky has also become a major research institution. The Albert B. Chandler Medical Center is an established leader in research on cancer and the aging. UK's agricultural college

has provided important research in tobacco and equine diseases while other University research has focused on the field of coal and other energy sources.

Singletary's involvement in athletics is as impressive as his academic achievements. A former president of the Southeastern Conference, Dr. Singletary is a member of the NCAA Select Committee on Athletic Problems and Concerns in Higher Education. He is also chairman of the board of directors of the College Football Association.

As president of the principal institution of higher learning in the Commonwealth, Dr. Singletary is greatly concerned with the University's role as a land grant institution, a "people's university" accessible to all who can profit from education.

In the 13 years Singletary has been president, the University of Kentucky has grown in enrollment to about 23,000

students on its Lexington campus and more than 22,000 students in the University's 13 community colleges.

Recognition of his service to the University of Kentucky was evidenced by the UK Alumni Association which presented to Dr. Singletary its Alumni Service Award, an honor rarely bestowed upon a non-alumnus of the University.

A native of Gulfport, Miss., Singletary holds degrees from Millsaps College and Louisiana State University. An accomplished administrator, Dr. Singletary served as chancellor of the University of North Carolina at Greensboro and was executive vice chancellor for academic affairs for the University of Texas system prior to coming to Kentucky.

He and Mrs. Singletary, the former Gloria Walton, have three children: Bonnie, Scot, and Kendall.



Continued growth in practically all phases of UK athletics has been the hallmark of Cliff Hagan's nine-year reign as athletics director with outstanding attendance at football and men's basketball games, increased attendance at Lady Kat basketball games, and a steady upgrading of facilities.

In the coming year, the University will host the 1984 NCAA Volleyball Championships and the Mideast Regional of

the 1984 NCAA Basketball Championships. In 1985, the presitigious NCAA "Final Four" basketball championships will be hosted by UK and held in Rupp Arena.

Having graduated from the University of Kentucky with high distinction in 1954, Hagan has been a long-time advocate of a strong scholar-athlete program.

Hagan, one of the greatest players in UK basketball history, received one of his highest individual honors in 1978 when he became the first University of Kentucky player to be inducted in the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame in Springfield, Mass.

An Owensboro, Ky. native, Hagan is married to the former Martha Milton.

Alumni Members Dr. Ralph Angelucci Thomas P. Bell When Terry Hall arrived at Kentucky in 1980, the Lady Kats were coming off their most successful season ever and beginning to gain national respect. They had been ranked in the Top 20 throughout the 1979-80 season and had finished the year with a 24-5 record and a berth in the AIAW National playoffs.



But the season was just a hint of the great things to come under Hall's guidance. The Lady Kats have gone far beyond respectability and into the perennial role of national contender. They have been ranked in the Top 20 every week and averaged 24 wins per season since Hall's arrival.

In her first year at UK, Hall's Lady Kats went 25-6, winning the Kentucky Women's Intercollegiate Conference and reaching the final round of 16 in the AIAW National tournament. Hall was named the KWIC Coach of the Year that season

In 1982 and again last season the Lady Kats were considered among the top contenders for the NCAA championship. The 1981-82 squad won the Southeastern Conference championship and reached the quarter-finals of NCAA play before losing to eventual national champion Louisiana Tech on the Lady Techsters' home floor. Last year's Lady Kats were ranked fourth

in the nation but fell to Indiana in the first round of the NCAA tournament.

Hall's record at Kentucky is 72-19, and considering Kentucky's tough scheduling habits (10 games with ranked opponents last season AND this season), a .791 winning percentage is outstanding. Her career record is 165-79. That mark includes one season at Eastern Kentucky, five at Louisville and three at Kentucky.

Hall began her coaching career in the high school ranks. Following her graduation from Indiana State in 1966, she was named head coach at Butler High School in Louisville. In five seasons at Butler, Hall coached her teams to two Jefferson County titles and an overall record of 69-33.

Then it was on to Eastern Kentucky University, where Hall earned her Master's Degree in 1974 and was immediately named head basketball coach. The Lady Colonels went 14-6 that season and won the KWIC title over Kentucky, Louisville, Western, Morehead, Murray and Northern Kentucky.

