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

A commendable ambitton—getting a job. We would not minimize its importance. But is there not something more—a vague, disquieting hint of a problem which has something to do with Life and what one does with it? The Germans express it beautifully by Die Weltanschauung which, translated, means The View of Life.

Knowledg is but a part of Die Weltanschauung. Life is too big, too enveloping, varied, mysterbus, interesting, uninteresting, sordid, beautiful, mad and same, quiet and tumultuous to say that any one thing is the be-all and end-all of existence. The student will not have attained Die Weltanschauung by the time he has graduated but surely he should be seriously concerned about getting it. From his reading, meditation and experience, from the confusion and perplexity of it all, somehow there must be a quiet lagoon, if he can only find it, some blace where he can erect around him a structure of Beauty.

But let him remember that Die Weltanschauung is different for each of us. In the final analysis none of us can help another for although human nature is the same, ideas are constantly shifting. As Spencer put it, "Truth generally lies in coordination of antagonistic opinions." To attain some degree of visdom without growing cyrical and bitter! To understand human fraitlies and weaknesses without despising! To listen sympathetically! That is building Die Weltanschauung.

WHY GO TO COLLEGE?

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

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
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