Hall then accepted the coaching job at Louisville, where she was faced with rebuilding a program. She succeeded, guiding the Lady Cards to a 79-54 record over five years. In 1979-80, her last season at U of L, the Lady Cards won their first Metro Conference championship. Hall also coached tennis and softball at U of L.

A native of Salem, Ind., Hall earned both her undergraduate and graduate degrees in Health and P.E. While attending Indiana State, she starred in basketball, field hockey and volleyball. She was honored with the "I" Woman Award in 1965, and received the prestigious Hillman Award in 1966 as the most outstanding female athlete at ISU.

Coach Hall on Kentucky's Style of Play: "Our style of play, or trademark, is the fast break. We believe that applying immediate pressure on the defensive team is one of the best ways to win a basketball game. Kentucky is one of few teams in the country totally dedicated to fast break basketball. Defensively, we play whatever defense we feel will exploit our opponents' weaknesses. Our main concerns are controlling the tempo of the game, teamwork, and shot selection by our players."

Coach Hall on Working With the Players: "I place a high premium on hard work and dedication to the task at hand. I want my players to feel the same way. I try to teach them that "doors of opportunity" open and close very quickly in life as well as on the basketball court. So always be prepared. In the span of a lifetime, their 4 years of college basketball is short, therefore they should work hard, be dedicated, excel, and enjoy the opportunity that exists."



Mike Kindred
Assistant Coach
Eastern Kentucky University, 1980

Mike was hired as a part-time assistant at UK in July, and then was elevated to full-time assistant in late September following the resignation of assistant coach Dottie Berry. A 1980 graduate of Eastern Kentucky, Mike served for two seasons as assistant girls' basketball coach at Estill County High School in Irvine, Ky., before coming to UK.

A native of Winchester, Ky., Mike graduated from Clark County High School in 1975. He then attended Morehead State University for one year before transferring to Eastern. He received a degree in Industrial Education, and then taught at Clark County for one year before accepting a job at Estill County.

In his first season at Estill, Mike helped direct the varsity squad to its first-ever winning season in 1982. The following year, the Lady Engineers won their first district championship. Mike's junior varsity squad, meanwhile, was doing even better, finishing with a 15-4 record in 1982 and a 19-4 record in 1983.

Mike is very active in the Big Brothers-Big Sisters program, and currently sits on the organization's Advisory Board in Winchester. He is also an active member of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes, and was the FCA's 10th Region representative last year while coaching at Estill County.

Joining the coaching staff at UK fulfills a life-time dream for Mike, a 26-year old bachelor who has always been a "Big Blue" fan

Graduate Assistant Louisville, 1983

A former player for Coach Terry Hall at Louisville, Robin joined the Lady Kat staff in September. While at Louisville, Robin lettered in basketball four consecutive years, two of those seasons with Coach Hall at the helm. She was a member of the Lady Card teams that won Metro Conference titles in 1979 and 1981 and is in the record book for best free throw percentage in a season, which she set in 1979. Robin was also an outstanding high school player at Louisville Butler High. She helped her team to the Girls' State Tournament in 1976 and 1978. She was All-State honorable mention for three straight years and played in the East-West All-Star game in 1978. She also played tennis for three seasons and ran track one year at Butler.

Robin is pursuing a Masters Degree in Recreational Therapy at UK. She has a great interest in young people and has participated as a volunteer for Special Olympics for five straight years. She also is credited with starting two Youth Basketball Camps in 1981 and 1982 at the St. Matthews YMCA in Louisville.

A former collegiate softball player at U of L, Robin has umpired softball and officiated basketball and volleyball. She is 23 years old and single.


LISA NEAL Manager



NEW ORLEANS HAS 12-GAME WIN STREAK

Records: Kentucky 8-8 (Before Saturday's game at Old Dominion)

New Orleans 14-2 (Before Saturday's

game at Louisville)

Series: This is the first meeting between the two schools

New Orleans pulls into town with a 12-game winning streak (prior to Saturday's game at Louisville) and designs on a Top 20 national ranking. The Buc-Kettes lost to No. 7 LSU in their first game of the season, and fell to Utah in their fourth game.

The Lady Buc-Kettes return four starters from their National Women's Invitational Tournament championship team. Chief among the returnees is 5-9 forward Sandra Hodge, the NWIT's MVP and the fourth-leading scorer in the NCAA last year with a 27.3 average. She is again among the nation's top scorers this season with a 29.8 average. She also leads her team in rebounding at 8.4

The game marks a homecoming for former Paris High School star Cathy Stiles, the team's third-leading scorer at 8.8. Stiles is a 5-8 senior known for her outstanding passing and baseline shooting. Sophomore center Sandy Lucht, 6-1, adds 9.1 points and 4.9 rebounds a game.

New Orleans is among the nation's scoring leaders with an average of 84.5 points a game. Coach Joey Favaloro's team also pulls down 45 rebounds a game. Kentucky's scoring average is 73.8 and rebounding is 34.1.

Going into Saturday's game at Old Dominion,









Kentucky had lost two straight games to SEC rivals Vanderbilt and Tennessee. That gave the Lady Kats an 0-5 SEC record and an 0-4 mark in the SEC East Division.

Leslie Nichols, who should soon be discarding the protective mask she has been wearing most of the season, continues to lead UK in scoring (18.1) and rebounding (8.4). Diane Stephens and Karen Mosley add 13 points each while Jody Runge and Lisa Collins contribute 10 points a game.

Kentucky is ranked second in the nation and first in the SEC in free throw percentage at 77 percent. Nichols and Mosley are ranked one and two in the SEC's individual free throw rankings.

The schedule doesn't get any easier for the Lady Kats as their next four opponents are Top 20 teams. No. 5 Mississippi comes to town for a 7:30 p.m. game on Wednesday, and then it's on the road to No. 20 Florida, No. 11 Tennessee and No. 4 Georgia.

Martin Adds Experience for Lady Kats

Since coming to UK as a Lady Kat, senior guard Donna Martin has had a series of ups and downs but hopes to end her career as an integral part of the team's success. She proved her ability upon her arrival at Kentucky as a walkon her freshman year after a brief time at Valdosta State where she intended to play basketball. But homesickness got the best of her in Georgia and her performance at UK earned her a full scholarship the following year. During that sophomore year, she contributed her best performances in the most important games.

Last year, Martin was expected to be the first guard substitute off the bench but she suffered a severely twisted ankle which caused her to miss 10 of the team's 28 games. She was unable to regain top form until late in the season which affected her chances for starting this year.

"Mentally, it was hard to just sit and know that there was really nothing you could do about it," Martin said of the injury. "There was nothing I could do to change what was happening on the floor. But after the initial shock, it was just a matter of concentrating on what I had to do to get my ankle strong enough to where I could play again. But of course, by that time, I had missed a lot of games that really hurt."

However, Martin's dedication to the team and her enthusiastic spirit has enabled her keep improving and Coach Terry Hall is hoping that her experience will help fill the void at guard that resulted with the graduation of four-year starters Lea Wise and Patty Jo Hedges.


"Donna is a real fireball. She hustles all the time and makes things happen on the court. Her aggressive play is a great asset," Hall said.

Indeed, aggressiveness and hustle have been Martin's trademarks in recent games for the Lady Kats this season.

Martin sees her role as two-fold this year: as a model for the younger players and to help them build confidence in themselves. "My responsibility as a senior is to try to keep the team together and help bring the younger players into a team concept. When the younger players first come out of high school, they're all stars, and the team concept is so important because there are a lot of things to learn. A lot of the older players have been here three or four years and have seen a lot of basketball," she said.

"I think I can help the other players a lot by pushing them hard in practice to make everyone else the best player that they can be," Martin continued. "During practice, I try to point out things to the younger players that I see them doing to make it easier for them. And really, that's where they're going to get their confidence. It comes from themselves, but you can help them recognize things, and when they start to pick up on them, they start to play better."

So far this year, Martin has been able to step in and do the job at guard by supplying the team with an experienc-



ed hand in tight situations. That alone, has been a big factor for the Lady Kats due to their youth and relative inexperience after the graduation of three starters.

"We are a very young team and we just need the experience of more games," Martin said, "but I think the players have been hard on themselves, too. When they are having a bad night shooting, they start passing up shots rather than realizing that they can make it up in other ways, such as defense. They sometimes worry too much about what they are not being able to do instead of thinking about what they can be doing. But I think that situation will improve with more games."

A product of Lexington's Tates Creek High School, Martin is working toward a degree in Nursing with a minor in Psychology and is planning on a career in Sports Medicine. But until then, her time is devoted to a successful final season with the Lady Kats.

"Our team has started to play a lot better in recent games," she said. "Hopefully, we can pull everything together and get our enthusiasm up by the time post-season tournament action comes."

Kentucky vs. Tennessee: A Classic Rivalry by LESLIE HUDDLESTON

One of the South's greatest rivalries will continue tonight when the University of Kentucky men's basketball team tips off against the Tennessee Volunteers at 8:05 p.m. in Rupp Arena.

Despite the fact the Vols have been the most successful SEC team against the Cats, Kentucky has built a commanding 102-51 lead in the series, which began in 1910. In that first game, which UK won 20-5, UT failed to score a field goal, getting all of its points from J. D. Welcker, who hit five of 24 free throw attempts. As a result, Kentucky set an all-time shool and conference record for the fewest points allowed to an opponent.

Several other UK records have been set against Tennessee over the years. For instance, the Volunteers attempted the most free throws of any opponent when they hit 33 of 53 against the Cats on March 3, 1956. In terms of the smallest margin of victory for a Wildcat team, one of UK's many one-point wins came over UT when the Wildcats won 60-59 on February 12, 1968. Additionally, guard Ralph Beard made one of the longest shots in UK history when he connected from 53 feet, 9 1/2 inches during the 1947-48 season.

Both schools have also experienced some coaching changes over the years. Adolph Rupp won both games against the Vols in his first season at Kentucky (1930-31) and continued to dominate them until he retired. Current coach, Joe B. Hall, split the two games with Tennessee in his first year at UK (1972-73). In his first game in Knoxville, Hall's team trailed 65-64 with nine seconds left. Since UK was not in the bonus for free throws, center Jim Andrews was slapped, pushed, and kicked on each of the three times Kentucky tried to get a shot off in the final seconds. Finally, Tennessee's Larry Robinson stole the ball to preserve the victory.

Tennessee coach Don DeVoe has been quite successful against the Wildcats in his first five years. In his first season, 1979, the Volunteers defeated the Cats three times, twice in the regular season and again in the SEC tournament finals. Since then, the two teams have split every year, each winning at home.

Last year, Tennessee won the first game 65-63, despite at 42-point performance by UK's Melvin



Turpin. Turpin connected on 18 of 22 from the field and six of eight from the line, prompting DeVoe to say he should be the conference MVP. Kentucky got revenge in Lexington, winning 69-61. Turpin, again, had a big game, as did teammate Kenny Walker. But the night belonged to UT All-American Dale Ellis, who scored 31 points and grabbed nine boards.

Though Ellis is now in the NBA, the Wildcats can expect a tough game. The Vols return their other four starters and, prior to Saturday's game against Vanderbilt, were 12-7 overall and 3-4 in the conference.

The Vols have two solid front court seniors in 6-7 forward Willie Burton and 6-10 center Dan Federman. Burton is currently among the SEC's top 10 scorers, while the team's second leading scorer, Fred Jenkins, is only the second freshman ever to start for DeVoe. Additionally, senior guard Tyrone Beaman is third in the Conference in assists, while 6-7 sophomore Rob Jones is fifth in the SEC in field goal percentage.

In short, this could be another classic game in what has become a classic rivalry.



pportunities for UK students are not limited to the academic world. Involvement in the social and cultural aspects of University life also is important.

Recognizing this, the University provides the widest range of opportunities for personal and social development. If a student likes music, for instance, the Concert and Lecture Series brings outstanding soloists and symphonies on campus. There are chamber music concerts and hard rock concerts, impromptu bluegrass groups and flute recitals. 
Assistant Directors Of Athletics




